## **1<sup>st</sup> Q 2020 STATION INITIATIVES:**

### Rescan Day and Campaign:

For more than a month, WZVN ran hundreds of crawls, PSA’s, news stories, social media posts, website stories and push notifications informing viewers watching with an antenna that they would need to rescan their televisions. Thursday, March 12th, was “Rescan Day” - the day viewers were encouraged to rescan in order to receive all newly available broadcast channels. WZVN provided information on air, online and through social media platforms showing viewers how to rescan TVs. The station also broadcast news stories showing viewers how a new antenna was placed on the 1500’ broadcast tower using a helicopter. Stories as well as the information campaign were regularly updated from October 2019 to March 2020 as technicians made progress on the massive project.

### Coronavirus Education:

WZVN produced 10 different coronavirus PSAs to alert viewers to the pandemic. Topics ranged from ways for viewers to keep their kids safe, to proper handwashing techniques. These PSAs featured all of the weekday ABC7 on-air anchor talent providing trusted faces to deliver the information regarding the virus and its impact. PSAs informed viewers about basic signs and symptoms and informed viewers of the importance behind social distancing. WZVN also broadcast PSAs from ABC News Health Correspondent Jennifer Ashton. ## **Public Service Announcements:**

AS 1419 & 1489-1498 Coronavirus Education :15 - 290 spots

The Coronavirus impacted every viewer. Starting in March when the virus outbreak reached Florida, WZVN started airing numerous locally produced PSAs with WZVN's anchors to educate viewers about the virus, encourage social distancing, promote thorough hand washing and thank medical personnel.

AS1467 Suitcase (Foster Care) :30 – 145 spots

Every day, 700 children enter America's foster care system. From there, the path to landing in a stable home situation is rocky at best, especially for older children. Though there are currently more than 400,000 children awaiting foster care, their stories are typically shrouded in silence. Among the scores of national issues that we allow to take center stage, the subject of a crowded, impersonal foster care system does not get as much of our attention as it should.

AS1461 Youth E-Cig Risk (CDC) :30 – 160 spots

The use of e-cigarettes is unsafe for kids, teens, and young adults. Most e-cigarettes contain nicotine. Nicotine is highly addictive and can harm adolescent brain development, which continues into the early to mid-20s. E-cigarettes can contain other harmful substances besides nicotine. Young people who use e-cigarettes may be more likely to smoke cigarettes in the future.

AS1460 Taking Steps (CDC) :30 – 171 spots

Taking Steps is more than just a walk. It is a community that brings together patients, caregivers, and friends in a celebration that will leave you feeling empowered and inspired. When you fundraise through Take Steps, you are directly impacting treatment, research, and quality of life programs for patients with inflammatory bowel disease (IBD).

AS1459 Stop Wildlife Crime-Rhino (World Wildlife Crime) :30 – 159 spots

African and Asian countries are reeling under a poaching crisis. Ruthless criminal networks are plundering the wild to supply skyrocketing demand for rhino horn, illegal ivory and tiger parts. As a WWF supporter, you know that wildlife crime is the most immediate threat to wild elephants, tigers and rhinos. And you share our concern about its connection to regional conflicts, national security and even terrorism.

## **ISSUES:**

### **Weather & Environment**

This quarter we saw an early start to dry season. January proved to be colder for an extended time compared to years past. By mid-March, most of Southwest Florida was feeling the typical winter drought. While January was chilly, several days in March parts of Southwest Florida hit record heat with Naples and Fort Myers breaking several heat records. Another significant development was erosion along Lee County Beaches. A hot spot that needed emergency help was along Sanibel and Captiva islands. Lee County Commissioners called a State of Emergency so the county could get the money to replenish the section of the island that was having the most severe problems. County Commissioners shut down part of the beach so crews could finish the replenishment project before the start of sea turtle nesting season.

### **Coronavirus**

This quarter, the global pandemic of the deadly coronavirus reached the state of Florida and is impacting the health of our residents, our economy and our environment. The first sign that COVID-19 was impacting our state was cruise line restrictions on the east coast. Within a few days, President Trump issued an international travel warning which hit our local colleges hard. Several college groups were forced to return early from trips abroad and immediately sent to self-quarantine for 14 days. The state of Florida did not see its first COVID-19 case until March 2nd. Within two weeks, Southwest Florida had its first travel-related case in Charlotte County. It didn't take long before a couple was diagnosed with the virus in Lee County. By March 16th, the state and our local governments were working around the clock to make changes and stop the spread of the virus. Everyday our crews listened to a daily conference call with our leading health officials; Lee Health and Naples Community Hospital talked to us daily to keep track of cases, the areas with the highest risk of spreading and the status of how staff and health officials are doing. Some of the major concerns for our healthcare deliverers: medical supply shortages, a flood of COVID-19 patients filling facilities and preventing patients with symptoms from spreading the virus out of isolation. The largest spike in cases was seen in the last two weeks of March. We were in daily contact with County Commissioners in five counties in our viewing area. We also did daily check-ins with our local health department agencies to help by

broadcasting major alerts and warnings to our viewers. We created an online list of resources from the health department with signs and symptoms and provided a list of locations where to get tested and who to contact if you felt like you had the coronavirus. Another concern outside of the health of our residents was the status of our economy. By the third week of March, all public beaches in our viewing area were shut down, vacation rentals were suspended and bars and nightclubs were shut down. Restaurants in Florida were ordered to close all seating and only allowed to serve takeout. County leaders in our area did not issue a 'stay at home' order because they were concerned shutting down non-essential businesses could be devastating to the economy. While a 'stay at home' order was not issued for our area, county leaders encouraged people to social distance and sent deputies out in every county to make sure people were not gathering in groups larger than ten. Almost every newscast for the last three weeks of March, were vastly focused around cancellations, press conferences and changes due to the coronavirus.

### **Wellness & Safety**

One big issue this quarter outside of the coronavirus, was a problem with deadly hit-and-run investigations. Neighbors in North Fort Myers are calling on Lee County leaders to add more sidewalks and streetlights to roads after a teen was hit and killed by a run-away driver. 14-year-old Allana Staiano was hit by an SUV while walking along the side of the road. The other girl was hurt but taken to the hospital and survived. Her accused killer was later found and arrested. Weeks after the young girl's death, another Fort Myers woman and her dog were killed while out walking along McGregor Boulevard. Florida Highway Patrol has a suspect, put up billboards with the driver's face and name, but have yet to arrest the accused driver who left the scene. For the 10th year in a row, Southwest Florida served as the location for the Imagine Solutions conference. Dozens of visionaries gather annually in Naples to share their ideas, advice and talent. The two-day conference was held February 23rd & 24th. The Lee County Public School District is teaming up with a suicide prevention group to help educate teens about suicide and mental health. Students talked with Kevin Hines, a suicide survivor. Kevin survived after throwing himself off the Golden Gate Bridge in San Francisco. He talked to students in Lee and Collier counties about depression and when it's time to get help, or how you can help a friend suffering from depression. Florida Repertory Theatre is also showing a one-man play to high school students about the other side of suicide. Lee County high school students are seeing "Every Brilliant Thing" which highlights depression and mental health.

### **Tourism & Local Economy**

The beginning of the quarter started strongly for Southwest Florida. Collier County saw a big increase in tourists and spending during the 2019 year. Within a year, tourism spending has increased 6% from the previous year. This means strong growth in hospitality and employment, but with more people comes increased traffic. However, everything in our economy and tourism was hit extremely hard when the effects of the coronavirus reached Southwest Florida. The economic impacts are discussed in the "Coronavirus" section. The industry suffering the most is the hospitality and restaurant. Bars and nightclubs are shut down, restaurants have transitioned to takeout only and our vacation rentals have been suspended until further notice. We talked to several non-profits offering food, supplies and help to those who are now unemployed. Near

the end of the quarter, one of the biggest problems in our area was the struggle to file for unemployment. Due to the number of people laid off so quickly, the state's unemployment filing system was overwhelmed with the number of people trying to file at the same time. We talked to local leaders, state leaders and non-profits on the quickest way to seek relief for those ending the month of March without a paycheck.

### **Politics & Government**

This quarter marked the start of the Florida Legislature with hundreds of bills and a budget seeking approval for the 2020 year. The first half of the session focused primarily on one of Governor Ron DeSantis' priorities, paying Florida teachers more. DeSantis made it clear in his State of the State address he wants to raise teacher salaries to a minimum of \$47,500 per year. Florida lawmakers have filed a dozen bills dealing with abortion. One requires minors to get parental consent before getting an abortion. It passed through its final committee and will move to the governor's desk to be signed next quarter. Business as usual was turned upside down after the coronavirus appeared. Florida's Presidential Preference Primary was held prior to all the shutdowns caused by the coronavirus. On the day of the primary, several polling locations had to close, because so many poll workers and volunteers decided to drop out for fear of exposure. Many of the poll workers were older putting them at greater risk to contract the virus. Many of our crews witnessed comparatively empty polling locations and for those that did show up to vote in person many were wearing masks, gloves and carrying hand sanitizer. Florida lawmakers are on track to keep the state's lead tourism marketing agency alive until at least 2023. It was slated to go dark July first, but expected to now be retained with growing coronavirus concerns. The agency is on track to keep \$50 million a year through 2023 and the deal comes as the state is attempting to deal with the consequences of COVID-19.

### **Positively Southwest Florida & Bright-Side Blocks**

WZVN works to highlight the positive happenings in Southwest Florida. The year started out focusing on non-profits. Olivia Trader is a 7th grader at Challenger Middle School in Cape Coral. She was participating Reading Buddies at Gulf Coast Humane Society. It's a program where kids read to dogs, helping the dogs get more comfortable with kids. But the program also improves the student's reading skills without intimidating students by having to read in front of a big classroom of their peers. After the devastating destruction caused by the deadly tornado in Nashville, Red Cross in Southwest Florida is sending a team to Tennessee. A nurse with the Naples Red Cross hopped on a plane within days after the tornadoes to help in any way that she could. We followed her on her journey and how her 20-years of experience volunteering is helping. As the fears of the coronavirus increased and the impact on people's day to day lives became extreme, WZVN created another feature titled the "Bright-Side Block". While Positively Southwest Florida focused on the good happening in our area, the Bright-Side Block extended that effort to the good and happiness happening across the U.S. Our newscasts were filled with a lot of scary and life-changing news for hundreds of thousands of people in Southwest Florida, so our crews banded together to make sure each newscast ended with some positive news. We focused non-profits helping feed those out of a job, organizations turning public events into virtual events and how people could effectively use takeout and help local mom-and-pop shops in our area.

Title: Sanibel Erosion

Description: Sanibel city leaders have started the first phase of a much needed erosion mitigation project on the Lee County island. The city wants to prevent the only escape route off Captiva and part of Sanibel from washing away. Erosion is threatening the bridge that connects Sanibel Island to Captiva Island. Many tourists are angry that part of the two popular islands are closed off during the busy season, but leaders say this is the only time of the year crews can work on the beach. Crews can't be on the sand during Sea Turtle Nesting Season which runs from May until November.

Title: Feeding Wildlife

Description: A Florida woman is now forced to pay \$50,000 in fines after being accused of feeding gators, bobcats and vultures for years. Now wildlife officials are using her situation as an example to remind people not to feed wildlife. Florida Fish and Wildlife say if you start feeding wild animals the critters will keep coming back for more, and might bring other friends. If you are caught feeding wildlife, first time offenders usually get a warning. But anything after that you could face a fine around \$1,000 or more depending how many times you may have fed wildlife.

Title: Manatee Rescues

Description: Florida Fish and Wildlife are sending out alerts about an early spike in manatee rescues and deaths. So far this year, seven manatees have already been rescued in Florida. One big problem is boaters speeding through wake zones and hitting manatees coming close to the shore. It's colder during the month of January so a lot of the sea cows are coming closer to the coast to warm up. The cold weather stresses these mammals and can put them in a 'frozen' state. FWC reminds people and tourists if you see a stranded manatee to call their hotline for help.

Title: Python Bowl Winners

Description: Florida's first python bowl is over and the winners have been crowned. More than 750 people from 20 different states turned out for Florida's Python Bowl. Snake wranglers

caught 80 of the giant invasive snakes. It was a ten-day contest created by Governor Ron DeSantis. It was all in the hope of ridding the invasive species from the Florida Everglades. The huge snakes are changing our environment eating panthers, bobcats and other species. The grand prize winner was Mike Kimmel, who caught eight Burmese Pythons. His prize was a Tracker 570 off road all-terrain vehicle. DeSantis says this year was so successful he is planning a 2021 bowl.

Title: Art Fest Hype

Description: Trash and what we do with it, is a hot topic for this year's Fort Myers Art Fest. Artists are handpicked and invited to display their art at one of the biggest events in Southwest Florida. Some artists use just trash to display their best pieces in downtown Fort Myers. As part of the big weekend, Fort Myers city leaders also had to put a pause on a major project to make room for the artists. The new Luminary Hotel had to be cleaned out for a week so the tents and vendors could be set up along the River District in Fort Myers. It brings thousands of visitors and artists to Lee County for one of the County's biggest events.

Title: Cape Tornado and High Winds

Description: Parts of Southwest Florida had to deal with high winds and stormy conditions. Wind gusts were climbing upwards of 40 mph for parts of Lee County forcing many residents to bring in chairs and lanai furniture so it wouldn't blow away in the storms. WZVN also checked in with residents in Cape Coral who still have blue tarps on their homes after an EF-1 Tornado hit neighbors in Northeast Cape in October. Meteorologists advised people to stay off the water and lock things down during the crazy windy conditions which is rare for this time of year in Florida.

Title: Dolphin Stabbed

Description: One of Southwest Florida's most precious symbols, was stabbed and washed on shore in Naples. But this isn't the first time this has happened in Southwest Florida. Another bottlenose dolphin washed up on shore in Sanibel last July in 2019. Florida Fish and Wildlife officials are warning anglers and boaters to move locations if dolphins start following their boats while fishing. Dolphins usually approach boats because they are looking for an easy meal. Some anglers drop fish into the water to attract a good catch. We went along with a fishing charter in Bonita Springs who showed us the proper protocol anglers are supposed to follow if dolphins approach. It is illegal, and NOAA is offering \$20,000 to anyone with info leading to a conviction for the brutal death. Penalty for someone convicted of this crime in Florida, could cost up to \$100,000 and a year in jail.

Title: Low Canal Levels

Description: The month of February has been dry and boaters are starting to notice. Professors at FGCU say the lack of rain is taking a toll on our canal levels in Cape Coral. Boaters in Cape Coral and parts of North Fort Myers are having a tough time getting out of the water. Some people needed a boost out of boat ramps, others are having trouble navigating the Caloosahatchee River. Professors at FGCU say they've seen a significant decrease in water levels at the Franklin Lock over the last month. Local experts say the best thing you can do to prevent getting stuck is to keep an eye on the tides and avoid shallow areas.

Title: Pet Amnesty Day

Description: Saturday, February 29, is Exotic Pet Amnesty Day. It is an opportunity to surrender exotic pets with no penalties, see exotic animals up close and learn about responsible pet ownership. The Naples Zoo is allowing people to hand over the exotic animals that could also be invasive to Florida's environment. Florida Wildlife officials say days like this are important to protect Florida's wildlife. Many times new species of animals pop up in the sunshine state, because people buy the exotic pets and release them into the wild, which later has negative effects on our environment. Allowing people to hand over the pets, with no questions asked also saves the animal or reptile.

Title: Drought in SWFL

Description: Southwest Florida is getting drier by the week. For about two weeks of March, parts of the viewing area saw several days reaching record heat levels, breaking a few records in Naples and Fort Myers. But it has also been a very dry and windy March. For the last two weeks of the quarter most of Southwest Florida was in a high fire danger. We talked to the Florida Forest Service about how it is getting ready to respond to fire emergencies. Fire crews also warn people now that schools, businesses and beaches are closing, be careful what you're working on at home. Suggesting against bonfires and to being extra careful where you cook if you grill outside.

Title: Coronavirus Travel Warning

Description: The U.S.State Department is now suggesting people don't travel to China. Federal leaders are worried about the Coronavirus. The World Health Organization declared a global health emergency today. The first person-to-person transmission of the virus was reported

today in the U.S. It happened in Illinois after a husband gave it to his wife. Nearly 200 Americans are also under quarantine tonight at a California military base. They were evacuated from the virus epicenter in Wuhan, China.

Title: Coronavirus Delivery?

Description: Now that the U.S. put a travel warning for China, people are asking, should they be worried about Coronavirus traveling on cardboard from China? A Cape Coral resident says a box from China was empty, but called a police hazmat crew to check the box. At the moment the story aired, there wasn't much known about if the COVID-19 virus could travel on cardboard from China. We talked to officials from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, who said it was very unlikely to get the virus from a package from China. Police say they didn't want to take any chance when picking up the packaging.

Title: Coronavirus Dresses

Description: The coronavirus isn't just impacting people's health, but it's also impacting the wedding industry. A lot of the wedding dress materials like silk, chiffon and satin are mostly imported from China. Because of the deadly virus, many boutiques are seeing four to six week delays. Now vendors, boutiques and brides are scrambling to come up with a second option if the dresses don't get to the U.S. in time for their big days. We talked to local boutiques and a bride in Naples, still searching for a back-up option.

Title: Nurse Stuck on Cruise Ship

Description: A Fort Myers woman is finally back home, after being stranded at sea for nearly two weeks on a cruise ship. Holley Rauen said she went on what was supposed to be a 30-day cruise on the MS Westerdam. But as fears over the coronavirus spread, things on board changed quickly. She said they were turned away from six different countries and were not allowed to dock out of fear someone on the ship was sick. She said they were never quarantined and no one on the ship was actually sick. Rauen said the ship was finally allowed to port in Cambodia. While there, she said a passenger did test positive for the virus. After that, Rauen said everyone had to get tested, which took days. Overall, Rauen said the coronavirus chaos lasted for about 18 days, but is now warning others to take the travel warning seriously.

Title: What is Coronavirus

Description: There are a lot of questions about what exactly the coronavirus is and what makes this different from other viruses. There are 6 different known strains of the Coronavirus. This strand is new and is called COVID-19. The Coronavirus is a name for several strains of a

respiratory illness that has infected thousands of people in China, and has begun to spread to places elsewhere in the world, including Europe, and even in a limited capacity, the United States. At the beginning of February, there were no known cases in Florida. We talked to doctors at Lee Health who say they still are not able to test for COVID-19 cases, but will be getting testing kits within the coming weeks.

Title: Coronavirus Fears

Description: Questions and concerns are swarming online about the myths and facts about the coronavirus. Today, WZVN brought in a doctor with Lee Health into the studio to talk about the facts about the deadly virus. Florida still had not seen a coronavirus case at this point in time, but state leaders know it's only a matter of time. Many people are asking health officials if the N95 masks really protect you from getting the virus. Many of the doctors we talked to today say you should not wear a health mask, unless you have the COVID-19 virus. Health experts say wearing the mask can help prevent you from spreading the deadly virus to others if you unknowingly have it. If you don't have the virus, doctors are warning you wearing one without having symptoms could just put you at risk of getting it because you'll touch your face more.

Title: Coronavirus Facts

Description: There was a lot of wrong information and fake articles spreading on social media regarding coronavirus. WZVN received numerous questions into the newsroom about articles with misinformation. We took some of the top trending fake articles and fact checked the claims they made about COVID-19. One example was an article quoting a fake Stanford study saying you could hold your breath to find out if you had coronavirus or not. It's fake. We talked to Lee Health doctors about the best ways to stay healthy. We also did a hand washing test and demonstration just to show how long it takes to get all of the germs washed off your hands. March 2nd, was also the first day Florida saw its first travel-related case.

Title: FGCU Choir in Italy

Description: Nearly twenty-four college students are still in Italy for a choir tour and performance trip. FGCU had to cut the trip short a week early, and will bring the college students back. We talked to FGCU administration about keeping in contact with the students, none have reported any symptoms. When the students get back to Florida, they are required to do a 14-day self-quarantine and they are not allowed to be on campus. We talked to The Florida Department of Health about what exactly a self-quarantine looks like, what people should keep an eye on and at what point you should reach out to a doctor.

Title: Price Gouging Fears

Description: Fears of getting the coronavirus has jacked up the prices of your basic cleaning supplies for online retail stores. Over the last week, Amazon has reported nearly 1 million incidents of price gouging on products like baby wipes, hand sanitizers, toilet paper and cleaning supplies. Florida Agriculture Commissioner, Nikki Fried, also sent out a warning to Florida residents about how to report price gouging and how to spot a scam. WZVN talked to a consumer expert with FGCU about how to spot a scam and how to report it. We also talked to Lee Health and Naples Community Hospital, where people have been swiping hospital masks from the waiting rooms and sitting rooms. Health officials are now pleading with people not to steal from hospitals because they anticipate a shortage of medical supplies coming in the future.

Title: Homemade Hand Sanitizer

Description: Coronavirus fears are causing people to swipe and hoard cleaning supplies. Hand sanitizer is very difficult to find. WZVN teamed with a Lee Health Doctor to demonstrate how easy it is to create homemade hand sanitizer. We talked to one local pharmacist who is running out of supplies themselves, and showed us how they are trying to refill stock with their own concoctions. Anything with about 70% alcohol will kill germs and the coronavirus. We did a live demonstration using a blacklight, to show how the germs are cleaned right off after using the homemade product.

Title: Coronavirus cancellations

Description: This was really the first wave of cancellations we saw associated with coronavirus fears. Southwest Florida reported its first positive COVID-19 case in Sarasota County. The Trump Administration was suggesting people start following the CDC guidelines to help stop the spread of the virus. At this point, Florida only has a few cases, but people and organizations started to cancel events with more than a few hundred attendees. Three of the big events shut down: Shrimp Festival on Fort Myers Beach, Collier County Fair and St. Patrick's Day events in Naples.

Title: Charlotte Coronavirus Case

Description: Charlotte County reports a travel-related COVID-19 case. A 57-year-old woman got the virus while traveling to Egypt on a three week trip. This was a big turning point in the relationship between media and the Health Department. Many of our viewers were demanding answers about where this woman lived, where she was tested and where she was being hospitalized. The problem: people wanted to know where she was out of fear of catching the virus. But the Florida Health Department could not release that information because it would

violate HIPAA laws. WZVN pushed the health department and hospitals to release more information, but they wouldn't budge. We talked to local health care lawyers if this information should be released in the time of a health crisis.

Title: COVID-19 Testing

Description: Cases in our viewing are climbing slowly and there are a lot of questions about how to get tested. Southwest Florida has not set up a mobile collection site for people to get tested outside of hospitals. Cases were primarily travel-related and many people were just getting back from international travel after the Trump Administration put out the travel advisory. Now with people flooding home after traveling, some thought they might have symptoms and wanted to get tested. Local health care facilities didn't have that many kits to conduct tests. People who believed they had symptoms, they were told to call the Florida Department of Health, who then determined if individuals would be tested. That quickly changed as cases and the number of people with symptoms grew. We talked to the Florida Department of Health about their push to get more tests, and local hospitals about how they are preparing for a rush of patients.

Title: Toilet Paper Shortage

Description: While cleaning and sanitizing materials are tough to obtain, another unexpected item is getting tough to find. First it was face masks, then hand sanitizer and now, it's toilet paper. People are posting pictures about empty toilet paper shelves at stores across our viewing area. We went out to stores to talk to shoppers about the frustrations over panic buyers. And it's not just cleaning supplies and toilet paper, people are also stocking up on non-perishable foods. President Trump is even sounding the alarm during daily briefings at the White House asking people to stop hoarding items and stop panic buying.

Title: Uber & COVID-19 Safety

Description: Ride-sharing programs are adding more protection for drivers and riders in the fear of spreading coronavirus. WZVN did a show-and-tell of how many things you touch from the moment you touch the car door, to the moment you click your seat belt. Our crews went out to talk to drivers about what they are doing to keep their cars germ free between riders. We also talked to drivers about concerns about riding in ride-shares. The company says it has sent each driver their own personal hand sanitizer and wipes for their vehicles.

Title: Update COVID-19 Testing

Description: As more coronavirus tests are sent to Florida, many of our viewers have questions about when to get tested, how to get tested and where to go if they have symptoms. We talk with Naples Community Hospital, Lee Health and the Florida Department of Health. We also talked with a local woman in Charlotte County who says it has been a nightmare just trying to get tested. Once she got tested, she had trouble tracking down the results. WZVN found that once a patient is tested the health department sends it to certain labs to get results. In some instances, people are waiting up to ten days to get results.

Title: COVID-19 & Nursing Home

Description: Elderly people are the most vulnerable when it comes to getting the coronavirus. And because of that, nursing homes in Southwest Florida are taking steps to battle the virus from getting into their facilities. Many of the assisted living centers are restricting visitors from coming into the buildings. Many of the local centers are only letting 'essential employees' into the buildings. There is no set date on how long these restrictions will be in place, but many are sticking to the social distancing guidelines set by the CDC.

Title: Beach Rentals and Restrictions

Description: Restrictions went into place at local beaches because of the coronavirus. Fort Myers Beach town council voted late in the day to temporarily restrict the use of rentals at the beach which includes jet ski rentals, parasailing, beach umbrellas and chairs. Seating at beach bars also had to be removed. Other restaurants along Estero Blvd. were also told to limit seating outside. This unfolded just days before Governor Ron DeSantis issued bars to close.

Title: NCH Patient Breaks Protocol

Description: The cases in Southwest Florida were primarily higher in Lee and Collier County. Lee Health and NCH started a temporary partnership, working together during the coronavirus pandemic. Every day the two hospitals hold a conference call to update the media on the latest number of cases, how hospital staff is doing, if anyone is quarantining and how many tests each hospital is doing per day. The new partnership was called "Stronger Together." During this call, NCH informed us a patient with COVID-19 symptoms had broken hospital protocol and may have infected nearly two dozen hospital employees. All of which had to be put on a two-week self-quarantine as a precaution.

Title: State of Education

Description: Schools in the state of Florida were issued to stay closed for the next two weeks. The Department of Education was ready to roll out pilot programs to test online learning.

Florida Governor Ron DeSantis waived all AP courses and requirements for high school students and will allow the parents to decide if they would like their student to move onto the next grade level. Collier County was the first district to test out the new online pilot program. On March 23, all districts in our area started online learning. At first, the governor issued all schools to be closed through April 15th. A week later, the Department of Education extended it ordering all schools to be closed until May first.

Title: Beaches Start Closing

Description: This was the first day of beach closures. Fort Myers Beach town council extended their beach rental closures, and shut down the pier. Within an hour of making the decision, county commissioners decided to shut down all county-owned beaches March 19th at 6:00pm. Lee County deputies were sent out to the beaches to make sure people were following the new rules. Within the first day, most people understood the importance of closing down the beaches. Lee County commissioners wanted to help stop the spread of COVID-19. While it is prime spring break season, a huge money maker for our area, County Commissioners decided it was crucial to send people home amid the pandemic. Just minutes after Lee County announced beach closures, Collier County followed. Naples city leaders had already shut down the city-owned beaches, but Collier Commissioners decided to shut down all county-owned beaches as well. We talked to visitors packing up and leaving the beach to head home and go back north.

Title: Churches, Synagogues, Bars & Restaurants

Description: Because of the CDC guidelines for groups of no more than 10, churches and synagogues across the world and in Florida, were moving services online. One Baptist church in Bonita Springs doesn't want to follow those guidelines. Gospel Baptist Church and Christian School still opened in Bonita Springs the following Sunday. We talked to the lead pastor over the phone saying they will stay open until they are legally allowed to. The Jewish school connected to the synagogue has moved online so kids can keep learning. Late in the day, Florida Governor Ron DeSantis issued all bars close at 5pm. He also says all nightclubs and bars need to be closed until the end of March.

Title: Mental Health & Self-Medicating in Isolation

Description: Mental health experts say mental health is taking a hit during quarantine and people self-medicating with alcohol to pass the time. We interviewed a mental health counselor about the negative effects that binge drinking has on your mental health.

Title: Travelers Executive Order & Great American Take Out

Description: Two big moves today by the Florida Governor, one executive order issues a new kind of travel order for people coming from Connecticut, New York and New Jersey. People coming from those states are now required to self-quarantine for 14-days and monitor symptoms. Many tourists from those states are flooding to Florida while things are still open. Florida health officials are worried those tourists will spread the virus. About a week later, Gov. DeSantis added Louisiana to the self-quarantine ban. The Florida Health Department and the National Guard have been set up at airports across the state, including RSW in Fort Myers to help issue the orders. Florida Highway Patrol has also set up road check points in the panhandle as people start crossing the state border. This was also the first day, after the Governor issued all restaurants to shut down dining areas and only allow take out or pick-up. Because of that issue, a national campaign is growing. It's called the Great American Take-out. We talked to local mom-and-pop shops about how they are transitioning to a takeout business. Many we talked to were forced to close one if not all locations, because it can't function on that type of business model.

Title: Package Delivery Safety

Description: The coronavirus is impacting everything we do because it is so highly contagious and spreads so fast. Health officials we talked to at Lee Health say COVID-19 can stay on hard surfaces for up to three days. It can also stay on cardboard for up to 24 hours. We talked to local FEDEX and USPS workers about what they are doing to stop the spread of the virus. Health officials also encourage people to either wipe down their deliveries or immediately throw boxes away, and don't touch your face until you thoroughly wash your hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. We also talked to local health professors who say you are much less likely to contract the virus from a package compared to person-to-person contact.

Title: Collier E-Learning Courses

Description: Next week, home is the new classroom for Collier County public school students. Beginning Monday, students will be taught virtually through the online program, Canvas. Last week, the school district sent surveys out via phone and email, asking parents if their child will have computer access from home. Monday will also mark the beginning of the fourth quarter of the school year. Students will move from district-wide program-based learning to virtual modules led by their teachers through Canvas. Adaptations across the board in the Collier County School District Administrators have fast tracked Canvas from a program only some teachers used for student's makeup work, into the primary learning method for all students through at least April 15. Which was later extended to May 1st.

Title: Lee & Collier County Special Meetings

Description: Lee and Collier County Commissioners have been working together to make the decision if they need to order countywide 'stay at home' orders. People in both Lee and Collier County have been urging commissioners to shut down non-essential businesses and issue an order. While several public areas and public beaches are closed, Commissioners in both counties did not issue a 'stay at home' order this quarter. But over the last week of March, Lee County officials sent out public service alerts on people's cell phones, urging them to practice social distancing, work from home if you can and stay home this weekend. The commissioners in both Lee and Collier counties say they will follow executive orders by the Governor and will work with county health officials to make a decision if they should issue a 'stay at home order.' The Lee Health president has suggested commissioners issue the order. Commissioners are mainly concerned about the tragic economic impact it could have on our Southwest Florida economy.

Title: Glove Dumps in Parking Lots

Description: People have been dumping their used gloves, face masks, and cleaning wipes on the ground of parking lots at stores in our area. Oftentimes, trash cans are only feet away. FGCU associate professor and nursing practitioner Dr. Loureen Downes said it's putting us all at risk when people do not properly dispose of those items. Downes wants to remind people to wash their hands or at least use hand sanitizer after removing a mask and gloves.

Title: Charlotte School Employees Furloughed

Description: Charlotte County Public Schools has furloughed some substitute teachers. No full-time employees have been furloughed, according to Charlotte County Schools. The school district is expecting the furlough to last through April 15. Which was later extended to May first later in the day when the Department of Education suggested students stay off campus until the end of April. This furlough has no impact on full-time teachers, paraprofessionals, cafeteria staff and bus drivers.

Title: Bills Due Tomorrow

Description: New evidence shows Florida Governor Ron DeSantis was warned about the state's unemployment website issues after numerous problems were pointed out in a 2019 audit. The state has struggled for weeks to keep up with the mounting unemployment claims being filed as a result of COVID-19 layoffs. Our crews have also confirmed many people who are unable to file a claim through the website. Career Source of Southwest Florida is working to help the state's re-employment office get signed up for unemployment. The state is scurrying to update its server, hire more workers and open another call center to meet the continued demand for unemployment claims. While the state has not answered any of our questions,

Career Source confirmed they are in talks with the state to assist with the problems and get people signed up for unemployment. Two things Career Source said are contributing to the website issues are the overwhelming number of visits accompanied by many people who have filed for unemployment previously and can't remember their lifetime four-digit PIN number. The state is waiving requirements that you look for a job while you're unemployed despite the fact that the program asks a claimant to fill it out. What isn't clear is if Florida can't get the problems fixed now, how long will claimants have to wait to receive much-needed unemployment funds? The Florida Department of Economic Opportunity has not responded to our questions about the issues.

Title: FDA New Vaping Ban

Description: The Food and Drug administration plans to ban certain flavors of e-cigarettes to combat the rise in teen vaping. President Trump has called for the action to decrease the sickness and deaths associated with vaping. This version of the ban is a scaled back version of the first he suggested. The FDA is now planning to ban vape cartridges with fruity or dessert-like flavors. There have been several lawsuits filed against e-cig companies, the state of Minnesota is accusing JUUL of targeting teens as a 'healthier' option than smoking.

Title: Sanibel Coyote Plan

Description: For weeks, residents have increased the number of wildlife calls of coyotes getting uncomfortably close to people walking on the island. Florida Fish and Wildlife officials are putting up more wildlife cameras around the island to spot the movements of the wild animals. FWC is also setting up public informational meetings to educate residents about what they should do if they encounter a coyote while on a walk.

Title: SRO Impact in Schools

Description: They do more than just protect and serve. But School Resources Officers are impacting our kids and students in a positive way. Our reporter was sent out to do a 'feature story' and profile a SRO and her daily routine. But as our crews rolled up to Lehigh Campuses, three schools went on immediate lockdown. For almost two years School Resource officers have been placed permanently in every elementary school and high school in Lee County. It was part of a new law signed into effect after the Parkland School Shooting in 2018. School leaders we talked to say these SRO's are more than just protection, but mentors to so many students.

Title: Naples Tot Walk

Description: In the last year, 64 Florida children have drowned across the state. But parents in Collier County are marching to pay tribute and create awareness about child drowning. It was the 7th annual Twins Tot Walk Vigil at Vanderbilt Beach in Naples. In addition to remembering the young lives, parents say education and prevention are key in lowering the statics and saving lives. This walk comes after Florida state lawmakers filed two bills in October calling for more requirements and water safety instructions in health classes for kindergarten through twelfth grade. Both bills were sent to committee in November. If approved, the bill would take effect on July first.

Title: Elderberries and Health

Description: Health officials say this could be one of the worst flu seasons ever. Nearly every state, including Florida has reported widespread flu activity last week. Local nutritionists say just a tablespoon a day for adults and a teaspoon for kids can boost immunity. But health officials warn, these kinds of syrups and supplements are not regulated by the FDA. Health officials say while it could help boost immunity, your best way to fight the flu is the flu shot.

Description: Neighbors in North Fort Myers are calling on county leaders to add more sidewalks and streetlights to roads after a teen was hit and killed. 14-year-old Allana Staiano was hit by an SUV while walking along the side of the road. The other girl was hurt but taken to the hospital and survived. A few days later, Lee County deputies tracked down the accused driver. Her name is Courtney Gainey. She is currently is in a Lee County jail facing several charges.

Title: McGregor Hit-and-run

Description: 63-year-old Anita Johnson and her dog were hit and killed by a hit-and-run driver. Johnson was about to cross McGregor Blvd. in Fort Myers when a driver hit her along the sidewalk. This first month 2020 had a big spike in hit-and-runs in Lee County. Florida Highway Patrol says the first half of 2019 had more than 50,000 hit-and-runs. 108 people died and more than 11,000 got hurt. Lee County had the highest number of hit-and-runs out of the five Southwest Florida counties.

Description: Homeowners are warning boaters about jet skiers cruising through canals with no wake zones. Not only does it keep boaters and kayakers safe, but it also keeps our wildlife safe. One of the leading killers of manatees are boaters. Cape Coral police responded with a plan to send out their marine units to the trouble spots where speeders are riding through canals.

New research shows our GenX generation has a 40% decrease in empathy and a 60% increase in narcissism. The mental health specialists we talked to say young people are struggling to be able to identify other people's emotions and connect with each other. We also talked to a local life coach about tips and advice on how to realistically limit phone and social media use.

Description: For the 10th year in a row, Southwest Florida was the location for the Imagine Solutions conference. In the week before the conference, WZVN featured many of the new inventions and technology showcased at the conference. We talked to some of the world's leading health care officials and some of the world's well known producers and TV writers. This year one of the inventions displayed was the Gravity Jet Suit. The day after the conference, WZVN followed the inventor to Naples High School to show off the invention to engineering students.

Layla's family signed off on the plea deal and gave an emotional statement during the final hearing. Hetherington hit the Cape Coral girl and drove off. Cape Coral police were able to use a series of home security videos connecting Hetherington to the deadly hit-and-run. The Department of Corrections will decide if

Hetherington will spend the time in prison or go to a boot-camp for youth offenders. While he is over 18-years-old we talked to local lawyers to see why Hetherington qualifies for the youth offender program. WZVN explained he qualifies because he is under the age of 21, has never been charged with a felony, and wasn't previously charged with anything as a minor.

We talked to him about the importance of knowledge and awareness of mental health for teens. He talked to students in Lee and Collier counties about depression and when it's time to get help, or how you can help a friend suffering from depression. Florida Repertory Theatre is showing a one-man play to high school students about the other side of suicide. Lee County high school students are seeing "Every Brilliant Thing" which highlights depression and mental health and how one boy looked at the brilliant things in life to see past the darkness and depression his mom was facing. We talked to mental health experts about how talking to teens at a young age could help them as they develop and deal with pressure through high school.

It caused massive damage and Lee ended up abandoning the home two years later. Each new storm and hurricane damages the homes a little more. Two have already fallen down, and many believe another big storm could rip the homes down forever.

If the group doesn't get the signatures the amendment won't make it on the ballot. So, in a last ditch effort the group has filed a lawsuit against the Secretary of State, trying to get more time. The lawsuit also challenges a new law that requires petition signature gatherers to register with the state. A second group also wants to regulate marijuana like alcohol. That group has already dropped out and hopes to push for the 2022 ballot.

Florida now has invested millions into the industry and created a Director of Cannabis to manage it all statewide. Last year Visit Florida had to slash 30 percent of its staff after having its budget cut by \$26 million. The agency is on track to keep \$50 million a year through 2023 and the deal comes as the state is attempting to deal with the consequences of COVID-19. Visit Florida has already begun preparing for the coronavirus, redirecting \$377,000 intended for marketing in China to regions closer to the state where air travel may not be necessary.
