Teens who get less sleep are more likely to engage in risky and suicidal behavior, according to a new study. Researchers used data from the youth risk behavior survey from 2007 to 2015, which explored behaviors related to health risks in American youth. They found teens who slept for less than six hours per night were three times more likely to consider suicide, plan a suicide or attempt suicide, compared to teens who slept eight hours or more.
<b><u>HEALTH:</u></b> CDC ADULTS FAST FOOD	DESPIERT A AMERICA	10/03/18	Study: 1 in 3 US adults eat fast food each day: A government study has found that 1 in 3 US adults eat fast food on any given day. That's about 85 million people. It's the first federal study to look at how often adults eat fast food. An earlier study found a similar proportion of children and adolescents ate it on any given day. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention released the numbers Wednesday. It's based on a survey of about 10,000 adults over four years. The study did not find a difference between men and women. But higher-income families ate fast food more often than lower-income families, and blacks ate it more than other racial or ethnic groups.

The Trump administration issued a new policy effective Monday, in which domestic partners of foreign diplomats and United Nations officials posted in the United States must show the State Department proof of marriage by December 31, or leave the country within 30 days. This means that same-sex partners of foreign staffers who are not legally married will no longer be eligible for a spousal visa allowing them to remain in the U.S. This reverses a State Department policy allowing for visas to be issued to same-sex partners put in place in 2009 under the Obama administration, when Hillary Clinton was Secretary of State.
<b><u>IMMIGRATION:</u></b> TPS VICTORY	DESPIERT A AMERICA	10/04/18	Judge Halts Termination of Temporary Protected Status for El Salvador, Haiti, Nicaragua, Sudan. California Federal Judge Edward M. Chen has issued a nationwide preliminary injunction in Ramos v. Nielsen, preventing the Administration from implementing its decisions to terminate Temporary Protected Status (TPS) for El Salvador, Haiti, Nicaragua, and Sudan, pending final resolution of the case. This may be particularly good news for Sudanese TPS beneficiaries whose status is scheduled to be terminated in less than a month, on November 2, 2018. The others are scheduled to terminate on January 5, 2019 (Nicaragua), July 22, 2019 (Haiti), and September 9, 2019 (El Salvador).
<b><u>HEALTH:</u></b> CALIFORNIA POOL SICKENS KIDS	DESPIERT A AMERICA	10/04/18	Authorities say 18 people including children have been sickened - seven critically - by exposure to chemicals at a Southern California swimming pool. The Ventura County Fire Department says authorities were called to Daland Swim School in Thousand Oaks Wednesday evening after several people reported they were having trouble breathing. Seven people were listed in critical condition and 11 were said to have been moderately affected. There's no word on the type of pool chemicals involved. Although it's far lower than the almost 700,000 people who died in the U.S. during the so-called Spanish flu pandemic that hit worldwide 100 years ago, last season was a "record-breaking" death toll, the highest since at least the late 1970s, according to the CDC.

Researchers in Spain found that children who cleaned their hands with sanitizer instead of soap and water reduced their missed days of school, respiratory infections and antibiotic prescriptions. Researchers studied 911 children up to age 3 who attended 24 day care centers in Almería, Spain. They split the children, their families and their day care centers into three groups: One group used hand sanitizer to clean hands, and one used soap and water, both with strict protocols about hygiene. A third, the control group, followed its usual hand-washing routines.

Those who hit the sack at roughly the same time each night were four times more likely to conceive within a year. Experts believe the body clock - linked to several diseases via disruptive sleep patterns - may play a role in fertility. US researchers asked 176 women -trying to get pregnant to wear a smartwatch that monitored activity levels. There was a four-fold rise in conception in a year for those who went to bed in the same hour timeframe each night. Women turning in within the same 90-minute period were more than twice as likely to get pregnant, according to the study from Washington University in St Louis.

U.S. District Judge Dana Sabraw, considering a request for a temporary restraining order in a case transferred from the District of Columbia, said an order he issued three weeks ago prohibiting the government from removing reunified families from the United States before they've had a chance to discuss their immigration status is still in effect for both cases.

The Army began booting out those enlistees last year without explanation.

While most children are receiving recommended immunizations, the number of children who aren't being vaccinated by 24-months-old has been gradually increasing, a report released Thursday by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention says. Uninsured and Medicaid-insured children were less likely to be vaccinated, according to the 2017 survey. The survey used data from the 2017 National Immunization Survey-Child and focused on children ages 19- to 35-months-old. Since 2001, the percentage of unvaccinated babies and toddlers quadrupled from 0.3 percent to 1.3 percent in 2015.
<b><u>MONEY:</u></b> SOCIAL SECURITY CHECKS	DESPIERT A AMERICA	<b>10/12/18</b>	Tens of millions of Social Security recipients and other retirees will get a 2.8 percent boost in benefits next year as inflation edges higher. Following a stretch of low inflation, the cost-of-living adjustment, or COLA, for 2019 is the highest in seven years. It amounts to \$39 a month for the average retired worker, according to estimates released Thursday by the Social Security Administration. The COLA affects household budgets for about one in five Americans, including Social Security beneficiaries, disabled veterans and federal retirees. Cases have been reported in 22 states, including some in our area. New Jersey has three confirmed, and three more are suspected. New York has none confirmed, but two are under investigation. Health officials urge parents to be vigilant, as there's a lot unknown about the syndrome and what causes it. Health experts say acute flaccid myelitis, or AFM, is a polio-like syndrome that affects the nervous system, specifically the spinal cord. Muscles and reflexes are weakened, and some patients are left paralyzed.
<b><u>HEALTH:</u></b> FLU SHOT	DESPIERT A AMERICA	10/17/18	Fall has arrived, and so has the annual flu season. While flu - or influenza - is most serious for older Americans and people with certain chronic conditions, influenza can affect people of all ages and lead to hospitalizations, significant health complications and even death. The peak months are December through February. The investigation has so far found that the contaminated chicken products have come from different brands and various locations, and is not linked to any specific company. There have been 21 reported hospitalizations, and zero deaths from the chicken, and the salmonella strain has been resistant to multiple antibiotics.
<b><u>HEALTH:</u></b> FERTILITY RATES DROPPING	DESPIERT A AMERICA	<b>10/19/18</b>	Fertility rates in the U.S. have dropped significantly over the past decade as first-time mothers have grown older on average, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). The CDC's data also show differences between rural and metropolitan communities widened between 2007 and 2017. Fertility rates dropped by 12 percent in rural areas, 16 percent in small- or medium-sized metropolitan areas, and 18 percent in large cities, the CDC reported. Meanwhile, the mean age of first-time mothers rose by 1.3 years in rural areas and 1.8 years in large cities. The mean for first-time mothers in rural counties was 24.5 years old in 2017, compared to 27.7 in large cities. These findings track with research that shows rural areas tend to have higher fertility rates and younger mothers.

In addition to its Dinuba headquarters, Ruiz Food Products also has facilities in Denison, Texas, and Florence, South Carolina.

On Tuesday the New Jersey Department of Health announced the death of six pediatric residents at the center and the infection of 12 additional residents. Wednesday the department announced an additional pediatric death. The New Jersey Department of Health said it's an ongoing outbreak investigation and workers were at the facility Tuesday. A team at the facility on Sunday found minor handwashing deficiencies.
<b><u>IMMIGRATION:</u></b> AMAZON ICE	DESPIERT A AMERICA	10/25/18	At a time when Big Tech is under attack for cooperating with military and police, Amazon is facing scrutiny for marketing its surveillance software to U.S. immigration officials. Amazon has confirmed that it met with Immigration and Customs Enforcement in Silicon Valley over the summer to discuss Rekognition, its controversial facial recognition software. Emails obtained by a watchdog group show that Amazon followed up in an apparent attempt to close a sale of the technology.
<b><u>HEALTH:</u></b> FDA FLU DRUG	DESPIERT A AMERICA	10/25/18	For the first time in two decades, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration has approved a new type of antiviral flu drug. The single oral dose of Xofluza (baloxavir marboxil) is for the treatment of uncomplicated flu in patients aged 12 and older who have had symptoms for no more than 48 hours. When used within 48 hours of getting sick with the flu, antiviral drugs can reduce symptoms and duration of the illness, according to the FDA.
<b><u>HEALTH:</u></b> HONEY SMACKS SALMONELLA	DESPIERT A AMERICA	10/25/18	Kellogg's Honey Smacks is returning to shelves with a new recipe following a voluntary recall after salmonella infected 100 people in 33 states. The company announced on Monday the cereal will return next month in limited quantities with "a simpler, updated recipe." The company says production was moved to a "trusted and tested Kellogg-owned facility that has been reliably producing cereal for decades." The June recall prompted the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to warn consumers "Do not eat this cereal." The agency said at least 30 of the people infected in the outbreak were hospitalized. Kellogg's said consumers should look for Honey Smacks marked with "New Recipe" in the top left corner on the

			front of the box.
<b><u>HEALTH:</u></b> NY FLU SEASON	DESPIERT A AMERICA	<b>10/26/18</b>	The city is reporting its first pediatric death this flu season, and doctors are urging flu vaccines for everyone 6 months of age and older. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention says more than 180 children died from the flu nationwide last flu season and more than 80 percent of those deaths were in children who didn't receive a flu vaccine. Health officials say the flu vaccine doesn't give people the flu, but rather it stimulates the body to produce antibodies to fight the virus.
<b><u>HEALTH:</u></b> ADENOVIRUS	DESPIERT A AMERICA	<b>10/29/18</b>	A ninth child has died in a New Jersey rehabilitation facility that is currently suffering an adenovirus outbreak, according to officials. The child, whose name has not been released, died late Saturday night at the Wanaque Center for Nursing and Rehabilitation in Haskell, New Jersey. This latest death was a confirmed case of adenovirus, according to the New Jersey Department of Health. Twenty-five pediatric cases of adenovirus have been connected to the outbreak at this facility, officials said. A staff member at the facility also became ill, but has since recovered.
<b><u>IMMIGRATION:</u></b> TRUMP BIRTHRIGHT	DESPIERT A AMERICA	<b>10/30/18</b>	A person familiar with internal White House debate says the topic of birthright citizenship has come up various times over at least the last year. President Donald Trump tells "Axios on HBO" he wants to end birthright citizenship for babies born to non-citizens and immigrants not authorized to be in the U.S. White House lawyers expect to work with the Justice Department to develop a legal justification for the action. It's one of many immigration changes being discussed including asylum law changes and barring the migrant caravan from entering the U.S. Administration officials say there likely would be no decisions until after the midterms. Most scholars believe ending birthright citizenship would require a constitutional amendment.

But he said he wouldn't spend "hundreds of millions of dollars" on "structures" to house anyone detained while awaiting the outcome of an asylum application.

The report, based on findings from researchers in India who scoured worldwide media reports, said the main causes of selfie deaths were drowning, usually involving people being washed away by waves or falling from a boat, followed by people killed while posing in front of a moving train, deaths involving falls from high places or while taking pictures with dangerous animals. More than 10 people have died at Yosemite this year, some from natural causes and others from falls, park spokesman Scott Gediman said.
<b><u>IMMIGRATION:</u></b> IMMIGRANTS WAITED	DESPIERT A AMERICA	11/01/18	100+ immigrants waited in line in 10 cities for court dates that didn't exist. More than 100 immigrants showed up to court carrying paperwork ordering them to appear before a judge, only to find out that their court dates hadn't actually been scheduled, according to the American Immigration Lawyers Association (AILA). Attorneys say the practice began after the US Supreme Court ruled in June that notices to appear -- the charging documents that immigration authorities issue to send someone to immigration court who's accused of being in the United States illegally -- must specify the time and place of proceedings in order to be valid. Since then, immigration lawyers across the country have reported that officials are increasingly issuing such notices with so-called "fake dates," ordering immigrants to appear at hearings that, it later turns out, were never scheduled in immigration courts.

The confirmed cases became ill between September 26 and October 30, according to the health department. The number of illnesses has risen from 18 cases, including six deaths, announced last week by the health department.
<b><u>HEALTH:</u></b> FDA FIRST CANNABIS BASED PILL	DESPIERT A AMERICA	11/02/18	Epidiolex, the first cannabis-based medication approved by the US Food and Drug Administration, is now available by prescription in all 50 states. The twice-daily oral solution is approved for use in patients 2 and older to treat two types of epileptic syndromes: Dravet syndrome, a rare genetic dysfunction of the brain that begins in the first year of life, and Lennox-Gastaut syndrome, a form of epilepsy with multiple types of seizures that begins in early childhood, usually between ages 3 and 5. Epidiolex was recommended for approval by an advisory committee in April and approved by the FDA in June. In September, the US Department of Justice and the Drug Enforcement Administration classified Epidiolex as a Schedule V substance, clearing the final hurdle for it to be legally prescribed by doctors in the United States.

<b><u>HEALTH:</u></b> STUDY HOT COFFEE	DESPIERT A AMERICA	11/02/18	A new study out of Thomas Jefferson University in Philadelphia compared the acidity and antioxidant activity of hot and cold brewed coffees in hopes of crowning a healthy coffee king. Researchers examined hot and cold versions prepared with the same "grind-to-coffee ratio" in light roast coffees from Brazil, two regions of Ethiopia, Columbia, Myanmar, and Mexico. Their findings suggest that — drum roll, please! — hot coffee has higher antioxidant activity than cold brew coffee, with benefits including cancer prevention and a lower risk of diabetes and heart disease. The pH values in each brew were found to be rather comparable. Health reports that cold brew has often been considered less acidic than hot brew coffee, and therefore gentler on the stomach. But the Jefferson study shows that the pH levels in both hot and cold fell in a range from 4.85 to 5.13.
<b><u>HEALTH:</u></b> PEDIATRICIAN S AGAINST SPANKING	DESPIERT A AMERICA	11/05/18	The American Academy of Pediatrics has hardened its stance against spanking children as a form of parental discipline. In a new policy statement, published in the journal Pediatrics on Monday, the pediatricians' group recommends that adults caring for children use "healthy forms of discipline" -- such as positive reinforcement of appropriate behaviors, setting limits and setting expectations -- and not use spanking, hitting, slapping, threatening, insulting, humiliating or shaming. The policy statement updates guidance published in 1998 that recommended "parents be encouraged and assisted in developing methods other than spanking in response to undesired behavior." The policy statement describes corporal punishment as "non injurious, open-handed hitting with the intention of modifying child behavior" and indicates that spanking is considered a form of such physical punishment.

Flavored e-cigarette products would be available in vape and tobacco shops. Gottlieb is also expected to propose a ban on menthol in regular cigarettes. The convenience store ban on flavored e-cigarette sales would not include menthol. Because the FDA will continue to allow the sale of menthol in regular cigarettes, the agency doesn't want to give cigarettes an advantage over e-cigarettes. E-cigarette makers argue the devices help adult smokers give up cigarettes -- potentially saving them from related illnesses -- by giving a nicotine fix without the smoke and smell of combustible cigarettes. The scientific consensus is still out on the long-term health effects of vaping. About 6.9 million adults used e-cigarettes in 2017, according to a US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention report released Thursday.
<b>IMMIGRATION:</b> DETENTION CENTER OTAY	DESPIERT A AMERICA	11/12/18	Immigration officials stopped allowing a volunteer group to visit people at a local detention facility unless its members agreed not to talk with the press or other groups about conditions inside. Immigration and Customs Enforcement says that members of SOLACE, or Souls Offering Loving and Compassionate Ears, must sign the "Volunteer Code of Ethics" form to be in compliance with the agency's detention standards. The group so far has refused, arguing that detention standards don't require them to sign away their First Amendment rights in order to visit detainees. Beginning in 2012, SOLACE volunteers have made more than 1,450 visits to at least 800 immigrants at Otay Mesa. They tried to give detainees who don't have anyone to visit them a feeling of humanity, emotional support and hope. The new requirement took volunteers by surprise. They thought they had a good working relationship with ICE and had been told the agency appreciated their work. At recent meetings, volunteers speculated that either the current political climate or critical media coverage of conditions in immigration detention facilities may have led to the change, but they could not think of a specific report that might've triggered the forms' restrictive language. The confidentiality sections of the new forms require volunteers to agree not to share information they learn inside without written permission from the warden.
<b>HEALTH:</b> US EXERCISE GUIDELINES	DESPIERT A AMERICA	11/13/18	The U.S. Physical Activity Guidelines Have Been Updated for the First Time in 10 Years. The US Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) has released the second edition of the <i>Physical Activity Guidelines for Americans</i> at the American Heart Association's Scientific Sessions meeting. This document complements the <i>Dietary Guidelines for Americans</i> , which was released by the HHS and the US Department of Agriculture (USDA). The new edition was developed by the 2018 Physical Activity Guidelines Advisory Committee who conducted systematic reviews of available scientific literature. This guidance, updated for the first time since 2008, provides evidence-based recommendations for children (ages 3-17) and adults. Specifically, it includes new guidelines for children aged 3-5 years and updated recommendations for children and adolescents aged 6-17 years, adults, older adults, women during pregnancy and the postpartum period, and adults with chronic health conditions or disabilities. The second edition outlines the types and amounts of activity recommended for these various populations.
