Bay Area Focus 7/6/14 8am:

Seg 1: **Susan Manheimer**, Chief of Police for San Mateo County, talked about her work with San Mateo's Homeless Outreach Team, policing partnerships, and Countywide Gang Task Force, among other topics. She also discussed San Mateo County's social media efforts in minimizing crime and building community.

Seg 2: **Richelle Donigan**, Owner/Yoga Instructor with Ojah Yoga and Skeeter Barker, Yoga Instructor, Ojah Yoga, talked about Ojah's efforts to create an LGBTQ-friendly space for yoga classes and workshops. They promoted upcoming events and described current programs.

Seg 3: The actors playing "Guy" and "Girl" in ONCE: THE MUSICAL talked about their preparation for the roles, audience reactions, the national tour, their background in theater, and highlights from the upcoming show.

Seg 4: **Tyson Daugherty**, Founder of Mission Bit, and **Danielle Leong**, an instructor at Mission Bit, talked about their work teaching computer coding classes to San Francisco Unified School District students. They noted the benefits of learning coding early in the game, as well as the importance of diversifying the computer science workforce. They described courses and discussed upcoming events.

Bay Area Focus 7/13/14 8am:

Seg 1: **Midge Wilson** and **Nancy Ong** discussed the range of services of the Bay Area Women's and Children's Center offices: Free Clothing Closet, Food Pantry, Parent-Child Program, the youth sports initiatives, changes in the Tenderloin neighborhood over the years, and the main issues of concern for most Tenderloin residents, particularly ones who have recently emigrated to the US.

Seg 2: Two reps from StarVista discussed school-based mental health services, Child and Family Treatment initiatives, youth programs, residential programs, and preventative measures before young people experience substance abuse struggles.

Seg 3: **Gina Waota**, President of the Haiti Rise Association, discussed Haiti Rise's work in providing scholarships to Haitian students, the statistics of many Haitian children receive quality educations, the state of schools in Haiti, and upcoming fundraisers for their scholarship program.

Seg 4: Due to no-show guests, the Mission Bit segment was inserted as the 4th segment for this show. Info below:

Black Renaissance 7/20/14 8am:

A local dj who is a yoga instructor bringing "yoga for all"; fashion on the square reps; **Ed Drew**, a local photographer, **Addisu Demissie**, political analyst for Cooker Booker and President Obama.

Bay Area Focus 7/27/14 8am:

Seg 1: **Jayn**, the Afternoon DJ & Music Director with Alice @ 97.3, talked about her background in Radio, the challenges and benefits of the field, and emphasized the fact that CBS Radio hires locally-based DJs who can actually comment on breaking stories in the regions they serve.

Seg 2: **Curt Yagi**, the Executive Director of Real Options for City Kids (ROCK), discussed ROCK'S range of after-school programs for students living in the Excelsior neighborhood of San Francisco: Skill Drills, SALT, Martial Arts, Overnight Camping, and Learning Enrichment initiatives. He discussed problems that low-income SFUSD students face in the Excelsior neighborhood, as well as the importance of young people having a safe and productive way to spend time after school.

Seg 3: **Hesse McGraw**, VP of Exhibitions & Programs with the SF Art Institute, talked about current exhibitions with SFAI, upcoming shows, the diverse group of artists they attract to their site, the range of community-oriented programs they run, and the art scene in general in the Bay Area.

Seg 4: **Pragati Grover** and **Lakshmi Ravi** of the India Community Center discussed issues of concern for the Indian community of the Bay Area, described their range of recreational, youth-oriented, and health-related programs at the ICC site, and talked about their outreach efforts and volunteer opportunities.

Bay Area Focus 8/24/14 8am:

Seg 1: Actor **Michael Urie** discussed his upcoming role in BUYER & CELLAR, a one-man show staged at the Curran Theatre in San Francisco. He mentioned his national tour for the role, his television background, his enthusiasm for the script, and the way he prepares for performances.

Seg 2: Two reps from East Palo Alto Tennis and Tutoring discussed EPATT's unique programs blending physical fitness (via tennis lessons) with academic tutoring. They discussed the importance of parental involvement in a child's learning process, the benefits of physical fitness, and the difference between skill development and homework completion.

Seg 3: Filipino Community Center reps talked about issues concerning the Filipino community in the Bay Area, particularly recent immigrants: domestic violence, immigration status, ties to extended family abroad, gaining back unpaid wages in homecare work, and language barriers. They also discussed youth development initiatives that their organization facilitates.

Seg 4: **John Morrison**, Director of Education with the California Film Institute, talked about CFI's summer programs (animation, filmmaking courses), the Mill Valley Film Fest, their work with at-

risk youth, and their intergenerational educational initiatives. He also discussed the film scene in the Bay Area.

Bay Area Focus 8/31/14 8am:

Seg 1: Two reps from the Children's Health Council talked about CHC's services for children with ADHD, learning disabilities, Anxiety/Depression, and Autism. They discussed their clinical services, their on-site schools, parent reactions, and parent education efforts.

Seg 2: Lead actors from Motown: The Musical talked about their roles in the show, the history of the music, the civil rights era that inspired the music, and highlights from the current tour.

Seg 3: The Executive Director and a Program Manager from Narika discussed domestic violence in the South Asian community, talked about their services for domestic violence survivors, and talked about how illegal immigrants being abused by their spouses often feel trapped in their relationships.

Seg 4: **Claude-Alix Bertrand**, Captain of the Haitian National Polo Team, discussed Haiti's polo team, the polo scene in the Bay Area, the international tournaments held by PoloSF, and the classes that PoloSF teaches to expose newcomers to the sport. He also broke down common myths and misperceptions about the sport of polo.

Bay Area Focus 9/7/14 8am:

Seg 1: Refugee Transitions reps discussed their range of services for low-income immigrants to the Bay Area. They mentioned topics of concern to immigrants, such as language barriers, immigration status, past trauma, social isolation, and other topics. They explained their range of home-based tutoring, youth enrichment camps, family programs, and citizenship programs.

Seg 2: Two staff members from Oakland Unite talked about the factors that lead to violent crime in Oakland, the outreach efforts their organization employs to reach at-risk young people before they commit violent acts, their rehabilitation work, and their efforts to build a community in low-income, high-crime parts of Oakland.

Seg 3: Filmmaker and photographer **Chris Felver** talked about his background in filmmaking, his impression of the Bay Area film/photography scene, his projects with various Bay Area celebs and public figures, his recent book, and his solo and group exhibitions.

Seg 4: **Tom Myers**, Executive Director of the Community Services Agency, discussed income inequality in the South Bay, his non-profit's services for homeless and low-income residents, the problems that senior citizens on fixed incomes have as the cost of living keeps increasing, and the upcoming Hometown Hero Awards ceremony hosted by Community Services Agency.

Bay Area Focus 8/14/14 8am:

Seg 1: Founder of the SF Latino Film Festival and a filmmaker from this year's festival talked about using film to build community, the general film scene in the Bay Area, how this year's festival differs from prior years, and about the making of East Side Sushi (filmed in Oakland).

Seg 2: Two reps from Rebuilding Together – Oakland talked about their organization's home repairs, the rising cost of living in the Bay Area, Rebuilding Together's outreach efforts, the volunteers who work for them, and the people who qualify for their rebuilding projects.

Seg 3: Huckleberry Youth reps discussed their non-profit's youth workshops, youth retreats, the stigma and shame attached to topics like birth control and abusive relationships, and their Wellness Academy that enables students of diverse backgrounds to gain a foothold and have some exposure to the healthcare industry.

Seg 4: Southern Exposure staffers talked about their organization's grants for artists, prior and current exhibitions, their free youth arts education initiatives, their summer and mentorship programs, and the changing arts scene in the Bay Area as the cost of living keeps increasing.

Black Renaissance 9/21/14 8am:

A chiropractor, jazz vocalist/recording artist **Nicolas Bearde**; **John Hope Bryant**, author: "How the Poor Can Save Capitalism: Rebuilding the Path to the Middle Class"; and the director for faith partnerships and mobilization for the human rights campaign.

Bay Area Focus 9/28/14 8am:

Seg 1: Community Gatepath senior staff members talked about their non-profit's range of services for children and adults with developmental disabilities. They discussed inclusive pre-schools, employment programs, community initiatives, and outreach efforts.

Seg 2: The Pacific Center for Human Growth's Youth Program Manager and Director of Clinical Services discussed Pacific Center's youth-led speaker bureau, anti-bullying work, adult peer groups, and general initiatives to empower LGBTQ communities in the Bay Area.

Seg 3: Two reps from Girls on the Run of the Bay Area discussed their organization's unique blend of physical fitness and social/leadership skill training. They talked about their running workouts, discussions of self-esteem, and the importance of empowering girls to become involved in sports at a young age.

Seg 4: **Chike Nwoffiah**, Founder/Festival Director of the Silicon Valley African Film Festival, talked about the 5th annual festival in Mountain View. He mentioned the range of films, an

African Women in Technology Forum, marketplace events, and the misconceptions of Africa as a backward nation that is always “on its knees.”
