It shows South Carolina Students are improving on Standardized Tests. The State Education Department reports more students met state standards in 2007 on PACT.

200 Lucky students at North Central High School in Kershaw County has laptops. The Superintendent helped start the I-Can Initiative. It provides wireless Laptops for both High School students and teacher's students and are thrilled to be able to take their laptops home. Kershaw County made it a priority to fund the project.

WACH NEWS AT TEN**9-14-07**

The University of South Carolina is celebrating the grand opening of their newly renovated Athletics Academic Center. Officials say the opening represents collaboration between the library and the Athletics Department. The Center has a computer lab, tutorial space and a large multi-purpose room. The Library and Athletics Department spent 250,000 dollars to renovate the space.

Blythewood Middle school's Annual Career Fair gives students the tools they need to enter the work force. Students learn about job requirements—helping them figure out what field they want to go into. Career counselor's say the event can change the direction some students are headed.
