A manager at one local sports store said this rush to get the newest Ohio State gear has boosted sales.	1/1/15
Crime	Charges have been filed for the murder of a Jefferson County man from last week. 53-year-old Jeffery Spring is facing a murder charge with a gun specification for the murder of 47-year-old Steve Boyer II. Police say last Tuesday, Spring shot and killed Boyer on Township Road 242 near Austin Lake. Sheriff Fred Abdalla says Spring was drunk when he shot Boyer and that the two were friends. Spring claims he shot Boyer because he was trying to break into Spring's home. Police are still investigating that case.	1/5/15
Political	West Virginia's first female US Senator was sworn in earlier today. Republican Shelley Moore Capito is also one of four counsel members, Majority Leader Mitch McConnell was also appointed in the new Congress.	1/6/15
Political	The Brooke County community had the chance to have their voices heard by the people they elected to office before they head to Charleston to start the latest term in the West Virginia Legislature. State Senator Ryan Ferns and Delegate Ryan Weld held a town hall meeting at the Brooke County Public Library tonight. Ferns says meetings like this are an opportunity for them to know what problems the Ohio Valley is facing and decisions they can make to solve them.	1/7/15
.Economy	A big decision has finally been made in Brooke County. The contractor has been chosen for the proposed lodge at Brooke Hills Park. LDG out of Williamsport, Pennsylvania was the consultant chosen to draw up a plan for the lodge. That according to Business Development Executive Director Pat Ford, Ford says LDG has a very strong team of 4 consultants with a variety of skill sets that are necessary to give them the product that they want. Healthcare	West Virginians who get healthcare benefits through their employers are paying some of the highest premiums in the country. According to a report, company-sponsored health programs have seen a steady increase 6.4% annually since 2010. 31 other states and the District of Columbia have seen a slow down in premiums since parts of the Affordable Care Act have been enacted.	1/13/15
Political	Governor Tomblin touched on a number of issues in his State of the State address, including energy production, the state's highways and bridges, and pollution guidelines. Tomblin urged fellow lawmakers of the importance of working together for a common good that will benefit the entire state. He spoke of the partnership between Pierpont and West Virginia Northern Community College, and West Virginia's Teacher of the Year, Gail Adams was honored as well.	1/14/15
Crime	We're following up tonight on an alert from the Bellaire Police Department, after neighbors reported a strange person knocking on their front door late at night, claiming he was from the census. The man also claimed he was going door to door for a survey. Police Chief Mike Kovalyck said his office was not aware of such a survey and he's advising people to make sure you do not invite this person into your home.	1/17/15
Crime	Wheeling Police are investigating what they're calling an alleged attempted abduction. It happened yesterday afternoon in the Hil Dar area. Police describe the suspect as a white male, about 5 feet, 9 inches tall with no facial hair. He was reportedly wearing a black jacket and dirty clothes. He appears to be in his mid-30's. The man was driving a blue, older-model sedan with unknown plate, make or model.	1/19/15
Economy	Right now West Virginia is negotiating a lease with Noble Energy. Noble Energy has submitted the highest bid to lease a one-thousand 400-acre state-owned tract under the river and agreed to pay 35 hundred dollars per acre to lease the land. It's not known what percentage of production royalties Noble will pay the state. A Noble spokeswoman hasn't commented on the deal because it hasn't been finalized.	1/20/15
Healthcare	The American Lung Association released their annual State of Tobacco Control report this week, and the results are not good for the state of West Virginia. The Mountain State received an "F" for Tobacco Prevention and Program Funding along with services available to help quit tobacco. Marshall County received a "B" while Hancock and Brooke Counties got incompletes. Ohio County also received a "B". Health administrator Howard Gamble says there is obviously room for improvements.	1/21/15
Economy	With its Ohio Valley roots dating back to the days of Abraham Lincoln and the Civil War, one local business will be changing hands today for the 6 th time in its 160 year history. Warwood Tool was founded by Henry Warwood in Martins Ferry as a manufacturing plant making gardening and coal mining tools before moving to its current location in wheeling in 1905. The business developed over the centuries, through the industrial revolution and two World Wars.	1/22/15

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Healthcare	The 29 th Annual Media Blood Donor Day was held at WesBanco Arena and this year, numbers were down. The American Red Cross says 269 people rolled up their sleeves to donate blood between 10am and 7pm. They were hoping for 400 successful units of blood, meaning nearly 500 people needed to walk through the doors. The Red Cross says 150 of today's donors were walk-ins. They say attendance was down this year due to the snow, slick roads and cold temperatures.	1/26/15
Education	Snow days have one local school district scrambling to find days that they can use later in the year to make up all of those missed school days. Hancock County Superintendent Sue Smith says the school board has decided to shorten the spring break by four days because students already missed four days of school. They'll now make those days up on March 30 th , 31 st , April 1 st and 2 nd . Those days were previously designated as out of school days, but due to the new state law schools must have 180 full days of school.	1/27/15
Political	Medicinal Marijuana may soon be legal in the Keystone State. Pennsylvania Governor Tom Wolf is vowing to sign a medical marijuana bill that Senators are currently writing. State Senators Daylin Leach and Mike Folmer say they plan to broaden their legislation that overwhelmingly passed the Senate last fall. That bill was opposed by then Governor Tom Corbett and it died when the House didn't act on it at the end of the legislative session. The new bill would expand the list of authorized medical conditions to give doctors more leeway.	1/28/15
Crime	New details on an attempted robbery overnight in Bellaire. Police say a man walked into the BP gas station on Belmont Street, just before 2 this morning with his hand inside his hoodie pocket. That's when customers and the clerk tried to take the man down, but he took off running. Chief Kovalyk says the man was wearing a dark grey hoodie, blue jeans, and a black scarf covering his face. The man never displayed a weapon and didn't get away with anything.	1/30/15
Education	Wheeling Jesuit University's Appalachian Institute is hosting a public forum on drilling for oil and gas under the Ohio River. Gastar recently won a bid to drill wells underneath a 232-acre state-owned tract under the river in Marshall County. The panelists are Wheeling Jesuit professor of biology Ben Stout and Vice President of Gastar Mike McCown. Several state legislators will also be in attendance. Crime	The father of a 2-year-old found dead in Mingo Junction last week has been arrested for child endangerment. 33-year-old Adrian Wolfe turned himself into authorities just a few hours ago. He's facing child endangerment charges for the death of his 2-year-old who police say was found bruised and suffered burns to the top of his feet. The child's mother, Channe Fleischer, was arrested and charged with child endangerment as well.	2/3/15

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Healthcare	The Ohio Valley is witnessing another big spike in the number of heroin overdoses. Officials in one local community say there could have been as many as 17 in one week. At Trinity Health System in Steubenville, Dr. David Cercone, says they've seen a sudden increase in the amount of heroin overdose cases coming into the ER. Dr. Cercone who heads up the emergency department credits this increase to a bad batch that is circulating throughout the area. This "bad batch" is due to the other substances that the heroin is cut with and now it has made its way here.	2/4/15
Political	Senator Lou Gentile has been selected to serve on the Finance Committee in the Ohio Senate. Committee members are responsible for managing the Governor's two-year budget proposal as it moves through the legislature. The Senate Finance Committee is charged with crafting a budget bill that includes, but is not limited to, funding for K-12 education, economic and workforce development and funding for local governments. For Senator Lou Gentile, focusing the budget on education is something he believes must be prioritized for this region.	2/8/15
Crime	A follow up to a Brooke County murder case tonight. Rocco Zuccaro was in court today for a hearing to admit a statement that he allegedly made to a fellow inmate. The judge decided the statement could be used during his trial. Zuccaro is accused of murdering Jason Lee Pratz at his home in February 2014. His trial is set for February 23.	2/9/15
Healthcare	West Virginia and Mississippi are known for their struggles with health crises, but when it comes to getting children vaccinated, the two states have the toughest policies. A recent measles outbreak that has sickened more than 100 people has brought attention to policies in 48 states that allow parents to opt out of vaccinating their children because of their religious or personal beliefs, or both. West Virginia and Mississippi are the only states to give those two exemptions. Separate efforts to significantly loosen those rules died in both states' legislatures last week.	2/10/15
Education	One school district in Jefferson County is beefing up security in all its schools. The NaviGate Prepared system in Buckeye Local is giving students and staff some extra protection by giving first responders a birds eye view of buildings, classrooms, and hallways. This will help law enforcement officers in the event of an armed intrusion or any other emergency incident.	2/11/15
Political	All new tonight across the Mountain State, it's been one of the most talked about issues at the Capitol so far, Prevailing Wage. Republicans wanted to repeal the law and introduced a bill to do so, but democrats and union members have opposed the bill. The Senate compromised on the prevailing wage bill. Instead of repealing the current law, lawmakers agreed to modify it, changing how it would be calculated and exempting projects costing less than half a million dollars.	2/16/15
Economy	Osaka Steakhouse Express and Room for Change Interior Decorating will soon be calling Centre Market home. Osaka will be a mobile restaurant stationed next to Coleman's Fish Market while Room for Change will be located in the Upper Market House. They're the latest businesses to be part of the revamping of Centre Market done by Kurt Zende and the City of Wheeling. Both businesses were voted on and approved at tonight's City Council meeting. Political	New details on a push for medical marijuana in the Mountain State with an unlikely ally. About a dozen people gathered today at the state capitol to show their support. State Senator Mitch Carmichael introduced a bill that would legalize marijuana for medical use only. Carmichael says he was opposed to marijuana and voted against other bills in the past, but has since been convinced of its legitimacy for medical purposes.	2/23/15
Political	Ohio Governor John Kasich has delivered his annual State of the State address. Kasich made a pitch to state lawmakers to do more to help Ohioans out of poverty. In his two-year budget, the Republican governor proposed a way to let lower income families keep child care subsidies as their income increases. He also wants to use \$310 million in state and federal dollars to better coordinate public assistance programs and job services at the county level. According to the latest U.S. Census estimates for 2013, close to 1.8 million Ohioans are living in poverty. That's a poverty rate of about 16 percent.	2/24/15

Crime	Now to the very latest out of Hancock County. The woman charged in a disturbing animal cruelty case has pleaded guilty to all her charges. Elizabeth Tustin can no longer own or work with animals for 5 years and she must pay the state 35 thousand dollars in restitution. Back in November, Sheriff's Deputies found dogs, under the care of Tustin, living in overcrowded, deplorable conditions. Tustin's case will be dismissed after 5 years, if she abides by the terms of her plea agreement.	3/4/15
Economy	West Virginia's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was released, and it remained unchanged. It stayed at 5.9 percent for January. He was also charged with two counts of domestic violence, one count of burglary, and one count of violating a protection order. He pleaded guilty to felony assault on a police dog, and violating a protection order. Williams called his girlfriend almost 70 times from jail after being ordered not to. 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Crime	The boyfriend of a missing Monroe County woman has been indicted for her murder. Ralph Ash was originally arrested on a weapons under disability charge. And now, he's facing far more serious charges. If you'll remember, Tracey Heskett was last seen on Valentine's Day getting into a large white truck with two men who were alleged pipeline workers. Earlier this month, Deputies found a body during a search of Ash's home a few weeks ago, but couldn't identify it. Sheriff Charles Black says preliminary autopsy results indicate the body is Heskett's. Ash, who is a convicted felon, has been charged with aggravated murder, abuse of a corpse, and having weapons under disability. He is being held in the Columbiana County Jail.	3/23/15
Education/Economy	One in 3 kids in the Mountain State are at risk of starting school behind their peers and never catching up. That's according to the 2014 West Virginia Kids Count Data Book that was released this morning. 32% of kids under the age of 6, live in a family with an income below the federal poverty level. That means 38,000 of the state's youngest kids are at risk of being behind their friends. And the program continues to monitor the well being of the state's kids. Organizations like Catholic Charities offer a number of programs that provide assistance in getting quality care for early childhood years.	3/24/15
Political	You may think it's a bit early to talk about elections, but the polls have opened in Weirton for early voting in April's primary election. On the 2015 City Election ballot, residents can vote for the next mayor, city council seats, and two levies.
