He's 53, just a few years older than President Trump's other pick, Judge Neil Gorsuch. Judge Kavanaugh will now spend time meeting with members of Congress and is expected to face some tough questioning on Capitol Hill as they prepare for confirmation hearings. Republican Senate leaders say they'd like to confirm him before the court's new term starts this fall, possibly holding a vote after Labor Day. This is the second time President Trump has filled an open seat on the court. Both former Presidents Barack Obama and Bill Clinton filled 2 seats as well.

Parts of Phoenix set a new record with 115 degree heat. In Houston automated calls went out warning of the oppressive temperatures. Heat advisories are in effect in Texas and New Mexico. Firefighters struggling too, dozens of big wildfires throughout the West – a fire near Yosemite National Park is growing and threatening thousands of buildings. Part of Yosemite National Park will be closed starting tomorrow at noon for several days as firefighters fight a huge wildfire. Tourists, residents and some employees at Yosemite National Park are being asked to leave due to smoke. State Route 41 before tunnel view will be closed starting tomorrow as firefighters work to contain the Ferguson fire. The fire has taken the life of one firefighter and has injured 6 others. Things are very different in the East – more than 20 million under flood watches from the Carolinas to Maine. Lives being lost in hot cars – on track to set a record this year.

President Trump called is a new phase in European relations. The Department of Agriculture says it'll borrow 12-billion-dollars from the U.S. treasury to pay soybean, corn, wheat and hog farmers who stand to lose money because of stiff tariffs. The Ag Department will also buy surplus commodities and give them to food banks and other nutrition programs.
