Spot	Thursday's total confirmed COVID-19 cases in Cape County have increased by five, to 127, according to the Cape Girardeau County Public Health Department. Probable cases remain at 34, with a total of 161 overall. There are five more active cases, now at 32. 126 individuals have recovered. Eight cases are linked to travel, 65 are traced to close contact, and the origin of 49 cases is unknown. The 20 to 29 age group accounts for the largest number of COVID-19 cases, at 34 overall; followed by the 50 to 59 age group, at 32 cases overall. There have been seven deaths since April 7th. The public health emergency remains in effect for Cape Girardeau county. Positive COVID-19 cases around the region widely vary. Scott county has reported 159 cases, with eleven deaths; Perry county has reported 112 cases; Stoddard county has reported 132 cases with eight deaths; Bollinger county has reported 12; St. Genevieve county has reported 17 with one death; St. Francois county has reported 100, with two deaths; Mississippi county has reported 82; New Madrid county has reported 36 cases with one death; Butler county has reported 71; Carter county has reported six cases with one death; Reynolds county has reported two cases; Ripley county has reported 17, and Wayne county has reported three. To date, 19,421 COVID-19 cases have been reported in Missouri, 600 total individuals are currently hospitalized, and there have been 982 deaths. 341,648 individuals have been tested for the virus statewide.
