Broadcast Date: July 1, 2019

Description: Traffic Sign for Busy Crosswalk

SCDOT puts up new HAWK (High-Intensity Activated Crosswalk) on Millwood Ave and House St. that will help people cross the road safely. These crosswalks feature signals in the form or stoplights that are not activated unless a pedestrian presses the button. like on typical cross-walk signals, and the stoplight will activate beginning as a red light, and gradually progresses through a yellow light, to inactive again.

Description: DUI Warnings ahead of Independence Day

Public officials say not to drink and drive. WACH aired an interview with a man who lost his grandfather and brother after two separate drunk driving incidents. At the time SC ranked in the top 10 for the most fatalities involving impaired drivers.

Description: I-77 Construction after not matching Safety Standards

After being found not in compliance with modern safety standards, Highway 277-N was closed near the I-77 bridge. The bridge will be closed as updates are made and it until it is in accordance with all current safety standards and regulations. It was announced to be finished August 2020.

Description: HP Labor Day Warnings

Labor Day ends the 100 Deadly Days of Summer. Highway Patrol warned that they would be out in full force over the weekend. In 2018, 11 people died during the Labor Day weekend in the state. HP said don't drink and drive and follow the rules of the road.

Description: Preparing for Hurricane Dorian

Information was aired as both on-screen text as well as a voice over about the ways people could prepare their homes ahead of the impending hurricane. Tips included boarding up windows, securing shutters, and more.

Description: Sumter NAACP talks School Consolidation

The Sumter Chapter of the NAACP met about consolidating two schools in Sumter district. One school has no lockers, unfulfilled, much-needed specialist positions, in addition to many other issues. Parents met and voiced their concerns about the consolidation of schools. The community eventually voted and will allow the Sumter NAACP Chapter to help with the issues.

Description: Memorial for Murdered Transgender Woman in North Charleston

A vigil was held in memory of a transgender woman that was fatally shot in North Charleston. Activists called for a hatecrime bill to be passed as South Carolina is one of only five states in the nation without one.

Description: Residents of Low-Income Area Forced out due to Carbon Monoxide

Residents at Allen Benedict Court had to leave their homes quickly due to carbon monoxide poisoning from several gas leaks. More than 400 people had to evacuate, and those residents had to find new places to live. Many organizations and individuals throughout the community are organizing fundraisers and other ways to help those affected by the evacuations.

Description: Spanish-Speaking Hotline

After a double homicide in Sumter, police set up a hotline for Spanish-speaking residents. It is believed the victims were targeted because of their race. The new hotline will allow many more residents to gain access to help and protection without the language barrier they may have faced in the past. The hotline number was mentioned and shown on air multiple times, as well as posted on the station website along with the story.

A building in North Charleston became a safe space to hang out and fight hate in the low country. FBI says attacks are up on the LGBT community from 2016-2017.

Farmers in the state began to prepare for the severe damages and costs to their farms. We interviewed an Alpaca Farm that was doing what they could to reinforce fencing and other structures to keep the animals safe from high speed winds and flooding.

Description: SC School of Law Tuition Drop

The tuition for the only public law school in the state set to drop in 2020. Officials said in-state tuition for USC School of Law would decrease by more than \$5,000 in 2020.

Description: USC to Vote on President

At this point in the year, the USC Board of Trustees was still struggling to pick a president to replace Harris Pastides. Bob Caslen was being considered even after student protests about his remarks on sexual assault and alcohol abuse.

Description: Volkswagen Settlement Buys Buses

Volkswagen had to pay the state \$34 million. Governor McMaster and State Superintendent Molly Spearman announced that more than \$9 million was going to pay for 78 new school buses and 3 public transit buses.

After two mass shootings occur in the country in a short period of time, schools try to prepare themselves. As the government does not plan on changing gun laws, tips for students are spread. Description: HPV Vaccines

CDC releases new recommendations on HPV vaccinations that add more age categories that should vaccinate. HPV spreads through sex and can lead to 6 different cancers. CDC says men and women 26-45 should talk to their doctors about vaccinating.

Description: Babies left in hot cars

Florence County investigators had to break through a window to get to a baby left in a car by her mother. The child was saved, and the mother was charged with Unlawful Child Neglect. Officials said 18 children were left in hot cars since the beginning of 2019. WACH shared helpful reminders to avoid unintentionally forgetting children in the back seat, as well as information on what to do if you find a child that has been left in a vehicle.

DHEC announces 5 people could have been exposed to rabies in Jasper County from a cat that tested positive. The exposure occurred over a few weeks' time in Ridgeland. Cat was second animal to test positive in Jasper since January.

Description: Agent Orange Victims demand disability

Thousands of people who were exposed to Agent Orange in the Vietnam War, including veterans, were asking to receive disability benefits. Interview of a woman whose husband was exposed and later died from a disease that doctors say was caused by the exposure. Officials told WACH that victims do not have to prove exposure to receive benefits, victims say otherwise.

SC Attorney General Alan Wilson says he's going after three major opioid distributors who he says had a hand in the crisis in the state. The state was suing McKesson Corp., Cardinal Health and AmerisourceBergen Drug Corp. because 'they did not do a good enough job of monitoring and reporting distribution'.

An 8-year-old boy from Irmo became the first child in the US to get a cochlear implant for single-sided deafness. The boy lost his hearing when he was four and got the implant as part of a clinical trial done by UNC Chapel Hill.

Governor Henry McMaster vetoes \$27 million in budget items that he said lacked an explanation or justification. The General Assembly overrode those vetoes. The budget included millions of dollars for local parks and festivals and to restore historic buildings.
