A new study of more than 14,000 middle aged men like David Kim of Columbia, shows that working out is beneficial to long term health even if there is no weight loss. Doctor Duckchool Lee of USC's Arnold School of Public Health is the Co-author of the study. He says it shows working out is never a waste of time. Dr. Lee stated that among the men who became active, about 80% of them maintained or increased their fitness level. The men who were less active and did not maintain their fitness were associated with a higher risk of death and changes in weight had nothing to do with it. Lee says that physical activity is the key factor in increasing or maintaining the proper fitness level for good long term health.
