Baby Your Baby and Check Your Health – Both are ongoing campaigns hosted by Mary Nickles/KUTV Anchor and designed so that KUTV works with the Utah Department of Health. Baby Your Baby is a health program for mothers to be encouraging early and regular prenatal and postnatal care. Check Your Health is committed to bringing viewers the latest information to help keep families healthy. Both of these segments run in all of our newscasts.

Get Gephardt - Investigative reporter Matt Gephardt takes on major corporations or government entities helping viewers who are caught in red tape. In addition, the Gephardt Unit investigations serve as a warning to consumers about potential fraud happening locally. The Gephardt unit takes many calls from the tip line each week and receives several e-mails weekly from viewers with consumer complaints. The Gephardt stories air during the 10:00pm newscast.

Pay It Forward - Every Wednesday, KUTV's Mark Koebel/10P Anchor features a Good Samaritan in the community. Mark gives the Good Samaritan \$500 in cash via Mountain America Credit for this person to give to their cause. This franchise highlights people and organizations working in the community on a grassroots level to make life better for others. Every Wednesday during the 10pm News there will be a billboard open to the weekly story. KUTV will also run the Pay It Forward story the following Thursday Morning in KUTV2 News This Morning and in the 2News @7PM on KMYU.

CONSUMER AFFAIRS

Tesla Supreme Court (aired 4/3/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - The Utah court ruled in favor of the Utah State Tax Commission which deemed that Utah law prohibits Tesla from selling its electric cars directly to consumers from a Utah-based dealership. Despite having a car dealership in the state, Tesla has been forbidden from selling cars at the location. Utah state law says Tesla is not allowed to sell directly to customers. Car makers must offer their vehicles for sale through franchises. Tesla Inc. tried to get around the law by forming a company called "Tesla UT," but the company was still not given a license to operate a car dealership by the Utah State Tax Commission. Tesla argued the law is unconstitutional and also that not allowing Tesla to open its own franchise was against Utah statute. Monday afternoon, and a 5 to 0 decision, the court sided with the Tax Commission.

Academy of Country Music Awards (aired 04/03/2017 @7pm, 2 minutes) – Thomas Rhett, Miranda Lambert and Jason Aldean won awards at the Academy of Country Music Awards show. Thomas Rhett won male vocalist of the year along with song of the year, while Miranda Lambert won female vocalist of the year and album of the year. Jason Aldean won Entertainer of the Year, keeping his title for the second year in a row. Although Keith Urban was nominated for seven awards, he didn't get a single one. This story informs country music fans of the popularity of some artists and lets them know which concerts may give them the most entertainment for their money.

IRS to Hire Debt Collectors (aired 4/4/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) – IRS phone scams have been plaguing the nation the past couple years. Now a call from the IRS may actually be real. The IRS is hiring collection agencies to collect on its behalf this year. The IRS seems to acknowledge the move could open the door to enhanced fraud in the IRS' name, writing in a statement, "the IRS wrote it will do everything it can do to help avoid confusion." The IRS says debt collectors won't demand payment over the phone and checks will always be made out to the IRS, not collection agencies.

Reshaping Downtown (aired 04/10/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Anyone visiting downtown Salt Lake City is going to notice a few new additions to the skyline. A cluster of construction cranes marks the spots above some major developments taking shape. The viewer gets a glance at some of the projects taking shape, and what to expect in the city in the coming months.

Married People and Taxes (aired 04/17/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – A lot of Utahns are still trying to figure out how much they owe on their taxes. There's a surprising new tax study by Pew Research saying married people pay three times as much as those that are single. 2News Rod Decker explains the study to the viewer and interviews people on the street about the study, and if they are surprised by the results.

Busy Weekend in Downtown (aired 04/21/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Tens of thousands of people are expected to hit the streets of Salt Lake this weekend because of several major events that are taking place along with the big Jazz game at the Vivint Smart Home Arena. The Jazz game is just one of about five big events taking

place in Salt Lake. Some of the others include the Salt Lake City Marathon, FitCon, Supercross event, and a Kenny Rogers concert. For local businesses they are already starting to see the crowds show up. Salt Lake City leaders say the city is ready for the crowds.

SLC Housing Market (aired 04/27/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Utah Real Estate experts are calling it the best-selling market ever, and it's putting a strain on agents and anyone looking to buy a home. The viewer hears from people trying to buy a home, as well as a real estate agent who's helping people list their homes in a seller's market.

Questar Name Change (aired 06/05/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) - Dominion Questar has been renamed Dominion Energy after a vote by corporate shareholders. Questar merged with Dominion Resources, Inc., in September 2016. Dominion Energy's Utah-based natural gas utility will now begin making changes to company bills, building signage, trucks, employee uniforms and other identifying marks in the coming months. The change also saves consumers money, as the previous owner Questar had planned to up rates. Dominion Energy says they will not raise rates for at least 3 years.

Dave & Busters (aired 6/16/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - A new Dave & Buster's will be built in The Gateway in downtown Salt Lake City. The entertaining and dining chain is expected to be open by March 2018, and serves as another effort by the shopping center to "re-establish itself." Dave & Buster's has locations in 34 states and offers patrons the chance to eat, drink, and play under one roof. Games include arcade favorites, billiards, bowling and more. Restaurants also have numerous televisions in each location with different sports playing on each one.

SelectHealth Pre-Authorization (aired 6/19/2017 @7pm for 2 minute, 30 seconds) – A woman called her health insurance company and get pre-authorized for a knee surgery. After the surgery the insurance company refused to pay despite the pre-authorization. We tried to talk to the insurance company about this, who refused to answer any of our questions.

Pokemon Go Revival (aired 06/20/2017 @7pm, 30 seconds) – One of last year's most popular apps is making some changes. Pokemon Go is making a comeback with a new gym system. The popular game has disabled gyms, while designers install a new interface. The new gyms will feature a new style of raid battles, where players will team-up to defeat super powerful Pokemon. The new gyms will also feature more streamlined defense and a motivation system, to help them from becoming stagnant. Pokemon Go also announced their first real world event in Chicago. 20,000 players are expected to attend and tickets to the event sold out in 30 minutes. This story effects anyone in Utah who plays last year's third most downloaded app.

Biking and Texting App (aired 06/22/2017 @7pm, 30 seconds) – A new app is trying to prevent people from using their cell-phones while riding a bike. We have all heard of apps that prevent texting while driving, but a Dutch firm is testing an app to stop people from texting while biking! The "safe-lock" app will block cyclists from making calls or

streaming content, while their bikes are unlocked. It will be tested this summer in the Netherlands and may be available in the U.S. in the future. This story could impact anyone in Utah, who rides a bicycle and shows how tech companies are being creative to keep people safe.

CRIME AND PUBLIC SAFETY

Search for Fisherman (aired 04/03/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Search crews are on the water at Yuba State park looking for a missing 64-year-old man. The man was with a fishing partner when their boat capsized. 2News had a crew on the scene giving viewers a live look of the scene and the search, as well as the condition of the man found on the shore.

Search for Suspects (aired 04/03/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Southern Utah Police are searching for a man accused of hanging around high schools and leering at girls. The man is connected to three separate incidents in the St. George area. The viewer learns the latest details on the suspect and who they're looking for, as well as what parents to kids at the school as to say.

Mt. View Stabbing (aired 04/03/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – A 16-year-old boy pleaded guilty today to stabbing several classmates inside a Bountiful school locker room. The teen will serve time in the juvenile justice system. The viewer learns what was said in court, and who testified in the hearing that decided the teens sentence.

Boat capsized on Yuba Lake (aired 4/3/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) – Juab County Sheriff's Office found the body of a missing man on Yuba Lake. Two fishermen were out on the lake Sunday when their boat capsized. One man was found alive on shore and taken to the hospital. The body of the second fisherman was found Monday evening. According to police, drowning is suspected.

Homeless Plan Criticized (aired 4/4/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - The American Civil Liberties Union of Utah is speaking out against Salt Lake County Sheriff Jeff Winder's recent proposal to create a homeless campground near Rio Grande where drugs, alcohol and weapons will be prohibited. The ACLU of Utah argued that the 21-point proposal is "constitutionally suspect and could attract expensive litigation." The ACLU of Utah points out that Winder's plan opens the county to a number of lawsuits under the First, Fourth, Eighth and Fourteenth Amendments.

School Stabbing Sentencing (aired 4/5/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) – A Mountain View High School student admitted in court to stabbing five students back in November. The teen admitted to five counts of attempted aggravated murder. A competency evaluation found the teen competent to proceed in the case. Judge Nielsen said the maximum sentencing guidelines would put keep the juvenile incarcerated until he is 21-years-old.

Hiking Safety (aired 04/06/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Two hikers are recovering after a serious fall at a popular Utah hiking trail. Search and rescue says the good

weather can be deceiving on the trails. The viewer learns how the warmer weather, doesn't always mean safe hiking conditions. They also learn when the safe time of year is to hit the trails, as well as safety tips for when they do decide to hike.

Sex Assault Suspect (aired 04/07/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Tonight, a woman is recovering from an attack on the Salt Lake Community College Campus. Police say a man was hiding in the woman's locker room before the assault. The viewer learns the details of the crime, the search for the suspect, and video of the arrest.

LDS Bishop Killed (aired 4/10/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - The Southern Utah town of Veyo is hurting after one of their own was killed in a car crash. Darrin Ivie, 53, who was an LDS ward leader and father of seven kids, was driving on State Route 18 towards St. George. His pickup truck swerved over the center line causing a semi, in the oncoming lane, to crash into his vehicle. Sgt. Larry Mower with the Utah Highway Patrol said the semi-truck driver was caught completely off guard. Both vehicles were completely destroyed.

Aggravated Burglary (aired 04/11/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Police are searching for a man after a wild assault in Draper. The man was hurt bad, but will survive. Police say he had to be taken to the hospital and cops are still looking for the assailant. The viewer learns details about the terrifying break-in and a description of the suspect they are looking for.

Woman Beaten to Death (aired 4/12/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - The man arrested for the murder of a Mount Pleasant woman appeared in court for arraignment. Anthony Christensen, 35, is facing charges of murder, obstruction of justice, and abuse or desecration of a human body for the March 31 death of his fiancé, 34-year-old Kammy Edmunds. Investigators believe Christensen beat Edmunds to death and tried to make it look like she was injured in a car crash, and died at home. They found her body, bloody and bruised, inside the bathroom of their Mount Pleasant home off 300 North State Street. Authorities recovered Edmund's wrecked car from a dry riverbed. They say the damage was not consistent with a fatal crash.

Homeless Syringes (aired 4/12/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - A small contingent of volunteers scoured a field off 600 West in Salt Lake City looking for used drug syringes. Patrick Rezac works with newly formed group called Syringe Watch. They pick up what drug users leave behind. The spot near the railroad track on 600 West is popular with drug users because of low lighting and a trail that is set back from the road. Their trail includes garbage, discarded clothes, and dozens of used syringes. Syringe Watch has been out for a few weeks picking up needles from spots popular with drug users. They've also formed a hotline where people can call and report discarded needles.

Abused Cat (aired 4/13/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Another cat has been abused in Davis County within 20 days and about a block from where Sage the Cat was found back in March. The Humane Society of Utah is issuing a \$3,000 cash reward to

bring a stop to the ongoing animal cruelty. The injured 1-year-old cat is in the care of a veterinarian and is expected to survive, according to animal control. The Humane Society does not know if the same person who tortured Sage the cat also abused this cat.

Abdi Mohamed Ruling (aired 4/14/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - A judge ruled that a teen shot by Salt Lake City Police outside a homeless shelter in 2016 will be tried for aggravated robbery and drug charges in juvenile court. Abdullahi "Abdi" Mohamed is accused of using a broom handle to assault a man after an attempted drug deal on Rio Grande Street in February 2016. Police confronted Mohamed during the alleged assault and ordered him to drop the broom handle before shooting him several times. He appeared in juvenile court in January for a preliminary hearing where prosecutors called witnesses and laid out evidence against him.

Pajama Robbery (aired 04/17/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – A woman believed to be the so-called “Pajama Bandit” is behind bars tonight. Police say Nannette Perkins faces serious charges for robbing at least six banks. The viewer learns how police tracked her down, and hears from her family who can’t believe she would be accused of such a crime.

DJ Harrison Plea (aired 4/17/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Dereck James "DJ" Harrison pleaded guilty to kidnapping and killing a UTA employee. Harrison was in Kemmerer, Wyoming, in connection with the death of 63-year-old Utah man Kay Ricks. The plea agreement states that he admits to two of the four crimes he would have faced. In exchange, it is agreed the sentence will be life without parole for the murder charge and 20 to 22 years for kidnapping, one sentence running after the other. The murder charge carried a possible death sentence.

Hiker Search (aired 04/18/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Crews continue their search for a Utah woman and her step-grandson that went missing while hiking in Grand Canyon National Park. The two were last seen being swept away in a creek on Saturday. The viewer learns the latest in the search efforts at the park from park rangers.

Syracuse Teen (aired 04/18/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Tonight, a community is mourning the loss of a 15-year-old Dakota Kilburn. The Syracuse Jr. High School student was hit last night and died today in the hospital. The viewer hears from classmates of the student, who are mourning the loss of their friend.

Jazz Player Allegations (aired 04/20/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – A Utah Jazz Player is facing domestic violence allegations. Back up center Jeff Withey is reportedly accused of abuse by his ex-fiancée, Kennedy Summers, a playboy playmate. The team says it’s “collecting information.” Summers and Withey broke up last year. In the middle of the Jazz vs Clippers playoffs, TMZ.com indicated she filed a police report. The viewer learns the allegations against a player in the middle of a big playoff series for the Jazz.

Teen Speaks (aired 4/20/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - A Cache County teen who was shot in the head and left in a Smithfield ditch is home after a two-month stay at Primary Children's Hospital. Deserae Turner, 14, told the media she is very thankful to be alive and is looking forward to go home to her horses. Turner was at the hospital since she was found with a gunshot wound to the head in the early morning hours of February 18. The Turner family said they have felt the overwhelming support from their community.

Child Hit by Car (aired 4/20/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) – A young boy was taken to the hospital in critical condition after hit by a car right in front of his school. The first grade boy was with his friend when he said he ran across the street and was struck in front of Fremont Elementary. The child was later upgraded to fair condition with broken bones.

Daggett County Sheriff Resigns (aired 04/24/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – The Daggett County Sheriff suddenly resigned today, as his department faces serious allegations of criminal misconduct. The sheriff was the one who asked the State to consider the misconduct allegations at the jail. Today, he said he was stepping down to help with the investigation. The jail allegations have been a big talker in the media, and the sheriff resigning had a lot of people wondering what that had to do with the allegations. The viewer learned what was being said concerning the rumors.

Cold Case Guilty Plea (aired 04/24/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – A guilty plea, in a 40-year-old cold case murder. A DNA test helped investigators track down Patrick Michael McCabe, and today he answered for the crime. 2News was in the court room for the guilty plea and brought the viewer reaction from the family after it was all over.

County Sheriff Resigns (aired 4/24/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Daggett County Sheriff's officials say former Sheriff Jerry R. Jorgensen left his job in an attempt to speed up the process of returning inmates from the Utah Department of Corrections to the county jail. Nearly 80 inmates were pulled from the Daggett Jail after allegations surfaced of mistreatment of the inmates. The sheriff's office, with approval from the county attorney, said Sheriff Jorgensen was the one who made a request to the Utah DOC to investigate in January after he was alerted to the allegations of mistreatment. The department will be temporarily led by Chief Deputy Chris Collett, until the county commission appoints an acting sheriff at their meeting on Tuesday.

Springdale Vandalism (aired 4/25/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Springdale Police are looking for a vandal after tens of thousands of dollars in damage was recently done to public parks and city buildings. Springdale police said a number of trees around the city were cut in half, a park sprinkler system was cut, and the pickleball courts were damaged. Now investigators are asking for the public's help finding the suspect responsible for this. A \$1,000 reward has been posted by police for anyone who has information leading to the arrest of the vandal or vandals.

Moab Crash Charges (aired 04/26/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – A teenager involved in a deadly car crash in Moab is now behind bars with some shocking charges, including homicide and sexual assault. 2News was in Moab and spoke to people who lived in the same neighborhood as the teen that was charged and the teens that were hurt and charged in the crash.

Masseuse Rape (aired 4/26/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Salt Lake City Police are looking for 22-year-old Nevin Sheehan, who has a warrant for his arrest for felony object rape. According to a probable cause statement, a woman said Sheehan touched her inappropriately in and around her gentiles during a 90-minute massage at Healing Mountain Massage School last year. The school immediately removed Sheehan from contact with clients after the report. A judge signed the warrant for Sheehan's arrest Wednesday morning. Police looked for him throughout the day and made contact over the phone Wednesday afternoon. Sheehan promised detectives he would turn himself into authorities within 24 hours.

Sexual assault (aired 4/27/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Police are investigating after a woman went to a hospital to report she had been sexually assaulted by an armed man at a Sandy park. Police said Monday evening or early Tuesday morning a woman was in her vehicle when a man entered with a bladed object. She said he forced her to drive to a Sandy park and then sexually assaulted her. The man reportedly fled on foot when a vehicle pulled into the park where the sexual assault was happening. The woman drove herself to a hospital where an officer notified dispatch of the woman's claims.

Bountiful Sex Abuse (aired 04/28/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – A serial groper suspect is behind bars tonight. Three women say they were attacked by the man in Bountiful, but police say there could be more victims out there. The viewer learns the details of the brazen attacks, and about how the suspect victimized women across the Wasatch Front.

Rape Arrest (aired 04/27/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – A man's accused of raping a girl after they set up a date on the Tinder app. The incident happened a while back, but an arrest was just made this week. The viewer learns why the crime was not reported months before, and what happened leading up to the attack.

Hit & Run Driver (aired 05/01/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Police are searching for the driver that hit and killed a bicyclist in West Valley City. The Victim's son was calling his dad to tell him that the Utah Jazz had just won, but instead a police officer answered the phone. The viewer learns the latest details including the car description, and where the accident happened, in case they can help police catch the driver.

Teacher Arrest (aired 5/1/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - A West Valley City teacher is in jail after investigators say he kept albums of child pornography in his classroom. Administration at American Preparatory Academy called police to report they discovered the photo albums in the classroom of Michael Hatfield. When investigators

looked at the album, they report finding 24 pages of pornography which included cutouts and collages of nude girls, including captions and comments with names, ages, and stickers. Hatfield is in jail on a felony sexual exploitation of a minor charge, according to police.

More Jail Beds (aired 5/1/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - County leaders have put the wheels in motion for the first step in combating crime in the Rio Grande neighborhood and it begins with money to open up more jail beds outside of Salt Lake County. Salt Lake County Mayor Ben McAdams announced the council will immediately make \$700,000 available for staffing and relocating inmates to other jails in nearby counties. During the 2017 Utah Legislative session, the state approved \$2.8 million toward more jail beds. The state appropriated half the cost of 300 jail beds. The county would pay the other half, but waiting until July to address the public safety issue wasn't soon enough, McAdams said.

Reservoir Rescue (aired 5/1/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Crews in northern Utah worked together to rescue two teen anglers who were stuck in a marsh at Hyrum Reservoir. State, county, and local agencies were able to get 15-year-old Josh Kessler and 16-year-old Dallin Huber out of the Cache County reservoir after the two Layton boys had been stuck for about an hour. They used Josh's cell phone to call 911 for help. They fell about ten feet down into the cold waters of the slippery marshland. As they were falling, the boys grabbed onto some sturdy roots for support while they waited for help.

Rio Grande Crime (aired 05/02/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Salt Lake County leaders say something needs to be done to fight crime in Downtown's Rio Grande area. So, they're going to rent jail beds outside the county to get dealers selling drugs to the homeless, off the streets. It's all part of a state initiative. The viewer hears about what county leaders are trying to do to make downtown Salt Lake City safer for the public.

Smithfield Accomplice Hearing (aired 5/2/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - One of the two teens charged with attempted aggravated murder of Deserae Turner appeared in court to determine whether he will be tried as an adult. In court, they argued the suspect willingly, and with forethought, participated in the criminal activity and later worked to cover it up. They argued he would be better served in the adult criminal system. They said, if found guilty, he would get access to rehabilitation resources for a longer period of time with greater supervision. The defense argued the State offered no proof of his client being involved in the shooting.

Snowbird Skier Death (aired 5/3/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) -The body of a Millcreek man was discovered after a Snowbird ski patrol member found him unresponsive on the mountain Wednesday morning. Snowbird officials say the 54-year-old man was injured near Chip's Run on the mountain, but added that it appears nobody witnessed the injury. Unified Police said Daryl Norton was found alone at 10:08 a.m. Norton was an experienced skier and familiar with the area he was skiing, according to police. Right now it is unknown if his death was caused by trauma or a medical issue.

Deportation Scare (aired 5/5/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - The first day of freedom for a West Valley City, Utah, mother of three who spent a week in a Cache County Jail after getting detained by ICE agents and scheduled to be deported to Mexico, was spent with family. Avelar Flores was released Thursday night and given a 90-day window, before ICE says she will be deported to Mexico. She said sitting in the jail cell is something she never wants to experience again. According to Sean Young, Avelar-Flores' attorney, the threat of deportation is far from over. Young said from his experience he's confident something will come through in 90 days.

UDOT Road Closures (aired 5/5/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Multiple exits on Interstate 80 near Foothill Drive will close for up to four months while crews handle construction projects, according to the Utah Department of Transportation. The eastbound and westbound exits at Foothill Drive will close May 8 and may stay closed until September. Construction crews will work to reconstruct several bridges at the interchange. Drivers will be rerouted to the Interstate 215 east belt, where they can then turn around at 3300 South and then take northbound I-215 to the Foothill Drive and Parleys Way exit. Along with this construction project, UDOT warns drivers to allow extra time for their commutes.

Smithfield Teens in Court (aired 05/08/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Two Smithfield teens, accused of shooting a teenager and leaving her for dead in a ditch, are being tried as adults. 2News was in the courtroom, and the viewer hears from the teens' parents and siblings, as the judge decided their fate in the attempted murder trials.

Taylorville Tire Gift (aired 05/08/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – A Vietnam Vet gets the surprise of his life when he shows up at a Taylorville car shop to buy tires. A good Samaritan handed him something that left him speechless. The viewer hears from the man who got the surprise gift.

Runaway UTA bus (aired 5/8/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Two women are being called heroes after stopping a runaway UTA bus during rush hour in Salt Lake City. On Friday, while in route on Foothill Drive, two women said the bus shut off, so the driver pulled over to check it out. Utah Transit Authority spokesperson, Remi Barron, said they believe the bus's engine overheated. As the two women watched the driver work on the engine, the battery was reset and they saw the door shut and the bus started rolling down foothill. One woman jumped in the driver's seat and was able to stop the bus. No one was seriously injured.

Smithfield Shooter Hearing (aired 5/8/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) – One of the teenage boys accused of pulling the trigger that injured Deserae Turner appeared in court. The 16-year-old boy, who prosecutors say admitted to pulling the trigger, is fighting to stay in juvenile court. The prosecution said the defendants admitted to shooting Deserae Turner and should be tried as an adult because he is a risk to the public. The judge could make a ruling in the second defendant's case as early as Tuesday evening, or she could wait several days, as she did with Decker's case.

Ogden Drowning (aired 05/10/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – An 8-year-old boy drowned during a tragic accident in the water at Big D Sports Park in Ogden. The boy was with his family when he disappeared and ended up in the river. He was later found, and was not able to be revived. The viewer hears an update from officials about what led up to the sad events on that day.

River Rescue Death (aired 5/10/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) – An 8-year-old boy that was pulled out of the Ogden River passed away. According to his family, Korbin Minchey had autism and was chasing his service dog when he fell into the river. Police said he was away from his family for as few as three minutes and then was gone. His service dog returned without him, alarming his family. He was located nearly two miles downstream from where he was last seen. Police said he was cold to the touch and wasn't breathing when he was found. Emergency responders performed CPR on the scene, but the boy died at Primary Children's Hospital Tuesday night.

Carjacking (aired 05/15/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – A plea for help from a Taylorsville mother who became the victim of a frightening carjacking. She hopes someone can find the man who stole her car, with herself and her baby inside. Two separate car jackings happened. One at a restaurant in Salt Lake City, and the other at a grocery store in Taylorsville. The viewer hears the details of the event from the woman herself.

Holt Murder (aired 05/15/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – A murder suspect is behind bars tonight, but detectives say they still don't have a motive for the shooting. After hours of questioning the suspect, they don't know why Jefferey Shephard shot and killed Matthew Holt, who was inside his car on Easter Sunday. The viewer learns the latest on the murder investigation that had police searching for the suspect for more than a month.

Salt Lake City Fire (aired 5/15/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Four families have been displaced and more than \$300,000 in damage was done in a four-alarm fire Monday afternoon on the west side of Salt Lake City. Firefighters battled the blaze in two homes for more than three hours. The cause of the fire was unclear Monday evening. Fire officials said the majority of the flames were contained in two hours and 25 minutes. Crews and investigators planned to remain at the scene until at least Tuesday morning to make sure it is out and investigate the cause.

Murder Arrest (aired 5/15/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Investigators arrested a man in connection with the Easter Sunday murder of Matthew Holt in South Salt Lake. Jeffery Ray Shephard, 36, faces charges of murder, aggravated robbery, and evidence tampering after allegedly robbing and shooting Holt, 46, in the parking lot of an industrial business near 3200 South 900 West. An off-duty South Salt Lake officer spotted a silver Chevy Sonic in Tooele Sunday night that matched the description of the vehicle from Holt's murder. The officer called for assistance from Tooele County authorities who pulled Shepard over and arrested him.

DJ Harrison (aired 05/17/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Today is the final chapter in the disturbing case of a UTA worker kidnapped and murdered last year. DJ Harrison will spend the rest of his life in prison for his role in killing Kay Ricks. The viewer learns what was said in court, including a letter written by the victim's family. They also learn where Harrison is headed to start to serve his time.

SLC Robbery (aired 05/17/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Police are searching for a violent purse snatcher. They say the suspects rammed a car, smashed a window, and pulled a knife on a mother, then took off with her bag. Now detectives want to get these dangerous men off the streets. The viewer learns when and where the crime happened, and a description of the men cops are looking for.

Skull Found in Backyard (aired 5/22/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Crime scene investigators are trying to determine the identity of what appear to be human remains found in the cellar of a Spanish Fork home Monday morning. The home near 80 North 800 East is the same place where a woman lived who went missing nearly three decades ago. Two friends noticed some sinking dirt in the cellar and decided to dig down to see if there was anything in the dirt. They discovered what appeared to be a human skull wrapped in a blanket, according to Spanish Fork Police. Police say Peggy Sue Case was reported missing from the home in 1988. An autopsy will confirm the identity of the bones.

Cottonwood Heights Serial Robber (aired 5/22/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Cottonwood Heights businesses are on edge after four armed robberies have taken place in three weeks. The first robbery happened at a local Subway, which he actually robbed twice, the first time on April 29th at 3:40 in the afternoon where police say he pulled a gun on employees. Investigators say he also hit The World Market and the most recent robbery happened on Sunday at 6:00pm at the GameStop store. Every business in the surrounding area has his picture put on display so that employees are aware of the armed serial robber.

Statue Stolen (aired 5/23/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Police are searching for the thieves who stole an 800-pound statue valued at more than \$125,000. The bronze statue depicts former LDS prophets Joseph Smith and Brigham Young. It was taken from a building in Salt Lake City around 4a.m. Surveillance video shows a white Ford Expedition loading the statue onto a trailer and then taking off. Detective Ungricht with the Salt Lake Police Department told 2News they were "surprised that all four were able to move this statue and make off with it."

Ogden Pileup (aired 5/23/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - A man suspected of causing a drunk driving pile up crash in Ogden Monday evening posted bail hours later. The crash happened during rush hour at the busy intersection of 20th Street and Wall Avenue around 5:30 p.m. Ogden City said Christopher Wood tried to flee the scene after he crashed into a car and caused a five car pileup. Cline was arrested on multiple charges related to DUI, fleeing the scene, failing to obey traffic devices, and assaulting officers.

Teen killed in Crash (aired 5/23/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Friends and family are mourning the death of an 18-year-old Spanish Fork teenager who was killed in a car crash just days before her high school graduation. Kathryn Shaw, 18, died in that crash at the intersection of 1600 North Main Street in Mapleton. Police said a 17-year-old boy did not stop at a stop sign, hitting the SUV Shaw and two other people were riding in. Shaw was not wearing a seat belt and was thrown from the vehicle and died, police said. All others involved in the accident were treated on scene or were released from the hospital with non-life threatening injuries. Police were still investigating the crash Tuesday afternoon and no charges had been filed.

Violent Kidnapping (aired 5/24/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Police in Salt Lake City need your help to find a suspect and a victim who is possibly in danger after a morning kidnapping. The suspect has been identified as Victor Gambino-Perez, 32. The victim in the aggravated kidnapping is Samantha June Medina, 24. Witnesses reported seeing a woman being forced into a car by a male suspect, believed to be Gambino-Perez, with a gun. The suspect was seen leaving in a white or gray 1995 Pontiac Grand Am, plate E585NB. Anyone with information is asked to contact police.

Missing St. George Boys (aired 5/24/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - St. George Police Department are looking for two brothers, ages 9 and 11, that they say are missing and endangered. It is believed they are with their father who has no custodial rights and is recently divorced from the children's mother. Police believe their father, Ricardo Flores, 51, is heading to Tijuana, Mexico with the boys. It is believed they are traveling in a 2007 Dodge Caliber with Utah plate E462AC, pulling a trailer with a blue tarp over it.

Amber Alert Follow (aired 05/25/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Police are trying to get two boys back, from their non-custodial father who's taking them to Mexico. The dad was supposed to take his sons to school this morning, but they never showed up. The viewer gets information about the boys, their dad and the car they are seen in, to see if they can stop them before they cross the border.

Child Missing in River (aired 5/29/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) – Crews pulled two adults from the Provo River Monday afternoon while a child is still missing. A witness told 2News, the child fell into the water near Nunn's Park and adults were racing down the river searching frantically for the child. Police said the child was sitting on a rock with her mother and at least one other child when she somehow ended up in the river. Rescue crews are actively searching in an active rescue effort. A helicopter is in the area helping in the search.

Provo River Drowning (aired 05/30/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – A woman, Good Samaritan and 4-year-old girl are all dead, after a tragic drowning in the Provo River. London De Dios fell into the fast-moving water, and several people jumped in and tried to save her. Her mother, and a stranger both drowned trying to get to her. The viewer got a live update from the scene with the latest on search efforts to find London's body.

WVC shooting (aired 5/30/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Investigators in West Valley are on the lookout for the person responsible for a shooting at an apartment complex Monday afternoon. According to West Valley City Police, the shooting occurred just after 5 p.m. at the Somerset Village Apartments where a 15-year-old boy was shot by someone from inside a car. A witness told 2News she gave the boy emergency medical care for a gunshot wound. He was rushed to the hospital but police said he was conscious and breathing when he was transported.

Fentanyl Operation Arrests (aired 5/31/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - The U.S. Attorney's Office announced an indictment against six people they believe are responsible for an international drug trafficking ring. The group of six are believed to have been manufacturing and distributing the deadly, potent narcotic fentanyl as a fake pill. Officials believe a man arrested in a raid in Cottonwood Heights in November was the ringleader of the operation. That raid took in more than \$1.2 million in cash, 500,000 pills and the pill presser that's believed to have been used to make them.

Three Shootings (aired 5/31/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Police are actively looking for shooters in three separate incidents on the west side of Salt Lake County. Officials say it's too early to tell if the shootings are all related, but they are looking into possible connections. In one of the shootings, a 15-year-old was killed after a street fight in West Valley City. In the other two incidents, two other people were injured in drive-by shootings.

Teen Hit By Car (aired 6/1/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - A teen girl is in extremely critical condition' after a car hit her in a Midvale crosswalk. Unified Police say an 85-year-old woman was driving a Ford Fusion east on 7720 South when she struck the 17-year-old girl. Witnesses to the crash told 2News at the scene that they attempted to perform CPR, but the victim was in such poor condition they couldn't do it safely. Paramedics transported the girl to the hospital.

Kearns Shooting (aired 06/02/2017 @7pm, 2 minutes) – This morning, police are looking for several people connected to a shooting in Kearns, overnight. The shooting happened just before 10 o'clock, near 5100 South and 4800 West. Police say a car pulled up a house in that area and a gunman fired nine shots into a crowd. Witnesses say one person was shot in the leg and ran north into another house. Police say they haven't been able to locate the shooter, or the victim who was shot. They believe the shooting may be gang related. This report highlights possible gang activity in Utah and alerts residents in the Kearns area that they may not be living in a safe neighborhood.

Bell Canyon Drowning (aired 06/05/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – A search and rescue crew worked for hours to retrieve the body of a man that fell and drowned in the fast moving waters in Bell Canyon. The man was hiking with friends when the accident happened. Rescuers had to form a human chain, and wade in the fast moving water for hours to accomplish the mission. The man's family camped out overnight and into the next day waiting. The viewer gets an update on a story that started on Sunday night and continued into Monday night.

Arson Arrest (aired 6/5/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) – The daughter of a woman killed in a West Valley City house fire has been arrested for murder and arson. Police say Loralie Thomas was booked into Salt Lake County Jail after her mother was killed in the house fire early Wednesday morning. The fire was set on the first floor of the house outside Kathie Thomas' bedroom. Loralie admitted to police she set the fire there so her mom could not escape.

Recovery Suspended (aired 6/5/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Officials have temporarily called off the recovery efforts for the body of a hiker who drowned in Bell Canyon Sunday night. According to Unified Police, the water level in the area where the body of Siaosi Brown is stuck has risen and it is unsafe to continue to try and pull the body from the water. Bell drowned in Bell Canyon Creek after he fell while hiking with friends.

Sandy Triple Murder (aired 6/6/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Three people are dead and two injured following a shooting in a neighborhood in Sandy. Police say the victims include an adult male, female and child. The adult male has been identified as the shooter and is dead. A juvenile male and female were also injured, one of them in critical condition. Witnesses say they saw a man fire his gun at a car. A Good Samaritan also intervened to try and help, but was not injured.

Sandy Shooting (aired 6/7/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - The woman who died in a shooting in Sandy had reported harassment from the suspect three days earlier. According to a news release from the Sandy Police Department, Memorez Rackley reported "telephone harassment" early June 3 from Jeremy Patterson. Sandy police declined to provide further information except to say that officers spoke to Patterson and asked him to stop contacting Rackley. Patterson, who lived in Draper, is accused of shooting and killing Rackley and her six-year-old son. Rackley's nine-year-old son and another eight-year-old girl were wounded in the shooting. Patterson then turned the gun on himself, according to police.

Uintah County Shooting (aired 06/08/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Two people are in the hospital, and a third behind bars, after a shooting in Uintah County. Police say the men got in a fight outside a party, and it ended with one of them shooting a gun. The viewer gets a live report from the scene with the latest details from police.

Rackley Harassment (aired 6/13/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Sandy Police released details Tuesday of Memorez Rackley's report to officers that Jeremy Patterson was harassing her days before he killed her and her son, and shot two other children near Brookwood Elementary School. In a police report, Rackley told Sandy Police she was being followed and harassed by Patterson, who she described as "a man she was seeing." The report goes on to say the officer explained Rackley's legal options, but she declined to pursue further criminal action at that time, citing a fear that it would "provoke" Patterson further. Court records do not show any protective orders filed by Rackley at the time of her June 6 death.

Sandy Shooting 911 Calls (aired 6/13/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Authorities in Sandy released recordings of the emergency calls reporting several people were shot on Alta Canyon Road last week. Memorez Rackley and her 6-year-old son, Jase, were killed. Two other children were shot and the alleged shooter, Jeremy Patterson, 32, shot himself and died at the scene. Emergency responders arrived to the scene near Brookwood Elementary School and found the victims in the middle of the road. According to Sandy Police, Memorez Rackley had an unspecified relationship with Patterson and there was a verbal dispute that preceded the shooting. Police said Rackley and her children were picked up by a female Good Samaritan who saw her arguing with Patterson outside the elementary school. Patterson rammed the Good Samaritan's car and then shot the victims, according to police.

Sandy Shooting Tip (aired 6/14/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Police in Utah investigated an anonymous tip about a man who wanted to kill a woman he was dating and himself just before he killed the woman and her son. According to documents, the tipster called 911 about Jeremy Patterson after getting a message from Patterson saying he had just broken up with his girlfriend and wanted to kill her and himself. A Draper officer investigated the call June 6, the same day Patterson opened fire on the car Memorez Rackley was riding in. The officer tried to call the tipster but no one answered the phone number she provided, the report said. The tipster gave Patterson's name but did not provide Rackley's name.

Wrong Way Driver (aired 6/14/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) – A man is lucky to be alive after getting into a head on crash with a wrong way driver on I-215. It was just before midnight on Saturday when Sunny Mallick was cruising along I-215 when suddenly a Dodge Ram Truck appeared going the wrong way. His friend swerved and that's when Mallick saw the headlights coming right at him. According to investigators, the driver of that truck hit two cars and then pulled over and ran from the scene. Troopers said they did find several items in the truck. Troopers say they found the owner of the truck but he told them his friend borrowed his truck. Investigators say the search is still on for that friend.

Lyle Jeffs Captured (aired 06/15/2017 @7pm, 3 minutes) – Breaking news out of South Dakota, where a wanted fugitive from Utah was captured by FBI agents. Lyle Jeffs, a prominent member of the FLDS community, was arrested late last night in Minnehaha County. He is the brother of the imprisoned FLDS leader, Warren Jeffs. In 2016, eleven members of the FLDS church were arrested following an FBI raid on the community of Hildale. Lyle was one of those eleven people, and he was indicted on food stamp fraud and money laundering charges. He was convicted of getting federal food benefits and then illegally transferring them to their church, or church leaders. Jeffs was placed on house arrest, but somehow managed to ditch his ankle bracelet one year ago and has been on the run ever since. This story highlights crime by a prominent member of the local FLDS community. It impacts the local population because they are living in close proximity to people of the FLDS faith. It especially impacts those who live in the FLDS communities.

Jeffs Case Reopened (aired 6/15/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - The United States Attorney's Office reopened its case FLDS leader Lyle Jeffs. Jeffs previously faced charges of conspiracy to commit Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program benefits fraud and conspiracy to commit money laundering. The indictment alleged FLDS church leaders used SNAP proceeds from authorized beneficiaries for "unapproved purposes." The Attorney's Office will file new charges against Jeffs for fleeing from law enforcement.

Jeffs identified (aired 6/15/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - In his 17 years as the owner of River City Tool & Pawn in Yankton, South Dakota, Kevin Haug has seen a lot of unexpected things come through his shop, but never a fugitive polygamist. Haug said he was acting off and fidgety when Lyle Jeffs came into his shop Thursday. An employee at the store thought Jeffs was suspicious and decided to google his name. When they realized who Jeffs was, they contacted the FBI.

DIVERSITY

Saratoga Springs Temple (aired 04/03/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – The city of Saratoga Springs is the latest Utah location for the 18th LDS Temple in Utah. So, what does that mean for a small town? The viewer learns about opposition to the temple. They also learned about the economic growth the neighboring town of Payson experienced from the LDS temple that was built there.

LDS President Hospitalized (aired 04/05/2017 @7pm, 1:45 minutes) – The LDS Church President, Thomas S. Monson is recovering in the hospital after speaking at General Conference. According to church leaders, the 89-year-old was taken to the hospital Monday night after he didn't attend two of the five sessions of General Conference. President Monson is the 16th president of the church and has been in that position since 2008. If anything was to happen to him, the presidency would fall upon the leader of the Quorum of the 12 Apostles, Russell M. Nelson. This story informs the Mormon population about the health of their proclaimed prophet, and informs them how church leadership would continue if he passed away.

Pay Wage in Utah (aired 04/05/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Women earn less than men in the United States, but in Utah, the wage gap is even bigger. A group in Utah is protesting the pay gap and demanding the pay be equal. The viewer hears from the leaders of the group, and from women in the workforce, that are not making as much as their male co-workers.

WVC Mom Home (aired 05/05/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – The first day of freedom for a West Valley Mom. She spent a week in jail for being in the United States illegally. Silvia Avelar Flores gets a stay from being deported to Mexico, for now. The viewer hears from the woman's family, and learns what she needs to do in the next 90 days, to get to stay in United States longer than 3 months.

Immigration Conflict (aired 05/10/2017 @7pm, 2 minutes) – National Immigration officials are at odds with one Maryland County, after it let an undocumented immigrant

go free. The young man was arrested for allegedly bringing a stolen assault rifle to high school. Now lawmakers are debating whether the county had the right to set him free. Local officials in the area don't agree with ICE protocols. Now the government may consider cutting federal funding to counties that ignore federal law to detain undocumented immigrants. This story could have huge consequences in Utah for the minority population. If the federal government threatens to cut funding to states and counties, local law enforcement may detain more immigrants, for fear of upsetting the government.

Boy Scout Program (aired 5/11/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints will no longer participate in the Varsity and Venturing programs offered by the Boy Scouts of America. The LDS Church said it doesn't believe young men between 14 and 18 years old are being "served well" by the Varsity or Venturing programs. The LDS Church will, however, continue its relationship with Boy Scout programs for those between the ages 8 and 13 years old. As for those who still wish to work toward an Eagle Scout badge, the church said they will be "registered, supported and encouraged." The LDS Church will continue to make the same payment to the BSA for registration of its young men through 2018.

Future InDesign Builds Bridges (aired 05/15/2017 @7pm, 1 minute) – A new program is building a bridge between Utah's marginalized communities and the tech sector. Future InDesign partner's industry leaders with under-served young adults from the ages of 16 to 20. Through the program youth learn technology and design skills. The goal is to break cycles of poverty in Utah families, and to create a pipeline that feeds right into Utah's workforce. This story shows the public what a Tech sector program is doing to try to eliminate poverty in the state. It is especially impactful for youth who are raised in poor families, by educating them of a possible avenue for advancement.

Tithing Lawsuit (aired 05/22/2017 @7pm, 2:30 minutes) – Victims of a 22-million-dollar scam ran by a Utah businessman want the LDS church to return their stolen money. Victims say Curtis DeYoung took their money and then donated, through tithing, to the LDS church. The LDS church is not giving up the money without a legal battle. LDS Church officials says they must first complete a thorough investigation before returning funds. This story explains how DeYoung duped so many people, lets viewers know how much money he gave to the church and gives the details of a lawsuit filed by the victims in an attempt to get some of their lost money back.

LDS President Monson Health (aired 5/23/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) – President Thomas S. Monson of the LDS church has stepped back his involvement in day-to-day church operations. The 89-year-old man is esteemed as a prophet by faithful followers and the 16th president of the Mormon church. He was recently hospitalized April 3 and released three days later. For the past several years, Monson's health has been declining. Monson has been in the position since Feb. 3, 2008, when he took the place of previous president Gordon B. Hinckley.

Missionary Safety (aired 6/5/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints created the survey to "better understand the day-to-day experiences and perceptions of missionaries" and "identify areas or circumstances where missionary safety may be at the greatest risk." It will use the results of the survey to "review and modify" the already existing missionary safety guidelines and instructions. The LDS church says the survey will help them better understand the day-to-day experiences and perceptions of missionaries around the world related to physical safety.

EDUCATION

Teacher Pay Increase (aired 04/25/2017 @7pm, 2:30 minutes) – Teachers in the Jordan School District will be getting a 10-million-dollar raise. The bump in pay will take effective at the beginning of next school year. The raise means starting pay for a first time teacher will increase from \$36,000 to 40,000 a year. Negotiations for the raise have been ongoing for more than a year. This story goes into detail about what this mean for Jordan teachers across the board and explains why some teachers aren't overly excited about the raise.

Actress Addresses Grads (aired 5/5/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Diane Guerrero, known for her roles in "Orange is the New Black" and "Jane the Virgin," was the keynote speaker at Salt Lake Community College's Commencement Ceremony -- the largest in the school's history with 4,700 graduates. Guerrero told the graduates she found success, but only after surviving the trauma of being forcibly separated from her family at age 14, when her parents and brother were deported to Colombia. Guerrero said she came home from school one day to find her family was gone. Guerrero was the only one in her family born in the U.S. She feels an obligation to speak for immigrant families and believes when the government arrests and deports good people, everyone around that person suffers.

School Discipline (aired 5/22/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - A new study suggested serious changes need to be made to the way schools take disciplinary actions. Voices for Utah Children released the study that showed school disciplinary actions that take students out of class and often involve law enforcement are down overall, but on the rise for minority groups. Authors hope to see the new committee formed in time for the upcoming school year.

Park City Undocumented Student Help (aired 05/24/2017 @7pm, 2:30 minutes) – In just one week, The Park City Education Foundation (PCEF) has raised \$10,000 to help undocumented students apply for permits that allow them to work and live in the U.S. legally. The goal is to raise \$20,000 to help the students pay the \$495 fee for DACA status. DACA, or consideration of deferred action for childhood arrivals, is open to young people who were brought to the U.S. illegally by their parents before their 16th birthday. There are about 5 to 15 thousand undocumented students in Utah who qualify for DACA status, but don't apply. This story explains why the PCEF decided to raise the money for these application and it gives the personal story of one student who applying for DACA status with the help of the PCEF.

School Fee Audit (aired 06/13/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – The State Board of Education has approved an audit of school fees. The board received some complaints about fees being misapplied to some kids. Members plan to spend at least the next six months reviewing fee policies. This story explains what the audit will entail, what changes could be made after the audit is finish and gives parents a chance to express their opinions about school fees and the newly announced audit.

ENVIRONMENT

Road Repairs (aired 4/11/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Nearly half of the roads in Highland need serious repairs that current tax dollars do not cover. Most residents reported they are willing to pay extra to fix the deteriorating roads. The city estimated they need an additional \$7 million over seven years to fix the seriously damaged roads. In a recent survey, 70% of residents told the city they wanted their tax dollars to go towards fixing the roads first. And 67% said they were willing to pay an additional fee to make that possible. The city proposed adding the additional fee as either a utility road fee or a property tax.

Airport Upgrades (aired 4/13/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Cedar City Regional Airport has had a busy year breaking enplanement records every month. That traffic has made a positive impact on the growth of the city but it's wearing down the current airport runway and taxiway. Officials said the idea would be to make the runway, taxiway stronger so that larger BLM aircraft and commercial planes can land and be safe doing so. Right now the airport is in the beginning stages of formulating this plan. The hope is to have a final master plan drawn up by August 2017.

Sand Hallow Water Levels (aired 4/14/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Easter weekend is upon us and many visitors flock to a Southern Utah hot spot, Sand Hollow State Park. Some visitors could be surprised to find a lack of available spots for them to camp and lounge. That issue arose when the level of water did in the reservoir measuring nearly five to six feet higher than it has been in about seven years, according to park rangers. All the reserve camping sites are already booked and many of the open camping spots are buried under feet underwater, leaving plenty of demand but limited supply for park rangers and the public to choose from.

National Monument Review Order (aired 04/24/2017 7pm, 1:30 minutes) – Today President Trump is expected to sign an executive order, demanding a review of National Monuments, designated since 1996. If Trump signs the order, the Interior Secretary Ryan Zinke, take on the responsibility of reviewing two Monuments here in Utah. One of those is the Bears Ears National Monument, which was designated by Former President Obama just before he left office. Utah republicans are strongly against the monument, because they say it limits how much control the state has over the land. Zinke says the designations do a great service to the public, but local communities should have a voice. This story informs viewers about a decision that will affect public land right here in Utah. It especially impacts the communities in Southern Utah, who depend on the land to provide income for tourism.

Slow the Flow Campaign (aired 5/2/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Utah's incredible snow fall this year means the drought is over, but it's just the beginning of a major campaign effort for the state's water conservation program called: Slow The Flow. This year Utah's Division of Water Resources is going to be a banner year for Slow The Flow. The team that runs the program is revamping its website, and flooding social media with water conservation slogans. They also plan to offer more competitions between cities for a \$5,000 water conservation grant.

Dimple Dell Decision Preview (aired 05/12/2017 @7pm, 2 minutes) – Today a decision will be made about the paving of the North Rim Trail, in Dimple Dell Park. Salt Lake County Mayor Ben McAdams, is expected to make the announcement at the Wrangler Trailhead, this morning at 10. The Dimple Dell community is already celebrating a victory because they believe he will rescind the plan to pave a three-mile section of the trail. The \$4 million that would have been used to pave the trail, will instead be redirected to preserve the park. This report informs the public that their public lands will be protected. It especially affects the thousands of residents who ride horses, bike, or run, along the park's trail every year.

Air Quality Bills (aired 05/16/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Can you breathe easier because of new Utah clean air laws? The Governor and lawmakers say you can. There was a clean air extravaganza at a local elementary school today where lawmakers talked about what they did to help the air in the state. The viewer learns what they can do to help clean out the pollution in the Beehive state.

Utah Lake (aired 05/16/2017 @ 5pm, 2:00 minutes) – Utah Lake is Quickly filling up with mountain runoff. Could this fresh water prevent an algae breakout like what we saw last year? They say the hope is it will be a great year with plenty of water for people to enjoy, but what does this mean for the green stuff? 2News spoke to experts who tell the viewer what they expect in the coming months in the waters of Utah Lake.

Zion Memorial Weekend (aired 5/26/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Zion National Park is about to get very busy this Memorial Day Weekend. Park rangers expect more visitors than last year and that number hit about 79,000 people within a three day period. Already, lines and parking spots are filling up. John Marciano with Zion National Park said they had to bring in some rangers on their day off to help lend a hand and corral visitors. Marciano said they are also extending the hours that faculties are open and buses operate.

Human Caused fires (aired 6/13/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - It's been a busy season for firefighters already with dozens of human caused fires popping up all of the state. Officials say there's been in the upwards of 45 human caused fires in the last three days, which has proven a frustration for crews in Southwest Utah. The Division of Forestry, Fire and State Lands said people need to understand that every spark can start a fire and they're putting men and women at risk. There are currently six active fires around Utah, and if this continues, fire officials believe it could be a very busy year

for his crew. He's now asking for the public's help.

Bonanza Flats (aired 06/14/2017 @7pm, 55 seconds) – The ‘Save Bonanza Flats’ fundraising effort is helping save the land from the development of a gated housing community. Park City residents pitched in part of the funds towards the effort. Other cities and counties also helped the group reach its goal. The mayor of Park City says he is confident the land will be saved from development.

Brian Head Fire (aired 06/19/2017 @7pm, 2 minutes) – Hundreds of crews are battling a fire that is burning in Iron County, not far from Cedar City. The Brian Head wildfire has burned over 1,000 acres and crews have not had any luck containing it. Soon after the fire started, 750 people were evacuated from their homes. The fire was human caused and is threatening several structures. One house was completely destroyed while three others were damaged. This story notes that high temperatures and dry grasses are making it very easy for fires to start. It warns locals of the reality of the fire danger, and it especially impacts residents living close to the fire who may be displaced, or who's homes may be destroyed.

Heatwave Grips the West (aired 06/21/2017 @7pm, 1 minutes) – An extreme heat warning has been issued for Arizona, California, and Southern Utah. The heat wave is expected to cause several problems for airports and power grids. As temperatures are expected to soar above 115 degrees in some parts of California, air conditioning units will struggle to keep up. Power outages have already been reported, and more are predicted in the coming week. In Arizona, temperatures are predicted to exceed 120 degrees, forcing the cancelation of many flights. American Airlines says regional jets can't operate one degrees hit 118 degrees. This story impacts viewers who may be planning to travel to a neighboring state in the coming week. It also alerts those in Southern Utah, that they could experience similar problems with temperatures just under 115 degrees.

GOVERNMENT/POLITICAL

.05 Special Session (aired 04/03/2017 @7pm Utah drinkers are still reeling from the new .05 limit passed in the last legislative session. 2News Political Specialist Rod Decker gives the viewer the latest on the special session and what will be addressed at the Capitol.

UTA Meeting (aired 04/04/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – UTA worked out a deal with Federal Prosecutors to avoid possible public corruption charges. They didn't release the specifics of the agreement, and wouldn't say what the violations were. They just said they were ethical, conflict of interests and involved misuse of Federal funds. The viewer learns the latest developments on a settlement in a scandal surrounding a big organization in the state of Utah.

UTA Corruption Probe (aired 4/4/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Federal prosecutors have agreed not to file charges against Utah's public transit agency in exchange for cooperation with a Department of Justice investigation of corruption and

misuse of public funds. U.S. Attorney for Utah John Huber and Utah Transit Authority leaders announced the deal Tuesday. It calls for an independent watchdog at UTA and requires the agency to share information about any allegations of criminal activity by UTA board members, employees and contractors. Huber says UTA, which oversees public buses, light rail and commuter trains in six counties, has made improvements since a scathing 2014 state audit found sweetheart deals and lavish pay for UTA executives.

Homeless Shelter Recommendation (aired 04/10/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – The state committee approved Mayor Ben McAdam's recommendation for the South Salt Lake homeless shelter location. To receive the \$20 million in funding, the mayor and the committee had to pick a location that fit certain requirements. The council passed the proposal, but with some additions. The viewer learns the latest on the controversial homeless shelter location, and the conditions that the council passed the location with.

Orrin Hatch Interview (aired 04/10/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Orrin Hatch says as of now, he is running for re-election to the United States Senate in 2018. However, another race depends on his health and other factors. Hatch's re-election status has been a big talker in the media, and this is the first time the viewer is hearing his plans on camera on KUTV.

Homeless Shelters Approved (aired 4/10/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - The Homeless Coordinating Committee voted to approve plans to build three homeless resource centers, including one controversial location in South Salt Lake. The committee believed the location at 3380 South 1000 West holds up to the statue requirements to be allowed to receive the funding. McAdams said it'll be about 12 to 15 months to build after the plans are approved. SSL Mayor Cherie Wood spoke about the "irreversible effects" the facility would have on the community.

Highland Roads Tax (aired 04/11/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – There is a proposed tax increase in Utah County to fix roads in Highland. Every winter the city spends a large part of their budget to fix potholes, but with temperatures going up and down the fillings don't stick. Now they're asking residents to pick up the tab to reconstruct the roads. The viewer learns why the tax increase is necessary and how much it will cost a household each year.

Chaffetz in Town (aired 04/17/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Utah Congressman Jason Chaffetz just returned from visiting the exact same area as Vice President Mike Pence. Chaffetz met with officials in the demilitarized zone, even getting a stare down from a North Korean Soldier. 2News met up with the Congressman and visited with him about the trip, and the viewer heard about his trip and thoughts on the situation.

Bernie Sanders Visits Utah (aired 4/21/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) – Former Presidential candidate Bernie Sanders rallied in Utah for the democratic party Friday. Hours before the event, hundreds of Utahns stood in the col waiting for the doors to open. The visit comes part of Sanders' Unity Tour. DNC Chair Tom Perez and

several other top democrats attended as well. They spoke for raising the minimum wage, pay equity for women, climate change and free tuition for college.

Beckerle Reinstated (aired 04/25/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – After a closed-door meeting at the University of Utah Dr. Mary Beckerle is back as the Chief of the Huntsman Cancer Institute, effective immediately. There was a lot of protest and backlash after she was fired via email just days before. The viewer learned about controversy surrounding the decision, the process leading up to the reversal, and reaction from people when she was reinstated.

Monument Review (aired 4/26/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - President Donald Trump signed an executive order Wednesday morning demanding a review of all national monuments that were designated in the past 21 years. The Antiquities Act Executive Order will instruct the Interior Department to review those designated by Trump's three past predecessors and will call into question both Bears Ears National Monument and Grand Staircase-Escalante National Monument. Not everyone was happy, however. In a released statement, the Center for Western Priorities said Trump "launched an all-out assault on our national monuments and public lands."

Holt's Mom Visits D.C. (aired 4/27/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - A Utah mom whose son is imprisoned in Venezuela has just wrapped up a trip to Washington, D.C., pushing for his release. Laurie Holt said her 10 month ordeal is getting more attention from leaders at the highest level. Holt met with a lot of people about her son, Josh, who has been imprisoned in Venezuela since June, 2016. Holt got no firm answers about her son. While she is frustrated and impatient, Holt said she is also optimistic after the week's events. If anything, she said, she got a little more hope.

Ryan Zinke Visits Bears Ears (aired 5/8/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Secretary of the Interior Ryan Zinke has wrapped up his first day in Southern Utah touring 1.3 million acres of land. The Secretary is tasked with reviewing the monument that was designated in December by President Barack Obama. Monday afternoon, he took a hike to view some ancient Native American ruins, just outside Blanding. Zinke has said he hasn't made up his mind yet whether to recommend to President Trump that the monument remain, be reduced, or be rescinded altogether. Zinke insists he is listening and said he plans to meet "with everybody" during his trip to southern Utah. But he also hinted that the monument designation -- as it is today -- may not be around very long.

Comey Firing Reaction (aired 05/10/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Utah Senators and Congressmen say they were blindsided by James Comey's firing from the FBI. Senator Mike Lee admits he is concerned about perceptions that the firing might affect an FBI investigation. He says they are calling for a special prosecutor in the probe into Russia ties and the 2018 Presidential Election. The viewer hears from a congressman serving their state in Washington, D.C.

Jordan River State Park (aired 5/10/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Would you support turning the Jordan River Parkway into Utah's 44th state park?

Representative Mike Winder thinks it's a good idea to help keep the park clean and safe from transients while also remaining open to public users. Some opponents of the South Salt Lake homeless resource center criticized the location for being too close to the Jordan River Parkway. Winder said authorities would be better able to enforce illegal camping ordinances and other laws under state ownership. Various private, city, and county agencies now own the land of the Jordan River Parkway. Winder said uniting the ownership as a state park would allow them to better serve the public.

Prison Land (aired 5/10/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) – As land developers discuss what to put on the state prison land that will soon be available, residents are concerned what it can do to their neighborhood. Residents are most concerned the big makeover could cause a lot of traffic and congestion. Developers did not say what will be built, but at looking at a large facility that would bring high quality job growth. Kelley Thompson, who lives on Redwood Road, west of the prison, said the report is a good first step, but must be more imaginative.

Chaffetz to Subpoena Comey (aired 5/16/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - The Republican Chairman of the House Oversight Committee says he plans to demand that the Justice Department turn over all memos written by former FBI Director James Comey concerning his past meetings with President Donald Trump. Rep. Jason Chaffetz is taking action because of a memo Comey wrote detailing how Trump asked him to shut down a federal investigation into former National Security Adviser Michael Flynn. Chaffetz says the memo raises concerns "about improper interference placed on an active investigation." He says he has ordered staffers to draft a letter to Justice Department officials seeking Comey's memos. The letter is expected Tuesday night.

Chaffetz Announcement (aired 05/18/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Jason Chaffetz announced his final day in office will be the end of June. The Utah Congressman spoke to the media from his Utah County home. He said he wanted to spend more time with his family, and with his job now he was spending too much time sleeping on a cot in his Washington, D.C. office. The viewer hears the explanation from their Representative, about his decision to leave his office earlier than the end of the term.

Sheriffs and Medical Marijuana (aired 05/19/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Some Utah Sheriffs signed a letter saying medical marijuana is a “deadly farce.” Tonight, medical cannabis users say the Sheriffs’ letter is inaccurate. The viewer hears both sides of the argument about a controversial subject that has been at the center of bills at the State capitol in years past.

United Utah Party (aired 05/22/2017 @7pm, 1:30 minutes) – A new political party: United Utah Party. It appeals to moderate Republicans, Democrats and Independents. The small group hopes to unite moderate voters with moderate candidates. They believe the current system is too extreme.

A few things they support: Term limits for public officials, public education funding, independent redistricting, stricter campaign finance limits, compassionate immigration, pro-life and a fair tax system.

Bears Ears Land Auctioned Off (aired 05/24/2017 @7pm, 1:20 minutes) -

Conservationist and millionaire Jennifer Speers has paid \$2.5 million for 640 acres (2,589,990 sq. meters) of land within Bears Ears National Monument. Speers paid about \$1.5 million above the starting bid Wednesday for a spot called the Needles Outpost. The outpost was on property owned by the Utah School and Institutional Trust Lands Administration, which put it up at auction for a minimum bid of \$1.03 million. The area includes an old landing strip, a commercial campground, convenience store and the only gas station around for about 45 miles.

Utah GOP Debt (aired 5/25/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - The new regime at the Utah Republican Party has found at least \$50,000 of more debt, since just last weekend. In an interview with 2News, Griffin said the party owes more than \$300,000 to lawyer Marcus Mumford for legal work and there are debts tied to "operating costs" that are over \$100,000. Griffin said the Utah Republican Party has not had a budget for four years, and an "audit committee" had little to review. He said a new audit is coming along with a budget.

DABC Audit (aired 5/30/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) -The Utah Office of the State Auditor released a scathing report that claims the Utah Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control failed to report hundreds of millions of dollars in revenue and sold goods between July 2016 and December 2016. The report blames the DABC for the findings, citing "poorly-implemented" tools, a lack of qualified employees and poor time management systems. The audit cited six findings, which included the organization did not correctly use its management software. It did not correctly record revenue each month. It did not record expenses at a store level and it did not review store manager time cards.

Obamacare Repeal Troubles (aired 05/31/2017 @7pm, 1:30 minutes) - Senator Orrin Hatch says republicans may not be able to repeal and replace Obamacare. The senator is the chair of the senate finance committee where a senate repeal and replace bill is now being worked on. Hatch says some Americans need help with insurance, but the congressional budget office says the republican house plan would mean 23 million more uninsured Americans. However, it would save \$119 billion.

Tax Reform (aired 06/01/2017 @7pm, 1:30 minutes) - Tax reform may be coming, and it may cost you money. Senator Orrin Hatch is working on changing the tax code, and he says some Americans who don't pay income tax now, should start paying something. Senator Hatch says too many Americans don't pay income tax. The money lower income people pay might go to lower the corporate tax rate. President Donald Trump says America now has one of the highest corporate tax rates of any country. He wants to cut the corporate rate from 35% to 15%. Hatch says reform might even cut the deficit

if republicans can find the magic formula. This story notifies tax payers how tax reform could impact them, and may end up costing them more money.

Democratic Candidate Harassment (aired 6/5/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - At least seven women are accusing a Utah politician of years of sexual harassment. In a letter to the Democratic Party's Executive Committee, the group accused Rob Miller of sexual misconduct. The women described years of sexual harassment including "petting" a coworker's hair, saying inappropriate remarks like "you're so sexy," and other unwanted physical contact. Miller questions the timing of the leak, and said there were never any allegations when he was in office.

Homeless Shelter Plan Changes (aired 06/06/2017 @7pm, 2 minutes) – Salt Lake County and City officials announced major changes regarding Salt Lake's homeless shelter and the surrounding area. The county plans to shut it down by July 15th. That's well over a year earlier than planned. Originally, the county was going to shut down the shelter July of 2019, but now the county is planning to close the place in mere weeks. That means 40 families and 170 people need to be out. Officials say they just can't afford to wait until new shelters are built in 2019 to start cleaning up the Rio Grande area.

Call for Gary Ott Resignation (aired 6/7/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Salt Lake County Mayor Ben McAdams has called for the resignation of county recorder Gary Ott, whose ability to effectively do his job has been disputed by voters and politicians alike for more than a year. Ott's capability to do his job has been under close scrutiny for months. A September audit found Ott was not regularly showing up for work. Ott earns roughly \$180,000 a year in salary and benefits. He first took office in 2001 and is serving an extended term that will expire in 2020.

Polygamist Running for Mayor (aired 06/09/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – An outspoken polygamist who lives in Herriman is holding nothing back. He's running for Mayor. Technically, his lifestyle is against the law. Joe Darger and his three wives showed up as he filed to run for mayor. The viewer hears why he wants to run for public office, the hurdles he would face, and what his wives think about it.

Female Fire Captain (aired 06/12/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – A first for the West Jordan Fire Department. A woman firefighter has been promoted to Captain. It didn't come without some pain and suffering in her personal life. The viewer learns the journey Captain Joy Stearns takes to get to where she is in her career as a firefighter with West Jordan Fire Department.

Salt Lake City Budget (aired 06/14/2017 @7pm, 2 minutes) – The Salt Lake City Council met behind closed doors to discuss the budget and pay raises. The police department asked for a 4% salary raise, but it was denied. Instead officers will only get a 1% raise which barely covers inflation. As a result, the police department is struggling to keep veteran officers. While they are strongly disappointed with the raise they will receive, officers say they will continue working on the force. This story informs the

public about how their civil servants are being paid, and how the city is spending tax dollars.

HEALTH/HEALTHCARE

Naloxone One Year Later (aired 04/05/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – A year ago police officers started carrying the overdose drug called Naloxone. Since then, dozens of lives have been saved. Salt Lake Police officers alone, saved 15 lives. The viewer hears from families that had loved ones saved from the drug, and the viewer learns how they can have the drug in their homes, if they worry about someone they know, overdosing on Naloxone.

Treating Osteoporosis (aired 4/5/17 @7pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Osteoporosis or low bone mass affects 44 million Americans. It's caused by the body losing too much bone, not creating enough new bone, or a combination of the two. You may be at risk for osteoporosis based on age, genetics, certain medications, and if you are "thin boned." The TOSH Healthy Bones Clinic provides wellness-based treatment options for patients with varying stages of the condition. Diet, possible supplementation, and exercises are three big factors to improve wellness in osteoporosis patients.

Whooping Cough Outbreak (aired 04/07/2017 @7pm, 2:10 minutes) – An outbreak of Whooping Cough has hit a Murray Charter school. At least 15 kids have come down with the disease, forcing the school to cancel classes in an effort to slow the spread. Some parents are blaming other parents who have refused to get their children vaccinated. This story lets our viewers know what school is impacted by the outbreak, details what school officials are doing to combat the highly contagious disease and explains the laws surrounding immunizations.

Avoiding Running Injuries (aired 4/12/17 @7pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – If you're planning to sign up and run a race this summer, it's important to address your running form and technique before training begins. Doing this can help avoid injury down the line. At TOSH, experts can assess your running form and do a gait analysis. By looking at film, running form can be addressed and improved. They will also supplement your foot to pavement training with some mobility and strength exercises. It's also key to warm-up and have a stretching routine for before and after your runs.

Huntsman March (aired 4/24/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - A passionate march crossed the campus at the University of Utah as dozens of people protested the firing of the Huntsman Cancer Institute Director. Dr. Mary Beckerle was fired a week ago after spending 11 years as the institutes CEO. Since then protest have taken place and even Jon Huntsman Sr. himself has come out in opposition. Many of those speaking out are cancer survivors who spent months at the Huntsman Cancer Institute. Protesters signed a statement that will be delivered to the school's president and plan to not give up the fight to reinstate Beckerle.

Beckerle Reinstated (aired 4/25/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Effective immediately, Mary Beckerle will be reinstated as the CEO and director of the Huntsman

Cancer Institute, according to the University of Utah. Beckerle was fired last week causing an uproar at the institute and The University of Utah campus. Faculty members launched a petition calling for her return. The decision for Beckerle to resume the position came after a meeting of Huntsman and University of Utah officials including President of the University, David Pershing.

New Mobile Clinic (aired 4/26/17 @7pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Doctors making house calls are coming back, but this time it's a little bit different. This spring Intermountain's new mobile clinic hit the road. The goal of the clinic is to provide better access to healthcare in rural Utah. This clinic is operated by Garfield Memorial Hospital and will provide primary care services to Antimony, Glendale, Marysville, Bryce City, and Duck Creek. The mobile clinic will have a routine schedule and book regular appointments, but, just as with a regular clinic, will also accept day of patients.

Sports Performance Assessment (aired 5/3/17 @7pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Athletes are turning to sports performance assessments in an effort to edge out their competition. For triathlete Amber Blair, this information has helped her improve her body's performance. This assessment goes over three tests. First, athletes sit in the BodPod and test their body fat composition. Second, they undergo a Vo2 test that looks at heart rate while training. Third, athletes go through a functional movement screening. The information from all of these tests look at and address where athletes can improve their training and performance.

Healthcare Reform Passes House (aired 05/04/2017 @7pm, 1:30 minutes) – A new plan for Republican Healthcare reform, passed a vote in the House of Representative. As the bill passes its first hurdle, some Utahns who have pre-existing medical conditions, are wondering what will happen to their health care plans. The new bill would give states the option to require insurance companies to continue covering people with pre-existing conditions. Utah resident, Jennifer Provost, is worried that her insurance rates will increase if Republicans replace Obamacare. Jason Stephenson with the Utah Health Policy Project thinks Utah leaders will not require insurance companies to keep cover pre-existing conditions. This story represents many Utah residents and informs them how their healthcare coverage could change, if the new bill passes a vote in the Senate.

Utah Man Receives New Kidney (aired 5/10/17 @7pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Polycystic kidney disease affects around 600,000 people in the United States. It often results in the need for a kidney transplant which was the case for one Utah man. We meet one man whose kidneys were in such bad shape, they were filled with millions of balloon like cysts. Fortunately, his sister-in-law came forward as a donor and after surgery to remove the bad kidneys, followed by another surgery to get the new kidney, this man is recovering and doing extremely well.

Whooping Cough (aired 05/16/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Tonight, a warning for parents of Students at a Murray School. A whooping cough outbreak has now gone school wide. The school has been dealing with the disease for a while, and thought it

was under control. Now, more than 30 students at the charter school have whooping cough, and the school staff says state vaccination laws need to change to prevent things like this from happening in the future. The viewer learns about the outbreak, what officials are doing about it, and what they say needs to change to prevent it from happening again.

Surviving a Stroke (aired 5/17/17 @7pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – May is National Stroke Awareness Month. Strokes are responsible for 1 out of every 20 deaths. Every year, strokes kill more than 130,000 Americans. Since strokes can strike people of any age, it's important to recognize the signs early. In this story we go over the warning signs of a stroke and explain how quick action has led a young Utah woman's remarkable recovery.

Zika Virus Research (aired 05/25/2017 @7pm, 1 minute) – The mosquito-born Zika virus may have been spreading longer than we thought. New research shows that the virus was likely circulating in the Americas, months before the first cases were detected. An analysis from MIT and Harvard scientists, suggests that Zika was spreading in Brazil in February of 2014. That is a year before the first infections were reported. According to researchers at Florida Gulf Coast University, the transmission of the virus in the U.S., started months before the first case was confirmed. They say it wasn't a single case that introduced the virus in Florida, but rather at least four separate transmissions. This story educates people about the history of the Zika virus, that infected several local women last year. It also comes as a timely reminder of the danger, as the mosquito season approaches.

Running Fast is Science (aired 5/25/17 @7pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – In nearly every sport, it helps to be fast. However, improving your running speed isn't always easy. Many people think running is a natural movement, but there's a lot more to it. To improve the skill of running, experts at TOSH first look at what an athlete is doing wrong. By moving correctly not only do you reduce your injury risk but you also become more efficient and faster. They also look at foot placement, stride length, and turnover rate. With that information they make adjustments to ensure athletes are running as efficiently as possible.

Helmet Saves Motorcycle Rider's Life (aired 5/31/17 @7pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – One of the easiest and most effective ways to stay safe on a motorcycle is to always wear a helmet. For one Utah man, taking this simple step is what saved his life. He was on a motorcycle trip in Idaho when not feeling well led to him passing out and crashing his bike. He broke many bones, but the most severe injury was his head. He was in a coma for almost two weeks and, after being diagnosed with a severe traumatic brain injury, didn't know where he was, who he was, or what had happened. He hopes his story of recovery encourages everyone to always wear a helmet.

Botox and Dentists (aired 06/02/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – New guidelines are being considered to allow dentists to do Botox at your next cleaning or cavity filling. Right now, some dentists can do the procedure for jaw pains, or discomfort, but they're

considering expanding the guidelines for when the dentist can give a patient Botox. With Botox becoming more and more popular, the viewer learns about how a possible change in on the way for when or where they can get the injection.

Intermittent Fast Study Looking for Participants (aired 6/9/17 @7pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Intermittent fasting is one of the latest diet trends, but could this eating pattern actually improve your health? That's what a new study out of Intermountain Medical Center Heart Institute is looking to answer. The WONDERFUL trial asks whether or not intermittent fasting could be a solution for patients at risk of developing a chronic disease. In this story we explain what participants do in the study, who is qualified to participate, and how to sign up.

Mental Facility closing (aired 6/16/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - Staffers at Valley Behavioral Health's last remaining residential teen mental health treatment facility say the center is closing, and teens are being "forced out" too soon. When employees arrived to work Thursday, they found the locks changed. Now employees are working about the teens getting treatment and the impact the closure could have on them. A spokesperson for Valley Behavioral Health said the closure will happen next week, and is part of a wider effort to put troubled youth in "community-based" programs.

Safe Summer BBQs (aired 6/21/17 @7pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – The last thing anyone wants with their barbeque is a side of foodborne illness. To avoid this, store foods at the right temperature and cook foods to the appropriate temperatures. This varies between 145-165 degrees. Next, remember to store food in a timely manner. Bacteria grows whenever food is in the danger zone of 40-140 degrees so you want to minimize the amount of time it's in that zone. Finally, remember to always keep raw and cooked foods separate and to wash your hands frequently.

Precision Genomics Saves Man's Life (aired 6/21/17 @7pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – As an active 40-something doctor, Larry Gabriel thought he was a healthy adult. However, results of a routine physical proved otherwise. He had cancer. Unfortunately, several types of chemo, radiation, surgery, and other treatments were not working. He was only getting worse not better. Then he tried precision genomics. This personalized approach treats cancer based on gene mutations. To Larry's surprise, a type of chemo usually used to treat ovarian cancer worked. He is now disease free.

YOUTH AND FAMILY

Peaks Ice Arena Closing? (aired 04/04/2017 @7pm, 2:15 minutes) – Hundreds of families in Utah County say they are furious to hear an Olympic venue, and the county's only ice rink, may be shut down. The future of the rink depends on a deal between Utah County and the City of Provo. Currently, the two entities split 20 percent of the cost to run the facility and now Utah County is reconsidering their part of the investment. The rink is used by dozens of youth hockey teams and the BYU hockey team. This story explains why the rink is in danger and lets our viewers know what is being done to try and keep it open.

Roy Boy Fire Gifts (aired 04/06/2017 @7pm, 2:15 minutes) – A happy ending for a little boy who not only lost his house but all of his birthday gift when his house went up in flames. The Roy City firefighters who battled the blaze knew they had to do something to help ease the pain. They surprised the family with two jars of cash and some birthday presents. This story explains how the fire started and gives the little boy and his mom an opportunity to share their story about how it could have been much worse. It also shows our viewers the kindness of a group of firefighters.

Support Through the Loss of a Child (aired 4/7/17 @7pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Pregnancy is often filled with excitement and happiness, but when that suddenly turns into loss, coping can seem impossible. We meet mother of four Molly Smith whose healing began with the help of Intermountain Medical Center's Bereavement program. Due to a cord accident, Molly's fourth daughter passed away at 31 weeks. The program helped guide Molly and her family through their emotions and created a safe environment for healing.

Increasing Milk Supply (aired 4/14/17 @7pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Breastfeeding is one of the biggest stressors for many new moms because it takes a lot of work. One problem nursing mothers sometimes face is not producing enough milk. The first step is to look at how moms are fueling their bodies. Nursing mothers need to get good nutrition and not just eat healthy foods, but eat enough of them. Staying hydrated and drinking water is also crucial. Nursing on demand helps promote milk production and pumping between feedings can also help. Finally, talk to your doctor and don't give up because help is available.

Foster Families in Southern Utah (aired 04/17/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – There are close to 200 kids in Utah's Foster system waiting to find a home. Some parents who are struggling to have kids, are overlooking the option of adoption. The viewer learns of common misconceptions when it comes to adoptions. They also learn about a public event going on where they can meet foster kids in Southern Utah looking for a home.

Special Care Nurseries (aired 4/24/17 @7pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Delivering a baby usually goes as planned, but occasionally there are surprises. Fortunately, special care nurseries are able to provide high-level care outside of the NICU. These nurseries are between a well-baby nursery and a NICU. They care for babies with conditions such as respiratory problems, low blood sugar, or infection. One of the big benefits of babies receiving care in a special care nursery is that most of the time it means mom and baby can stay together in the same hospital.

Introducing Healthy Foods (aired 4/28/17 @7pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Parents have lots of questions when it comes time to introduce solid foods to their baby. However, what you feed your child can actually be pretty simple and easy as long as what you eat is healthy as well. Parents can start by just blending up whatever they are eating and give it to baby. Dr. Cannon Marriott also recommends avoiding the traditional rice cereal for a baby's first food experience. Instead, introduce natural or whole foods from the very beginning. Make a point to frequently introduce new textures, flavors, and

combinations. No specific food is off-limits; however, there's one ingredient to stay away from. Sugar.

Domestic Violence food pantry (aired 5/4/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - A group of friends banded together to help a family affected by domestic violence. Paul Stoddard led about a dozen of his friends to a West Jordan, Utah, courtroom where Juanita Strong and her two kids would face their accused abuser. His passion for preventing domestic violence began at a young age, when he witnessed it in his own home. Stoddard's business, Nickey's Food Warehouse, offers discounted food and supplies from restaurant suppliers. He and his friends use their own two hands to help families in need. Juanita now plans to "pay it forward." She and her friend started a nonprofit organization to help families of domestic violence find resources.

Prenatal Screening Tests (aired 5/5/17 @7pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Prenatal screening tests are available to all pregnant women. However, it's important to decide whether or not these tests are right for you. One reason you might want to get testing done is if you are over 35. Unfortunately, once you are over 35 there is a higher risk of chromosomal anomalies. With a simple blood test, prenatal screenings can look for chromosomal anomalies and neural tube defects such as down syndrome or trisomy 21, trisomy 18, and trisomy 13. If one of these tests comes back as positive, take a breath. Just because a test is abnormal does NOT mean your baby is affected with something. It just tells you that you have an increased or decreased risk.

Make a Wish (aired 5/10/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - A dream came true when Utah's Make-A-Wish Foundation granted a West Valley City boy the dearest wish of his heart: A day in the life of a garbage man. Utah's Waste Management company teamed up with the Make-A-Wish Foundation to bring a smile to Austin Trusty who has cystic fibrosis. Austin loves garbage, garbage cans and garbage trucks. When Brad Kloos with Waste Management knocked on the family's door and asked for Austin, there was an ear-to-ear smile. Austin will also be going to Disney World thanks to Make-A-Wish. It is something that would not be in the cards because of high medication costs that control the family budget.

Stepping Up for Utah – Breastfeeding Support (aired 5/12/17 @7pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – The Utah Department of Health is encouraging baby-friendly hospital policies with their "Stepping Up for Utah Babies" program. This includes 10-steps aimed at promoting breastfeeding. Intermountain's Riverton Hospital is focusing on two of these areas: initiating breastfeeding within one hour after birth and 24-hour rooming in. These steps help improve a woman's chances of breastfeeding both right away as well as long-term.

Foster Homes (aired 05/18/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – A desperate plea for more foster families after a major increase in children in Utah. Officials say the jump in kids may have something to do with a jump in drug use in the home. Thus, another 200 kids have come into the system, compared to last year. The viewer learns what they need to do to become a foster parent, to help find those children a home.

Feeding Therapy (aired 5/19/17 @7pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Whether it's because of a new flavor or a new texture, mealtime for some kids is simply not a positive experience. However, help is available and it's called feeding therapy. Kids who struggle transitioning to new textures have a chance of developing oral aversion and who later on become really picky eaters. Feeding therapy is for children with many different eating struggles but can help make mealtime a more positive experience for both baby as well as the parents.

Pearl Harbor Remains Returned (aired 05/25/2017 @7pm, 2 minutes) – Today is a very special morning for one Utah family, who is being reunited with the remains of a relative that died in the attack on Pearl Harbor. Through the advancement of new DNA technology, the U.S. navy has identified 1st Class sailor, Elliot Dean Larson. Relative Lisa King was at the Salt Lake International airport to receive the delivery of her Uncle's remains. After 75 years the navy musician is finally returning home, just in time for Memorial Day. This features how the U.S. Navy is working to reunite local families with their missing relatives, and bring them some closure.

Developmental Specialists Help Late-Preterm Babies (aired 5/26/17 @7pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Babies born early often have some catching up to do. However, speech, physical, and occupational therapists can actually help babies with development starting from day one. Feeding challenges are common for late-preterm babies. This is where a team of specialists can help. They will analyze your child's feeding and make it easier for baby to eat. This can be done by using a shield to help baby latch and using a slower-flow bottle. Movement and sensory development are two other areas where specialists can help these babies.

Monroe Scheduled Burial (aired 05/28/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – A Pearl Harbor Veteran was laid to rest today, decades after it's believed he drowned back in 1941. His remains were finally identified and are on their way to Monroe, Utah where he was buried. His family re-created the memorial that was held for him 75 years ago, with the same talks and words shared. The viewer heard from family that shared the memories passed down through generations about Navy Musician 1st Class Elliott Dean Larsen.

Fort Douglas Memorial Day (aired 05/29/2017 @7pm, 1:30 minutes) – People marched from the Fort Douglas Military Museum at 32 Potter St. in Salt Lake City to the Fort Douglas Cemetery for Memorial Day. A ceremony was held following the march. The ceremony included a wreath laying, gun salute, "Taps" being played, memorial prayer and music.

Thoughtful Care Improves Patient Outcomes (aired 6/2/17 @7pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Some of the tests and checks a baby receives in the NICU are not always needed. That's why a system called "POKE" is aiming to change that and challenge caregivers to be more thoughtful. This doesn't mean babies don't need certain tests and checks, but sometimes tests are done because that's the way it's always been done. Now, providers are challenged to question and be able to justify every single "POKE"

which results in more thoughtful care and better patient outcomes.

Protect Baby from Summer Heat (aired 6/9/17 @7pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Summertime means parents need to take a few extra precautions to keep their little ones safe and healthy. When temperatures are over 90 degrees it's a good idea to keep baby inside. You also want to avoid the sun between the hours of 10 and 2. Dress baby in lightweight, cotton clothing with long sleeves and long pants. This keeps baby cool while also protecting them from the sun. Expect your baby to eat more than normal. Hydration is important for babies just as it is for adults. However, the only way babies stay hydrated is with breastmilk or formula.

Wee Care Kits (aired 6/14/2017 @7pm for 1 minute, 30 seconds) - A 13-year-old St. George girl is creating a distraction for children in the region who have been or will be involved in terrible, traumatic situations. Brindee Heaton started a service project called Wee Care Kits. The kits are filled with gifts and given to kids dealing with a rough time. But each of these bags cost about eight dollars to put together, so she had to find a way to raise money. One idea was to sell cinnamon rolls. Little did she know it would make every penny she needed -- and more. All those sweet treats made her \$1,000 and she was able to make 95 Wee Care Kits, handing them out to local organizations like the Children's Justice Center and St. George Police Department.

Books for Baby (aired 6/16/17 at 5 p.m. Runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Studies show babies who are read to as infants have better literacy skills later in childhood. This is why reading to newborns is so important for their long-term development. Babies learn how to listen and begin to recognize sounds from the day they are born. This is why the Salt Lake County Library system and Intermountain have paired together to give a book to every new mom who gives birth. The books are filled with nursery rhymes, colorful pictures, and some tips for parents. The kit also includes an invitation for your child to get their very own library card.

Simply Birth Suites (aired 6/23/17 @7pm runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Expecting mothers have many choices when deciding how and where they would like to give birth. One option is Simply Birth Suites. These rooms feel more like a hotel room than a hospital but still provide the safety of a hospital that a home birth would not. In this room, women have many options and are able to choose how they labor. This option is for women with a low-risk pregnancy, who have not had any complications, and who are planning to un medicated.

Cancer Anniversary Donation (aired 4/6/2017 @7pm, 1:40 minutes) Izzy Abernethy knows what it's like to be stuck in the hospital. She was diagnosed with kidney cancer when she was just four years old. She is cancer free, but is now giving back to Primary Children's Hospital, where she received treatment. She and her mother are collecting fun items for current patients at Primary Children's. She has been doing the fundraiser for nearly six years now. She donates the items on or around April 11th, her cancer-free anniversary. Mountain America Credit Union donated \$500 to help Izzy buy more fun items like nail polish and Play-Doh for Primary Children's Hospital.

Buddy Bench Fundraiser (aired 4/13/2017 @7pm, 1:40 minutes) Making friends at a new school can be difficult and even lonely for some children. So a group of young girls at Hawthorn Academy in West Jordan are working to help their classmates find friends on the playground. Every Tuesday after school, the girls set up a store and sell things like pens, pencils and toys. Everything is five dollars and under. They're hoping to raise \$5,000 for a "buddy bench" for their playground. If someone needs new friends during recess, they'll be able to sit on the bench as a signal for people to invite them to play. The store, and the idea for the bench, has been quite popular with the students at Hawthorn Academy. Mountain America Credit Union donated \$500 to help the girls get closer to their goal.

4 Paws 4 Patriots (aired 4/20/2017 @7pm, 1:45 minutes) The organization, 4 Paws 4 Patriots, is giving veterans and first responders help to getting to a normal way of life. The group connects veterans, police officers, firefighters, 911 dispatchers, and corrections officers with service dogs, free of charge. James Mann founded the Utah chapter of 4 Paws 4 Patriots. He is a veteran who needed a service dog to help with his PTSD. He had a hard time finding the help he needed, and found out about 4 Paws 4 Patriots. The organization not only gives the service dogs for free, they also have experts teach the veterans and first responders training skills with their animals. We attended one of these training classes, and talked to a veteran who has benefited from the program. Mountain America Credit Union donated \$500 to 4 Paws 4 Patriots to help them with costs of taking care of the animals and more.

Lunches of Love (aired 4/27/2017 @7pm, 1:45 minutes) Members of the First Baptist Church in Salt Lake City have made it their mission to help homeless youth. After church every Sunday, members gather together what they call "Lunches of Love." They make about 50 bag lunches per week that are delivered to the Volunteer of America's Youth Resource center for Homeless Teens. All of the food and supplies for Lunches of Love are provided by church members. They even donate the bread as part of their communion services once a month. Mountain America Credit Union donated \$500 to help First Baptist Church members make more lunches.

Viewmont Scholarships (aired 5/4/2017 @7pm, 1:45 minutes) A senior at Viewmont High School wants all of her classmates to be able to afford to go to college. Whitney Holman got her entire school involved in an effort to fund nine scholarships for Viewmont students. Instead of basing the scholarships on grades or sports, she wanted

them to be based on character. Students and teachers nominated potential recipients who were invited to write an essay. Teachers are helping Holman score the final essays and find the final recipients for the scholarships. According to school administrators, the scholarships have really brought the school together. Administrators and Holman hope the scholarships can continue past her graduation. Holman's goal was to raise \$1,000 for each scholarship. Mountain America Credit Union donated \$500 to help her reach that goal.

Dolls of Hope (aired 5/11/2017 @7pm, 1:45 minutes) A Utah County woman is spreading hope to refugees around the world. Sarah Parson makes stuffed dolls and bears to send to children waiting at refugee camps in places like Greece. She ships and bears and dolls to the camps herself, or gives the items to other humanitarian groups helping out the refugees. She has always been passionate about helping refugees and doing humanitarian work, but when she heard about the conditions of many of the refugee camps, she knew she had to do something for the children. She is calling her efforts Dolls of Hope. Parson made the dolls on her own at first, but eventually asked for help. Now several people around Utah are sewing the stuffed creations. There are even people sewing in different parts of the country, even the world. Getting the materials for the bears and dolls, and especially the shipping, can get pricey. Mountain America Credit Union donated \$500 to help Dolls of Hope out.

Tooele Community Closet (aired 5/18/2017 @7pm, 1:40 minutes) Many families in Tooele County are living in poverty, even to the point of homelessness. So the Tooele County School District is doing its part to help students and their families who are struggling. Christy Johnson is the one in charge of community outreach for the district, and helps a student in need every day. Her office is filled with shoes, clothes, and hygiene supplies to give to students all over the district. A big part of her efforts is a back-to-school closet she organizes for Tooele County families. Parents can pick up clothes, shoes and backpacks all for free. Hundreds of families attend. The Tooele Community Closet is in need of a lot of items for the next school year to meet all the needy families' wishes. Mountain America Credit Union donated \$500 to help them buy any necessities they need to provide for this summer's event.

For the Love of Z (aired 5/25/2017 @7pm, 1:45 minutes) A young Utah woman is doing her part to raise awareness of childhood cancer and help families who are facing that battle. Nicole Gaines has had two nieces with cancer. One of them was three years old when she passed away. So Gaines started For the Love of Z and sews items like masks, pillowcases, blankets, and more to give to children who are battling cancer. She also holds online auctions to raise money to give to families whose children have cancer. She one day dreams of turning For the Love of Z into a full-blown charity one day, so she can do even more to help fight childhood cancer. Mountain America Credit Union donated \$500 to Gaines to help her in her efforts.

Homeless Tai Chi (aired 6/1/2017 @7pm, 1:45 minutes) A Utah couple has a unique approach to helping the homeless population in Utah—tai chi. Bernard and Marita Hart started the group called Understanding Us. They host the free tai chi classes outside the

Salt Lake City Public Library three days a week. The Harts worked with children who have autism, and found that tai chi could help calm their nerves. So they decided to try the practice with the homeless population. We talked to several of the homeless participants, who tell us that the tai chi has helped them find peace and balance. In addition to the tai chi, the Harts also provide free burritos, coffee, and even a couple of dollars each to the participants. Mountain America Credit Union donated \$500 to help them continue hosting the free tai chi sessions.

Nellie's Service Projects (aired 6/8/2017 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) Nellie Mainor spends a lot of time at Primary Children's Hospital. She has a rare kidney disease called Dense Deposit Disorder, which requires her to get dialysis treatments several times a week. She also has a blood disorder. So she has several activities to do while she waits hours during her treatments at the hospital. One of her favorite things to do is help people. So she often works on service projects during treatment. This month, she is working on Father's Day cards to give to people at the hospital. She made Mother's Day cards last year and hopes to do a blood drive next month. For her first service project, she collected hundreds of toys that she gave to the hospital's patients. Mountain America Credit Union donated \$500 to Nellie to help her with her future service projects.

Donation for Emerson (aired 6/15/2017 @7pm, 1:45 minutes) June 21st is an important day for Jen Beckstrand and her family. That's the day her daughter, Emerson, was born. Unfortunately, she was stillborn. When Beckstrand and her husband had to go back to the hospital to deliver the stillborn baby, she didn't bring any clothes or blankets to wrap Emerson in so she could hold her for a few hours. A nurse bought an outfit and blanket for the Beckstrands. They still have the outfit. And in honor of that kind act and in honor of Emerson, the Beckstrands collect outfits and blankets to donate to Orem Community Hospital, where Emerson was delivered. They bring the clothes to the hospital every June 21st. This year will be their fourth donation. Mountain America Credit Union donated \$500 to the Beckstrands to help them make this year's donation their biggest.

INSIDE THE STORY

** This franchise presents special stories from our community that highlight citizens making a difference in their own way.

Antarctica Trip (aired 4/5/2017 @7pm, 3:00 minutes) A science teacher at Timpanogos High School is very passionate about biology and animals. So passionate that he traveled thousands of miles to Antarctica to learn about them. Josh Heward was chosen from a pool of hundreds of applicants to join Polar Trec and study for one month in Antarctica. The team was made up about a dozen researchers and teachers from across the country to study animal life. They studied microscopic animals that live in the ground, called tardigrades. Heward documented his research and activities, and also did a variety of Skype interviews to schools across the country during his time in Antarctica. The goal now is to bring all that he's learned out in the field into the classroom, where he is bringing the research to life for his students.

The Void (aired 4/7/2017 @7pm, 3:30 minutes) A make-believe world is coming to life in a building in Lindon, Utah. It's all thanks to the latest in virtual reality technology, called "The Void." In The Void, you are immersed into another world. All you need is a pair of goggles and a vest. In our story, we showed viewers how it all worked. The Void was three years in the making. The virtual reality experience opened its first location in New York City in May of last year, and the second location opened in Dubai. The third one will be right in Utah County. We talked to creators about how it all came about and developed over the years.

Video Store (aired 4/19/2017 @7pm, 3:10 minutes) It may seem odd that Leon Larsen uses a 30-year-old computer and printer to run his business. But it makes more sense when you realize his business is a video store. Larsen Video is one of few surviving video stores. The secret to the store's longevity according to Larsen is customer service and no debt. Larsen Video opened in 1987, a time when video stores were booming. But as the digital age came to life, many video stores started to close down, including Blockbuster and Hollywood Video locations. It still costs the same amount of money to rent a movie today as it did 30 years ago.

Master Barber (aired 4/21/2017 @7pm, 3:10 minutes) The Barber School in Midvale has become a popular teaching ground for dozens of students wanting to learn how to cut hair, shave, and more. And the man sharing his trade secrets is 90-year-old Tim Hite, who still shows up to work every day. Hite grew up with a fascination for barbering, and attended barber school with icons like Paul Mitchel and Vidal Sassoon. He has won numerous awards and was running 14 different salons at one time. But his real love is teaching, which is why he opened The Barber School. In our story, he demonstrated some of his favorite techniques and gave some advice to those who may be interested in becoming a barber. He plans to keep teaching as long as possible.

Aquarium Yoga (aired 4/26/2017 @7pm, 2:45 minutes) A new class is offering people the chance to meditate surrounded by sharks. "Yoga with the Sharks" comes once a month to the Living Planet Aquarium's shark tank every month. And if the sharks aren't interesting enough, yogis can also do yoga in the aquarium's rainforest area. We attended both sessions and talked with Amanda Jones, who came up with the idea to do yoga surrounded by the creatures. It was born out of trying to cope with post-partum depression. The yoga sessions have become quite popular at the aquarium, and tickets for the events have been going fast.

Drumtastic (aired 4/28/2017 @7pm, 2:50 minutes) Students at Terra Linda Elementary School in West Jordan are participating in a gym class that is actually six classes built into one. It's called "Drumtastic," and it involves drum sticks and a giant exercise ball. In our story, we followed the creator Carrie Ekins as she conducted the high-energy class. She noticed that drumming helped her after an injury, and decided to apply the technique to kids. Research on the program so far has shown that this drumming class has helped kids perform better in the classroom, and behave better as well. Teachers are also being trained in the ways of Drumtastic, so they can use the drumming during

class to help kids who are having trouble focusing. It's a pilot program being used by the elementary school to see just how well Drumtastic works.

Swimming Ministry (aired 5/4/2017 @7pm, 2:45 minutes) Tragedy at a reservoir led to healing at a recreation center for a Methodist church in Kearns. In June of last year, Penoni "Noni" Mouna drowned while swimming across Blackridge Reservoir during a church activity. After the tragedy, the church's pastor, Rob Bruendl, decided to teach his members how to swim. He calls it Swimming for Noni. He now teaches his flock to swim at the Kearns Oquirrh Park Fitness Center every week. He hopes that those he's teaching to swim can begin to help others learn how to swim. The U.S. Masters Swimming Association heard about Bruendl's efforts and is giving him a grant to run his swimming program.

Baseball Triplets (aired 5/11/2017 @7pm, 3:00 minutes) Every team that faces Herriman High School's varsity baseball team is coming up against a triple threat—three brothers who play on the team. Not only are Ashton, Baylor, and Cole Rich brothers; they're triplets. The so-called "Richlets" are very competitive in everything they do, especially when it comes to sports. But that competitive spirit paid off when all three boys made the baseball team when they were freshman at Herriman High. We attended baseball practice and a game to catch the triplets in action. They are now seniors in high school and will soon be leaving the nest. All three hope to play baseball at a college level.

Graduation Video (aired 5/18/2017 @7pm, 2:50 minutes) Two high school seniors have set out to make the ultimate, epic video for graduation day. Megan Quinn and Fayth Melton are trying to interview every student in the class of 2017 before graduation. That means the student body officers are trying to talk to 825 students. They asked each senior the same questions to figure out how they felt about their high school experience. It's something that hasn't been done at Herriman High before. And in order to accomplish that task, Quinn and Melton had to interview about 75 kids every other day. After each interview session, the students had to get to editing. The video project was pitched to the girls back in December and were asked to interview just a handful of students. But they decided they wanted to hear from everyone in the class. They hope to play the video while people are getting seated for Herriman High's graduation ceremony and then again at the 10-year class reunion.

One Heart Bulgaria (aired 5/25/2017 @7pm, 2:45 minutes) A woman in a small, northern Utah town is helping to save the lives of thousands of kids in another part of the world Deborah Dushku Brailsford runs One Heart Bulgaria. Right now, the non-profit is providing humanitarian aid to 28 different orphanages in Bulgaria. The idea for the organization came to Brailsford when she was serving an LDS mission in the country during the 90s. One Heart Bulgaria does more than just provide supplies like blankets, diapers and medicine. They also give the kids opportunities for activities like karate, singing and dancing instruction, and other educational opportunities. When we did the story, the group was preparing for one of its medical missions for next month.

STEM Bus (aired 6/1/2017 @7pm, 2:45 minutes) A high school program in Park City is giving some serious hands-on experience for students by connecting them to the business world. It's called the PCCAPS program, which stands for the Park City Center for Advanced Professional Studies. Students in the program have helped design buildings, kids' toys, and more. In our story, we featured a group of students who helped design a mobile classroom made out of a school bus for the Utah STEM Foundation. In PCCAPS, professionals mentor and assist the students with their designs. Right now, there are five different classes in the program with more than 100 students enrolled.

Tree Climbing (aired 6/8/2017 @7pm, 2:50 minutes) The best of the best in Utah are getting ready for the Tree Climbing Championship this weekend. The competition features the best tree climbers and arborists in the state competing for the coveted title of "Master Climber." In our story, we followed a group of tree climbers training for the competition. They demonstrated each event, which includes the secure foot lock, aerial rescue, work climb, throw line, and belayed speed climb events. We also gave information on when the competition was taking place.

War Hero (aired 6/15/2017 @7pm, 2:45 minutes) A World War II veteran knows all too well the cost of freedom. 93-year-old John Delliskave, or "Pops," can often be found in his workshop. He has some amazing woodworking skills, and builds things like puzzles. He has six children, 19 grandchildren, and 58 great-grandchildren. In our story, Delliskave reflected on his past. He fought in the Battle of Iwo Jima—one of thousands of U.S. Marines who stormed the beaches in February 1945. Delliskave was one of only eight in his platoon who survived the battle. His service to his country hasn't gone unnoticed. He was honored during a Utah Jazz game and also recently traveled to Washington, D.C. with 50 other veterans as part of Utah's Honor Flight.

Sheri Dew (aired 4/3/2017 @7pm, 3:45 minutes) Sheri Dew is the CEO of Deseret Book and the Executive Vice President of Deseret Management Corporation. She is also an author. Dew talked with Shauna Lake about her unexpected career path and life. When she graduated from college, she wanted to be a wife and a mother. But it still hasn't happened for her, which she told Shauna Lake was "deeply painful" for her. In her interview, she and Lake also discussed her latest book, which deals with "wrestling" to find answers to life's questions and problems.

Dell Loy Hansen (aired 4/10/2017 @7pm, 3:40 minutes) Dell Loy Hansen is the owner of Real Salt Lake. Hansen is an avid sports fan who is passionate about training the youth. So much so that he's working on several training facilities in Utah. Hansen has earned praise for his dedication to Real Salt Lake and the team's engagement with the community. He is also a busy businessman who loves to spend time with his family. He hopes his family and the work he has done with the community through RSL will be his legacy.

James Worthington (aired 4/17/2017 @7pm, 3:40 minutes) James Worthington is the CEO of Kneaders, a popular café chain based in Utah. His parents founded Kneaders, so he has been with the company since it began. That means he has had nearly every job in the restaurant. Worthington is also behind one of Kneaders' most popular recipes—its French toast. He told Shauna Lake how he came up with it to impress the girls he met during college. He and Lake also discussed the importance of family both in his professional and personal life.

Ted Ligety (aired 4/24/2017 @7pm, 3:50 minutes) Ted Ligety is a Utah native who has won two Olympic gold medals in ski racing. Ligety told Shauna Lake he wasn't always a skiing star. He had to work hard to excel in the sport, but it definitely paid off. He won his first gold medal at 21 years old in the 2006 Torino Olympics. His next gold came eight years later in Sochi. Since then, he has suffered some setbacks and injuries. Last year, he blew out his knee and in January he decided to get back surgery. He is now working on his comeback for the 2018 Winter Games and is preparing to be a father after marrying his sweetheart two years ago.

Frank Abagnale (aired 5/1/2017 @7pm, 3:45 minutes) Frank Abagnale, Jr is the subject of the book, movie and musical, "Catch Me if You Can." His story of fraud, disguises, and scams is more known through the film directed by Steven Spielberg. Abagnale talked with Shauna Lake about seeing his story come to life on the big screen. The confidence to commit his crimes came just from being an adolescent, according to Abagnale. What he is most proud of is how he was able to turn his life around and work on the other side of the law. He has developed print technology that is used all over the world on car titles, birth certificates, money driver licenses, and more. He has also developed technology and software now used by banks.

T.C. Christensen (aired 5/8/2017 @7pm, 3:40 minutes) T.C. Christensen is a filmmaker who is behind movies like "17 Miracles" and "The Cokeville Miracle." His latest film, called "Love, Kennedy," is coming out next month. His films are typically family-friendly, inspirational stories—which is what he wants. Christensen told Shauna Lake he got interested in film at a young age and has done just about every job in the film industry. And even though he loves each of his movies, he believes that your last film should be your best.

Conrad Anker (aired 5/15/2017 @7pm, 3:30 minutes) Conrad Anker is a mountain climber who has summited Mt. Everest, Mt. Kilimanjaro, Meru and more. He is a graduate of the University of Utah, and recently returned to the school to give this year's commencement address. Anker has had many memorable experiences during his years of mountain climbing—some of them tragic. He lost his climbing partner in an avalanche in 1999. Anker eventually married his friend's widow and adopted his three sons. In the past few years, he also greatly pared down his adventuring. Last year, he suffered a heart attack while climbing at 20,000 feet in Nepal. He will keep doing some climbing, but has plans to get a master's degree in geography.

Jackie Joyner-Kersee (aired 5/22/2017 @7pm, 3:45 minutes) Jackie Joyner-Kersee is a six-time Olympic medalist who still holds the world heptathlon record she set over 20 years ago. She was recently in Utah to speak at a Boys and Girls Club gala. The Boys and Girls Club is a cause close to her heart. She attended one as a young girl in Illinois and opened up her own community center when she was older. While she was young, she also developed a real talent for athletics through hard work and dedication. She also discussed with Shauna Lake her marriage to her coach, Bob Kersee. She described what it was like to be married and have that coach-athlete relationship.

Michael Ballam (aired 5/29/2017 @7pm, 3:45 minutes) Opera singer Michael Ballam is the founder and general director of the Utah Festival Opera. He also recently hosted the Utah High School Musical Theatre Awards. He has performed on some of the biggest stages in the world, but he couldn't have done it without the support from his family. He told Shauna Lake how he slowly gained that support from his father and recounts the time where he knew his father was proud of him and cared about his career. Ballam also discussed the thrill of being on stage, and why he feels safe there.

Steve Starks (aired 6/5/2017 @7pm, 3:30 minutes) Steve Starks is the president of the Utah Jazz, which just finished a great season. His journey to the Jazz all began with a relationship with Larry Miller. Miller saw something special in Starks, and essentially asked him to put off business school to work for him. Starks talked with Shauna Lake about his humble upbringing, where he learned not to take things for granted. He is also now raising his own family, and hopes to be a good father to his three daughters. He told Lake his hopes for the future—especially an NBA championship title for the Utah Jazz.

Lauren Wilson (aired 6/12/2017 @7pm, 3:45 minutes) Lauren Wilson is Miss Utah 2016. She is giving up her crown later this month. She told Shauna Lake she didn't always aspire to wear that crown. She was a self-described "tom boy" who typically wore t-shirts and jeans. When she decided to get into the pageant scene, she had to learn to walk in heels and even get makeup lessons. Her platform is something very close to her heart. Two days before her first orientation meeting for Miss Pleasant Grove, her best friend took her own life. So she decided to run on the platform of suicide awareness and prevention. She has spent the last year educating others about the warning signs of suicide and resources to get help. Wilson also shared what it meant to her to compete in the Miss America pageant and what she's planning to do next.

Kristen Ries (aired 6/19/2017 @7pm, 3:45 minutes) Dr. Kristen Ries was on the forefront of the HIV/AIDS epidemic in Utah. She was the first doctor who would treat patients with the disease. She reflected with Shauna Lake about the time when epidemic began and the social stigma that surrounded the disease. Ries and her partner, Maggie Snyder, would work all day and night to treat patients—not only in their clinic, but at patients' homes as well. Ries recalls how the gay community was ostracized because of the disease. She is gay herself, so she had empathy for what many of them were going through. Ries said she got her desire to help others from her parents, who were Quakers and raised her on a farm in Pennsylvania.
