Description: Drop in Homicides

Richland County Sheriff Leon Lott announced there was a 22% drop in homicides from 2018 to 2019. He also said deputies seized 855 guns off the streets. He said people should keep their firearms locked up and not left in a car.

Description: Coyote Dangers

During the cold seasons coyotes pose threats for pets. According to officials, male coyotes become aggressive toward male dogs because of mating competition. Officials warned people to keep their pets inside or watch them closely.

WACH ran a story about where the city Columbia gets its water from and how it is treated before coming into the taps. There are microplastics in our water and something called forever chemicals. The chemicals are not regulated by the government and can be harmful.

A ceremony was held in Columbia for a brand-new firetruck. According to organizers back in the day fire trucks had to be pushed sometimes by firefighters because the weight was too much for the horses to handle so they pushed the new truck during the ceremony. Broadcast Date: January 7, 2020

Source: Local

Description: Unity Against Hate

Groups called on state lawmakers to pass hate crime laws in South Carolina. Leaders from South Carolina's Black, Jewish, and interfaith communities came together at the State House after attacks on minority groups across the country. SC is one of the few states with no laws concerning hate crimes.

Description: RCSD Bags Groceries for a Cause

The Richland County Sheriff's Department spent the day bagging groceries with Special Olympics athletes. This was an effort to raise awareness and funds for the SC Special Olympics. RCSD partnered with Publix for this program. In 2019, Publix employees and customers donated \$4.8 million to the Special Olympics.

Description: Oliver Gospel Mission

Lay-Z-Boy of Columbia partners with Oliver Gospel Mission every year to raise money and donate slightly used furniture. The mission held a drive and raised around \$5,000 for the homeless in Columbia.

Description: Prison Reform

After lawmakers disputed over the distribution of a \$2 billion surplus, it was announced that more than \$100 million was earmarked for the Dept. of Corrections. According to officials, all state facilities have severe maintenance issues that contributed to riots. \$14.5 million was said to go to recruiting and retraining corrections officers.

Description: Church History

A church in Columbia was featured due to its involvement in a civil rights demonstration in 1961. During the demonstration students, including a now congressman, marched from the church to the State House in protest. The demonstration was about a law that was passed prohibiting the right to protest for African Americans people. 187 of the protestors were arrested for breach of peace; They then appealed to the Supreme Court and won. The State was ruled to be in violation of the groups' First Amendment rights.

Description: Woman rescued from Sex Trafficking

A woman was rescued from a house in Elgin after being drugged and held against her will by the homeowner. Officials say that deputies found the woman who said she was dropped off by her boyfriend to a man he owed money. Deputies found two other women in the house but they did not choose to press charges.

Description: Trans Athlete Bill

A group of lawmakers gathered to talk about a plan called 'Save Women's Sports Act'. The act is in response to a policy put in place in SC schools that allow transgender women to compete in women's sports. Lawmakers said it was unfair because biological males are stronger and are more likely to win against biological females.

Description: Students may have been Exposed to Coronavirus

Kershaw County School District announced that two students who interned in the emergency room where they may have been exposed to a woman admitted due to the virus. The two children were sent to Prisma Health to be treated and presumably tested. The students apparently had no direct contact but were quarantined as a precaution.

Richland One School District announced that five students were in indirect contact with a person being tested for coronavirus. The students ranged from elementary to high school aged. Parents were notified and the children were quarantined.

More than 170k households in South Carolina received extra money in benefits due to coronavirus. DSS funded \$30 million for another round of emergency food assistance. Description: Boating Education from Family

A family lost a father during a boating accident when a driver under-the-influence slammed into another boat. The family took the opportunity to try and educate people on boating safety and advocate for a mandatory boater education course for people seeking boating licenses.

The historically all-female Columbia College announced that they would begin allowing men to attend as early as Fall 2021. Some males returning from military service had been allowed to attend online or at night, however men have never been considered as full-time students before now.

A senior at AC Flora Hight School in Columbia was awarded \$5,000 for her 5.49 GPA. She was top of her class in addition to being a student-athlete as a member of the Varsity Golf team. The student also helped with fundraisers for children in her spare time.

Description: Food Waste

A study by state researchers found that schools were wasting food and classroom supplies across the state. Research found that between 35% and 50% of the food and supplies could have been recycled. The Dept. of Education said they were going to recommend ways to cut down on the waste.

Description: Education Bill passes Senate Approval

Description: Firefighter Amputee

After a man who had dreamed of being a firefighter lost his leg when he was hit by a drunk driver, he and his child were able to learn to walk together. He met a firefighter who was also an amputee and was encouraged to continue to strive for his goal. The man announced he would start firefighter training again in October 2020.

Doctors in the low-country began making progress toward establishing a burn center after almost 20 years without one following a budget approval by lawmakers. Farmers in SC were hesitant to farm hemp because of the false positive which if they got, the entire crop had to be destroyed.
