
David Wegner expert on western water, endangered species, river restoration, the application and use of science, and adaptive management. He spent over 20 years with the Department of the Interior and was lead scientist for the Bureau of Reclamation's environmental impact studies of Glen Canyon Dam. For 13 years he served as science director for the Glen Canyon Institute while establishing his own business, Ecosystem Management International, which specialized in the study of the effects of climate change on large landscapes, river basins and species both nationally and internationally.

1. Can you tell what it means to be an expert on western water? What sorts of concerns and issues does a water expert attend to?
2. What are the factors that have put water in the west at such risk? What has been the impact on endangering species?

3. As science director for the Glen Canyon Institute for 13 years, what have you learned about Glen Canyon? In what ways is Glen Canyon instructive for other dams and for our management of water in the West?

4. You've established your own business, Ecosystem Management International, which specialized in the study of the effects of climate change on large landscapes, river basins and species both nationally and internationally. This is a huge question in a short amount of time, but where has that work taken you? What have you learned? Will our rivers be able to survive climate change? How?

### Start Flash Drive Now

This is Ecotopia on KZFR, and this segment, we'll be talking with a man who has multiple Ecotopian skills. Jim Mathys is the owner of Terra Design and Landscape Consulting here in Chico, with a focus on ecologically sound landscape, including water use. His company also helps people measure their water consumption through water audits. But there's more . . . Jim has been a strong advocate of community gardens and farmer's markets and has spent countless hours working on such projects as the Chapmantown Farmer's Market and the Jesus Center Community Garden and Farmer's Market. Welcome Jim Mathys.

--Let's start with Terra Design. How long have you been in the landscape design business (35 yrs). What is the range of services you offer?

--You are a Certified Landscape Irrigation Auditor (and an EPA Watersense Partner). Please tell us about this aspect of your work. How does an irrigation audit work? Who are your clients? How do you conduct the audit? (What is an EPA Watersense Partner?).

--We've been through a rainy patch here in the Northstate, and our current rainfall is above average. But that's no cause for comfort and the drought isn't over. What are your short- and long-range concerns about water use and consumption in Northern California? (If you have thoughts about water transfers, groundwater depletion, or the Twin Tunnels, we'd love to hear them.)

--Our guest last week, Dmitry Orlov, suggested that lawnmowers should be a thing of the past along with lawns—that we should employ sheep to crop the grass and that “grass” should in fact, be native grass, not “lawns.” Please tell us about landscape design practices. How have they changed in recent years? Are people still installing lawns or going for other forms of landscape?

--The portfolio page of your website <http://www.terralandscapeconsulting.com/gallery.html> shows some really beautiful installations that you've done. Let's do a little visual radio: Please describe one or two of the projects you've done—How do they combine aesthetics with environmental responsibility?

--You also supply plants and trees as part of your business. What kinds of trees, shrubs, other plants do you recommend for our part of the world?

We're talking with Jim Mathys of Terra Design and Landscape Consulting. Jim is also a gardener and a community activist supporting community gardens.

--I first met you when we had a small grant from Cultivating Communities to support the Chapmantown Farmer's Market. You've also worked with the Jesus Center to create a community garden and a farmer's market. Please tell us about those projects. (The Chapmantown market had to close despite its admirable goals due to lack of support. We know there have been problems with the Jesus Center market as well. What do you see as the problems in creating viable markets in our town?)

--We recently interviewed Michael Ableman, who has had success creating community gardens in tough neighborhoods in Vancouver, B.C. What do you see as the need for community gardening here in Chico?

--Are sustainable gardens something that can be a part of landscape design? Should we be turning our yards into fruit and vegetable mini-farms?

--Here's a two-part question: What do you see as the opportunity for towns and cities to develop genuinely sustainable, local agriculture? What is your degree of optimism that we'll actually be able or willing to do that?

--Where can people go to learn more about the kinds of practices you've been recommending? (We'll mention one from our recent interview—check out <http://michaelableman.com> for more on urban farming.)
