It's a common sight in the days after Christmas: discarded, brown Christmas trees, abandoned in alleys or stacked in parking lots. One Canadian drug maker is giving used and never sold Christmas trees a new purpose this season. We're used to seeing them beautifully decorated, standing proudly in our homes, but now Christmas trees have a medicinal purpose as well. That's the main ingredient in Tamiflu, the antiviral drug used to reduce common flu symptoms. It's also the same drug known to be effective against human infections of the deadly bird flu. That's why governments around the world, including here in the United States are stockpiling the medication in case of an avian flu

outbreak. Dr. Don Low, Medical Director at Mt. Sinai Hospital in Toronto: Here what you have is something that is highly concentrated in pine needles and when you can extract that, you can use it to make Tamiflu. A critical early step in making Tamiflu is to have this shakimik acid. Right now shikimic acid is supplied by one country, China, and one plant, the star anise. Scientist at the Canadian drug maker Biolyse says they plan to sell the acid to companies producing generic versions of Tamiflu. But doctors caution, it's only a short term solution.

By sheer size the Lituya Bay tsunami dwarfs the Asian tsunami. It hit in 1958 and was so large, that for a time, the wave would have swamped the Sears Tower by almost 300 feet! The difference is it hit in a very remote part of the world. Lituya Bay is located about 120 miles southwest of Juneu, off the gulf of Alaska. Our journey to Lituya Bay was by float plane. To visit Lituya Bay is to understand why this area is so tsunami prone. Earthquakes happen frequently here and they're big. And the terrain is steep, steeper than almost anywhere else on the planet. On the night of July 9th, a massive part of that mountain broke off and

cascaded into the water. It hit with force that scientists liken to that of an asteroid. The wave it created was over 1700 feet high.

It's a common sight in the days after Christmas: discarded, brown Christmas trees, abandoned in alleys or stacked in parking lots. One Canadian drug maker is giving used and never sold Christmas trees a new purpose this season. We're used to seeing them beautifully decorated, standing proudly in our homes, but now Christmas trees have a medicinal purpose as well. That's the main ingredient in Tamiflu, the antiviral drug used to reduce common flu symptoms. It's also the same drug known to be effective against human infections of the deadly bird flu. That's why governments around the world, including here in the United States are stockpiling the medication in case of an avian flu

outbreak. Dr. Don Low, Medical Director at Mt. Sinai Hospital in Toronto: Here what you have is something that is highly concentrated in pine needles and when you can extract that, you can use it to make Tamiflu. A critical early step in making Tamiflu is to have this shakimik acid. Right now shikimic acid is supplied by one country, China, and one plant, the star anise. Scientist at the Canadian drug maker Biolyse says they plan to sell the acid to companies producing generic versions of Tamiflu. But doctors caution, it's only a short term solution.


