

Education	Ohio education officials are starting work on a new series of tests to be administered to students starting in the upcoming school year. Superintendent Richard Ross said yesterday that the state has contracted with the American Institutes for Research on developing the assessments in English/Language Arts and Math that will be used in the 2015-16 school year. After an outcry from parents in Ohio and across the country, the state has dropped and defunded tests from the PARCC. A new law requires replacement tests to be shorter and to return results faster.	7/2/15
Economy	All new this morning, the abandoned railroad property where 20 arches stand, also known as the Great Stone Viaduct is being purchased by The Great Stone Viaduct Historical Education Society. The society and current owner, CSX transportation, have been in negotiations for more than a year now settling on a price of \$83-thousand for the 5 and half acres on which the arches and bridge sit. Once the purchase is final, GSV, along with others, plan to develop the site, highlighting its historical significance and making a visitors attraction in Belmont County.	7/29/15
Economy	A West Virginia workforce for women might shut down by the end of the year. West Virginia Women Work helps train women for higher paying jobs. The executive board plans to close locations in Morgantown, Charleston and Martinsburg if it doesn't get more funding soon. For more than a decade, the non-profit has offered an 11 week program to train women for careers like carpentry and iron work. The executive board says they're working with state and federal officials to get funding.	8/11/15
Education	Our last big group of schools heading back today. Harrison Hills, Southern Local, Union Local, and Marshall County schools all start today. It was a special first day for the students at all Saints Catholic School. If you remember, back in March, a massive fire destroyed St. John's Church in Benwood, as well as St. James and Johns Catholic School, leaving the community heartbroken yet ready to rebuild. Recently in a criminal case, a Wheeling police detective who wasn't among the case's initial investigators testified before the grand jury. Judge Sims says this is legal, but it undermines the grand jury process. Prosecutor Scott Smith says his office complies with the law. We're working to get more information on exactly what tactics were used by the prosecutor's office. Political Ohio Republican Governor John Kasich will run for the 2016 presidential 7/21/15 election. Gov. Kasich says he has experience with the federal budget, national security, and running a state, and that will make him unique in the Republican presidential field. Kasich ran for president once before, briefly seeking the 2000 nomination after helping seal a federal balanced budget deal as House Budget Chairman in 1997. Kasich is formally joining 15 other Republicans running for the party's presidential nomination. Crime To Hancock County now, where police seized a significant amount of drugs 7/22/15 and money from a home in Weirton. It all happened at home on Sellitti Lane. Officers discovered that Michale Cottrill and Bryan Cottrill have been allegedly allowing Corey Gaston From Steubenville and Carlos Molina from New York to use their home to distribute the illegal controlled substances. Police say all 4 people have been arrested. Chief Rob Alexander says resident tips, increased traffic at the home, and out of state licenses in the neighborhood is what lead them to this investigation into the illegal distribution of heroin and crack cocaine from the residence. Crime The murder trial for Jeffery Spring started today in Jefferson County. Spring 7/28/15 is charged with murder with firearm specification and tampering with evidence. Spring allegedly shot and killed Stephen Boyer at his home near Austin Lake in December 2014. He originally told authorities he believed Boyer was armed with a knife and broke into his home, shooting him in self defense. Healthcare With school just a few weeks away, you'll need to talk with your child's 8/4/15 doctor to make sure they have all of their immunizations, but don't be shocked if your doctor tells you there are some changes this year. Before your child can head into 7th and 12th grade, they are required to have boosters of pertussis and meningitis. Right now, the only way to get out of those shots in West Virginia is to apply for a medical exemption through Charleston.

Healthcare	Health officials say with all this rain we will probably see an increase in mosquitoes by as soon as next month. The reason for it, there are more opportunities for them to live and breed. For example, anywhere that water has been sitting still like pools, ditches, and holding ponds, mosquitoes will be around. Health officials say the rise of mosquitoes isn't the concern it's more so of what disease they will carry. Howard Gamble of the Ohio County Health Department says there are several steps you can take to prevent mosquitoes or bites. One is if you own a pool to keep it covered and highly chlorinated. If you plan to be outside or near water especially at dawn and dusk, wear protective clothing such as long sleeves, wear deet repellent, install or repair screens on windows and doors.	7/10/15

Political	Election rights advocates say recently passed Ohio voting create new hurdles for minority voters casting absentee and provisional ballots. The advocates argue the laws and similar orders by the state's elections chief unconstitutionally permit votes to be thrown out for ID errors. The updated version of a long-running voter ID lawsuit was filed today in federal court in Columbus. The lawsuit says the absentee and provisional ballot changes adversely affect the black and Hispanic voters. The Attorney General's Office declined to comment.	8/10/15
Healthcare	Continuing Coverage right now out of Marshall County, where a doctor who is facing 3 civil suits, has filed a suit of his own. Dr. Roland Chalifoux of the Valley Pain Management in McMechen has filed his suit claiming damages after a report from the West Virginia Bureau of Public Health claimed his practice was unsafe. He faces a number of charges in connection with the shooting death of twenty-six year old Dustin Moreland back in May. Clark waved his right to an attorney during his arraignment. A not guilty plea was entered by the court on his behalf. Clark's bond was set at five million dollars. A pre-trial hearing is set for next Tuesday.	7/8/15
Economy	Right now, hundreds of workers in the energy industry are without jobs. Nearly 500 workers from the natural gas and corporate divisions of Consol Energy are being laid off.
