Most politicians dare not defy the ASL, and in 1917 the 18th Amendment sails through both Houses of

Congress; it is ratified by the states in just 13 months. When the Amendment is signed into law, Prohibitionists rejoice that America has become officially dry. But Americans are about to discover that making Prohibition the law of the land has been one thing; enforcing it will be another.
