**SPRINGS FIRE RAGES ON FOR SECOND DAY, EVACUATIONS REMAIN IN PLACE

Authorities say a brush fire that started Thursday near the 101 Freeway in Camarillo is just 20 percent contained after scorching 18,000 acres in Ventura County. The fires flared up again just after noon Friday when offshore winds shifted back on-shore. Some of the flames seen from Sky9 were estimated to be at least 150 feet, according to Mike Case. Bill Nash of the Ventura County Fire called the change of events a "nightmare" situation. CBS2's Chief Meteorologist Josh Rubenstein also confirmed that the temperature in Camarillo was a record-breaking 96 degrees as of 12:30 p.m. The blaze has spread to more than 15 square miles. It reached Pacific Coast Highway at Sycamore Canyon Road around 9 p.m. Thursday and subsequently jumped PCH just before 9 a.m. Friday. Thousands of residents have been evacuated, 15 homes have been damaged, and another 4,000 are threatened. No residential structures have been destroyed, but 25 out buildings, power lines and several RVs at a storage facility were damaged.

Evacuation orders for Hidden Valley, Sycamore Canyon, La Jolla Canyon, Broome Ranch, Camarillo Springs, Deer Creek Road and Yerba Buena Road remain in effect. Homes on the south side of Potrero Road from Reino Road east to 930 W. Potrero Road were also being evacuated. The Ventura County Naval Base was evacuating the San Miguel housing area due to smoke. Families were being asked to relocate to Port Hueneme. Mandatory evacuation orders were lifted Friday morning for residents living in Dos Vientos and the area around Cal State Channel Islands, but residents could be evacuated again Friday afternoon.

**NEW IMMIGRATION CONTROLS

On Monday, May 6, 2013, U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services will implement customer identity verification, or CIV, in its field offices. Individuals will now be required to submit biometric data, specifically fingerprints and photographs, when appearing at USCIS offices for interviews or to receive evidence of an immigration benefit. CIV will help to both defend against threats to national security and protect customers from identity fraud by enhancing the agency's ability to verify identity. Currently, USCIS requires applicants and petitioners requesting immigration or naturalization benefits to visit one of our Application Support Centers to provide biometric data. USCIS uses this data to help determine eligibility for requested benefits. This requirement, along with providing a government-issued document for examination, will not change.

**PLASTIC GUNS

Lawmakers in Washington are calling for a ban on plastic firearms made from 3-d printers. A Texas group called Defense Distributed has assembled a plastic handgun made with parts made from the printer. It has also test fired the gun and posted instructions online so others can duplicate it. The test firing has reignited calls to ban 3-d printed guns. Critics fear the gun could easily fall into the wrong hands. They also have safety concerns because plastic guns would be invisible to metal detectors.

The Sonora desert claims the lives of hundreds of people crossing the U.S.-Mexico border each year. Many of the dead -- about one out of three -- go unidentified. Now, there may be an easier way to put a name to some of these suspected border-crossers who died north of the international boundary. Monday, the Pima County Office of the Medical Examiner joined with Humane Borders to launch a Web-based system that will allow the public to identify the deceased found in the desert in the Tucson area -- more than 2,000 dating back 13 years. The International OpenGIS Initiative for Missing and Deceased Migrants will feature a map documenting deaths as far back to 2001. The database contains customizable search tools available through menu options. It will allow any user to query data concerning migrant deaths and view the data using online maps and tables. Also, it allows the public to download the data for further use.

INDIANA IN-STATE TUITION

Thirteen states enacted legislation to allow long-term unauthorized immigrant students to become eligible for in-state tuition if they meet certain requirements: California, Connecticut, Illinois, Kansas, Maryland, Nebraska, New Mexico, New York, Oklahoma, Texas, Utah, Washington and Wisconsin. In 2008, Oklahoma ended its support for in-state tuition for students without lawful presence.

NEW YORK IMMIGRATION VOTERS PROPOSAL

Hundreds of thousands of New York City immigrants could get the right to vote in local elections under a proposal before lawmakers. A City Council hearing is scheduled for Thursday on a plan to allow people who are in the country legally, but aren't citizens, to vote. Advocates estimate that could be more than 800,000 people. Many U.S. states once let noncitizens vote, though policies changed by the 1930s. Some Maryland cities now allow it, and the idea has been floated in New York's City Council for years. Supporters say immigrants who pay taxes deserve to decide who spends them. Opponents say voting should be reserved for citizens. New York state election law prohibits immigrants from voting, but supporters say the city has the right to set its own policies for local elections. Mayor Michael Bloomberg is opposed to the proposal. He "believes voting is the most important right we are granted as citizens, and you should have to go through the process of becoming a citizen and declaring allegiance to this country before being given that right," Bloomberg spokeswoman Evelyn Erskine said in a statement, also noting that the proposal contravenes state law. Dromm says the proposal has enough support to override a veto, should it get to that point. Council Speaker Christine Quinn, who exercises considerable control over what measures come to a vote, hasn't taken a position on the proposal. She said Wednesday she was looking forward to finding out more about it at the hearing

**OBAMA ON IRS AND TEA PARTY

The Justice Department secretly obtained two months of telephone records of reporters and editors for The Associated Press in what the news cooperative's top executive called a "massive and unprecedented intrusion" into how news organizations gather the news. The records obtained by the Justice Department listed incoming and outgoing calls, and the duration of each call, for the work and personal phone numbers of individual reporters, general AP office numbers in New York, Washington and Hartford, Conn., and the main number for AP reporters in the House of Representatives press gallery, according to attorneys for the AP. In all, the government seized those records for more than 20 separate telephone lines assigned to AP and its journalists in April and May of 2012. The exact number of journalists who used the phone lines during that period is unknown but more than 100 journalists work in the offices whose phone records were targeted on a wide array of stories about government and other matters. In a letter of protest sent to Attorney General Eric Holder on Monday, AP President and Chief Executive Officer Gary Pruitt said the government sought and obtained information far beyond anything that could be justified by any specific investigation. He demanded the return of the phone records and destruction of all copies. The Obama administration has aggressively investigated disclosures of classified information to the media and has brought six cases against people suspected of leaking classified information, more than under all previous presidents combined.

**NACIONAL CAMPAIGN AGAINST DEPORTATIONS
CHICAGO PROTEST

Police sawed through plastic pipes to pry apart seven protesters at an immigration detention center near Chicago on Tuesday. The protesters, all in the United States without permission, demanded a halt to deportations as Congress considers allowing most of the country's 11 million unauthorized immigrants to apply for legal status. President Barack Obama's administration has increased deportations to roughly 1,100 a day, a record pace. removals have continued as the Senate Judiciary Committee works on a sweeping immigration bill drafted by a bipartisan group that includes Dick Durbin (D-Illinois).
