Description: The ABC7 Player of the Week award is given to the top high school football player from the previous week. Each Tuesday at 6pm, starting August 22, 2023, the athlete who was chosen for that specific week is revealed. WZVN goes to the team's practice and interviews the player and coach with their reaction and analysis of how the game went.

Title: Hurricane Idalia Preparations

Description: Hurricane Idalia was forecast to come dangerously close to southwest Florida. Community interest is especially high given the impact of Hurricane Ian which struck 11 months ago. WZVN’s Chief Meteorologist and Hurricane Expert John Patrick explained to viewers the track of the storm and variable that could impact the track as well as what impacts would be felt in southwest Florida. Reporters explained to viewers what they should do to prepare for Idalia and how they could secure their homes and plan for any insurance claims.

Title: Hurricane Idalia Continuous Coverage

Description: WZVN was on the air for our community for 32 straight hours leading up to, during, and after Hurricane Idalia moved passed the coast of Southwest Florida. Leading up to the storm, WZVN alerted the community to the possibility of storm surge, high winds, and heavy rain. During the storm WZVN forecasted the track, rain, winds and storm surge danger and provided urgent warnings and alerts to residents. After the storm, reporters spread out to assess

the damage and alert the community to dangers still present. As recovery began, WZVN helped to guide people to available resources and assistance.

Title: Hurricane Ian, Survival to Revival

Description: This quarter, WZVN broadcast an hour-long special to mark the one-year anniversary of Hurricane Ian. The special, entitled "Survival to Revival," shared stories of strength and resilience in every part of Southwest Florida. The hour of coverage was different from anything else in the market in several different ways. It began with a promise that WZVN would not be showing any video of the storm as it made landfall. Six members of the WZVN team told six unique stories about Hurricane Ian's impact, and how community members have come together since the storm. Anchor Geoff Harris focused on construction crews, and the way they are physically rebuilding Southwest Florida every day. Anchor Meagan Miller shined a spotlight on two restaurants that were destroyed in the hurricane but found new ways to keep their business going and keep customers coming back. Reporter Alex Howard showed viewers how mangrove and cypress forests actually benefitted from the hurricane's hard reset. Meteorologist Jim Dickey explained how a famous restaurant located just a mile from where the storm made landfall escaped with minimal damage. Chief Meteorologist John Patrick showed viewers how the town of Everglades City made changes after a different hurricane and fared much better during this one. Reporter Amanda Lojewski shared the story of volunteers who helped save homes across the hardest hit areas of the market.

Issues:

Weather & Environment

Summary: This quarter provided many reports regarding invasive species. Every summer, Florida Fish & Wildlife holds the Florida Python Challenge. Its goal is to get as many invasive Burmese Pythons out of the Everglades despite trappers freedom to catch pythons year-round. This quarter, trappers caught the longest python ever in the state, measuring 19 feet long. Another trapper also discovered a big python on a 60-egg nest. Pythons are not the only invasive species threatening the Everglades. A growing number of Green Anaconda sightings are threatening to harm the ecosystem. These snakes are much larger and pose just as great a threat. Invasive plants are also a constant battle. Collier County wanted to put homeowners on alert to invasive Air Potatoes that can destroy entire gardens and forests by suffocating native plants. Water quality continues to be a problem in Southwest Florida. Blue-green algae blooms clogged canals. WZVN highlighted how cities planned to fight the blooms that can be harmful to health. Saharan dust is also an annual weather event that greatly impacts our forecasts and health. WZVN tracked the dust plumes and their impact. After Hurricane Idalia, wildlife was trapped when storm surge receded. Wildlife crews had to rescue multiple manatees from canals.

Health & Consumer

Summary: This quarter was a hot one for Southwest Florida. WZVN got viewers more on how to stay safe in the heat, including the risk of leaving children in hot cars. The heat and Hurricane recovery also saw a spike in tire repairs costing consumers a lot of time and money. Summer is also a popular time for sports like pickleball, the fastest growing sport in the country. WZVN investigated the sudden rise in pickleball related injuries plaguing the sport. The death of Jimmy Buffett was a shock to many people in Florida. Buffett found his style in the Florida Keys and frequented Southwest Florida. WZVN researched the rare cancer he quietly battled for years.

Community Development & Local Economy

Summary: Southwest Florida is one of the fastest growing regions in the country, and it shows with the amount of construction and community development. Some big projects happening this quarter included adding new traffic lights to multiple busy intersections in the City of Cape Coral to make them safer. Construction on a major stretch of US 41 should also be wrapping up after more than 5 years. Residents also fought to stop changes to Jaycee Park in Cape Coral. As the City of Cape Coral grows, the demands become greater on the bridges in and out of the community. County Commissioners approved designs for a new Cape Coral Bridge that will replace the original bridge over the Caloosahatchee. Meanwhile in Downtown Fort Myers, city

council approved the sale of an old newspaper building that has sat empty for years. It will now be turned into low-income housing, shops, and restaurants.

Insurance Crisis

Summary: Florida's insurance crisis continues to evolve. Hundreds of thousands of people and businesses, including school districts received notices their rates would be going up by double digits. More private insurers announced they would be leaving the state entirely, dropping thousands of customers. Citizens, the state-run insurer of last resort, also warned it was taking on too many homeowners, and might have to impose a Hurricane Tax on everyone in the state unless it shed policies and raised rates. Citizens announced it was dropping hundreds of thousands of homeowners and raising rates by 11.5%.

Law & Public Safety

Summary: Many new laws went into effect this quarter in Florida. Supervisors of Elections expressed concern that their vote-by-mail ballot requests had be purged before every general election. They now worry longer lines at polling places on election days will deter people from voting if they do not register again for a mail ballot. New rules for schools also went into place, including teachers being prohibited from using a child's preferred pronoun and allowing them to use a bathroom that matches their gender identity. Teachers are also required to use a child's name given at birth. In order to call a child anything else, a teacher would need a permission slip from the parent. That includes nicknames like calling someone named Timothy Tim. Permission slips are also required for students to check any book out of the library.

Positively Southwest Florida & Bright-Side Blocks

Summary: This segment is a staple on WZVN's weekday evening newscasts. At 6pm and 7pm, WZVN broadcasts two segments that highlight the good happening in Southwest Florida and around the world. We select a variety of human-interest stories that showcase how people in our community are helping others and giving back to further develop our community, our people and our paradise.

Title: Blue-Green Algae

Description: Blue-green algae plagued Cape Coral. The Florida Department of Health issued a blue-green algae health alert for Jaycee Park along the Caloosahatchee River. Algae was also found in the Rubicon Canal, the Paradise Marina Entrance in Waterway Estates and the Rivers Condo. Blue-green algae is harmful if ingested and can irritate your skin. The City of Cape Coral set aside \$300,000 to combat blue-green algae. The city said it would use the money to invest in more bubble curtains and treatments against harmful algal blooms. During the hottest parts of the year, blooms become more noticeable. Crews deployed hydrogen peroxide to keep the blooms at bay. Still, with this summer being the hottest on record, some scientists were concerned that hotter summers like this could worsen Cyanobacteria problems.

Title: Record Breaking Pythons

Description: There were many record-breaking Burmese Python finds this quarter. A group of trappers set the new record for the longest python ever caught in the state of Florida. The snake they caught measured 19 feet long. The previous record was 18 feet, 9 inches long. Researchers say the snake was anywhere between 18 to 21 years old and had just finished sitting on eggs. WZVN got viewers more by showing what researchers do after record pythons are caught. Scientists at Florida Gulf Coast University dissected the record 19 foot python caught in Collier County. The dissection held a dual purpose; to gain a comprehensive understanding of the python's internal organs and to meticulously search for parasites that might be posing a threat to Florida's native wildlife. Parasites had been discovered in previous python dissections, causing detrimental effects on the native snake populations of Florida. The team has done as many as 40 necropsies on Burmese pythons and is determined to shed light on these "backseat driver" parasites and their potential impact on both wildlife and humans. Another trapper caught a snake with a clutch of 60 eggs. Experts say finds like that help curb the population growth of this invasive species. While the exact number of invasive Burmese pythons is not known, experts say there could be upwards of 100,000 snakes lurking in the Everglades. The annual Florida Python Challenge was also held this quarter in the Everglades. Over the ten-day period, 209 invasive Burmese Pythons were removed by nearly 1,000 hunters from around the world. Florida Fish & Wildlife Commission awarded the trapper with the most pythons a \$10,000 check.

Title: Saharan Dust

Description: As heat continued to stifle Southwest Florida, Saharan dust blanketed the skies creating health concerns for many people. It brings nutrients that can worsen algae blooms and red tide. The dust also creates dryer atmospheric conditions that can lead to hotter temperatures. Doctors also warn the dust is made up of tiny particles that can irritate your eyes, nose and throat, creating allergy-like symptoms. There are some benefits though. The dry air reduces the risk of tropical systems forming.

Title: Invasive Anacondas

Description: Florida's Everglades have been home to various invasive species over the years, but a new concern arose with an increase in sightings of green anacondas in the region since 2000. These enormous snakes, native to South America, captured the attention of experts and sparked worries about their impact on the delicate ecosystem. What sets green anacondas apart from other invasive snakes, like pythons, is their build. While pythons are long, anacondas are fat. They are known as the largest snake in the world, reaching lengths of up to 25 feet and weighing almost 500 pounds. The presence of smaller anacondas, even juveniles, in the wild suggests the possibility of reproduction, indicating a worrisome trend. The concern surrounding the green anacondas centers on their invasiveness and potential impact on the Everglades. With reports of these snakes found away from civilization, there is a growing fear that their population might be larger than expected, and they could disrupt the already fragile balance of the ecosystem. The parallels between the current green anaconda sightings and the past occurrences of Burmese Pythons from the 80's and 90's are disconcerting. The experts note that this pattern bears a resemblance, raising the question of whether history might repeat itself, further exacerbating the problem.

Title: Fecal Bacteria Health Alerts

Description: The Florida Department of Health Issued multiple Public Health Advisories for elevated levels of fecal bacteria in the water off the coast. Enterococcus bacteria normally inhabit the intestinal tract of humans and animals. Water contact may pose an increased risk of disease, diarrhea, and abdominal pain. High levels of these bacteria mean possible pollution, which could come from stormwater runoff, pets, wildlife, or sewage.

Title: Trapped Manatee Rescues

Description: Twice this quarter, animal rescue crews had to pull manatees trapped in canals. Five manatees were rescued from a Whiskey Creek canal and relocated. The mother, calf, and three juveniles were taken to Horton Park in Cape Coral after being evaluated to be released. Experts say storm surge from Hurricane Idalia allowed the manatees to get over storm walls, but when the flood water receded, they became trapped. Another two manatees, a mother and calf, were rescued from a similar situation in Cape Coral.

Title: Air Potatoes

Description: Collier County asked residents to keep an eye out for the invasive air potato plant. The plant can suffocate trees and darken the forest floor, causing harm to low-lying plants and wildlife. The vine can be identified by its arrow-shaped leaves and potato-like bulbs that grow along its' stem. The bulbs are not potatoes but a type of toxic yam. The Naples Botanical Gardens recommends removing the plant by simply digging out the entire root structure and disposing of the plant. When removed, staff says to check for excess bulbs, as that is how the plant regrows.

Title: Women's Self Defense

Description: The Charlotte County Sheriff's Office partnered with ATA Martial Arts to hold self-defense classes for women. This class is vital for women to feel confident if something happens. There is the physical portion of the class but also the mental side which installs psychological confidence. The purpose for the class is a serious one but in a room of all ladies, the pressure to be perfect does not exist.

Title: Pickleball Injuries

Description: In this WZVN special report, as pickleball continues to grow in popularity, injuries from the sport continue to climb as well. For the third straight year, pickleball retained the title as the fastest-growing sport, especially right here in Florida. According to USA Pickleball, there are more than 44,000 courts spread across the country, with over 2,800 right here in Florida. That is second only to California, which has around 3,500. But as more people hit the court, local physical therapists say they have started to see more athletes come into their clinics because of injuries. One factor is the age of many people playing the game.

Title: Help Candy

Description: The State of Florida is trying to put an end to THC products that look attractive to kids. It banned just over 68,000 products in their week-long 'Kandy Krush' operation. That means products made in the shape of humans, cartoons or animals. Anything that is made to look like existing food products or brands will not be allowed in smoke and vape shops. In Lee County, two businesses were caught selling gummies with hemp extract that did not follow the new laws. In June, Governor DeSantis signed a bill into law that closed a loophole in Florida's hemp statutes. Until then, high-potency hemp products could be sold without restrictions, including to children.

Title: Tire Repairs

Description: Tire shops in Southwest Florida say they were extremely busy repairing flat tires, which has become a very costly problem for drivers. One person said they had nails in three of their tires. Tire shops said they were seeing about 10 people a day for tire repairs. It was not just nails either. Tow truck drivers said they were overwhelmed with motorists stranded on the side of the highway with blown tires. Flat tires have plagued drivers since Hurricane Ian. I-75 has been littered with blown tires and debris. Oftentimes, crews are not completely cleaning up sites where tire blows happen along the highway, leading to more blown tires. One company said in the first eight days of August it reported 141 tire service calls.

Title: Hot Car Dangers

Description: Summer is a dangerous time for children being left in hot cars. In just two minutes, the interior of a car can go from 80 degrees to 94. But numbers do not really give the whole picture. Children and infants are smaller, so they tend to heat up faster. So even within 10 minutes of a child being in a hot car, their body temperature can rise. They tend to sweat, they lose salts, they lose fluid, disoriented or dizzy, that can lead to coma or death in a very short period of time. Even cracking the window does not do much.

Description: Amazon offered a new way to pay for groceries at Whole Foods. Instead of paying with cash or card, customers use their palm. Experts say it is like using your fingerprint, but more advanced. The palm print is linked to the customers Amazon account and phone number.

Title: Jimmy Buffett Skin Cancer

Description: For decades Jimmy Buffett strummed his 6-string for parrot heads across the country, on stage doing what he loved for the people he loved. His sun-drenched songs celebrated life by the shore. Buffett found his musical voice and his people after moving to Key West in the 70's. He captured the feeling of lazy days in paradise but what his fans did not know is that for the past 4 years, Buffett continued to perform while receiving treatment for Merkel cell carcinoma. The American Cancer Society said that while the disease is rare, the number of those diagnosed with it has been increasing over the past few decades as our population ages. There are only four types of skin cancer from our skin, Basal cell carcinoma, Squamous cell carcinoma, Melanoma and Merkel cell. About 3,000 people are diagnosed with Merkel cell carcinoma a year. In many cases, it is related to UV exposure.

Title: New Cape Coral Traffic Lights

Description: Cape Coral transportation officials discussed adding new traffic signals at six intersections throughout the city. One of the spots is the four-way stop at Chiquita Boulevard and Embers Parkway. Two locations on Del Prado Boulevard are already approved for traffic lights, Averill Boulevard and De Navarra Parkway. Over the last three years, Cape Coral Police say there have been over 300 crashes at these intersections.

It received nearly 1,500 responses about adding a band stage, beach volleyball, a river overlook and much more.

On average, the county loses \$30,000 a day when tolls are not collected. Those numbers are based on the Sunday average of last year so they could be skewed. In 2022 for the same exact days the tolls will be closed, the sum of the expected loss of revenue would

equal \$180,000. The county later approved extending the free tolls another four weekends to drive traffic to the Island Hopper Songwriter Festival.

Description: The Fort Myers City Council agreed to sell the old News-Press building to Tre Bel Housing and Procida Experience for \$11 million. Another developer offered \$17.4 million for the property at the corner of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard and Fowler Street, but five city council members agreed to lower the cost because housing in the proposed development would be more affordable. The plan is to turn the space into 614 units of multi-family housing. At least 100 of those units would be designated for attainable housing. The plan would also add a full-service grocery store with parking, a park and 10,000 square feet of restaurants and retail shops. They also agreed to set aside almost five acres for a new police station. Deal negotiations could take months to sort out before any ground is broken.

Title: New Cape Coral Bridge

Description: The Lee Board of County Commissioners chose a design for the new Cape Coral Bridge Replacement Project. Earlier this year, the Lee County Commissioners moved forward with a plan to reconstruct the Cape Coral Bridge in a \$200 million project. Both design options would change access to the Caloosa Yacht and Racquet Club, incorporating a U-turn lane that juts out over the river. Alternate 1 would put the U-turn near the Caloosahatchee River underneath the replaced bridge structure, and it is the most cost-effective option. Alternate 2 would put the U-turn closer to the Caloosa Yacht and Racquet Club entrance, but it would require the construction of an additional bridge structure. The Cape Coral Bridge Replacement Project is estimated to cost approximately \$300 million, with construction expected to start in 2026.

Title: School District of Lee County Insurance Increase

Description: Local school districts got hit with massive insurance increases this year. The School district of Lee County was hit with a \$12 million dollar rate increase after more than \$150 million in Hurricane Ian damages. That is five times the \$31 million in losses caused by Hurricane Irma in 2017. The district has 118 schools and other property to insure. Collier County Public Schools said their policy rates are jumping from \$6.7 to \$10.7 million a year. Charlotte County Schools report their insurance policy rates are increasing by 75% and noted property owners will pick up the tab. While districts do not have an option, the increased insurance rates will ultimately be paid with property tax revenue.

Farmers' decision affects more than 100,000 customers. The announcement came just one day after Florida Chief Financial Officer Jimmy Patronis threatened to act if the company pulled out of Florida. Earlier this year, United Property and Casualty (UPC) went insolvent and pulled out of Florida — leaving 140,000 people looking for new insurance. Weston Property and Casualty and Southern Fidelity went insolvent last year, impacting more than 100 thousand customers statewide.

Title: Hurricane Tax

Description: Many Florida homeowners feared a hurricane tax could be looming over the state as hurricane season is in high gear. If a private insurance company gets hit with a big storm and they cannot afford to pay out... they can go bankrupt. However, state-run Citizens cannot go belly up, so that leaves people statewide — even those who do not own a home in Florida, picking up the tab. Governor Ron DeSantis warned back in March that Citizens simply does not have enough money to cover its more than 1.3 million policies. Currently, Citizens has about \$4.8 billion in the bank, and Idalia claims are expected to take a big chunk of it since Citizens is the largest insurer in the Big Bend area where the storm made landfall. Experts worry the only way the state-run company could pay out hurricane damage is to charge everyone a hurricane tax. That insurance tax would also be placed on car and renters' insurance. It last happened in 2004 when 10 hurricanes hit the state, and Florida residents were stuck paying off citizens \$1.7 billion tab through 2015. Citizens realizes how vulnerable it is. The company asked the state for a 12% increase, but that was rejected, and while it may save policyholders money, it could end up costing all of us in the long run.

Title: UPC Claims Not Processed

Description: Nearly one year has passed since Hurricane Ian swept through Southwest Florida, yet thousands of homeowners were still waiting for repairs due to unprocessed claims that the state never received. Several of those homes were insured by United Property and Casualty (UPC) of Florida, which went bankrupt last year. The Hurricane Ian claims left unpaid were supposed to be processed by the state. However, the state may not be aware that those claims even exist, leaving many in limbo. The Florida Insurance Guaranty Association (FIGA) is the state agency responsible for processing claims from bankrupt companies.

Title: Citizens Shedding Policies

Description: Florida's largest insurance company prepared to shed tens of thousands of policies. The state-run company Citizens Insurance currently has 1.3 million customers. Between September and Jan. 1, 2024, the company said it would wipe away half a million of those customers. The company would randomly assign those policies to new companies. Homeowners may have to accept the offer even if it means paying more. New state law says policy owners must accept a private insurer if their policy increases by 20%. If the new policy totals more than 20%, they have the right to reject the take-out offer. Florida has five new residential insurers that have been approved to write business in the state, including Orange, Orion180, Mainsail, Tailrow, and Loggerhead. For anyone who received a take-out offer from Citizens and is appointed to another company, the best advice would be to shop around and make sure they are getting the best deal.

Title: Roof & Insurance Policies

Description: Property liens were being placed on some Hurricane Ian-damaged homes, and owners may be completely unaware of why. It turns out many of these homeowners thought their roof was fully insured for complete replacement, when in fact, it was not. Many Southwest Florida homeowners were discovering that they have what is called a "roof replacement schedule." That basically means if they have an older roof that is damaged in a storm like Ian, they could end up paying for half of the repairs, and in some cases, that can cost as much as \$15,000 if they do not have complete replacement cost on their policy. Insurance experts said they urge homeowners to get complete roof replacement coverage so they are not caught off guard.

Description: Just one year after Hurricane Ian, Citizens Insurance announced a significant rate hike for its policyholders. The company announced it received approval to place an 11.5% increase on home insurance policies. must get rid of policies, or the entire state risks paying an insurance tax. He advised people to check their mail and communicate with their agent if they receive a notice informing them they must go with a private company.

Title: Kratom Age Law

Description: A new Florida law states it is illegal to sell, deliver, barter, furnish, or give, directly or indirectly, any kratom product to a person under 21 years of age. Kratom is an herbal substance that can produce stimulant and sedative-like effects. Kratom is sold in many kava bars across Florida. Kava is a complex plant that's root is often brewed into tea. Both kava and kratom have become a craze in the Sunshine State. The first kava bars opened in the early 2000s in South Florida. From liquid form to powder form, the products he distributes are the ones you end up seeing in common places like a kava bar. The miracle root, as some call it, can be used for many different reasons. Business owners say it has been used for thousands of years in a traditional sense with tribes even, and some like it just as an option or alternative alcohol. The Florida legislature slapped an age limit on kratom consumption. The law not only came with an age limit, it also requires more transparency in product labeling.

She said the event was on July 29 and 30 at Cape Coral City Hall. The problem is there was no such event and the scammer was asking for money ahead of time. The city says it never uses apps like Paypal, Cash App, or Venmo. The city said all payments go through RecTrac, and you will get a confirmation receipt.

Title: Vote-by-Mail Ballots

Description: WZVN learned hundreds of thousands of vote-by-mail requests had been wiped out of the system in every county in the state. That meant all those people would not receive a ballot in the upcoming March primary. Lee County would like to have about 250,000 vote-by-mail requests in its system, but only has 23,000. In Collier County, there are about 50,000 fewer mail ballots slated to go out. In Charlotte County, last year there were 34,00 vote-by-mail requests and currently they have just 5,600. It is up to voters to reach out to the county they live in to request a ballot be mailed to them. A new law signed by Governor Ron DeSantis required counties to purge requests before every general election. They claim it will cut down on election

fraud, although no significant fraud has been discovered in Florida. Now Election Supervisors are worried election day polls could be overwhelmed.

Description: There was growing division in Florida's Republican Party as top Lee County Republicans accused their Republican lawmakers in Tallahassee of making elections unsafe. They also drafted two resolutions claiming party leaders are not conservative enough and they claim elections will be less safe. Local Republican leaders argue that SB 7050, signed by the governor, made elections less safe and alleges noncitizens could end up voting. Lee County Supervisor of Elections Tommy Doyle vehemently denied that claim. The Lee County Executive Committee wanted the governor to call a special legislative session to address their concerns.

Many students went to the Orlando meeting to protest. The state also banned drag queens from going into schools and teachers are forbidden to take students on field trips to see a drag queen.

Description: A new law required parents to sign permission slips for students to use nicknames in schools. This came after a new law was signed by Governor Ronald DeSantis, who himself goes by the nickname Ron and has claimed the new law strengthens parents' rights. The form is called a "Name Deviation Consent Form," and it says without this consent, school personnel are obligated to use your legal name as it appears on your birth certificate. Previous generations in the 1960's and 70's printed students' nicknames in class yearbooks, a practice unacceptable by Florida standards in 2023. Florida House Bill 1069, signed by the governor, prevents nicknames. The governor previously said it protects students from having to use their pronouns in school. The state teachers union has said many of these new rules are driving teachers away from education. The new policy seems to vary by each district. Some districts are allowing shortened versions of full names, like Dave for David; however, other districts are playing it safe and requiring the form to be filled out regardless.

Wave of Deceit

Texas housewife Laura Day seemed to have it all: a large home on the water, a loving marriage with her husband, David Syring, and a close relationship with her 6-year-old stepson, Taylor Syring. But, when Taylor drowned on a beach trip with Day under suspicious circumstances, police discovered her shocking criminal past, and the façade of her picture-perfect life quickly came crashing down. A two-hour “20/20,” in collaboration with Plum Pictures, features ABC News anchor John Quiñones’ interview with Day from prison, nearly a decade after her first-degree capital murder conviction for Taylor’s death. In the interview, Day opens up about what she claims really happened that day and her past crimes of bigamy and murder while also maintaining her innocence in Taylor’s death, alleging it was an accident. Truth and Lies: The Family Manson

It was one of the most gruesome crime sprees of the 20th century that shocked and haunted the nation. As Leslie Van Houten is released from prison this week, “20/20”

explores Charles Manson, his cult of devoted followers and the grisly murders in Los Angeles that he instructed his members to carry out. Amidst an era of sex, drugs and rock and roll in 1969, Manson's followers killed seven people in two consecutive nights, including actress Sharon Tate, who was more than eight months pregnant at the time, in the home she shared with her husband, Roman Polanski. The terrifying and violent acts instantaneously eliminated a sense of safety and security for many people across the country. After serving 53 years for her role in the murders, Leslie Van Houten, a former cult member, was released from prison this week. This episode includes ABC News' interview with Van Houten from her time in prison and takes a look at the details surrounding her release. The program includes footage from ABC News' interviews with Manson, in his last network television interview from prison, and former cult member Patricia Krenwinkel, who is serving a life sentence for the murders masterminded by Manson. The documentary explores the crime scene footage and features interviews with law enforcement, first responders and the production crew who met Manson during his final TV interview. The special also features interviews with Debra Tate, Sharon Tate's sister; family and friends of the victims; actors who worked with Sharon; Mike Love of the Beach Boys, who met Manson before the killings; reporters who were in the courtroom during the trial and more. But perhaps his most brazen move came in 1978 when he made a chilling appearance as a contestant on the hit show "The Dating Game" and won. Through first-hand accounts from investigators, victims, eyewitnesses and even his court-appointed psychologist, "20/20" reports on one of the most notorious serial killers of modern times. When Mark and Shaun Staudte fell ill and died suddenly within months of each other, it seemed as though the Missouri family experienced a spurt of horrible luck. "20/20," in collaboration with Plum Pictures, features contributing anchor Deborah Roberts' prison interview with Diane Staudte, mother of four and mastermind behind a sinister plot to poison her husband and two children. Diane talks about her relationship with her family and her feelings about the tragic events and alleges that outside influences forced her to falsely confess to the police despite having no evidence to support that claim. The program includes recordings of police interrogations with Diane and her daughter Rachel Staudte, who pleaded guilty to helping her mother in her disturbing scheme to pick the family off one

Nearly three decades ago, then-17-year-old Amy Fisher — dubbed the “Long Island Lolita” by media — shot Mary Jo Buttafuoco on her front porch following an affair with her husband, Joey Buttafuoco. “20/20” takes a look at the story through the eyes of Mary Jo, Joey and their daughter, Jessie, who was just 9 years old at the time of the shooting in May 1992. Jessie reflects on her journey, including how she learned to understand the tabloid glare that dominated her childhood and how she survived the scrutiny. She also reveals intimate details about life after the incident, including her mom’s excruciating recovery; the family’s move to California to try and escape the media frenzy; her battle with drugs, alcohol and depression; how she turned her life around; and her relationship with her parents. The two-hour program also features Buttafuoco family home videos and the first on-camera interview with confessed accomplice Steven Sleeman, who says Amy hired him to kill Mary Jo. Steven reveals startling details to “20/20” about his role in what he claims was another attempt to kill Mary Jo that shocked his attorney and the Buttafuocos. (OAD: 11/8/19)

Anna Nicole Smith

Years after iconic model, actress and reality star Anna Nicole Smith’s death, “20/20” followed her then 14-year-old daughter, Dannielynn Birkhead, as she visited the most influential places in Anna Nicole’s life with her father, Larry Birkhead. On the journey, they traveled to Mexia, Texas, where Anna Nicole spent part of her childhood. They met her high school friend and saw the places she frequented before becoming famous. While in Los Angeles, they visited several sentimental locations, and Dannielynn saw some of Anna Nicole’s memorabilia from her life and career tucked away in a storage locker following her death. Featuring reporting by “20/20” contributing anchor Deborah Roberts, the two-hour program takes a comprehensive look at Anna Nicole through interviews with those closest to her, as well as material from the ABC News archives. I Now Pronounce You Dead

Just two days before Molly Watson was set to marry James Addie, her love of seven years, a passing motorist found her tragically murdered on a quiet Missouri road. He was living a double life, both engaged to Watson and married for over 20 years with kids at home. As investigators dug through text messages and other key evidence, the question became: How far would James Addie go to ensure his two lives wouldn’t collide? “20/20” contributing anchor Deborah Roberts sits down with Melanie Addie, James’ ex-wife, who discusses her marriage and

Sincerely, The Happy Face Killer

How did a bizarre confession derail the investigation of the first murder committed by Keith Hunter Jespersen, the notorious “Happy Face Killer,” and allow him to remain on the loose, killing at least seven more women? A two-hour “20/20” reports on how after authorities discovered the body of Taunja Bennett in the Columbia Gorge in 1990, 57-year-old Laverne Pavlinac confessed to the police that she took part in the crime. She provided convincing evidence implicating her and her boyfriend, 39-year-old John Sosnovske, in the murder. They were convicted and sentenced to life in prison. In a shocking twist, Pavlinac’s confession turned out to be false to escape what she described as an abusive relationship with Sosnovske. With reporting by “Nightline” co-anchor Juju Chang, “20/20” dives into how Pavlinac was able to dupe police and features audio from the couple’s confessions, police interviews, and from the hidden microphone installed in Pavlinac’s apartment when she tried to convince Sosnovske that he was involved in the murder. Eventually, authorities discovered six other bodies along Ocean Parkway. In an all-new episode, “20/20” contributing anchor Deborah Roberts reports on the dramatic twists and turns in the more than decadelong investigation to find the killer or killers – ranging from a federal investigation into a police chief to the latest forensic technology – until, according to authorities, the latest DNA technology resulted in the arrest of architect, family man and Long Island resident Rex Heuermann. He has been charged with murder in the deaths of Barthelemy, Waterman and Costello, and has pleaded not guilty just this year.
