Ed Ternan, co-founder of Song for Charlie lost his college-aged son to one pill and now helps other parents warn their children. “We still say ‘just say no’ but we spell it K. N. O. Convoy of Hope’s lead team is now in the quake zone. “It’s just mile after mile of rubble, piles of rubble, and uninhabitable buildings that are still standing...many families have truly lost everything,” shares Convoy spokesman Ethan Forhetz. The team reports, “There are tent cities everywhere they look.” There have been roughly 6,000 aftershocks since the main quake on February 6. These can range from mini-quakes to more significant magnitudes capable of bringing down even more of the damaged structures. People are fearful. Between the two countries, 46,000 people have been confirmed to have lost their lives, with many more injured. Ethan believes it will potentially take years for anything approaching normal to be possible. In our interview podcast, just below, Ethan shares what Convoy of Hope is actively doing to provide as much food and necessities as possible during this time of extraordinary need. Hook spent years counseling foster children as a mental health professional. “We’re not always looking at it from the adoptee’s side,” she warns, for example, repeatedly calling one’s adoption a ‘gift’ can unintentionally hurt your child. Vanessa Joy Walker is an author and lifecoach who was herself adopted as a baby. “The issues of identity and abandonment are interwoven into who I am, they are part of what I call my emotional DNA.” Billie Wright reports.</p>

<p>Poverty Homeless</p>	<p>K-LOVE's Positive People</p>	<p>Feb</p>	<p>Monthly Feature</p>	<p>60 second weekly promo Podcast 7:07</p>	<p>Loving On Her Community: Katelyn Offers Free Laundry Station In Her Home's Basement "I have an extra washer and dryer set up in my basement for people who don't have access to running water, or a washer & dryer, or enough money to go to a laundromat. They can come to my house and do their laundry or, say if they're like homeless, I pick up their laundry and wash it for them and bring it back to them," explains Katelyn Dias in Cleveland, Tennessee, near Chattanooga. She calls it the Free Laundry Project. For those who come to her home's accessible basement, she has a futon, a coffee station, Wi-Fi, and a TV with movies alongside, "so they will not be super bored while they're here doing their laundry." One question you might ask of Katelyn is <i>why are you doing this?</i> "I am an admin in the group Cleveland Tennessee Mutual Aid Network - and I saw a lot of people trying to raise money to go to a laundromat - and I was like, 'well, I have an extra washer and dryer in my basement, would you all feel comfortable using that?' and everybody answered 100%, 'yes.'" Because there's no similar laundry outreach in her area, "I took it upon myself to start my own thing." As word gets out, about 30 families so far have been blessed by this practical outreach. Katelyn's heart for this is very transparent. "I tried to make it as comfortable as possible. I was thinking, 'what would I want if I was at a laundromat?'" Adding, "Anything to help them out because - like I said - a lot of these people, they don't even have access to running water," so she's providing what's needed. And there's a benefit in this for Katelyn, too. "You can see the joy on their faces when you give them their laundry back and they smell it and they're like, 'oh, it smells so good!'" One of the homeless men she helps mentioned to her how important the clean clothes are because "If you smell bad, you can't get a job." Katelyn tells us, "He's right." There's been no problem with home security for Katelyn and her family upstairs, though they have taken some precautions. Initially, Katelyn paid for and provided detergent and other laundry supplies, but others are now chipping in to help keep the outreach going. "I have reached out for help for our electric and our water bill because those have doubled since we started doing this."</p>

One of the department's firefighters, Allen Green, sees just how important the Read to Succeed program really is. But it's not just about reading and fire safety, it's also about making connections in the community. Green says, "Some of them may have been in a fire before. Like, one kid started crying. And now I have to go into comforting mode." Green shares that most visits to the schools are filled with laughter and sometimes silly questions. "The best part about doing the presentation...is the question and answer portion because we just get so many different questions. And we just laugh. The kids laugh. You know, it's a fun time altogether." Green hopes the children they read to will not only gain reading skills but will know what to do if there's a fire in their home. Ultimately, Green knows it's more than just a book read to kids in a classroom. "I say it's not about me. I say my thing is seeing our community being empowered. So it makes me feel very purposeful when I get up every day and know I have a purpose."</p>

Shicks talked about how the Nashville Youth for Christ serves several hundred youth in a four county area between the ages of 11 and 19. Shicks said the primary mission is to reach young people by working together with local churches and other like-minded organizations to raise up lifelong followers of Christ. He said while social media provides many challenges it also provides many opportunities for staying connected with youth with daily prayers, scriptures and words of encouragement.</p>
