01-02-18 Alabama State Health Office Says Flu Cases Are On The Rise

Alabama Health officials say incidents of the flu are on the rise across the state.

The Alabama Department of Public Health said Friday that flu activity is picking up for the season and urged people to get vaccinated.

The health department said people should request the "quadrivalent vaccine" that protects against four strains of flu.

As it is the only version that protects against the Type B/Yamagata flu strain which is currently circulating in Alabama.

Dr. Burnestine Taylor, medical officer for disease control and prevention for the state health department, said the increased activity is a concern because flu can be a serious disease for anyone.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention says Alabama is one of 21 states reporting high flu-like illness activity.

**02-14-18 Alabama Dept Of Conservation Bans Deer Carcusses From Mississippi** 

The Alabama Department conservation department has implemented a ban on the importation of deer carcasses from Mississippi in order to stop the spread of a disease.

A test in January of a 4 year-old buck showed positive signs of Chronic Wasting Disease- a neurological disease that affects deer, elk, and moose and is 100% fatal.

A statement from Alabama Wildlife Section Chief Keith Gauldin says there is no evidence of the disease in Alabama.

And Gauldin asks the public for help to keep the state disease-free.

Hunters can still transport deboned meat, cleaned skulls with antlers, teeth, and tanned hides.
