SHOW TOPICS: What local lawmakers are doing to help undocumented children who may have a medical crisis. Also, information on how parents can protect their children from the dangers of the internet.

SUMMARY: Ana Esparza was only 16 but she became the face of undocumented children in need of health care when hospitals here in Chicago refused to replace her failing liver because of Medicaid limitations. A hospital in Miami gave her a new liver that just simply did not last. Ana died last month, and after her death lawmakers are hoping that laws will be changed so that undocumented immigrants who need an organ transplant will not have to suffer as much as Ana did. Alderman Ricardo Munoz from the city's 22<sup>nd</sup> ward, former state representative Frank Aguilar and Carmen Velasquez Executive Director of Alivio Medical Center joined us to talk about this issue. Also on the shew, the mixture of children and the internet can be dangerous; Michael Sullivan Deputy Bureau Chief of the High Tech Crimes Bureau for the State of Illinois and Officer Raimond Ranne of the Chicago Police Department gave us some tips on how parents can protect their children from internet dangers.
