The technology was "supposed" to make ballot counting easier. But, as WGN's Judie Garcia reminds us, that's not always the case. But, when it came time to merge those two technologies at each precinct before the results could be transmitted to the board of elections there were major problems. Despite all the problems in March and they're well documented, no one has ever said that the votes were not counted accurately, said Langdon Neal, Board of Election's Chair. But, the full count took a week after the primary election. This time, elections board and the voting systems manufacturer hope to head off potential problems with improved technology and a back-up system which includes 25 remote transmit sites in Chicago, 29 in Cook County.

A new way to treat a common and sight robbing disorder. It's a shot at seeing better if patients can tolerate an eye injection. Age related macular degeneration is an epidemic in this country. It looks like this. No, there's nothing wrong with your television, the central spot is the view people with macular degeneration are left with. The disease deteriorates the macula and puts a black hole in patients' sight. Dr. Seenu Hariprasa/U OF C, Ophthalmologist: abnormal blood vessels grow underneath the retina; cause the retina to separate from the layer beneath it. In the past, patients got laser treatments and injections. Over the last year Lula Moise has tried 5 treatments. Yet her vision remained 20/150. Then she came to the University of Chicago where doctors tried a new approach, an eye injection of Lucentis. Lula Moise, Macular Degeneration patient: it looked like a skin or something was over the eye, but after I started taking the first treatment that cleared it up so I could see, that was beautiful. 90% of individuals actually and stabilized vision and did not lose greater than 3 lines of vision but was a new patient receiving this treatment actually left with improved vision?

Toddlers going to sleep and never waking up. You've likely heard of SIDS where infants die in their sleep. But as a child grows the risk doesn't necessarily get smaller. From his first picture, Joshua Burda looked like a little fighter. His smile made his parents laugh and make each day better than the next. He walked, talked and kicked and climbed. A strong boy who made friends and played music. Rob and Diane Burda, Josh's parents: he had little shakers he liked to shake to the music when I played and he'd sing along. The sweet sounds ended one day as a 20 month old Josh fell asleep in his mother's arms. She put him down for his nap. I needed to get him up to feed him lunch early so that we could get out of the house, so I went up to get him and he was gone. All doctors could say was Josh died of Sudden Unexplained Death in Childhood. Ongoing studies point to a possible genetic mutation. Whether it will be one gene or it will be a composite of several polymorphisms or genetic variations among more than one gene, we don't know yet. We're certainly aggressively studying so that we can get to the answer for that and yes then the parent would at least know what the risk is. With this information parents could perhaps monitor

children more closely. But that understanding of SUDC is likely years away.

Michael: I have friends and family members who are diehard fans and they'd rather die than go to the hospital or whatever, if their team is on the verge of losing. Sam: sometimes you don't feel good or you feel a little dizzy. You tough it out and stay with the game. Rex: I would just suck it up and enjoy if it was really a good game. These men are not alone, a new study finds if the game is on, men are in front of the TV, no matter how they feel. Chest pains linger, breathing problems persist according to the American College of Emergency Physicians. ER visits skyrocket in the hours following a game. Matthew Belden, MD, emergency physician, Rush University Medical Center: I wouldn't put it off till the end of the game because it may not be caused by the food you are eating and it may be something serious like some type of heart problem.

And now it can skirt important brain structures while reaching down into the neck and even treating multiple brain lesions at once. Dr. Cerullo, Chicago Inst. Neurosurgery and Neuroresearch: the perfection, is able to expand the word envelope 300%, so that a whole new category of people can now be treated effectively using this state of the art, the gold standard technology which is known as gamma knife.

If you smoke, you are the first to go on the list. It doesn't matter if you have symptoms, you get a scan. Dr. Daniel Ray, Head of Pulmonary and

Critical Care Medicine, Evanston Northwester HC: to see if this technique would allow cancers to be detected when they are small, when they can be surgically resected and then to see if that translates into an improvement in survival from lung cancer. Survival odds for lung cancer are generally slim, only about 5%. But across the country when doctors gave at risk people a low dose spiral CT scan, they say the odds skyrocketed raising the projected 10-year survival rate for lung cancer patients to 92%.

Beginning next week a new plan is in effect for pregnancy protection. Plan B is moving to store shelves. Regina: "I think it's really important and I'm absolutely in support of it". Many women support the move which will make Plan B more readily available to women. Up until now the delay getting the prescription likely meant the "Morning After" pill would not work as well. But some worry improved efficacy and access may translate to abuse. Phyllis: "I think its going to be abused because I think that people are not going to be careful with what they do, because they know they can run to the drugstore anytime to get the pill. The pill is really two pills: high doses of the hormone progestin found in birth control pills. Plan B is first taken immediately following intercourse and again 12 hours later to prevent, not terminate a pregnancy.

Your doctor is watching you, checking your weight and more, from home! New technology is making medicine a bit like big brother and patients say "bring it on!" Vernon Berrien and his family look at images of a healthy one and one enlarged and failing. While he didn't know what it looked like, Vernon knew what heart failure felt like. He needed an implantable pacemaker to set his heart's rhythm and defibrillator to shock it when necessary. But Vernon's device had a few extra gadgets that make him feel super special. Vernon Berrien, Latitude patient: I always got somebody watching me. Every day his doctor can look at how his heart is pumping. Nats: we can watch from a remote location on computer display and analyze the rhythm. The device extracts information from Vernon then sends the data wirelessly to his doctor. It really provides some reassurance both to the physicians and the patient that there's a way to identify problems soon.

The painful symptoms sneak up quickly and can spoil a Thanksgiving meal. How you can avoid holiday heartburn. I think the biggest problem is that we over indulge and tend to overeat. There's nothing like it, turkey, mashed potatoes, stuffing and pumpkin pie. But for those with gastro esophageal reflux disease or chronic heartburn indulging in holiday food, is a recipe for disaster. Generally when we think of Thanksgiving, we think of turkey and turkey is usually not too bad in terms of fat. That's the good news. But watch out for fatty side dishes. Dr. Carline Quander, Gastroenterologist, Rush University Medical Center: one of the things that fat does is slows down emptying in the stomach so when you have a stomach that is not emptying, then it is more likely for whatever it is in the stomach to come back up into the esophagus. When that happens, acid from the stomach irritates the esophagus and causes painful burning in the chest. But doctors say follow a few simple rules for a reflux-free holiday.

Milk for medical tests. They say it does a body good. Now it's helping doctors look inside the body better. When doctors suspect an internal problem with a patient, they often order a CT scan. And patients have to drink a thick, chalky, foul testing liquid to line the bowels to fill and highlight them for radiologists. Then someone asked, got milk? Dr. Lisa Shah-Patel, Radiology resident, St. Luke's Roosevelt Hospital: we actually compared a traditional oral contrast agent which is usually barium based to milk. Milk goes down easy, people even like it. It has calcium and according to doctors, shows real promise for gastrointestinal imaging compared to barium. Both of them appear grey so when radiologists are looking at CT scans, the stomach, small and large bowel, appear grey, which is exactly what we want and they both provide distension and by distension we mean expansion of the small and large bowel which is exactly what radiologists needs in order to find out why a patient is having abdominal pain.

Attacking heart failure when bypass surgery and drugs can't help, doctors hope a new weapon will save lives. After a quadruple bypass in 1998, Larry Adwell was on top of the world. Felt great. But that didn't last. Last fall the chest pains were starting to get real bad. Adwell developed severe angina. Dr. Gary Schaer, Director Cardiac Cath Lab, Rush University Medical Center: at this point the blockages in his arteries are in vessels that are small or totally blocked and really not appropriate for repeat angioplasty or bypass. But Adwell may benefit from a cutting edge treatment doctors are testing at Rush University Medical Center. This study is a trial to try to grow new blood vessels in areas of the heart muscle that are not getting enough blood and oxygen. The way we're aiming to do it in this trial, is to use stem cells.

Since they're here nearly every week for one treatment or another, they agree that decorating the chairs gave them an opportunity to feel like they could do something wonderful.
