I've skimmed through your report, and had a couple of comments on broadening the description of the "issues" to sound more like public affairs issues.

For instance, I'd describe film, movie or music critiques as Arts and Culture. It's hard to say that a movie or a piece on music is an issue of public importance to the community unless you are referring to the recent Sony hack over the "Interview."

Books or movies that explore a specific topic like Racism / Terrorism / Finance / Self-help / and are not really about the art form of writing / poetr Faith / Religion Faith / Religion

Narrative to include both the official title (MPR News with Kerri Miller / MPR News with Tom Weber / MPR News Presents or segment) and a brief narrative (one or two sentences).

Question: Is it acceptable to simply list the names of guests or do I need to provide background info/qualifications/context for their participation on the show? I usually identify guests in the program description (without their name to minimize redundancy) and then list their names only in the guest column. Is it important to provide that identifying information?

Editing of FCC report

Bold Face MPR News with Kerri Miller: Title of the segment

(No punctuation used after the heading)

Russ's Word style is set up to:

Flag instances of two spaces between sentences, use only one space.

Use "smart quotes"

Highlight misspellings. The big challenge is getting words and names spelled correctly. Words or names not in the dictionary are highlight and will pop out. However, many names are not in the dictionary. I add the correct spelling of all names to the dictionary so as not to have to guess whether or not I had confirmed the correct spelling. Given the diverse population included on the news shows, it's really difficult to keep track of correct spellings unless you have a way to confirm accuracy — and I have discovered that not all names on the websites are spelled correctly. Report misspellings to WEBTEAM.

If the program originates from a non—MPR source, for example the BBC, IQ2 Debate, JFK Library, America Abroad, LIVE Broadcast, National Press Club, The Commonwealth Club, etc., credit the source in boldface followed by a colon and then the program title or segment. Do not repeat this credit in the body of the copy.

If the program is a rebroadcast, precede the credits and titles with **Rebroadcast:** in bold face.

In the instances of program content for the Kerri Miller and Tom Weber entries, I refer to them as "Kerri" or "Tom" to minimize copy. It's redundant to refer to them as "MPR's Kerri Miller" or "MPR's Tom Weber." If there is a guest host, I do identify, them as "MPR's ______" or "Today's guest host is (fill in the name), etc.

To create the template for the next quarter report,

Once you have made your entries and BEFORE you do a final edit and repaginate for Rocky (explanation follows), using the file you have just completed for the quarter, do a "Save As" and rename and save the completed quarterly report with a new file name for the new quarter. For example, the second quarter report is saved as a newly named file with the third quarter file name.

Go to the top of the new file and be sure that you have entered the correct dates for the new quarter in the heading:

When you complete the fourth quarter, be sure to replace "2017" with "2017" for the first quarter of 2017.

Now, go through and make adjustments to specific days/dates.

Now that you've cleaned everything and you're ready to go, why not do a "Save As" and save clean files for the subsequent quarters before you make entries for this new quarter. Or save it simply as a "template" and it's ready for the next quarter.

The most time-consuming aspect of copying and pasting from the various websites to this spreadsheet involves removing hyperlinks and then reformatting the text to be consistent with the rest of the spreadsheet. Sometimes it's possible to copy and drag from the websites into the spreadsheet and formatting automatically assumes that of the spreadsheet. BUT, that is rare especially with copy from the podcasts.

As an example, in the following copy, do a right-click on the copy and "Remove Hyperlink"

Now you can reformat the typeface and font. The current format is Garamond 11 point. Place your cursor in the body of copy, click on the "HOME" button, and choose "AaBbCcD Normal". The text should now be in Garamond 11 point non-bolded type.

Finishing the quarterly report and sending off to Rocky Rothrock after you have renamed the file and saved it as the basis for creating the next quarter's template:

Go to the completed quarterly file,

Delete any copy that appears before this heading which should be the first thing at the top of the page: (Note: be sure your heading includes the correct date for the months being reported).

Next, 0Delete all copy at the very end of the spreadsheet that may follow the last entry for the quarter. It's a handy place to make notes while you're working but it shouldn't be a part of the finished report. (There is a long list of instructions as well as a list of "ISSUES" The completed file should end with the last official entry

Next: The final step involves final editing and some paginating before sending to Rocky. She does not want any entry to break from one page to the next.

Edit to be sure you have included timings for all entries and that you have defined the "Issue" being covered. We've accumulated a long list that should be looked over, but be sure it really is an "issue." For example, the following are NOT issues: Miscellaneous / Authors / The Thread / Fiction / Poetry. Try to find what the author is addressing, or what the poetry is about. This is a conversation with Rocky about what is acceptable.

There are two ways to the fix the break of copy from one page to the next. (It helps if you set the view so you see formatting, (paragraph symbols, etc.)

- 1. Try to edit the copy on the page before the break. Take out a few words or phrases of text and you may reduce enough content that the overlap of an entry from one page to the next doesn't occur. Look for the end of entries where maybe a single word is on a line. You can usually remove something to free up that line where only one or a few words show.
- 2. Failing that, go to the "Layout" tab and choose "Split Table." A paragraph mark will be visible and just be sure that entry following that mark is fully on the next page. Sometimes more than one line is necessary.

Send to Rocky as a Word document. She will look over, make her own revisions and turn it into a PDF.
