Grizzly hunt

THE NUMBER OF GRIZZLIES IN YELLOWSTONE COUNTRY IS ESTIMATED AT 718 BEARS, UP FROM 690 THE YEAR BEFORE. THAT REPORT FROM THE INTERAGENCY GRIZZLY BEAR STUDY TEAM MEETING IN CODY TODAY (**WEDNESDAY**). PENNY PRESTON REPORTS A GREATER YELLOWSTONE COALITION SPOKESMAN STILL THINKS IT'S TOO EARLY TO HUNT BEARS.

In 2017, the first year that Yellowstone area grizzlies were removed from the endangered species list, scientists estimate there were 718 grizzlies in the ecosystem

FRED "Since about the early 2000's, this population has been really very stable to possibly increasing a little bit, still. And every indication is we've reached biological recovery for this population, which is why this population was delisted earlier in 2017."

Dr. Frank Van Mannen told the group of state and federal members of the Yellowstone Grizzly Coordinating Committee that there were 55 known bear mortalities in the states surrounding the parks last year. He said that number was under the mortality limit...so, this fall, the states will, for the first time since the early 70's, hold grizzly hunts.

"For females, it's one percent of 250, so it's two and a half females across the ecosystem."

Wyoming's Game and Fish Department is proposing to allow hunters to kill two females...and up to ten males inside the demographic monitoring area, where grizzly numbers and deaths will be counted. The state proposes 12 more grizzlies can be killed outside the Demographic Monitoring Area.

Greater Yellowstone Coalition spokesman Chris Colligan: "We've seen this being called all sorts of things from cautious, conservative, and coordinated. And it is anything but all of those three. In our view it is aggressive and reckless."

Colligan says it's too early for any hunt.

"We think it's too soon for a bear hunt. We've asked for a five year moratorium on delisting."



But, the group of federal and state agency representatives did not protest the planned hunts. They were told the grizzly bear remains delisted, in spite of a pending lawsuit, filed by groups that contend it is too early to take grizzlies off the endangered species list. WYOMING HUNTERS ARE HEARING ABOUT WYOMING'S PROPOSED GRIZZLY HUNTING REGULATIONS THROUGH MEETINGS ACROSS THE STATE. PEOPLE WHO CAME TO CODY'S MEETING LAST NIGHT WERE CONCERNED ABOUT NON-HUNTERS CLOGGING UP THE SYSTEM. PENNY PRESTON WAS THERE, AND EXPLAINS IN THIS REPORT.

Under the regulations for Wyoming's first grizzly bear hunting season in 44 years, these bears would not be hunted. Although they are outside Yellowstone, grizzly sows with cubs, or dependent cubs will not be hunted and killed. And, roadside bears will not be killed. The regulations mandate hunters stay a quarter mile away from state and federal highways.

Wyoming's Large Carnivore supervisor told a group in Cody there will be seven hunt areas...six inside the demographic monitoring zone. He said Wyoming's grizzly season will run September 15th until November 15th, or until two sows are taken in the DMA. Then the season there will close. Hunters will have to take a training course... but no one here complained about that. Instead,

LEE "Our concern is to see the license system, the application system hijacked by the folks that don't want to see anything happen."

Several people expressed the same concern. Since it only costs \$5 to \$15 to apply to be put on a list, from which a draw system will choose who gets to actually buy a license, some are concerned non hunters will try to jam up the system.

DAN WHITE "That's happened in other states where anti-hunters have put in thousands of applications with the idea if I get a license, that bear won't get shot."

Large Carnivore supervisor Dan Thompson says this was the 7th of nine meetings across the state.

DAN THOMPSON "There's a lot of questions as to the license fees and whether we should require a full price license when you apply."



Thompson says people have until April 30th to submit their comments in writing...and he says their suggestions will be taken seriously. From Cody, Penny Preston, News 13.

WYOMING GAME AND FISH COMMISSIONERS HELD A LANDER PUBLIC MEETING TO GET OPINIONS ON GRIZZLY BEAR HUNTS. MULTIPLE ADVOCATES MET WITH COMMISSIONERS TO SHARE FEELINGS ABOUT TROPHY HUNTING IN THE STATE. OPPONENTS SAY IT'S IMMORAL TO KILL AN ANIMAL RECENTLY REMOVED FROM THE ENDANGERED SPECIES LIST.

ALTHOUGH MOST SEEM TO BE AGAINST THE SPORT, GAME AND FISH COMMISSIONERS DECIDED TO ALLOW TROPHY HUNTING, BEGINNING THIS YEAR. GRIZZLY BEAR HUNTING SEASON WILL RUN FROM SEPTEMBER 15 THROUGH NOVEMBER 15.

SCHOOL THREATS CONTINUE MEANING EFFORTS PUTTING STUDENTS AND TEACHERS' SAFETY FIRST EVOLVE EVEN AFTER RECENT THREATS. THE RURAL SCHOOLS OUTSIDE CASPER....CAN MAKE A TIMELY RESPONSE DIFFICULT. NEWS 13'S TYLER WAGGENSPACK SPOKE WITH N-C SHERIFF'S DEPUTIES...ABOUT SAFETY MEASURES IN THOSE RURAL SCHOOLS.

AS SCHOOL LEADERS HAVE SAID BEFORE, THEY TAKE ANY THREAT TO SCHOOLS SERIOUSLY. THE PARTNERSHIP BETWEEN POLICE AGENCIES AND SCHOOL LEADERS REMAINS VITAL WITH RECENT THREATS.

"We build a lot of relationships."

THE MARCH THREAT ABOUT USING A HAND GUN CAME FROM A STUDENT, PROMPTING SCHOOL LEADERS TO CALL FOR A LOCKOUT. IT WAS CONFINED TO THE CASPER AREA, BUT ANY THREAT CAN BE MADE EVEN TO SCHOOLS OUTSIDE CASPER. DEPUTIES SAY THEY OFTEN VISIT SCHOOLS DAILY, OR WEEKLY, CHECKING UP ON EVERYONE.

Sgt. Aaron Shatto "We don't have a school resource officer per say, but we do have deputies that make sure they go into those schools and meet with the students and staff."

THE DISTANCE TO RURAL SCHOOLS DOES TAKE TIME, BUT DEPUTIES SAY THEY RESPOND QUICKLY WHEN NEEDED.



"If there was a serious incident that took place at a school, there would be a heavily resourced law enforcement presence."

SCHOOL OFFICIALS EVEN SAY THE "RISK MANAGEMENT" TEAM HAS BEEN ESSENTIAL TO DEALING WITH ANY SCHOOL SAFETY CONCERNS. THE TEAM COMPRISES SCHOOL LEADERS....AND ALL POLICE AGENCIES IN OUR AREA.

"School crisis situations are our top priority."

Tanya Southerland "In recent months, especially we've been working closely with the NC Sheriff's office and our other local enforcement partners. We almost have weekly, if not daily conversations."

SCHOOL LEADERS AND POLICE CREDIT THAT STRONG PARTNERSHIP FOR RESPONDING TO ANY KIND OF SITUATION AND DEALING WITH IT. DEPUTIES SAY NO MATTER THE SITUATION, THEY'LL RESPOND ACCORDINGLY.

"We're going to make sure that we pull all the available resources and get officers to that location."

DISTANCE CAN BE A CHALLENGE FOR POLICE WHEN RESPONDING TO RURAL SCHOOL THREATS. BUT, NATRONA COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPUTIES DO THEIR BEST TO STAY ON TOP OF THINGS.

THERE ARE JUST TWO SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS WITHIN THE NATRONA COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT.

CHIEF "I was stunned that there was only two, in a community this size and a school district this size with that student population, there needs to be more school resource officers."

ALONG WITH CONCERNS OVER A NEED FOR MORE SRO'S, SOME SHARED CONCERNS ON THE DIFFERENCES BETWEEN SCHOOLS, ESPECIALLY WHEN IT COMES TO LAYOUT AND ASSESSING RISK.

"The only way that we can help you is to go individually to that school with that individual staff and work with them directly to analyze the conditions of that environment."



AND, AS SCHOOL SHOOTINGS BECOME MORE FREQUENT, OTHER AREAS AROUND THE STATE CONSIDER ARMING TEACHERS. IT WAS A POINT HIGHLIGHTED DURING MONDAY'S DISCUSSION.

MIKE "I think there's a lot of downside to it. It sounds good on the surface."

"If you choose to go down that route it's gonna take a high level of training, high level of practice or you're in worse circumstances than if the officers arrive."

BUT, CHIEF MCPHEETERS SAYS SCHOOL SAFETY SHOULD NOT BE NARROWLY FOCUSED.

"We're trying to get people out of the mindset of only thinking about active shooters there's many other things to worry about also."

HE HOPES TO HAVE TWO ADDITIONAL SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS CIRCULATING THE DISTRICT BY NEXT FALL.

"The reality is you know our best option is for us to be present and if we're not present, have our presence be so random that they can't plan for it. So we need to increase the opportunities for people to either believe that the police will be there or that the police are there."

CASPER POLICE ARRESTED A WOMAN TUESDAY, AFTER SHE TESTED POSITIVE FOR METHAMPHETAMINE DURING A PROBATION MEETING. REPORTS SHOW 28-YEAR-OLD AMBER CARPIN PROVIDED PROBATION AND PAROLE A POSITIVE URINE SAMPLE FOR METH, LEADING TO A SEARCH OF HER HOME. DURING THE SEARCH, OFFICERS FOUND A CROWN ROYAL BAG CONTAINING MARIJUANA, A JEWELRY BAG WITH METHAMPHETAMINE, AND A UNICORN PIGGY BANK WITH TWO GLASS PIPES.

CARPIN WAS ARRESTED AND CHARGED WITH TWO COUNTS OF POSSESSION OF CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES. THIS ARREST COMES JUST THREE WEEKS AFTER CARPIN'S SENTENCING HEARING, WHERE SHE WAS SENTENCED TO SERVE THREE YEARS OF PROBATION FOR HER CONVICTION FOR CHILD ENDANGERING WITH METH.

THE GROWING PROBLEM OF METH AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE REMAINS A KEY FOCUS FOR MANY, TO SLOW ITS PROGRESS. THE 15-TH ANNUAL "METH AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE" CONFERENCE IN CASPER, HELPED HIGHLIGHT THE ISSUE. SEVERAL KEYNOTE SPEAKERS INCLUDE POLICE OFFICERS WHO DEAL WITH DRUG ARRESTS OFTEN, AND THERAPISTS WHO TREAT DRUG ADDICTS.

CASPER POLICE SAY METH IS A PREVALENT DRUG CIRCULATING MORE OFTEN IN OUR AREA. THE PAST THREE TO FOUR YEARS THEY HAVE SEEN AN INCREASE IN DRUG ARRESTS. POLICE ALSO SAY METH'S CHANGING POTENCY IS ALSO A GROWING CONCERN FOR THEM.

METH ABUSE IS A CONTINUING PROBLEM IN OUR AREA.

"Methamphetamine is a very addictive drug."

"Meth is still the king in terms of the drugs."

THIS AND MANY OTHER TOPICS WERE BROUGHT UP DURING THE 15-TH ANNUAL "METH AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE" CONFERENCE. MANY KEYNOTE SPEAKERS WERE EITHER COPS WHO MADE DRUG ARRESTS, OR THERAPISTS HELPING ADDICTS OVERCOME ADDICTION. IN CASPER, METH ARRESTS WERE DOWN AT ONE POINT.



Det. John Hatcher "We saw a decline in meth over the last I'd say seven or eight years."

BUT THINGS HAVE CHANGED, AND ARRESTS HAVE INCREASED LATELY. IT'S DUE TO DRUG MARKETING CHANGES BY DEALERS.

"These drug dealers will supply the need and so they have changed their formulas, so we have now in the last three or four years methamphetamine coming back into our area."

AND CONFRONTING DRUG DEALERS IS ALSO THE MOST DANGEROUS PART. CORPORAL KEVIN HOLTRY WAS INJURED TRYING TO ARREST A GANG MEMBER, AND DRUG DEALER.

Cpl. Kevin Holtry "We had to apprehend him and we knew he was armed and ultimately I was ambushed, I got shot five times, paralyzed, and lost my leg."

MEANWHILE, OTHER COPS SAY THE DRUG EPIDEMIC IS AN ONGOING BATTLE IN OUR AREA, REQUIRING OUR CONSTANT ATTENTION.

"We need to work on this as a community to make sure we protect our citizens here in Casper."

SUBSTANCE ABUSE IN WOMEN CONTINUES AN UPWARD TREND. THE SECOND, AND FINAL DAY OF THE "METH AND SUBSTANCE" ABUSE CONFERENCE, HIGHLIGHTED THAT TOPIC. NEWS 13'S TYLER WAGGENSPACK RETURNED TO THE CONFERENCE TO LEARN SOME MORE ABOUT THIS PROBLEM. TYLER,WHAT CAN YOU TELL US?

SAM/MARELLA, A LEADING FACTOR FOR SUBSTANCE ABUSE COMES AFTER EXPERIENCING TRAUMA FROM AN ABUSIVE BACKGROUND. ACCORDING TO ADDICTION DOT COM, WOMEN WHO WERE ABUSED ARE *NINE TIMES* MORE LIKELY TO ABUSE DRUGS, THAN WOMEN WHO DON'T. A MAIN REASON IS BECAUSE THEY MAY HAVE EXPERIENCED SEXUAL OR PHYSICAL ABUSE WHEN THEY WERE CHILDREN. THE HAUNTING MEMORIES OF TRAUMA OFTEN MAKES IT DIFFICULT FOR VICTIMS TO OPEN UP.

ABUSE AGAINST WOMEN OCCURS OFTEN THAN WE'D LIKE TO ACCEPT. THE TRAUMATIC EXPERIENCE FOR THOSE AFFECTED MAY LEAD TO SUBSTANCE ABUSE TO COPE WITH THE ISSUE. ACCORDING TO ADDICTION DOT COM, ONE FOURTH OF WOMEN ARE EITHER SEXUALLY OR PHYSICALLY ABUSED IN



THEIR LIFE, AND ABUSED WOMEN ARE *NINE TIMES* MORE LIKELY TO ABUSE DRUGS, THAN WOMEN WHO AREN'T.

DURING THE SECOND DAY OF THE "METH AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE" CONFERENCE, THE SUBJECT OF WOMEN AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE WAS DISCUSSED. JAMES HENDERSON SPOKE ABOUT IT. HE'S PART OF A PROGRAM CALLED "BATTERED WOMEN'S JUSTICE PROJECT". HELPING WOMEN IN PRISON, ON PROBATION OR PAROLE, SEEK HELP FOR THEIR SUBSTANCE ABUSE.

James Henderson "Anywhere from 55% to 95% of the women who were in our substance abuse agencies or drug courts have a history of domestic and sexual violence."

HENDERSON ADDS THE DIRECT PROBLEM ISN'T FULLY DEALT WITH.

"Yet often times, that's not being addressed. We're only going and addressing their substance abuse, not the cause of elevating the substance abuse, but they may be using substance abuse to numb the pain."

AND OFTEN, IT'S HARD FOR THEM TO FREELY TALK ABOUT THE ISSUE.

"People are guarded and don't want to discuss it."

"People who are experiencing domestic violence or sexual abuse often have so much shame, they feel they're at fault or they're the only ones who experience this."

MANY SUPPORT SYSTEM ADVOCATES ALSO HEAR THE SAME THING WHEN TALKING TO CLIENTS.

Frederick Bergh "They tell you a little bit of that information to see how you react to it and then they share a little bit more. Sometimes this over one session or over a length."

EXPERTS ALSO SAY IT'S SOMETHING THAT REQUIRES A "TEAM EFFORT".

"How do we work with one another, how do we make appropriate referrals and really engage that client from a more holistic approach."

AND GIVE HOPE TO MANY WOMEN EXPERIENCING TRAUMA. TYLER WAGGENSPACK, NEWS 13. CASPER.

ACCORDING TO ADDICTION DOT COM, IN EIGHT TO THIRTEEN PERCENT OF RELATIONSHIPS OR MARRIAGES, WOMEN ARE PHYSICALLY ASSAULTED. ASSAULTS CAN ALSO REOCCUR IN TWO-THIRDS OF THOSE RELATIONSHIPS.

MARELLA, IT STARTED WHEN A CAR WAS PULLED OVER FOR A TRAFFIC VIOLATION. THIS IS THE CAR CASPER POLICE STOPPED. AFTER INVESTIGATING POLICE SAY THEY SAW METH-AMPHETAMINE IN THE VEHICLE-- AND THEN WAS LOOKED TO BE A PORTABLE METH LAB.

THE INVESTIGATION WAS THEN TURNED OVER TO D-C-I AND FIRE CREWS ALSO HELPED DO TESTING. FIRE CREWS SAY THEY WERE ABLE TO CONFIRM THEY FOUND PRODUCTS LAW ENFORCEMENT WAS CONCERNED WITH. THEN-- THEY SAMPLED THEM SO THEY COULD PROVIDE INFORMATION BACK TO POLICE.

"We pay Wyoming sales tax, income tax, as well as labor and insurance. Now you want us to pay to park in public parking as well?"

MANY OPPOSE, AND OTHERS ARE FOR THE ORDINANCE CITY COUNCIL DRAFTED. PARTIES ON BOTH SIDES, INCLUDING COUNCIL, SEARCH FOR THE FAIREST OPTION. BUT AS THE DEBATE GROWS, THE TIME TO MAKE AN OFFICIAL DECISION SHRINKS.

"They had the opportunity to present some solutions for the last maybe three months and yet now is when they come with solutions? To me it's too late."



FOOD TRUCK PARKING PERMITS WILL CONTINUE AS CITY COUNCIL WAS UNABLE TO REACH A DECISION DURING TUESDAY NIGHT'S MEETING. A MOVE COUNCIL MEMBERS, AND CONCERNED BUSINESSES OWNERS THINK IS BEST.

Rob "Table it until we can see everything out on paper and actually see it as a group and then we can vote on it."

CAPUTA OPERATES A FOOD TRUCK, BUT ALSO HAS A BRICK AND MORTAR RESTAURANT IN THE SUNRISE SHOPPING CENTER. HE SAYS THERE'S CONFUSION DISTINGUISHING THE TWO, BUT SAYS THEY'RE ALMOST IDENTICAL.

"It's exactly the same, except we can get up and move where brick and mortar can't. However food trucks bring a lot of business to the general area, and they provide a great service for the community."

Councilman Jesse Morgan - Casper, Ward 1 "Well it hurts me right in the stomach their flat-bread is incredible and if you have their burritos you'll never forget them so it's unfortunate that they are moving and it's even harder to hear that we are a contributing factor."

HOWEVER, THE FOOD TRUCK ISSUE IN CASPER WAS *NOT* THE MAIN REASON. IT WAS THE GYM BEING MORE OF AN OPPORTUNITY.

"We will be taking the food truck with us. So main job will be the gym and I'll work part time food truck. Britnee's main job will be running the food truck and she'll work part time in the gym."

Britnee Miller "Big thank you to our family and our close friends for all of the support they gave us when we moved here to open a new business from the ground up without them I don't think we could have pulled off what we did so we just really wanted to make sure they knew how much we appreciated how much they've done for us. (Kellen) - All the way from stepping into the trailer during festivals when we had to run and go to the bathroom to doing dishes to bringing us things when we forgot them"

A NEW SOLUTION TO FOOD TRUCKS IN DOWNTOWN CASPER EMERGES.

Vice Mayor Charlie Powell "I think we finally arrived at a solution that is not what everyone wants, but it's something that will work for everyone."

TWO AMENDMENTS PASSED CITY COUNCIL WITH POTENTIAL FOR EACH ONE. COUNCILMAN JESSE MORGAN CAME UP WITH ONE SOLUTION: FOOD TRUCK VENDORS COULD PARK ANYWHERE DOWNTOWN, BUT NOT UNTIL THREE P-M IN THE AFTERNOON.

CERTAIN SPOTS WOULD BE BLOCKED OFF, WITH SIGNS ALERTING DRIVERS. TRUCKS COULD ONLY STAY DOWNTOWN UPWARDS OF 12 HOURS, UNTIL THREE A-M, SEVEN DAYS A WEEK.



ANOTHER REQUIREMENT WOULD REQUIRE VENDORS BE SPONSORED BY A DOWNTOWN MERCHANT AND STAY WITHIN 100 FEET OF A BUSINESS. A PREVIOUS COMPLAINT WAS TAKING UP PARKING SPACES.

"I think we've loosened those regulations considerably."

MEANWHILE, POWELL'S AMENDMENT FOCUSES MOSTLY ON HAVING A DESIGNATED SPOT FOR FOOD TRUCKS.

"We allow the city manager to designate an area for the food trucks."

Tyler Waggenpack "Among council members' discussions, Vice Mayor Charlie Powell came up with one idea for a spot where food truck vendors can operate. That site is the old plains furniture building where I'm standing."

"That may reduce some of this pressure because it won't be adjacent to the restaurants, and it won't be taking up parking spaces."

ROB CAPUTA OWNS A FOOD TRUCK AND LIKES BOTH MORGAN AND POWELL'S IDEAS.

"It's going to make it a lot easier."

THE AMENDMENTS GO UP FOR A PUBLIC HEARING SOON BEFORE COUNCIL MEMBERS DECIDE MAKING THESE AMENDMENTS LAW. TYLER WAGGENSPACK, NEWS 13. CASPER.

COUNCILMAN BOB HOPKINS WAS THE ONLY OTHER COUNCIL MEMBER PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT, WHICH FAILED DURING TUESDAY'S COUNCIL MEETING. HIS IDEA WOULD'VE LET VENDORS OPERATE ON PUBLIC PROPERTY AS LONG AS THEY HAVE A HEALTH DEPARTMENT PERMIT. IT ALSO ALLOWED BUSINESS CREWS TO TURN DOWN ANY VENDORS WANTING TO PARK NEAR THEIR RESTAURANT. SAM/MARELLA, HOPKINS WAS FOLLOWING THE SAME METHOD USED IN CHEYENNE.

Charlie Powell "Hopefully we achieved a compromise that will be reasonable for everyone even though there are still people unhappy with it."

COUNCIL MEMBERS RECENTLY PASSED TWO NEW ORDINANCES REGARDING FOOD TRUCK OPERATIONS. ONE LAW CENTERS AROUND DOWNTOWN, WHERE THE TRUCKS HAVE BEEN A "HOT TOPIC" BETWEEN MANY BUSINESS MERCHANTS. THE LAW LETS TEN VENDORS OPERATE PER MONTH...BY PURCHASING A PERMIT.

IT ALSO BLOCKS OFF DESIGNATED SPOTS FOR TRUCKS BETWEEN THREE P-M TO THREE A-M. THE SECOND LAW ALLOWS THE CITY MANAGER TO DESIGNATE A SPOT WHERE TRUCKS CAN STAGE.

"I don't feel that it's right."

AIMEE VIRACHACK RUNS THE "MA DER MA KIN" FOOD TRAILER. SHE SAYS THE NEW RULES DON'T SIT WELL WITH HER.

Aimee Virachack "Being micromanaged by an outside source hinders our ability to spread out."

"I don't think they're too much of a problem."

MARY REECE ALSO OWNS A FOOD TRUCK. SHE'S OKAY WITH THE "FIXES" BUT WILL STAY AWAY FROM DOWNTOWN AND OPERATE ACROSS CASPER INSTEAD.

Mary Reece "It feels like they're not wanting the food trucks downtown which I think is a missed opportunity."

BUT OTHER OPERATORS FEEL OKAY ABOUT THE CHANGES.

James Andrews "I they (city council) just came up with a good mutual ground. They worked hard on it and they worked long on it."

CITY LEADERS HAVEN'T HEARD ANY FEEDBACK YET FROM VENDORS. BUT, THEY HOPE THE ORDINANCES WILL PRESENT AN "EXPERIMENT" IN CASES CHANGES ARE NEEDED LATER.

THE NATRONA COUNTY CORONER IDENTIFIED THE MAN KILLED DURING SUNDAY AFTERNOON'S POLICE INVOLVED SHOOT OUT. 38-YEAR-OLD DAVID P. WOLOSIN OF CASPER DIED AFTER A SHOOTOUT WITH CASPER POLICE SUNDAY.

AN OFFICER WAS ALSO CRITICALLY WOUNDED DURING THE SHOOTING AND WENT TO THE HOSPITAL WITH LIFE THREATENING INJURIES. WOLOSIN WAS WITH KIDS AT THE TIME OF THE SHOOTING IN THE EMPTY LOT BUT THEY WERE NOT HARMED. HOWEVER, SOME WORRY THIS COULD HAVE A TRAUMATIZING EFFECT ON THE KIDS.

A POLICE OFFICER CRITICALLY WOUNDED AFTER GUNFIRE BREAKS THROUGH THE SUNDAY AFTERNOON AIR. TODAY, CASPER MAYOR RAY PACHECO RELEASED A STATEMENT SAYING:

"I would suggest prayer for our city. I am asking those of faith to join with me to pray for healing for our injured officer and healing for our community. Yesterday's events have shaken all of us. ."

38-YEAR-OLD DAVID P. WOLOSIN WAS KILLED WHEN WITNESSES SAY HE PULLED OUT A GUN AND BEGAN SHOOTING. BUT WOLOSIN MAY NOT HAVE BEEN ALONE.

Connor Comeau "This vacant lot behind me is normally empty on Sunday afternoons, but for two kids yesterday, it became the scene of a scary situation.

CHIEF MCPHEETERS SAYS CARLSON REMAINS IN CRITICAL CONDITION, AND HAS MANY MORE SURGERIES AHEAD OF HIM. THE CHIEF DID NOT GO INTO DETAIL BUT DID SAY OFFICER CARLSON WAS INJURED IN HIS BACK, CHEST, AND WAIST. MCPHEETERS ASKED FOR CONTINUED SUPPORT TO SHOW OFFICER CARLSON THE PRIDE FELLOW OFFICERS TAKE IN HIS SERVICE AND SACRIFICE.

THE VIDEO, RELEASED WEDNESDAY, SHOWS GARRETT APPROACHING WOLOSIN AFTER GETTING CALLS ABOUT A CAR COMPLAINT. CARLSON LATER ARRIVED TO BACK UP GARRETT. THAT'S WHEN WOLOSIN BECOMES DEFENSIVE AND AGGRESSIVE, PULLING OUT A GUN AND SHOOTING AT CARLSON. CARLSON AND GARRETT CAN BE SEEN TAKING COVER BEHIND THE CAR TIRES.

GARRETT IS ALSO SEEN TRYING TO COMFORT THE CHILDREN BY TOUCHING THEIR HANDS AND TALKING TO THEM. CHIEF KEITH MCPHEETERS SAYS GARRETT IS HOLDING UP WELL AFTER THE TRAUMATIC EXPERIENCE.

"How much it costs when somebody is out that doesn't get their full paycheck and also when you have to take off time so there's money just not coming in and it just touches me to see how many people are actually out there helping."

THE OFFICERS SHOT BACK KILLING WOLOSIN.

THE CASPER POLICE DEPARTMENT FACEBOOK PAGE SAYS CARLSON WAS RELEASED MUCH EARLIER THAN EXPECTED. THEY THANK OUR COMMUNITY, WYOMING MEDICAL CENTER STAFF AND DOCTORS, ALONG WITH OTHER AGENCIES THAT SUPPORTED OFFICER CARLSON, HIS FAMILY AND FELLOW CASPER POLICE OFFICERS.
