25 (WEHT)	Government (Local)	6:00pm	Jan. 1	2:20 minutes	Eyewitness News at 6p	Indiana's legislative session begins in just a few days. Hundreds of bills are already filed in the statehouse. One bill would move the start of public schools to August and another would label prescriptions as opioids.
