Monday Fort Worth had about 300 teacher vacancies. Administration is coming up with a plan to address that, but some schools are worse than others. Fort Worth ISD didn't get back to us with staffing details this week. Frisco is okay on teachers but struggling with bus drivers. School employee groups tell us while many districts may have filled the gaps the problem doesn't end there. It's one thing to get them in the door. It's another thing to keep them. Teachers are leaving the profession in droves. They're either retiring, if they're eligible or deciding this is not right for them. Districts a bit further out, like in Mineral Wells, have moved to a 4-day week calendars this year, not to save money, but to use it as a bargaining tool to keep teachers in Mineral Wells. Incentives are out there, from higher pay in Desoto to free childcare in Grapevine/Colleyville, but will it last? Each year teachers are walking away, and districts are feeling it more than ever.

Researchers are also concerned about the rate of Texans testing positive for the virus. That's now topped 30%. Doctors say vaccination remains the most powerful tool for preventing severe cases of Covid. At last check, 62% of Texans are fully vaccinated.

He says the "Offshore Aabortion" process starts with a physician's referral. Then it's about a 40-minute boat ride to federal waters. Kimbro says more than 200 Texas women have already gotten abortions. He says they're seeing 8-20 patients a day currently charging up to over \$2,000 each.
