What is Alzheimer's Disease?

Alzheimer's disease is a type of dementia that leads to memory, thinking, and behavior problems. It is the most common form of dementia, accounting for 60 to 80 percent of all cases. It is also the sixth leading cause of death in the United States.

Alzheimer's disease gets worse over time and eventually comes to a point where a person can no longer accomplish daily tasks. In the beginning, memory problems are mild, but as the disease progresses, patients become unaware of their environment and may no longer be able to carry on a conversation.

Although those ages 65 and older are more likely to develop Alzheimer's disease, there are thousands of others under the age of 65 who have early-onset Alzheimer's.

Alzheimer's Disease Symptoms

Part of Alzheimer's disease awareness is knowing the symptoms so you can know whether a loved one may be developing it. The symptoms include:

Memory Loss – People may forget things they've learned as well as dates and events. They may also ask for the same information over and over again.

Trouble Planning or Solving Problems – You may notice a loved one taking longer to complete tasks they used to be able to do much quicker. You may also notice they have trouble following directions, even a simple recipe becomes complex.

Confusion with Time or Place – People with Alzheimer's often lose track of time. They also forget where they are and even how they got there.

Misplacing Things & Unable to Retrace Steps – As people forget dates and events they may also start to misplace objects. Although they would be able to retrace their steps in the past and find what they were looking for, that is no longer the case. This may lead them to accuse others of stealing because they can no longer find what's theirs.

Mood & Personality Changes – Because of the changes that are going on in their mind, you may notice major shifts in mood and personality. They may become confused, suspicious and even depressed.

Although there is no cure for Alzheimer's disease, there are things you can do to help a loved one, especially if the disease is still in its early stages.

Keep a Daily Routine – This helps to avoid confusion and lets the person know what can be expected. Alzheimer's patients like routines.

Don't Overstimulate – Keep things simple. Say one thing at a time. Present only one idea so that the person can understand it the best they can.

Be Reassuring – Always try to make the person feel safe and comfortable. Sometimes even saying the words, "You are safe with me" is enough to make that person feel at ease.

Don't Yell or Argue – As frustrated as you may get, imagine how the patient feels. They can no longer grasp what is going on inside their own heads. Don't yell or argue out of frustration. Be the calming voice they need.

While you may be able to care for an Alzheimer's patient in the early stages of the disease, doing so as it progresses can become more challenging. Many times the patient can present a danger to himself by wandering off or forgetting to turn off the stove. If this is the case it may be time to consider a memory care facility that can monitor and manage the patient.

PSA (Kill 10-07-19) ALDOT Will Be Working Along Hwy 431 Upgrading Traffic Signals To Make Things Safer

And ALDOT is urging drivers in Alexandria to expect heavier traffic in October while workers do some upgrades traffic signals on U.S. 431.

According to an ALDOT news release, the department plans to begin upgrades on Oct. 1, and says the work should take about three weeks.

Steady green, yellow and red arrows will also be added to traffic lights, according to ALDOT spokeswoman Linda Crockett.

According to the news release, studies have shown that flashing yellow arrows have reduced left-turn-related accidents by nearly 25 percent and by nearly 35 percent for drivers younger than 21.

The news release urged drivers to consider alternate routes, obey work zone signs and be cautious if driving through the area.

PSA CALSO New Years Advice 12-31-19

We hope that you all have a safe and happy new year. Here are some safety tips to help make sure . 2020 gets off to a good start.

If you decide to drink, eat before you drink, and snack while drinking. It's also a good idea to monitor the alcohol intake of yourself and your friends.

Don't drink anything that has been out of your sight or handled by someone you don't know and trust.

If you plan to drive on New Year's Eve, don't drink and drive.

If you are driving; be alert behind the wheel, be aware of your surroundings. There will be other drivers who are not obeying the law.

If you've had too much to drink, call a taxi or have a sober friend or family member pick you up.

Never get in a car with someone who has been drinking.

If someone appears intoxicated, keep them from driving and call them a cab to ensure they get home safely, and don't let them leave with someone they do not know.

Go out in groups so you can look out for your friends and family. Having a safety net in an unfamiliar environment is helpful.

Do you have Pets?

- * Loud noises can scare pets. Give them extra attention so they won't run away in a panic because of loud celebrations or exploding fireworks.
- * Keep your pets inside, in a comfortable room, with comforting music playing to drown out loud, unusual noises.
- * Make sure all fences and gates are secure so if pets leave the house, they are confined to the yard.
- * Ask your veterinarian for tranquilizers if your animal has shown signs of extreme uneasiness around loud noises or crowds in the past.

* Make sure your pet has its ID, or dog license, and if it has a microchip, make sure it is current. This will make it easier to get you pet back if he/she escapes your home and yard during festivities.
