Before that night, the now 20-yearold Doan was a typical 10-year-old girl in a hardworking family of farmers in Pampa, Texas. They became the targets of an intruder who enjoyed killing just for the thrill of it. The immediate investigation yielded few clues. Doan, however, had a remarkable ability to recall the details of that traumatic night. Investigators would later learn that the gunman who killed Doan's family had killed before, hundreds of miles away in Missouri. A day before the Pampa shootings, Orlie McCool and his daughter-in-law Dawn were killed and the family pickup stolen. Levi King was later found behind the wheel of the stolen vehicle in El Paso, Texas. He also told law enforcement that there were four more bodies in Texas. King told law enforcement officers that the feeling he got from killing the McCools was better than any drug he had ever done. This was the lead needed to solve the Pampa murders. Robin Doan was willing to help by testifying about the night her family was gunned down while they slept. King took a plea deal in Missouri -- to avoid execution he agreed to two consecutive life sentences without the possibility of parole. In Texas, he also took a guilty plea, but the DA refused to take the death penalty off the table. Robin testified at the trial. There was one holdout for the death penalty; King received a life sentence. He will serve his time in Missouri. Robin Doan is satisfied. On-screen text graphic: Robin has decided to leave Pampa. Mintz, whose family had long-standing ties to the area, had married early in life, divorced and raised two daughters, Jessica Freeman and Andrea Little Gray, as well as becoming a respected businesswoman, realtor and mentor to young girls. Police investigation at the lodge found a crucial piece of evidence only the killer could have left, but questions remained: did Mintz know her killer or was it a random robbery that went bad? The investigation took the case in another direction when police found out that her husband, Travis McGraw, was secretly dating Mary Beth Fisher. His cell phone records revealed he was sending intimate text messages to Fisher. Fisher claims McGraw had told her he wasn't married, and the relationship, though intimate, was not sexual. Fisher found out the truth and gave him an ultimatum -- make up your mind by Sunday. Mintz was shot dead on Saturday. Travis McGraw willingly turned over his cache of guns to police. One of his guns matched the cartridge found at the scene and he was arrested for murder. Mintz's daughters emerged as powerful advocates for their mother, and prosecutors, after consulting with them, offered a plea deal to McGraw: second-degree murder with a sentence of 16-20 years. He accepted, but at the last moment changed his mind about pleading guilty. Three years after the murder the trial began. McGraw was found guilty of first-degree murder. Schirmer, the pastor of the Reeders United Methodist Church in Reeders, Pennsylvania; and the eventual investigation to determine if the deaths of the pastor's previous wives were really accidental. Musante's sister, Rose Cobb, knew something wasn't right and pressed authorities to keep looking. Musante's daughter, Samantha, told police that she had discovered the affair between her mother and Schirmer and had told her father. Further investigation revealed Musante's death was truly a suicide. This led to questions regarding the death of the pastor's second wife, Betty Schirmer, just three months earlier in an auto accident. Her death was determined to be suspicious and police suspected Schirmer. Questions then arose about the death of Schirmer's first wife, Jewel. The cause of her death, from a fall, was initially classified as undetermined, but was now ruled a homicide. A.B. Schirmer was arrested and charged with the murder of his second wife, Betty. At trial, A.B. Schirmer was found guilty of murder. Cindy Musante continues to stand by him. Original on-screen text graphic: Schirmer is awaiting trial for the murder of his first wife, Jewel. Sam's mother, Cindy told the court she believes "one hundred per cent" in Schirmer's innocence. Epilogue (for the 01/17/15 rebroadcast): a year and a half after his conviction for the murder of his second wife, Betty, A.B. Schirmer struck an unexpected deal with prosecutors. He pled no contest to the charge that he murdered his first wife, Jewel, saying he only took the plea to spare his family the trauma of going through another murder trial. Schirmer was sentenced to twenty to forty years in prison, the maximum allowed, on top of his life sentence. 48 HOURS: "Murder in Pinyon Pines" (10:00-11:00p) - a report on the investigation into the triple murders and the long quest for justice for Vicki Friedli, her boyfriend Jon Hayward, and Vicki's daughter Becky Friedli. In 2006, in Pinyon Pines, California, Friedli and her boyfriend where shot dead and their house set on fire. Outside the home, investigators found the charred remains of Becky Friedli, in a wheelbarrow. She was burned so badly, they could not determine how she died. Retired policeman Ron Friedli, Vicki's ex-husband and Becky's father, had a theory about what happened: Becky was deathly afraid of fire and he suspected she knew her killer. Police searched for clues but the case went cold. Years later, Luis Bolanos, a private investigator and a former colleague of Ron's, asked if he could get involved; he said he could get the case back in the news. He did just that. Seven years after the murders, police arrested Becky's ex-boyfriend Robert Pape and his best friend Christian Smith and charged them with murder. Their families say they are innocent. But an unexpected courtroom twist turned the case upside down. The District Attorney said there was an "issue" in the grand jury proceedings against Pape, and dropped the charges against them both. However, it may not be completely over; the investigation continues. On-screen text graphic: A new DA was sworn in last week. He says he will review the case "with an open mind". 48 HOURS: "Kiss of Death and the Google Exec" - an investigation into the 2013 drug-related death of Google executive Forrest Hayes and an investigation of Alix Tichelman, the woman charged with killing him, whose exboyfriend also died of a lethal overdose. Hayes, a successful, wealthy, married Santa Cruz, California technology genius was found dead from a heroin overdose aboard his 46-foot yacht. The yacht had been outfitted with a sophisticated security system, which eventually led investigators to Alix Tichelman, a young woman with whom he had a secret liaison aboard the yacht. Hayes and Tichelman met on an online dating service known for connecting wealthy men with women looking to be spoiled. The video footage recorded Tichelman injecting Hayes, cleaning up the scene and stepping over him to leave. At issue is whether Tichelman knew Hayes was in distress when she left, as police maintain, or if his death was accidental, as public defenders representing Tichelman claim. Tichelman led a troubled life which included eating disorders, drugs, and specialized schools. Investigators learned that just months before Hayes' death, Tichelman's then-boyfriend, Dean Riopelle, an Atlanta night club owner, also died from a heroin overdose. After an elaborate sting, Tichelman was arrested for the death of Forrest Hayes. Riopelle's death, originally classified as accidental, is being given a second look by Georgia authorities. On-screen text graphic: Alix Tichelman pleaded not guilty to manslaughter in the death of Forrest Hayes, and pleaded not guilty to prostitution and drug charges. Tichelman's next court appearance is on February 23, 2015. If convicted of manslaughter, Tichelman could face a maximum of fifteen years in prison. 48 HOURS: "The Millionaire, The Model & The Hit-Man" - an investigation into the relationship between Dino Guglielmelli, a millionaire health supplement distributor/ wannabe rock star, his model wife, Monica Olsen, his business partner/presumed hitman Richard Fuhrmann, and the \$80,000 "hit" Guglielmelli ordered on his wife. In 2008, Olsen, a model-turned-housewife, wanted to re-start her career, Guglielmelli was not happy. He became very controlling, dating other women and eventually filing for divorce. He tried various schemes to discredit his wife. In 2012, when he couldn't get his way in the divorce, he confided his problems to business associate/friend Richard Fuhrmann, asking him to "take care" of his wife; Fuhrmann told Guglielmelli that he would take the job. Instead of murdering Olsen, he went to the authorities in Los Angeles, California, and agreed to wear a wire. In October 2013, Fuhrmann got Guglielmelli to repeat that he would pay \$80,000 to have Olsen killed. To the authorities, it was a clear-cut case of murder for hire; Guglielmelli was arrested. Guglielmelli, in a telephone interview from jail, claims he is the victim; he was conned by Richard Fuhrmann. Authorities agree that Fuhrmann is a con man, but the conspiracy to kill Olsen was very real. In a surprise move, they offered Guglielmelli a plea deal: plead guilty to attempted murder in the second degree and serve only nine years in jail. He accepted. In a telephone interview from prison, Guglielmelli discusses his decision. Olsen is proceeding with the divorce and worries about the future. Fuhrmann fears what will happen when Guglielmelli is released from prison. On-screen text graphic: Because Dino took a plea deal he cannot appeal his conviction.
