The Vanderburgh County Health Department said it has found most stents and staff who tested positive got the virus someplace other than school. Evansville Catholic Diocese Superintendent Daryl Hagan said he believes the Diocese can continue to educate students at school, and that there is little danger to the community. The health department said it believes the schools have done a good job following the rules, and that is why there is very little spread inside the school buildings.
