Healthcare	It's official, Hancock County is now smoke-free. The county-wide smoking ban took affect today. It's been almost a year since it was approved by the county board of health. Many businesses argued it would hurt their business, others took matters into their own hands in response. Mountaineer Casino, Racetrack & Resort has actually opened a smoking pavilion so their customers can continue to smoke while the rest of the casino goes smoke-free.	7/1/15

Political	In Ohio, the group working to get a marijuana legalization issue on the fall ballot has passed the next step. Ohio Attorney General Mike DeWine cleared the petition language today, a move that sends the effort to the state Ballot Board for further review. Responsible Ohio wants to create 10 designated grow sites around the state and says it has collected more than enough valid signatures to get the question before voters this fall.	7/6/15
Economy	Last month Wheeling Police Officers received 2 thousand 80 dollars in annual pay raises while the fire department only received 400 hundred dollars. Crime	We have an update for you on a murder trial in Harrison County. A trial date has now been set for Wesley Clark. Clark will appear in Harrison County Common Pleas Court on October 22 for a jury trial. He faces a number of charges in connection with the shooting death of twenty-six year old Dustin Moreland back in May. Clark waived his right to an attorney during his arraignment. A not guilty plea was entered by the court on his behalf. Clark's bond was set at five million dollars. A pre-trial hearing is set for next Tuesday.	7/8/15

Healthcare	Health officials say with all this rain we will probably see an increase in mosquitoes by as soon as next month. The reason for it, there are more opportunities for them to live and breed. For example, anywhere that water has been sitting still like pools, ditches, and holding ponds, mosquitoes will be around. Health officials say the rise of mosquitoes isn't the concern it's more so of what disease they will carry. Howard Gamble of the Ohio County Health Department says there are several steps you can take to prevent mosquitoes or bites. One is if you own a pool to keep it covered and highly chlorinated. Holt married U.S. Senator Rush Holt and was appointed to fulfill his term in the West Virginia House of Delegates after his death in 1955.
