ISSUE: Higher Education Needs for Elderly and Disabled

PROGRAM TITLE: “What’s Up Utah”

AIR DATE/TIME: Broadcast April 1 – 10:30pm;

DURATION: Each broadcast is 30 minutes

SYNOPSIS:

This week on What’s Up Utah, host Greg Johnson, Greg interviewed Matt Holland, President of Utah Valley University. On this program, President Holland shared some of the exciting things about this University and what sets this school apart from the other Universities in Utah, and how UVU has become a strong influence into the community. UVU's Business Resource Center provides resources, information and assistance to help Utah's small businesses grow. UVU hosts a variety of community activities for children and adults, including athletics, fine arts, academics, and more. The Accessibility Services Department is committed to helping students with disabilities receive reasonable accommodations during their college experience at UVU. They provide a variety of services, software and equipment for students with a wide range of disabilities. Elder Quest provides member-driven programs that convey Utah Valley University's fundamental role of providing educational opportunities to our community. Elder Quest offers a wide range of classes for participants at all levels, showcasing innovative activities in current events, literature, humanities, history, arts, and social sciences.

ISSUE: Anti-Semitism

SYNOPSIS:

This week on What's Up Utah, which airs on Wednesday from 10:30pm to 11pm and Fridays from 7:00pm to 7:30pm, and features host Greg Johnson, Greg interviewed Randal Neal, of Christians United for Israel and how the growing anti-Israel voices have become a concern for the Jewish people and churches here in Utah. On this show, Mr. Neal discusses the details of this ministry (CUFI) which is the largest pro-Israel organization in the United States with over two million members and one of the leading Christian grassroots movements in the world. They discussed the situation of Israel and the Middle East and about the issues facing Israel. He spoke about how the Jewish people have a right to live in their ancient land of Israel without acts of terrorism, and that Israel has the same right as every other nation to defend her citizens from such violent until the attacks stop and they are finally living in peace and security with their neighbors.

ISSUE: Family Emphasis in Utah

SYNOPSIS:

This week on What's Up Utah, host Greg Johnson, Greg interviewed Stanford Swim, Chairman and Interim President of the Sutherland Institute. Sutherland Institute is a conservative public policy think tank committed to shaping Utah law and policy based on a core set of governing principles. The Institute's name is derived from George Sutherland, who was the first and only Utahn to have served on the Supreme Court of the United States. Because there is a strong emphasis on the family here in the state of Utah, Greg and Mr. Swim discussed the involvement in the Word Congress of Families, as well as the upcoming WCF Conference held in Salt Lake City this fall. WCF, which says it "affirms and defends the natural family as the fundamental unit of civilizations," will host its worldwide congress at the Grand America Hotel in Salt Lake City in October.

SYNOPSIS:

This week on What's Up Utah, which airs on Wednesday from 10:30pm to 11pm and Fridays from 7:00pm to 7:30pm, and features host Greg Johnson, Greg interviewed Kirk Jowers, Director of the Hinkley Institute of Politics. On this show, Mr. Jowers discussed some of his responsibilities in the Institute and his journey into this position. The nonpartisan Institute was one of the first of its kind in the nation. It was

founded with the mission to engage students in governmental, civic, and political processes; promote a better understanding and appreciation of politics; and train ethical and visionary students for public service. The Hinckley Institute annually sends approximately 150 students to Utah campaigns, government offices, and non-profit organizations. The Hinckley Institute boasts one of the longest-standing DC internship programs in the nation. It provides more than 100 students annually with full-time, paid, and housed internships.
