In order to allow for extended listener responsiveness, community ascertainments are conducted on an on-going basis. Areas not covered within our programming and news segments are addressed in public service announcements.

The following issues were of greatest community concerns to the listeners in the WYOS broadcast area for the quarter:

Economic issues (includes stories on job trends, local employment opportunities, economic development projects and proposals and updates on development projects.)

Health/ Safety (includes stories that deal with health concerns ranging from cancer and Lyme Disease to sunburn and safety issues ranging from swimming and boating safety to mentions as to whether people involved in crashes are wearing seat belts or helmets as required>)

Crime/ Criminal Justice (includes stories involving warnings about scam activities, police requests for information in cases and crime prevention tips like warning residents to lock their cars.)

Drugs (includes stories that are not specific to drug use as a criminal activity but deal with efforts to stop the current addiction epidemic and treatment/recovery efforts)

Flood Response/ Recovery (Includes warnings, advisories and stories as flood danger exists followed by stories involving continued impact of flooding, resources available to those affected and information about recovery on personal and regional levels.)

Family/ Education/ Culture/ History (includes stories about school budget votes, educational outings for families and art and historic attractions in the region)

Enviornment (including stories about impacts of proposed development on the natural and urban environments, efforts to preserve habitat and educate residents about local and exotic flora and fauna.)
