Description: SC roadway deaths have increased so far in 2015. According to the latest South Carolina Department of Safety report, highway and state road deaths are up this year compared to last year at this time.

As of April 5th, 219 people have died on SC roadways, which are 26 more than at April 5 last year.

Clyburn said Wednesday that he has watched too many laws being passed and decided it was time to speak out.

John Matthews said the group called the "Elloree 21" is scheduled to be in the Senate chambers at 12:30 p.m. Tuesday.
