Issues:

Weather & Environment

Summary: Hurricane lan's impact on Southwest Florida's environment is still being evaluated. One of the immediate effects was a massive red tide bloom off the coast. The bloom caused fish kills from North Port to Marco Island. Besides the foul smell, red tide caused respiratory irritation up to a mile inland. A similar red tide event happened in the months after Hurricane Irma. Debris cleanup in Cape Coral canals sparked controversy. Neighbors accused contractors of ripping out living native plants and disturbing threatened wildlife. WZVN investigated and questioned the city and Florida Wildlife Commission. WZVN also educated viewers about efforts to control and better understand invasive species from hyacinth plants in canals, to pythons spreading farther North, to varieties of lizards and snails being found in Southwest Florida for the first time.

Health & Consumer

Summary: Hurricane Ian created a variety of health and consumer issues for people in Southwest Florida. Families on Fort Myers Beach were shocked to find water bills in the mail totaling \$15,000. In many cases, they had not returned to their homes, or did not have homes to return to. WZVN investigated what families could do if they were wrongly billed. Thousands of homes were flooded in the storm as well, one family was forced to sue their landlord after a man died from extreme black mold exposure. The rest of his family was still struggling with the effects after they say their landlord refused to fix the problem. There was also a spike in flesh eating bacterial infections after Ian. WZVN warned viewers about the dangers and ways to prevent infections. WZVN also delivered responsible reporting when a brain eating amoeba infection was reported in Charlotte County. The victim improperly performed a sinus rinse with tap water instead of distilled water. Pet owners were alerted to an outbreak of bordetella infections at dog parks that forced many to close.

Tourism & Local Economy

Summary: Southwest Florida is one of the fastest growing areas in the country, and it shows in all the development occurring in the area. Lee County voted to build a larger Cape Coral Bridge and tear down the old one to increase traffic capacity. New high rise condo buildings are being built along the Caloosahatchee River in Fort Myers, and new developments are being built in Southern Lee County. Communities also are focusing on improving existing infrastructure with new sidewalks and facade facelift grants for businesses and utilities extension projects. WZVN walked viewers through these developments reporting on the rapid growth in the community.

Hurricane Ian Recovery

Summary: Southwest Florida continued the recovery from Hurricane Ian. One of the biggest challenges this quarter was the wait for temporary living trailers. Both FEMA and The Florida Department of Emergency Management had problems getting trailers to people in need. WZVN investigated what the holdup was. Once trailers were delivered, the problems continued. WZVN followed a pair of widowed sisters locked out of their trailer for weeks. Another challenge

was FEMA's 50% rule. WZVN explained what the program meant, why the federal government said it was necessary and tried to clarify confusion to changes in home values.

Insurance Crisis

Summary: Hurricane Ian has made the state's insurance crisis even worse. Ano,ther insurer, UPC went bankrupt this quarter and dropped more than 100,000 policyholders. This started a race against the clock for people to find new insurance, but that became nearly impossible as most companies said they would not insure people with Ian damage. Other insurance companies, including the state-run Citizens insurance, announced rate increases as well. Many people worried they would be forced to sell their homes because they would no longer be able to afford insurance. State-run, Citizens Insurance, also announced the possibility of a so-called Hurricane Tax if another major storm hit this year. A 2% tax on home, renters, car, condo, and boat insurances were floated for everyone in the state. Citizen's policyholders would see an even bigger tax.

Law & Public Safety

Summary: The first quarter saw the beginning of the Florida Legislative session. Many hot button issues like permitless carry and a bill that would abolish the Democratic party was discussed. Governor Desantis also continued his push to end inclusion and diversity training in colleges and universities. Gay rights was also a major issue. Thousands of people in Naples came out for and against allowing the Naples Pride Fest to take place in a public park. The Lee County School Board also voted to allow some staff members to carry guns in schools.

Positively Southwest Florida & Bright-Side Blocks

Summary: This segment is a staple on WZVN's weekday evening newscasts. At 6pm and 7pm, WZVN broadcasts two segments that highlight the good happening in Southwest Florida and around the world. We select a variety of human interest stories that showcase how people in our community are helping others and giving back to further develop our community, our people and our paradise.

The following brief entries outline a sampling of coverage provided by WZVN during this quarter. This is meant to be a sampling only and not an exhaustive list of the coverage of the previously cited community issues.

Weather and Environment

Date/Time: January 6, 7pm

Duration: 3:00

Title: Hyacinth Control

Description: Water hyacinths are taking over canals in Cape Coral. Water hyacinth was introduced into Florida in the 1880s, but by the 1960s, it had covered more than 120,000 acres of public lakes and rivers – that is 25 percent of Lake Okeechobee. Its biggest hazard is that it grows so thick that it can stop boats in their tracks, clogging waterways in the process. Water

Hyacinth was first imported from South America as an ornamental plant, renowned for its bright purple flowers. But upon its introduction to Florida, it quickly came to dominate fresh water, like that in the Caloosahatchee River. There is now a task force dedicated to controlling hyacinth. Alongside targeted herbicide treatments, the Lee County Hyacinth Control District uses large mechanical harvesters to remove it from the water's surface.

Duration: 21:00 **Title:** Red Tide

Description: Red tide was a major problem along the coast this quarter. Dozens of red tide health alerts were issued in Charlotte, Lee, and Collier Counties. The toxic tide is not just an annoyance to beachgoers, it causes massive fish kills, and impacts animal health. Wildlife groups treated dozens of shorebirds for red tide poisoning. Many beachgoers reported birds acting "drunk" and disoriented. Some people who live on the beach started Facebook groups to report red tide conditions daily. The idea is to save others a trip to a beach with fish kills and respiratory irritation. The biggest question about the abnormally high levels of red tide in the winter months was if it was caused by Hurricane Ian. After Hurricane Irma, Southwest Florida experienced similar red tide blooms.

Title: Coyote Season

Description: Coyote sightings have become more common in Cape Coral. Wildlife experts said we were on the verge of their mating season, and a lot of wild animals were still displaced from Hurricane Ian. Some homeowners were on high alert, especially with fences in shambles and holes in pool cages after the storm. FWC warned to keep cats inside and small dogs on a short leash. It is rare for a coyote to attack or injure a human.

Title: Cape Coral Canals Torn Up

Description: Neighbors and local environmental groups accused Cape Coral city-contracted canal debris cleanup crews of stripping canals of healthy vegetation and wildlife. The operation launched in November, shortly after Hurricane Ian. The city contracted crews to map out which areas needed to be cleaned. Neighbors and wildlife groups say the crews took the dead and healthy vegetation out of the canal banks and disturbed threatened wildlife. After WZVN's initial report, FWC began investigating whether wildlife was harmed in the citywide Hurricane Ian canal debris cleanup operation. Cape Coral officials said with each crew comes a secondary contractor to oversee the operation. The operation was slated to finish by April.

Duration: 5:00 **Title:** Ghost Orchid

Description: A man was busted by FWC last October with a bag full of 36 stolen endangered plants, including a rare ghost orchid. According to the Florida Fish & Wildlife Commission (FWC), Michael Marinelli was charged with a misdemeanor after attempting to steal 36 plants from the Fakahatchee Strand State Park just west of Copeland. The ghost orchid, an endangered species, is native only to South Florida and Cuba. It is extremely tough to cultivate, and therefore only approximately 1,500 of the plants exist, according to the Center for Biological Diversity. The stolen plants have been returned to their natural habitats.

Title: Bear Hunt Proposal

Description: Florida residents want Florida Fish & Wildlife Commission to let them legally hunt black bears. Multiple hunters came forward during FWC's Jacksonville Commission meeting during the last week of February – asking leadership to bring the 2015 policy back. During that 2015 hunt, FWC's threshold of about 300 bears was hit within a few days. Many people were also cited for illegally poaching and baiting the bears. This sparked protests among bear habitats in Collier County, such as Golden Gate Estates. There is no official proposition to bring the hunting of black bears back to the State of Florida. More information will be provided to FWC for future meetings.

Title: Pythons in Charlotte County

Description: Invasive Burmese Pythons could be creeping farther north into Charlotte County. Scientists report it is a race against the clock before a breeding population can be established. Pythons are already well established in the Everglades but ever since they were found there in the 90's, they have been spreading farther north and to the coasts. There are multiple websites and groups that track and hunt this invasive species.

Title: Invasive Agamas Lizard Spotted in Southwest Florida

Description: A relatively new invasive species has been spotted in Southwest Florida. It is called an Agama, a type of lizard native to Africa, and was brought to Florida as part of the pet trade in the 1970s. Since then, it has spread far and seems to prefer rock or concrete over grass and trees, making urbanized areas, neighborhoods, and commercial parking lots its preferred habitat. Despite its small size and docile nature, it still does pose a threat to some native insects, like the Miami Blue Butterfly. As for those who might want to keep one as a pet, it is still legal to do so in Florida, but it is illegal to release non-native animals into the wild. While the Agama might not be as destructive as other invasive species in Florida, it serves as a reminder of just how many exotic animals, especially reptiles, make their way into the state. As

development continues, it is essential to keep an eye out for these invasives and to continue to work to prevent their spread.

Title: Giant African Land Snail in Lee County

Description: Parts of Fort Myers and Tice were put under quarantine to prevent the further spread of the Giant African land snail. This snail is invasive and detrimental to Florida's agriculture. It grows to 8 inches long and 5 inches in diameter. Biologists found the snail along the Caloosahatchee River in December 2022. Researchers have been trying to get a snail count. People living in the quarantine zone are not allowed to move plant matter or soil out of the zone.

Title: Sexual Assault Test Kits Tracking

Description: Florida Department of Law Enforcement announced that survivors of sexual violence can follow the path of their sexual assault evidence collection kits on their computers. After someone has a sexual assault exam, it typically takes months for the results. With this new system, victims can track the status of the kits going through lab testing from their computer. A dozen other states have implemented the online database software. Access to the portal will expand statewide by July 2023.

Title: \$15,000 Water Bills

Description: Some residents on Fort Myers Beach received outrageous water bills without having access to water or even a home that is still standing. It is another added headache to the already difficult rebuilding process. The Town of Fort Myers Beach said some property owners may have leaks or water running without their knowledge due to the damage caused by lan, which has caused unusually large bills. The town told people with unusually large bills to contact the utilities department. The town warned they were receiving a high volume of calls and emails, but would get back to everyone.

Title: Vibrio Vulnificus Infections

Description: A North Fort Myers man said he is fighting a bacterial infection after coming in contact with canal water. The immunocompromised man was cleaning his dock when water hit

his face. He washed it off, but shortly after noticed red blotchy patches on his skin. Doctors believed it was a flesh-eating bacteria called Vibrio Vulnificus. This is extremely rare. One in 5 patients die, and many survivors require amputations.

Title: Black Mold Lawsuit

Description: An Englewood man died after being exposed to black mold. His family was forced to move from place to place to stay healthy. The family's home was inundated with water during Hurricane Ian. The family tried to mitigate the issue, but says the landlord refused to fix the problem. The family did not have money to move, so stayed put, until the man died. The man's widow filed a wrongful lawsuit for damages and continuing health issues from being exposed to high levels of black mold.

Title: Tattoo Troubles

Description: Certain tattoo inks are less harmful to your body than others. Researchers are looking into certain inks to figure out what ingredients are being used to make them. Mars Inc., the company that makes Skittles, was under fire because of a chemical compound they use to make the candy, titanium dioxide. Turns out, the same chemical compound is found in certain tattoo inks as well. Tattoo artists recommend being selective and asking questions when getting a tattoo.

Title: Bordetella Scare

Description: Multiple dog parks in Charlotte County had to be shut down and deep cleaned after a dog tested positive for Bordetella. The bacterium is one of the most common respiratory infectious diseases in dogs, caused by a bacterium called Bordetella Bronchiseptica, which invades the lung tissues. It is spread by aerosolized spray, like coughing or sneezing, from a dog's mouth or nose. Some of the symptoms can be a "honky sound" cough and watery nasal discharge. To prevent infections, pets need to be vaccinated.

Title: Brain Eating Amoeba

Description: The Florida Department of Health in Charlotte County confirmed someone was infected with Naegleria fowleri, possibly as a result of sinus rinse practices utilizing tap water. Naegleria fowleri is a microscopic single-celled living amoeba. It is rare and can only happen when water contaminated with amoeba enters the body through the nose, according to health officials. A person can't be infected with the amoeba by drinking infected tap water. Health officials said the amoeba can cause an infection of the brain called primary amebic meningoencephalitis (PAM) in rare situations. The county tested water plants and determined

the amoeba was not present in the water system. They believe the amoeba came from the victim's house. 31 infections were reported in the United States from 2012 to 2021. Only 4 out of 154 patients have survived a brain eating amoeba from 1962 to 2021.

Title: Banking Collapse lesson

Description: A lot of attention went towards the U.S. banking system this quarter after the largest banking failure since the 2008 recession. The US Justice Department opened an investigation into the collapse of Silicon Valley Bank. A professor at Florida Gulf Coast University decided what better way to learn than from real-time events like this bank failure. This failure does not mean panic; it means pay attention. The Silicon Valley Bank collapse is the second-largest bank failure in U.S. history. From the stock market to the bond market, there is a lot of volatility. By learning from bank failures, people can use that knowledge to prevent something like this from happening again. In a hybrid class, the FGCU professor was able to bring real-time events to FGCU students. When things like this happen, it is very easy to make that emotional connection for the student to what they talked about in class.

Title: Cape Facade Facelift

Description: The Cape Coral Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) proposed a Facade Improvement Program for businesses in the South Cape Coral. It is an incentive program to encourage property and business owners to improve exterior appearances of their buildings and storefronts. Business owners who want to spruce up their storefronts could get up to 50% back, up to \$50,000, under the proposal. They would have to do at least three improvements like new lighting, landscaping, signage or doors.

Title: Cape Coral Bridge

Description: Lee County Commissioners voted to completely replace the 60-year-old Cape Coral Bridge. The plans call for 3 lanes going East and Westbound into Cape Coral and Fort Myers. Construction could start in 2027 and the plan is to have drivers on the new bridge by 2029. The original plan was to replace only the older side of the bridge, but commissioners thought it would save more money in the long run to replace both at the same time. The project will cost taxpayers just over \$216 million dollars. State and federal grants and loans will help cover the cost of the project at first. But the county has \$75 million of outstanding debt for three bridges. Come 2027, the county is slated to pay off the Midpoint Bridge with \$35 million

remaining debt. Last year Lee County toll revenue totaled \$50.6 million. The Cape Coral Bridge itself collected \$16.8 million.

Title: Cape Coral Sidewalks

Description: With a lot of roads without sidewalks, the City of Cape Coral is trying to make the area safer, one street at a time. A little over \$500,000 from the Florida Department of Transportation could add sidewalks to both sides of SW 29th Ave from Ceitus Parkway to SW 3rd Terrace and a 5-foot wide sidewalk on the north side of SW 10th Street from Chiquita Blvd to Skyline Blvd. The city voted to give the two projects the green light. Both areas are near several schools. The projects would be completed between 2026 and 2027.

Title: Cape Coral Storage Facilities

Description: The City of Cape Coral discussed making it harder for self-storage facilities to move into some neighborhoods. They would have to be 1,000 feet from another storage facility. On Pine Island Road, the front property line has to be less than 170 feet, and no self-storage units will be allowed right on Burnt Store Road. Residents say these storage facilities are taking the place of other businesses. The City already has 1.05 million square feet of storage space in permitting or under construction. There is another 1.5 million square feet of existing storage space. The City said with the lack of basements and attic space in Southwest Florida, there is demand for the space, but they are taking up prime real estate and are too close together.

Title: Cape Coral Utilities Extension Project

Description: The City of Cape Coral approved some of the final steps before construction begins on the North 1 West Utilities Extension Project in the Northeast Cape. Council finalized the cost homeowners will pay to hook up city sewer and water systems. Some homeowners wanted the project delayed because of the high costs associated with it due to inflation. The North 1 West UEP will bring city water, sewer and irrigation to 3,900 parcels. The average homeowner will pay between \$33,000 and \$35,000 if they pre-pay upfront by September 30th, 2023. If they choose to pay over 30 years on their tax bill with interest, it would cost up to \$112,000. The total cost of the project is nearly \$250 million. The city created a hardship program where homeowners could defer annual payments, though it must be applied for every year. The program is only available for owner-occupied single-family homes, condominiums, or duplexes, and must be homesteaded.

Title: New Amusement Tower Fort Myers

Description: A developer proposed a new 131-foot-tall entertainment tower in downtown Fort Myers. The tower would dangle 16 people around a rotating table for dinner. The developer told us he is fully committed to working with the people to make sure it is the right vision for downtown.

Title: 3 New High Rises Being Built

Description: Downtown Fort Myers is getting several new high-rise condo buildings. The projects have been in the works for years. While Hurricane Ian set things back a bit, the projects are moving forward. Prima Luce will be home to two 22-story high-rise towers along the banks of the Caloosahatchee River. A boat that was washed onto the property during Hurricane Ian must be removed so that work can proceed. Half of the building's 225 new homes are sold. They start at \$355,000 and go up to \$1.29 million for the penthouse view. Another high-rise set to break ground this year is "One." It is a 21-story "boutique" high-rise, also on the water, housing just 34 condos. Crews are currently preparing the property at Prima Luce, and the buildings will become visible later this year as they start to rise above the river.

Description: One of the biggest developments to come to Bonita Springs is underway. The development will feature shops, business, restaurants, a hotel, and apartments all within walking distance of each other. Description: Hundreds of people were left looking for safe shelter in the months following Hurricane Ian. Dozens of empty trailers were parked in a lot near the Punta Gorda Airport. The Florida Department of Emergency Management said 28 families received trailers from the

agency as of January 3. Officials said they expected to issue more in the following weeks. But issues persisted with getting trailers on people's property. Charlotte County agreed to create "FEMA City", a congregation of trailers, so families could get a roof over their heads. County leaders report more than 500 families in Charlotte County could use the temporary housing, yet only a fraction received accommodations by the end of January. The program provides housing for up to 18 months post-lan, and is free for residents. The travel trailers come in various sizes to fit different-sized households. They fit from two to six people and are designed for shorter-term needs. The mobile homes come in one and two bedrooms and are available for various accessibility needs.

The Garden will seed quick-growing, highly resilient plants at beach access points in the city that trap sand and help reinforce and create dunes. Hurricane Ian destroyed dune structures. Only dunes that had plants in place before the storm remained. The Botanical Garden's conservation team is doing research at individual beach accesses throughout the city. They plan on beginning the process quickly, ahead of the rainy season. Collier County also announced the mission to create an emergency dune structure throughout the area to reinforce flood resistance.

Title: Widowed Sisters Trailer Troubles

Description: WZVN followed two widowed sisters after Hurricane Ian destroyed their home. They had been locked out of their FEMA trailer and unable to get in weeks after it was delivered. They had been living without power and running water for months. FEMA gave them a trailer and quickly installed the plumbing and the skirting, leveling it in just three days, but they have remained locked because power was not connected. Lee County Electric Coop explained the company is responsible for the hookup, but they can't do the job until a county inspector inspects and approves the hookup. It turns out it was the county's responsibility, and they showed up and issued a permit before the end of the business day. After electricity was hooked up, the sisters wrongly received an eviction notice for the trailer. The government has ordered their FEMA trailer to be taken away, although they never even moved in. WZVN reached out to FEMA for an explanation and learned the notice was an error. After that, FEMA told the sisters their well was too damaged to use with the trailer. The sisters were forced to drill a new well before being able to move in. FEMA rules state a person can't move into their trailer until they have running water. After a new well was drilled, WZVN was there the first time the sisters walked into their trailer.

Title: Shrimp Industry

Description: This year has been an excellent year for pink shrimp despite Southwest Florida's struggling seafood industry. Only two shrimpers are back in the water after lan's storm surge pushed the fleet of 50 boats on land. Some of their buildings' walls have giant holes in them from shrimp boats smashing into them. All their dock space was destroyed, making it challenging to bring products in from boats. Instead of catching shrimp, many of the businesses are still trying to rebuild. Many of the shrimpers lived on their boats as well leaving some living in tents. Despite low prices, business owners said shrimp sales were going well, with the support from the local community.

Description: One of the most confusing and at times frustrating aspects of lan recovery for residents was FEMA's 50% rule. FEMA said they would no longer use the Lee County Property Appraisers Tax Roll Value Letter to estimate the 50% rule. FEMA sent letters to Lee County municipalities about the change saying they found 'wide disparities' in how the Property Appraiser determined market value of properties damaged after lan. FEMA's 50% threshold states if the repairs cost more than half the home's market value, the home has to be rebuilt to newer flood codes. This is not a new policy, and FEMA does not set the market values. FEMA said in the letters that the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) requires market values to "be based on the condition of the structure before the damage occurred." The letter also talked about the county property appraiser's system for calculating market value. They said, "without knowing how these adjustments are being calculated, we cannot determine if these values are acceptable." Lee County Property Appraiser Matt Caldwell denied claims that his office inflated market values to change the 50% rule threshold. FEMA later backtracked on the change saying it dealt with the issue with county leaders.

Description: Another Southwest Florida home insurance company was trying to avoid bankruptcy after more than \$140 million in losses from Hurricane Ian this quarter. Florida's Chief Financial Officer said he was aware that many people were still owed money from their insurance company and stressed that the state could help fix that. Patronis also revealed he planned to call insurance companies back to Southwest Florida to help payout outstanding claims.

Title: UPC Cancels Claims

Description: United Property and Casualty became the tenth insurance company to go insolvent in the last three years as the company began notifying 140,000 people, the majority of them in Lee County, that they must find an alternative insurance company. Slide is the company buying up the UPC canceled policies. This allows the company to charge considerably more to write a new policy. The cancellation notices do not discriminate, as even State Representative Spencer Roach got canceled. Florida Chief Financial Officer Jimmy Patronis said the state would oversee lan's claims going forward. Many UPC customers were forced into the state-run Citizens Insurance. Florida's home insurance crisis is growing more serious by the day despite lawmakers holding a special session in an attempt to address the matter. Experts said it could

be 18 months before any improvement in costs is seen in Florida. Insurance industry experts said because of this more people may be forced to put their homes up for sale simply because they can't afford to insure them. Customers who were in the middle of a dispute with UPC or have claims were asked to report it to the state.

Title: Insurance Companies Rejecting New Policyholders with Ian Damage

Description: After more than 100,000 people were dropped by UPC insurance, it became nearly impossible to find new providers. No insurance company, including the state-run Citizens, would accept a new policyholder if their home is still damaged from Hurricane Ian. March 29 was the deadline for thousands of people to find new insurance if they were canceled by UPC, but if their home was damaged and UPC had not settled the claim, homeowners could be forced by your mortgage company to pay thousands more a year for a policy. The state said it would take over the claims and insurance experts said those claims could take a year to settle, which means many people would have to pay for their repairs out of pocket until the claims are settled.

Some companies cut repair estimates by as much as 50% to even 97%. That means homeowners were stuck paying for the majority of their repairs. Description: A leaked internal insurance industry memo revealed thousands of people will see yet another home insurance rate hike in the coming months. This time it was customers of an Allstate Insurance company who would soon be paying more. An internal memo from subsidiary Castle Key revealed the company planned to raise rates by nearly 54% for condo owners. Reinsurance, which is insurance for the insurance company, was also expected to increase rates for Florida carriers in June, just as hurricane season begins.

Title: Citizens Insurance Rate Hike

Description: Florida's state-run insurance, Citizens Property Insurance Corporation, approved a 2023 rate that reflects the impacts of reinsurance costs, litigation, and recent legislative reforms. It came the same day an industry insurance memo revealed seven other carriers also plan home insurance rate increases. Citizens board members recommended a statewide average increase of 14.2% for all personal lines policies such as homeowners, condominium units, dwellings, renters and mobile homes. If approved by the Office of Insurance Regulation, the 2023 rates would go into effect for new and renewal personal residential policies beginning November 1. Homeowner policy rates could increase by an average of 13.9%. Condo owners may see an average 14.6% increase. Almost 25,000 people in Southwest Florida have this insurance. Individual premiums may increase by more than that because of higher replacement costs due to inflation in the construction market.

Description: Florida's state-run Citizens Insurance warned that residents statewide could face a state surcharge amounting to what many people are referring to as a "hurricane tax." The announcement is considered by insurance experts as a sign that problems continue mounting in the state's ongoing insurance crisis as resident rates climb, policies are being dropped and companies continue to fold. If Citizens Insurance depletes its surplus, it can and would impose a 2% tax on home, renters, car and even boat insurance policies statewide. A major storm however would impact Citizens Insurance policyholders the most. They could potentially face a 45% increase.

A form student athletes fill out lists the questions as optional. Health officials said they agree with privacy concerns, but also said it is important from a medical standpoint to have those conversations with a doctor. The FHSAA Board of Directors held a virtual emergency meeting and voted 14-2 to remove the questions from the physical form and no longer submit the personal health questions to the state.

HB 25 would make it illegal for anyone to make a citizen's arrest. It would not, however, impact the stand-your-ground law or the right to carry a gun.

Republican lawmakers in Florida heavily back the bill. However, it has been met with some criticism by several Democrats. The state legislature passed the measure and sent it to the governor's desk. The bill does not change who can buy a gun or the requirements to buy one. Nearly 3 million Floridians have a concealed weapons permit. While a background check and a three-day waiting period will still be required to purchase a gun from a licensed dealer, they are not required for private transactions or exchanges of weapons. People can still obtain permits to avoid the purchase waiting period and to carry in states with reciprocal agreements.

Description: More than 50 speakers took to the podium at Naples City Council to debate the 2023 Naples Pride Festival, hosted annually at Cambier Park in downtown Naples. Each year, the festival has to be re-approved for a permit. Residents opposed to the festival are unhappy the event is in close proximity to the playground at Cambier Park, exposing the events to children in the area. The Pride Festival has been hosted by the Naples Pride Center since 2017 each summer. It is an annual fundraiser to raise money for the Center's programs, such as LGBTQ counseling and education. The Naples City Council tabled the vote then approved it weeks later after more than 1,500 residents showed up to show support and against the event. After being approved, Naples Pride said the drag show portion of the event would be moved inside for their safety.

Title: Ultimate Cancel Act

Description: Florida Republicans introduced a bill that would abolish the Democratic Party from operating in the state of Florida. It is called the "Ultimate Cancel Act." If passed into law, it would force election supervisors to inform Democratic voters that they would be recognized by the state as no-party affiliate voters. The bill suggests that, because Democrats have fought to abolish anything related to the Civil War, the party itself should be abolished for its roots in supporting slavery. Historians and educators say the bill is not only unconstitutional, it would abolish the Republican Party as well. A professor told WZVN, Republicans introduced what would have been the 13th amendment, which said congress would never have the power to interfere in slavery in states where it existed. States seceded from the union and the civil war began before the amendment could be ratified.

I Have Been Watching

Antonio Armstrong — a former NFL player turned successful business owner — and his wife, Dawn Armstrong, raised what seemed to be a picture-perfect Texas family centered on faith and football. But on a fateful night in July 2016, everything changed when their then 16-year-old son AJ called 911 and reported that he heard gunshots from their room. When police arrived, they found the murder weapon had been left behind along with a mysterious note that read, "I've been watching for a long time." Rowland, a 37-year-old sex offender who had recently been released from prison. Lauren ended the relationship and contacted campus police when he began extorting and harassing her. After over a week of repeatedly asking campus police, local law enforcement and school officials for help, Lauren was kidnapped and later found dead in a car.
