

Quarterly Issues Programs List for Station KBAZ-FM January 1 - March 31, 2018

Section I. Issues.

The station has identified the following issues as significant issues facing our community in this quarter:

- A. Military: Various ways we could help Veterans in our area with a special focus on Mental Health.
- B. Education: Speaking with a College Professor about being denied access to speak at the University of Montana
- C. Health and Wellness: Spoke with Montana Outreach Director about the new 'Bridge to Wellbeing Program'
- D. Elderly: Spoke with CEO of Missoula Aging Services about 800 seniors in Western Montana that rely on the Meals on Wheels program and how vital the program is.
- E. Emergency Planning: Spoke with the Managers of Missoula Works; they staff positions in the most urgent situations in Western Montana
- F. Human Trafficking: Missoula Detective spoke about the negative effects of Human Trafficking especially with a major highway through our state being the main corridor for this.
- G. Government: With only one voice in the state of Montana within the House of Representatives, listeners were encouraged to voice their opinion on upcoming proposed bills with Congressman Greg Gianforte.

Section II. Responsive Programs

The station has broadcast programming dealing with each of the above-referenced issues. Programming dealing with each issue is set out below.

A. Military:

Broadcast on January 6, 6:00 AM; Duration 20 minutes. A segment of our locally produced public affairs program featuring a discussion with Dr. Mark Ibsen about Veterans in pain, We spoke with Dr. Mark Ibsen about the different forms of pain veterans experience and the best ways to treat them. Dr. Ibsen explained there are many ways to treat pain including much more than prescription pills.

Broadcast on March 10, 6:00 AM; Duration 20 minutes. A segment of our locally produced public affairs program featuring a discussion with Secretary of Veteran Affairs David J. Shulkin. Dr. Shulkin discussed many different issues the veterans are facing around the country and specifically in Montana.

Broadcast on January 27, 6:00 AM; Duration 20 minutes. A segment of our locally produced public affairs program featuring a discussion with Sam Redfern about Veterans Healthcare, Redfern works with Concerned Veterans For America in Montana. He shared his views on veteran healthcare in Montana. Sam also spoke about what issues need to be addressed first by our government when it comes to Veterans care.

Broadcast on February 3, 6:00 AM; Duration 20 minutes. A segment of our locally produced public affairs program featuring a discussion with two Montana veterans about their experience with Veterans Affairs. They expressed their disappointment with the organization and asked for change.

Broadcast on January 20, 6:00 AM; Duration 20 minutes. A segment of our locally produced public affairs program featuring a discussion with U.S. Senate Candidate Troy Downing about veteran care in Montana and what he would like to see improved.

B. Education:

Broadcast on January 13, 6:00 AM; Duration 20 minutes. A segment of our locally produced public affairs program featuring a discussion with Maria Cole regarding Freedom of Speech, Cole established the Jeff Cole Legacy Fund to support journalism and education at the University of Montana. She asked Professor Mike Adams to deliver the Jeff Cole Distinguished Lecture this year and the UM School of Journalism denied her request.

C. Health and Wellness:

Broadcast on February 17, 6:00 AM; Duration 20 minutes. A segment of our locally produced public affairs program featuring a discussion with Dr. Mark Ibsen about his recent trip to Greece where he was doing some medical care for Syrian refugees. Dr. Ibsen gave helpful insight into how Missoulians can help countries abroad going through natural disaster.

Broadcast on February 24, 6:00 AM; Duration 20 minutes. A segment of our locally produced public affairs program featuring a discussion with Henry Kriegel and he is the Montana Outreach Director for Americans for Prosperity Foundation. Kriegel talked about the Bridge To Wellbeing Program just being introduced.

D. Elderly:

Broadcast on March 3, 6:00 AM; Duration 20 minutes. A segment of our locally produced public affairs program featuring a discussion with CEO Susan Kohler about the Meals on Wheels program in Missoula. Missoula Aging Services reports that 800 people across Missoula County rely on Meals on Wheels.

E. Emergency Planning:

Broadcast on March 24, 6:00 AM; Duration 20 minutes. A segment of our locally produced public affairs program featuring a discussion with Paige Pavalone and Martin NoRunner from Missoula Works. They are a staffing agency that puts people to work in urgent situations, most specifically when it comes to Wildfires in the Western Montana region.

F. Human Trafficking:

Broadcast on March 31, 6:00 AM; Duration 20 minutes. A segment of our locally produced public affairs program featuring a discussion with Detective Guy Baker about Human Trafficking in Missoula. And how the Missoula area is affected with I-90 being a big factor as to why this area has so much human trafficking.

Broadcast on March 17, 6:00 AM; Duration 20 minutes.
