1. HOWELL PUBLIC SCHOOLS BOND ISSUE - Aired on 11/9/23 at 7, 8, 9 and 11 am and 1, 5, 7, 9 & 11 pm. Duration: approx. 60 sec. Howell Public Schools officials say approval of the \$258 million bond issue on Tuesday will usher in a new era of modern learning environment, increased safety and security, state-of-the-art learning tools, upgraded infrastructure and new facilities. Voters approved the "Our Kids, Our Community, Our Future" bond issue by more than 60%. Officials say the first step will be naming an architectural firm and a construction management firm and then starting the process of issuing the bonds. They say passage of the bond issue will not result in any increase over the current 5.5 mills.

1. VAPE DETECTORS APPROVED FOR BRIGHTON ARE SCHOOLS - Aired on 10/2/23 at 5, 7, 9 & 11 am. The Brighton Area Schools has made a significant investment in eradicating the incidence of vaping in local schools. The board has approved purchase of 44 vape detectors to be installed in bathrooms at Brighton High School, Scranton Middle School, Maltby Intermediate School and The Bridge Alternative High School. Health experts warn that vaping is extremely harmful because it produces many dangerous chemicals that result in lung and cardiovascular diseases. Superintendent

Matthew Outlaw told WHMI there were 13 suspensions last year that resulted from vape use or possession. He says the new detectors will serve as a disincentive for students to use vaping products.

3 SNACK PACK DRIVE FOR LOCAL STUDENTS IN NEED -

Aired on 11/18/23 at 6, 8 and 10 am & 12 pm. Duration: approx. 60 sec. Snacks are again being accepted as part of an annual food drive that provides for local students in need. The McKinney-Vento Act is in place to support students who are homeless, living in temporary situations, or might be in transitional housing. To combat these challenges, the Livingston Educational Service Agency developed The Education Project, which strives to support student needs and reduce the impact of homelessness. The Education Project's Snack Pack Donation Drive was initiated to help supplement the means students are typically provided with at school as part of the free school lunch program served at most Michigan schools. The donation drive will begin Nov. 27th and run through Dec. 8th. All items can be dropped off at LESA headquarters at 1425 W. Grand River in Howell.

1. HOWELL BRIGHTON COUNCIL RACES - Aired on 11/6/23 at Duration: approx. 70 sec. On Tuesday, voters in Howell and Brighton will go to the polls to elect candidates for the two city councils. Howell voters will also be voting on a mayor, whereas in Brighton, the mayor is chosen from among council members at a special meeting after the election. In the Howell mayoral race, incumbent Mayor Bob Ellis is being challenged by former mayor Nick Proctor. There are four candidates for three open seats on the Howell City Council, while in Brighton six candidates are vying for four seats. In Brighton, the top three finishers will receive four-year terms, while the fourth-highest will get a two-year term. Polls are open from 7 am to 8 pm in both communities.

2. BRIGHTON MILLAGE/HOWELL BOND - Aired on 11/6/23 at Duration: approx. 60 sec. Howell Public School District voters will decide on a \$258 million bond issue for improvements, focusing on five key areas: safety and security, learning environments, teaching tools, aging buildings, and community needs. Passage of the millage request will not result in any tax increase. Voters in Brighton will decide on a public safety millage to help fund police operations. The 0.1326-mill issue would help provide officers with the latest in equipment and technology. The millage issue, if passed, would raise about \$280,000 when first levied in 2024.

4. BRIGHTON CITY AUDIT - Aired on 10/23/23 at 5:30, 6:30, 8 & 10 am. Duration: approx. 60 sec. The city of Brighton passed its annual audit with flying colors, as presented at Thursday's meeting by the accounting firm of Plante & Moran. The city was given an "unmodified", or clean, opinion, meaning everything can be relied on as accurate, and accepted accounting procedures were followed. The city was able to increase its fund balance in the 2022-23 fiscal year by \$820,000 to a total of \$4.3 million. Also, the unassigned, or undesignated, fund balance at the end of the fiscal year totaled about \$2 million, up 6% from the prior year. Mayor Kris Tobbe asked Plante & Moran officials how Brighton ranked with other communities and was told, "You'd rank right at the top."

- 1. JOBLESS RATES DROP IN SEPTEMBER; LIVINGSTON STILL LOWEST Aired on 10/27/23 at 7, 9, and 11 am, and 1, 3, 5 & 7 pm. Duration: approx. 60 sec. Livingston County continues to register the lowest unemployment rate in the state's 83 counties. Data released by the Michigan Dept. of Technology, Management & Budget showed seasonally adjusted unemployment rates decreased in all 17 Michigan labor market areas for the month. Livingston County again had the lowest unemployment rate in the state, at 2.9%. The highest jobless rate was registered in Oscoda County, at 6.3%. Some 78 of Michigan's 83 counties showed jobless rate declines between August and September, while for the year, unemployment rates fell in 54 counties.
- 2. MSUFCU BRANCH COMING TO BRIGHTON Aired on 11/6/23 at 3, 5:30, 8 and 10 pm and on 11/7/23 at 5 & 6 am. Duration: approx. 75 sec. The Brighton City Council gave final approval Thursday night to an MSU Federal Credit Union branch, to be located where the vacant, former Big Boy restaurant is situated at Challis Road and Grand River. The 7,700-square-foot structure will replace the former Big Boy building, which will be demolished. Erin Bodell, MSUFCU vice president of infrastructure, told council, in her words, that they "are proud to be expanding into Brighton (and) look forward to making an impact." The MSUFCU was established in 1937 and is headquartered in East Lansing. The business is expected to be completed and opened to the public by next July.
- 3. HOLIDAY GLOW & CHRISTMAS MARKET SATURDAY IN DOWNTOWN BRIGHTON Aired on 11/16/23 at 6, 8 & 10 am and 5:30, 7 & 9 pm. Duration: approx. 60 sec. The Greater Brighton Area Chamber of Commerce is hosting a fun day and evening of holiday shopping and entertainment this Saturday from 1-7 pm on Main Street in downtown Brighton. The Theme this year is "Miracle on Main Street", with local performances by the Livingston Lamplighters Family Chorus, EMA Singers and the Livingston County Women's Choir. Popup merchants on Main St. will have special prices on holiday-themed items, while children's activities include a nativity petting farm, reindeer games and letters to Santa. And the Gleaners Community Food Bank is accepting non-perishable food donations and unwrapped gifts.

1. BRIGHTON CITY I-96-GRAND RIVER RECONSTRUCTION PROJECT - Aired on 10/20/23 at 9 & 11 am and 1, 3 & 5:30 pm. Duration: approx. 70 sec. MDOT plans on a major project to reconstruct the I-96/Grand River Ave. interchange in Brighton at a cost of \$35 million. The work will start in the fall of 2024 and conclude in late 2026. Due to heavy commuter traffic, the off-ramp from I-96 to Grand River often backs up all the way to the westbound lanes of the freeway during afternoon rush hour periods. There has also been considerable deterioration over the years of the bridge over Grand River and the on-and-off ramps. The massive project will involve a new bridge on I-96, new ramps and pedestrian pathways for walkers and bicyclists on both sides of Grand River. The state and federal governments will pay the entire cost of the project.

2. PLEASANT VALLEY ROAD WORK - Aired on 11/1/23 at 7:30 & 8:30 am and 5, 6:30, 7, 9 & 11 pm. Duration: approx. 30 sec. A road project in Brighton Twp. Will cause delays for motorists this week and next. Pleasant Valley Road, northeast of Brighton, is scheduled to get some needed road work in the near future. The work is scheduled from Spencer Road to Waycross St. which marks the end of the pavement. The project involves replacing the top layer of asphalt and performing shoulder work. The road will remain open but under flag control, and the Livingston County Road Commission asks motorists to seek an alternate route. The project is expected to be completed by next Wed., Nov. 8th—

the street improvement program has not taken a back seat. In 2019, city voters approved a 2.5-mill, 7-year tax levy to improve the city's streets, plus a program to fill sidewalk gaps and extend sidewalks to areas that currently lack them. In 2023, the city completed the Northwest Neighborhood project, as well as a mill and overlay project on Alpine Trail, S. Third and Fairway Trails. The sidewalk gap and extension work was postponed to next year due to the late arrival of a \$329,000 grant for sidewalks.

4. BRIGHTON STREETSCAPE - PHASE THREE - Aired on 11/19/23 at 5, 6, 7, 9 & 11 am. Duration: approx. 40 sec. The final phase of the Main St. Streetscape Project in downtown Brighton starts today. The work on the \$6.5 million project will require the closure of East Main from Grand River to South East St. Both left and right hand turns from Grand River to E. Main will be prohibited during the construction period. Drivers will be asked to follow posted detours. The city expects the roadway in phase 2 to be opened the week of Oct. 29th and all sidewalks on W. Main are open and accessible. The work includes the replacement of all water mains, installation of storm sewer system, replacement of curb and gutter, replacing driveway approaches, removal and replacement of street trees and new landscaping and improvements to Mill Pond Park.

Surf has already installed fiber optic line in Howell, Fowlerville, Iosco Twp. and Cohoctah Twp., and installation is underway in Webberville and Williamston in Ingham County. Fiber optic internet service provides far faster connectivity about 20 times faster than regular cable internet.

A mothballed, former elementary school in Brighton is now in the process of being demolished to make way for a residential development West Village, consisting of 123 multi-family rental units on two floors. The original plan called for 140 units, but was scaled down after protests from nearby home owners and a city rejection of the site plan which resulted in a lawsuit by the developers. The resulting court order also calls for ventilation units to vent fumes caused by an underground plume of TCE a carcinogen from an industrial solvent and degreaser emanating from a now-closed, former business.
- 3. COMMUNITY HOUSING CATALYSTS Aired on 10/10/23 at 6:30, 9 & 11 am and 1,

- 3, 6, 7, 9 & 11 pm. Duration: approx. 60 sec. A local non-profit is launching a new initiative to address the affordable housing crisis in Livingston County. Community Catalysts is a Howell-based organization specializing in attainable housing goals and will bring together municipalities, local employers, developers and others who want to make more affordable housing available. Executive Director Eileen Zilch told WHMI they have received tremendous support from the community and intend to develop a work plan for the next 5-7 years to bring more affordable housing for low-to-middle income people who can't afford to buy a home at their current, and ever-increasing, prices. 

On Tuesday, voters in the city of Brighton approved a Headlee Override public safety millage for the Brighton Police Dept. The millage had expired and was last levied in July of this year. According to Police Chief Brent Pirochta, the 0.5-mill issue includes a renewal, plus an increase of 0.1326 mills to keep up with inflation, while continuing to equip officers with the most up-to-date facilities, equipment and technology to be used in assisting policing and investigative efforts. The millage will generate approximately \$280,000 when first levied in July of 2024. The levy will cost the average city of Brighton homeowner about \$50 a year in taxes.
- 2. CRASH RESPONDER SAFETY WEEK Aired on 11/9/23 at 5:30, 6:30, 7:30, 8:30 and 10 am and 12, 2 & 6:30 pm. Duration: approx. 70 sec. Crash Responder Safety Week will take place next week, and this year's these is "Protect Those Who Protect You".
