**Baby Your Baby and Check Your Health** – Both are ongoing campaigns hosted by Mary Nickles/KUTV Anchor and designed so that KUTV works with the Utah Department of Health. Baby Your Baby is a health program for mothers to be encouraging early and regular prenatal and postnatal care. Check Your Health is committed to bringing viewers the latest information to help keep families healthy. Both of these segments run in all of our newscasts.

**Get Gephardt** - Investigative reporter Matt Gephardt takes on major corporations or government entities helping viewers who are caught in red tape. In addition, the Gephardt Unit investigations serve as a warning to consumers about potential fraud happening locally. The Gephardt unit takes many calls from the tip line each week and receives several e-mails weekly from viewers with consumer complaints. The Gephardt stories air during the 10:00pm newscast.

**Pay It Forward** - Every Wednesday, KUTV's Mark Koebel/10P Anchor features a Good Samaritan in the community. Mark gives the Good Samaritan \$500 in cash via Mountain America Credit for this person to give to their cause. This franchise highlights people and organizations working in the community on a grassroots level to make life better for others. Every Wednesday during the 10pm News there will be a billboard open to the weekly story. KUTV will also run the Pay It Forward story the following Thursday Morning in KUTV2 News This Morning and in the 2News at 7PM on KMYU.

## **CRIME AND PUBLIC SAFETY**

**Unified Fire Chief Charges Dropped** (aired 10/01/2014 @7pm, 2:30 minutes) – Charges against an assistant fire chief with the Unified Fire Department have been dropped. Marlon Jones was facing 14 counts of illegally obtaining prescription drugs by allegedly doctor shopping. Jones' defense attorney says an investigation uncovered all of his prescriptions were legally obtained by three different doctors. Our story explains how the doctors played a key role in getting the charged dismissed and lets our viewers know when the assistant chief could be back on the job.

**Pastor Arrested** (aired 10/02/2014 @7pm, 2:15 minutes) – A pastor from Oregon has been arrested in Utah. 66-year-old Leonel Rocha-Pereda is accused of sexually abusing a 15-year-old girl. Police say Rocha-Pereda was travelling to Utah to set up a new church and while he was with her he allegedly touched the young girl inappropriately. This story lets our viewers know that the pastor has been arrested and warns people that police think there may be other victims out there.

**Bus Driver DUI** (aired 10/13/2014 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Parents accompanying students on a field trip called 911 when they believed the school bus driver was driving under the influence. Sixty-seven elementary school students and seven adults were on the bus when the bus started swerving, nearly missing other vehicles on the highway. A Utah Highway Patrol Trooper eventually pulled the bus over and gave the bus driver a sobriety test. 39-year-old Lycia Martinez was arrested on a DUI charge. Troopers say they found four bottles of prescribed pills in her purse. A spokesman for the school district says Martinez had been with them for six years. All bus drivers in the district must pass a pre-employment Department of Transportation drug screen and then pass random drug tests. Those tests are conducted at least once a year. Our story also featured dash cam and 911 recordings from that day.

**Hyrum Deadly Shooting** (aired 10/14/2014 @7pm, 2:15: minutes) – A shooting investigation is underway in Cache County after a family fight turns deadly. Police say two brother-in-laws got into an argument, both men pulled a gun, and one man fired. The victim was hit and killed. The suspect was taken into custody for questioning but has not been arrested. This story let our viewers know there is not a gunman on the loose and explains why neighbors say they are surprised it happened.

**Cedar City Homicide** (10/22/2014 @7pm, 1:30 minutes) – Police are investigating an apparent homicide in Cedar City this morning. Cedar City police say they were called to a home in the 100 East block of 525 North around 10:30p last night, where they found a man dead from a gunshot wound. We spoke exclusively to a relative of the victim who tells us what she thinks happened. This story was breaking overnight, and lets our viewers know about the latest news and what family says happened.

**White House Fence Jumper:** (aired 10/22/2014 @7pm, 1:00 minute) – This story discussed a major security breach at the White House. Our live report from Washington, D.C. reviewed what went wrong when a man was able to jump a fence and get inside the White House and what is being done to correct it.

**Trick or Treat App** (10/31/2014 @7pm, 1:30minutes) – A house with a porch light on usually means trick-or-treaters are welcome, but now there's an app that will help parents map out their Halloween routes ahead of the big night. The app shows which houses plan to pass out candy, and which aren't. Holly Menino shows us how the app works. This story helps give peace of mind to parents as they prepare for trick-or-treating.

**Kid Left in Car** (aired 11/03/2014 @7pm, 2:30 minutes) – A West Jordan woman faces serious charges after she allegedly left her child in the car for as many as four hours. Police say Amber Dawn Catlin got drunk and left her 7-year-old son in her car. A woman walking by heard the boy crying inside the car and called police. This story explains that the woman was arrested and lets our viewers know she will now be facing criminal charges. It also explains that the little boy is doing okay and is now in custody of some family members.

**Cops RX Database** (aired 11/06/2014 @10pm, 6:00 minutes) – A state database tracks some of the drugs you are prescribed and police don't need a search warrant to look at that database. Two firefighters claim the database led to criminal charges being falsely filed against them and almost cost them their jobs. This story explains how the database works, who has access to it and why some say it's unconstitutional. We also talked to a state lawmaker who is proposing a bill that could change the laws surrounding the database, requiring officers to get a search warrant before searching the database.

**Sandy Kidnapping** (aired 11/7/2014 @ 7pm, 2:00 minutes) – A five-year-old girl was kidnapped from her bed in the early morning, but the suspect was eventually stopped by her father. The girl's family woke up when the suspect left through their front door. The suspect, identified as 46-year-old Troy Morley, got only as far as the yard before the father confronted him. Somehow, the father was able to talk Morley into giving his daughter back. Morley ran away afterward, and police were called out to search for him. He was found inside a home a few blocks away, and a K9 officer helped catch him. In our investigation, we discovered Morley had tried to call 9-1-1 earlier that day and wanted to talk to the FBI. He believed someone was after him. It may have been a motive for why he took the little girl in the first place.

**BYU Meth Student Lawyer** (aired 11/11/2014 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – The attorney for a BYU student under investigation for allegedly having a meth lab on his property shares his story. We focused on his attempts to clear his name as well as ramifications for other residents and students on campus.

**WVC Hit And Run Arrest** (aired 11/21/2014 @7pm, 2:30 minutes) – An arrest has been made in a hit and run accident in West Valley City. A few weeks ago, 21-year-old Justin Armendariz was hit while riding his skateboard. The driver fled the scene and ditched the car. Police were finally able to identify the driver and arrested him at his home in Kearns. This story lets our viewers know that police are no longer searching for a

suspect and explains what charges the driver could be facing. We also talked to the victim's mother, who explains her son is still in the hospital fighting for his life.

**Body Cam Bill** (aired 11/26/2014 @7pm, 2:45 minutes) – As police officer and police shootings face more scrutiny from the public, the idea of officer wearing body cameras is being talking about in a number of communities across the country. One lawmaker in Utah is drafting a bill to regulate how officers should use body cameras. This story explains what the bill would include and why it would not require all officers to wear the cameras.

**Student With Gun At School** (aired 12/01/2014 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Weber County officials are crediting a quick thinking student for saving lives today after another student brought a loaded gun to school. The girl noticed the gun and told a school resource officer who found the suspect and took him into custody. Police say the suspect had plans to shoot a particular student and then open fire on the school. This story let's viewers know this was a credible threat and that the suspect is now in juvenile detention facing criminal charges. The story also explains that investigators believe the suspected acted alone and students should feel safe when going back to school.

**Autoped Deaths** (aired 12/5/2014 @7pm, 1:30 minutes) – New numbers from the Utah Department of Transportation show a big increase in pedestrian deaths this year. Officials with UDOT say 34 pedestrians have been killed so far this year. That's up from 28 people at the same time last year. The 21% increase has transportation officials and police concerned, and are warning Utahns to be more careful on the roads. Police detectives we talked to in our story say the increase in pedestrian deaths is partly due to distractions both in the car and even on the sidewalk. Police say people are too distracted by their cell phones and headphones either in the car or while walking on the street. Police also says more people are getting hit by cars on the interstate. Last year, there was one pedestrian death on an interstate. This year, there were nine. Police say many of these are happening when people get out of their car after a crash. They suggest to viewers that they stay in the car with their seatbelt on after an accident and wait for help, instead of getting out.

**Teacher's Aide Sex Abuse Arrest** (aired 12/10/2014 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – A teacher's aide is accused of having sex with a 9<sup>th</sup> grade student. The teacher's aide from a Weber County school was arrested after the student came forward and admitted to the relationship. The sexual relationship occurred off campus. This is important for viewers because sex abuse involving figures of authority can put a student in danger.

**Sexual Exploitation** (aired 12/11/2014 @7pm, 1:30 minutes) – The story is about a Utah mother accused of selling inappropriate pictures of her daughter taken when she was only 3-years-old. The fiancé of the woman talked on camera, saying that he believed this was a misunderstanding and that the photos were only taken to explain human anatomy. The suspect is facing several charges.

**Salt Lake shooting arrests** (aired 12/22/2014 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Two men were arrested after police say one of them shot and killed a man in downtown Salt Lake City for a drug deal gone wrong. Police say the two suspects stopped and one of the men got out of the car and approached the victim. Police say a few minutes later, the suspect shot the victim. The driver turned himself in to police and the passenger was also taken into custody.

## **EDUCATION**

**High School Classes** (aired 10/15/2014 @7pm, 1:30 minutes) – Changes in Southern Utah could lead to a busier school day for some students. The Washington County School District is considering adding two more elective options for students—ultimately adding to the class load. Officials with the school district say this could give students more of a choice in what classes they take. But, for teachers, it could add to their work load. Teachers will have to spend more time teaching and have 5% less time for preparation. But, district officials say they would be able to structure teachers' time to allow them to help students more. But before this plan can be put in motion, district officials say they are discussing the changes with teachers and will make sure students' needs will be met.

**Spice Kitchen** (aired 11/12/2014 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – A local non-profit group is helping refugees learn cooking and restaurant skills. The “Spice Kitchen” just opened for its first official day for refugees and disadvantaged Utahns who need help starting a restaurant business. The kitchen was started with seed money from American Express and the program is supported by local businesses and Salt Lake County. People who participated in the program take a six month course and learn everything from food safety standards to small business development. Refugees who went through the course while it was held in rented out kitchens say they've been able to start successful businesses and sell their food all over the state.

**Utah Afghanistan Reporter** (aired 12/10/2014 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – A Utah man who is reporting for Stars & Stripes in Afghanistan talked to students at Westminster College in Salt Lake City about how his education and goals in journalism made him the reporter he is today. Josh Smith talked about his experiences overseas and why reporting is still a good career, but he also said the dangers of reporting in the Middle East are growing more risky.

**Education Ten Year Plan** (aired 12/10/2014 @7pm, 1:45 minutes) – Utah lawmakers are considering raising taxes to get more money for Utah's schools. For many years, Utah schools have been the worst funded in the nation. At an education conference, Utah politicians unveiled a plan to raise Utah school spending specifically to get better education results. The Salt Lake Chamber of Commerce offered a plan to raise education spending \$625 million over 5 years to improve Utah schools.

**66 by 2020** (aired 12/17/2014 @7pm, 1:30 minutes) – One of Governor Gary Herbert's biggest education goals are to get 66% of Utah workers to hold a college degree or certificate by the year 2020. But state officials say that may not happen. Higher Education Commissioner David Buhler says Utah will definitely make progress toward

the goal, but may not reach it. When the Governor announced the goal in 2001, 43% of working Utahns had a college degree or certificate. Now only 45% have the degree. Herbert says this goal is important for Utah's economy and the state should be aggressively working toward it—even if it's not reached by the year 2020.

**School Instagram Threats** (aired 12/19/2014 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – A St. George middle school was on the receiving end of a cyber threat. The threat was made over social media and authorities were investigating. The threat involved a gun being brought to school and used on students. Officials say they're concerned bullying has changed because of social media because students will say things over Facebook, Twitter and Instagram they wouldn't typically say face to face. This is important because it affects schools as social media becomes more popular for students.

## **CONSUMER AFFAIRS**

**Gas Prices:** (aired 10/28/2014 @7pm - 30 seconds) - Gas prices fall to their lowest prices since 2010. Our story talks about what is driving the changes in prices and where the lowest prices can be found.

**Black Friday:** (aired 10/30/2014 @7pm, 1:00 minute) – This story talked about the trend of retailers beginning their Black Friday sales early. In our story we pointed out several store chains that announced they would stay closed on Thanksgiving.

**Shopping at work** (aired 12/9/2014 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – The story is about a new survey saying that many companies across the country are loosening up their online shopping rules at the office, especially during holiday time. According to a company in the story, they believe the flexibility enhances the quality of life in employees and decreases stress during the holidays. The story is important because this affects millions of people who work and have difficulty getting their holiday shopping done.

**Airbag Recall** (aired 12/12/2014 @7pm, 1:30 minutes) – This story informed viewers about Chrysler expanding the recall of cars and trucks made with the deadly Takata airbags. The automaker extended the recall from 4 high humidity areas to 12 areas to comply with a request by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. This is important for viewers because they may have vehicles that are part of that recall.

## **YOUTH AND FAMILY**

**Breastfeeding Benefits** (aired 10/10/14 @7pm, runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Experts say breastfeeding has a lot of benefits to both mom and baby. Breastfeeding can reduce the risks of cancer and Sudden Infant Death syndrome. It can also help new moms lose weight after she gives birth. Breast milk also has a lot of benefits for newborn babies. The milk provides essential nutrients. It also has antibodies that can help keep a baby healthy.

**Cold Season Could be Dangerous for Kids with Asthma** (aired 10/17/14 @7pm, runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – A stuffy nose or cough can be annoying to most people, but for some kids, even a small cold can trigger a nasty asthma attack. Experts say the

body's immune response to a cold virus is what often triggers the asthma attack itself. One way to keep kids with asthma healthy during the cold and flu season is to prevent the spread of germs. These ways include making sure kids are washing their hands regularly, and that they receive a flu shot.

**Yoga & Kids** (aired 10/22/2014 @7pm, 1:30 minutes) – Studies have shown that yoga can help kids reduce stress, improve concentration and manage their emotions. Our story focused on a national yoga conference for kids held in Washington, D.C. Experts also weighed in on the benefit of yoga for kids. The exercise could also help kids with ADHD and other behavioral problems---and help with anxiety and depression as well. But, kids often lack focus and discipline, so teaching yoga to them is a little different than teaching adults. Teachers at this conference have adjusted the style of yoga to include more play and laughter than just deep breathing. Our story also included a warning from doctors that children with chronic medical conditions need to make sure yoga will work for them before getting into the exercise.

**Preparing for the Cost of Baby** (aired 10/24/14 @7pm. runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Experts say you should plan on seeing your doctor at least 13 times during your pregnancy. But the costs of office visits, labs, ultrasounds and deductibles can add up quickly. In fact, prenatal care and delivery costs can go well into the thousands of dollars. While your insurance may cover a bulk of the medical costs, you should still plan on paying a lot of money out of pocket. Experts say you should contact your insurance company and discuss what bills you should expect to pay. In addition, expectant parents should make sure their doctor and hospital are covered by their insurance.

**Baby Search** (aired 10/28/14 @7pm. runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Employees at Utah Valley Regional Medical Center are looking for every single person that was born at the hospital since it first opened its doors 75 years ago. They want those who were born at the hospital to join a registry. So far, about 16,000 people have joined the registry. But there are still a lot of people the hospital hopes to hear from in the coming weeks.

**Siblings Share Same Rare Disorder** (aired 10/30/14 @7pm. runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Three siblings share more than just their books and toys. The three also have a rare disease called Eosinophilic Gastrointestinal Disorder. It is a chronic illness in which white blood cells are found higher than normal amounts in the digestive tract causing life threatening food allergies to things like milk and fruit. Two of the kids have feeding tubes and their parents spend thousands of dollars a month on special formula. This disease does not have a cure.

**Healthy Halloween for Kids** (aired 10/31/14 @7pm, runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Utah children will soon hit the streets in search of Halloween candy. But health experts warn all of those treats contain sugar and empty calories. So what can parents do? One idea is to turn Halloween into an opportunity for your kids to make a little money. You can have them sell some of the candy back to you. Another idea is to have kids donate some of the candy to a good cause.

**Laundry Detergent Pods** (aired 11/10/2014 @7pm, 1:30 minutes) – Millions of people use laundry detergent packets to get their clothes clean. A new study from the journal “Pediatrics” shows the packets are extremely dangerous for kids. Research shows that between 2012 and 2013, poison control centers received more than 17 thousand calls about young kids swallowing the detergent. Swallowing the packets can cause vomiting and choking—one child even died from it. 769 kids were taken to the hospital after swallowing the packets. Doctors say kids often mistake the colorful packets for candy, and the dose in the packets can often be more dangerous than regular detergent. But manufacturers of the packets say there are clear warning labels on their products. They also they have changed the containers so kids can't see the packets inside.

**Breastfeeding While Mom is Sick** (aired 11/14/14 @7pm, runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – For new moms, being sick can shake up your breastfeeding routine. However, experts say you should continue to breastfeed, even if you have a cold or the flu. You should be able to take most over the counter medications to help with the symptoms. However, some medications can temporarily affect your milk supply. The best advice is to talk to your physician. You can also contact the Pregnancy Risk Line if you have questions.

**Local Doctor Researching Preterm Births** (aired 11/21/14 @7pm, runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – An estimated 1 in 8 babies is born prematurely. And preterm births can happen with any pregnancy. Doctor Helen Feltovich is looking into whether there are predictors of pre-term labor by studying both humans and monkeys. Her team is focusing on the tiny changes in a woman's cervix that could ultimately lead to labor. Doctor Feltovich says by better understanding these changes may one day allow doctors to predict and hopefully stop preterm labor.

**Protecting Infants During the Winter Months** (aired 11/28/14 @12P, runs 1 minute 30 seconds) – There are a lot of bugs out there that all new parents need to be aware of this time of year. There are a lot of viruses that can make newborns and infants really sick, especially since their immune systems aren't yet strong enough to fight off these illnesses. Parents can do a few things to protect their small children. First, you should be washing your hands often. Second, keep newborns and infants at home until they get their first series of vaccinations.

**Common Holiday Poison Concerns for Children** (aired 11/28/14 @7pm, runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Some of your favorite holiday decorations may be toxic to your kids and even your pets. The Utah Poison Control Center receives a lot of phone calls this time of year for everything from cough and cold medications to even holiday decorations. If your child (and even pet) gets into something, you are encouraged to call the Utah Poison Control Center as opposed to simply turning to Google.

**Toy Injuries** (aired 12/1/2014 @7pm 1:30 minutes) – As parents start their Christmas shopping, the Nationwide Children's Hospital has a warning for parents about certain toys. A study shows toy related injuries have increased nearly 40% in the past 20 years. “ride on” toys are a big reason for the jump. Doctors say those injuries include cuts to

the face or head, fractures, and even traumatic brain injuries. Scooters, wagons, tricycles and motorized cars were included in the study. Bicycles were not. Doctors say parents need to read warning labels and packaging information before buying any toys. Many parents are not buying age appropriate toys for their children. The Toy Industry Association says “toy related” injuries mean a toy was being used when the injury happened—but it doesn’t mean the toy itself caused the injury.

**Importance Of A Pediatrician** (aired 12/5/14 @7pm, runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Awaiting the birth of a baby is exciting for any new parent. Before the baby arrives, you should pick a pediatrician to handle your little one’s care. Experts say finding a physician to care for your child beforehand can help establish a foundation of trust. In some cases, your baby may need to be seen just days after leaving the hospital.

**Dying Girl Gets Christmas Cards** (aired 12/12/2014 @ 7pm, 2:00 minutes) – This story is about a 6-year-old girl in Fountain Green, Utah who is slowly dying of an unknown disease that is causing her development to go backwards. Her grandmother wanted her to feel like she has friends and posted on Facebook asking people to send the girl Christmas cards and letters. So far she has received more than 30,000 letters from people all around the world. The post office talked about how they’ve had to bring in additional postal workers to handle all the mail.

**Mom Pregnant with 2<sup>nd</sup> Set of Twins** (aired 12/19/14 @7pm, runs 1 minute 30 seconds) – A Utah mom is seeing double – literally. More than three years after delivering her first set of twins, Jessica is currently pregnant with another set of twins. Like the first set, she conceived the twins without the help of fertility treatments. Statistics vary on the odds of conceiving a second set of twins naturally. But we can safely say it is not common.

## **ENVIRONMENT**

**Utah Lake is Toxic** (aired 10/07/2014 @7pm, 2:30 minutes) – Health officials in Utah county are issuing a warning about Utah Lake. They say the lake is contaminated with toxic algae and people and pets need to stay out of the water. Officials say they tested the lake after a dog died after swimming in the lake. They found elevated levels of dangerous bacteria. This story explains how the toxic bloom developed and what is being done to try and get rid of the dangerous algae.

**Electric Cars Legislation** (aired 10/15/2014 @7pm, 1:30 minutes) – Salt Lake’s infamous inversions are right around the corner with winter approaching. The bad air has lawmakers from both parties concerned, so they are working together on a solution. One of those solutions involves electric cars. A Democrat and a Republican are teaming up to make it more affordable to buy electric cars. During the last legislative session, Representative Lowry Snow got a bill passed that would double tax credits for those who bought electric cars to \$1500. Now, he wants to try to extend that program. Ultimately, lawmakers want to clean up Utah’s air. Policy experts believe this plan will both clean the air and cut fuel costs.

**Fossil Fuel Rally** (aired 10/23/2014 @7pm, 2:30 minutes) – Several thousand people rallied in Carbon County for fossil fuels and against new rules proposed by the EPA. The rally was intended to send a message to Washington, D.C. that coal mining is a way of life in the small community of Price, Utah. This story explains why many people in the area feel like they are under attack by the federal government and lets our viewers know what rules they want the EPA to abandon.

**Saving the Bees** (aired 10/27/2014 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – A Brigham Young University student and researcher believe they've discovered a way to save the lives of billions of honey bees across the world. The team says they have come up with a virus that kills deadly bacteria that is killing billions of honey bees. According to the research, 3-14% of honey bees are dying from these bacteria. Researchers say this new virus can actually treat infected bees before they get sick.

**Avalanche Watch** (aired 11/21/2014 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Officials say avalanche danger will be high at times in November and are sending out a warning to back country skiers. Officials expect whipping winds, below freezing temperatures, and dangerous ledges. Our story focused on how search and rescuers are preparing for the winter season—especially in dangerous weather conditions. Dispatchers and rescuers met for a training session to learn how to better communicate in these situations. Our story also had tips for skiers on what to bring with them if they decide to go into the back country and what do to if there is an avalanche watch or warning.

**Reservoir Repairs** (aired 12/1/2014 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – A reservoir in Washington County is undergoing maintenance that should increase water storage for farmers. Years of sediment build up means there is less room for water. Workers hauled about 15,000 cubic yards of dirt every day for about 2 weeks to allow more water to settle in the reservoir. This is important because this is one of only a few reservoirs providing water for residents in Washington County.

**Warm Weather = Good Biz** (aired 12/9/2014 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) - Temperatures have been warmer than normal—and it almost looks more like spring outside than winter. The weather has brought good business to golf courses, which have been packed. But businesses that cater to skiers and snowboarders are praying for snow. Officials with the National Weather Service agree with them. They say things need to turn around pretty quickly. If we go through December without any snow, we will have below average snowpack. It will be very difficult to bring the level back to normal, no matter what happens. Weather forecasts indicate there may be snow in the mountains soon, but officials say much more is needed at this point.

## **DIVERSITY**

**Supreme Court Denies Appeal** (aired 10/06/2014 @7pm, 1:30 minutes) – The United States Supreme Court decided not to hear cases on same sex marriage. The decision effectively made same sex marriages legal in 30 states—including Utah. We talked to same sex couples in Utah who have been following this case very closely. Couples say they were shocked and excited about the Supreme Court's decision. Their attorneys

had been preparing for a long, drawn out fight in the court. Same sex couples we talked to say they hope same sex couples across the country will have the same protections they've been granted soon.

**Same Sex Marriage Religious Exemption Bill** (aired 10/23/2014 @7pm, 2:30 minutes) – A Utah state Representative says he will propose a law that will allow clergy to refuse to conduct gay marriages, if they object based on religious beliefs. The bill would also allow state officials to refuse as well and that has gay rights advocates crying foul. They say it could limit the access of a same sex couple to their legal right of marriage, especially in more conservative parts of the state. This story explains why the bill sponsors feel like the measure should be adopted into law and lets our viewers know when they could be asked to vote on the issue.

**NAACP on Hunt Shooting** (aired 11/10/2014 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – The NAACP is stepping in to a controversial officer involved shooting case in Saratoga Springs. Family members of a man shot by police, named Darrien Hunt, claimed police shot him because of his race. The Utah County Attorney's Office had ruled the shooting justified, but officials with the NAACP say practices and procedures were not properly followed by police. The organization called for the Department of Justice to review the case and asked for all Utah officers to get further training and wear body cameras at all times.

**Ferguson Decision** (aired 11/21/2014 @7pm, 1:30 minutes) – A decision is expected out of Ferguson, Missouri. A Grand Jury there could soon decide if a local white police officer will face criminal charges for shooting and killing an unarmed black teen. This story lets us know about the mounting tension in Ferguson, and a preview of what could happen if Officer Darren Wilson is indicted.

**Women & Prison** (aired 12/2/2014 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – A national crime fighting organization says there has been a 600% increase in the number of women ending up behind bars in the past three decades. The group, called "Fight Crime: Invest in Kids," says more than 60% of the women in jail or prison are mothers. Their solution to this problem is to visit expecting moms—especially in low income areas. They say studies show that low income women who have been involved in home visits are three times less likely to commit crime. In turn, their children are also less likely to be involved in crime. The program is federally funded, and is up for review next year.

**Chaffetz on Immigration** (aired 12/2/2014 @7pm, 1:00 minute) – Utah Congressman Jason Chaffetz put the Homeland Security Secretary in the spotlight during an immigration hearing. Chaffetz questioned Jen Johnson about President Obama's executive action on immigration. There was a question if the House would vote to undermine the President's executive order.

**Racial Profiling Guidelines** (aired 12/8/2014 @7pm, 1:30 minutes) - The Department of Justice announced new guidelines for racial profiling. The new rules ban law enforcement from profiling not just on the basis of race and ethnicity, but also religion, gender, national origin, sexual orientation and gender identity. Officers are only allowed

to consider race if it applies to a specific suspect description. The policy also has exemptions for Homeland Security who work on the border and TSA agents screening passengers at airports. The guidelines only apply to federal agencies. The U.S. Attorney General hopes the guidelines will be a model for local law enforcement. Some civil liberties groups, however, say the revised rules still don't go far enough.

**Police Diversity** (aired 12/10/2014 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – The West Valley Police Department announced they're hoping to add more minority officers to the police force. An Associated Press analysis found the city's Hispanic population is under represented in the agency. Latinos make up about one third of the population but only 5% of officers are Hispanic. The department says few members of the Hispanic population have applied to the force.

**TLC Show – Gay Men Marry Women** (aired 12/23/2014 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – TLC is debuting a new show featuring a few Utah couples in January. The show is titled "My Husband's Not Gay". All the men in these couples are attracted to other men but married women. The couples all belong to the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints.

## **HEALTH/HEALTHCARE**

**Pregnancy and Vaccinations** (aired 10/3/14 @7pm, runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Doctors are encouraging all pregnant women to get protected against the flu and whooping cough. Influenza can be very dangerous during pregnancy. Pertussis, or whooping cough, can also be dangerous to pregnant women. But it can also be deadly to infants. If the whooping cough is administered during the third trimester, it can provide antibodies to the baby.

**Importance of Taking Vitamins** (aired 10/6/14 @7pm, runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Experts say a healthy diet and multi-vitamins can both help support our general health and overall wellbeing. In a perfect world, you should be getting all of your vitamins from your meals. However, experts say most diets lack essential vitamins so they recommend vitamin supplements to replace the vitamins and nutrients that we may not be getting from the food that we eat.

**Coping with a Chronic Illness** (aired 10/9/14 @7pm, runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Life happens and sometimes you are dealt difficult news regarding your health. You may learn you have a chronic illness. Or maybe you were permanently disabled following an accident. If any of these do happen to you, experts say it is important take control of the situation by first accepting the diagnosis. Experts say you should also educate yourself. But most importantly, you should continue to live your life.

**Healthcare Numbers** (aired 10/13/2014 @7pm, runs 1:30 minutes) – More Utahns have health insurance, according to new numbers from the State Department of Health. Officials from the Utah Health Policy Project say Utah's economy has played a big role in more people being insured. As the state's economy has improved, more people have been able to get jobs that provide health insurance. An official from the policy project

also says Governor Gary Herbert's "Healthy Utah" plan will reduce the number of uninsured Utahns—if the legislature passes it.

**Important Health Screenings for Women** (aired 10/13/14 @7pm, runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – More than 11,000 women will be diagnosed with cervical cancer by the end of the year and thousands more will be diagnosed with breast cancer. Doctors say routine screenings can help identify these illnesses early. Women should be getting checked for cervical cancer beginning in their early 20s. Then at age 40, women should also be screened for breast cancer.

**Cancer Letters** (aired 10/16/14 @7pm, runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Women who have been diagnosed with breast cancer are finding comfort and hope with letters – letters written by other women in Utah who have walked in their shoes. The letter writing campaign is part of an organization called "Girls Love Mail". The Susan G. Komen/Utah Organization has partnered with "Girls Love Mail" to encourage breast cancer survivors to handwrite personalized letters that will be sent to women all across the country.

**Teacher Trek** (aired 10/21/14 @7pm, runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – A love for hiking and a passion for books has one Utah woman embarking on a trip to Nepal. Barbara Hopkins says she is ready for the challenge to climb 19,000 feet to the base camp at Mt. Everest. She has spent the last few months training by running and walking. She is also using this journey as a way to raise money for "Room to Read".

**Sports Performance** (aired 10/23/14, @7pm, runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Utah is home to a lot of sports people of all ages. While some participate in sports to win, others participate simply to stay in shape. And these athletes can continue to improve their performance all year round with the help of physicians and trainers at the LiVe Well Center at Park City Medical Center. Athletes learn how to improve their strength and endurance. They also learn how to prevent injuries.

**Local Ebola Follow** (aired 10/30/2014 @7pm, 1:00 minutes) – This story covers two Utahns who were being monitored by the state health department following their return from West Africa for Ebola symptoms. A Salt Lake County woman returned from Liberia recently where she was helping children orphaned because of the Ebola virus. The state is following CDC guidelines for 21 day monitoring, although quarantines are still possible if the situation or patient warrants.

**Healthy Option for College Students** (aired 11/4/14 @7pm, runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Top Ramen is often the meal of choice for many college students in the state. It may not be the healthiest option. The University of Utah is now trying to educate students about smart eating through its new food pantry. Students can pick up healthy foods at the pantry for no cost. The program hopes to educate students regarding future food choices.

**Unhealthy Utah Group** (aired 11/7/2014 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Governor Gary Herbert is trying to sell lawmakers on his "Healthy Utah" plan that uses federal dollars to

help poor people buy insurance. But, another group is attacking his plan. The group calls its campaign “Unhealthy Utah,” and is based in Florida. The group is sending mailers to Utah homes, claiming that Herbert’s plan will take money from Medicare for seniors and give it to people who are able to buy their own insurance. A spokesman for the Governor’s office says the plan would actually bring millions of dollars back to Utah and would help people that make very little money buy insurance. The Governor’s spokesman says the Florida based group is trying to scare and mislead people.

**Exercising During Pregnancy** (aired 11/7/14 @7pm, runs 1 minute 15 seconds) – Being pregnant doesn’t mean you have an excuse not to exercise. Doctors say you should stay active throughout your pregnancy. They recommend that pregnant women try to do something active for at least 30 minutes a day. They also say regular exercises, such as walking and swimming, can help reduce the risk for complications during pregnancy and labor and delivery.

**Cancer Fighters** (aired 11/14/2014 @10pm, 5:00 minutes) – A Utah couple who lost their daughter to a rare form of cancer have done something that will possibly save the lives of other young women. They helped researchers find a cause of this aggressive form of cancer that targets girls and young women. Because of their efforts, doctors are now working on a treatment for small cell ovarian cancer. This story explains how this couple turned their tragic loss into a lifesaving mission, how they helped doctors and what this means for the future cancer research.

**Health Benefits of Gratitude** (aired 11/27/14 @7pm, runs 1 minute 30 seconds) – We are all told to be grateful during the holidays. And research shows that there are health benefits for being grateful. In fact, experts say you should practice gratitude all year round. For one thing, being grateful has physical and emotional benefits. Also, focusing on the things we are grateful for can help reduce stress.

**Whooping Cough Outbreak** (aired 12/5/2014 @7pm, 1:00 minutes) – The Salt Lake County Health Department is reporting a whooping cough outbreak at East High School in Salt Lake City. As many as 2 dozen students were forced to stay at home because of the outbreak. Officials warn that pertussis is so contagious that even a few cases is considered an outbreak. Teachers are being given booster shots because the vaccine can wear off. This is important because parents of high school students will want to be aware of the vaccine and that it can wear off.

## **GOVERNMENT/POLITICAL**

**Latino Voting** (aired 10/13/2014 @7pm, 2:15 minutes) – Midterm elections are right around the corner and the local democratic party is making a new push to reach Hispanic voters. During the last presidential election, Latinos voted in record numbers but they still lag far behind black and white voters. Now a new campaign has been launched to get more Latino to the polls. This story explains why experts believe the numbers are so low and explains the measures being taken to try and increase voter turnout.

**Van Huizen Follow Up** (aired 11/05/2014 @7pm, 2:30 minutes) – A 16-year-old boy was released from the Utah State Prison today and placed on parole. As the teen left prison, he said it is not place for people his age and a local lawmaker agrees. The state senator says he is planning to sponsor a bill in the next legislative session to keep youth offenders out of the prison system. This story explains why he feels like young offenders should be kept in juvenile jails and how he thinks this could help them have a better future once they are released.

**Seats flip to GOP** (aired 11/18/2014 @7pm, 2:45 minutes) – Official election results are in and three seats that were initially declared democrat victories flipped and now belong to the republican party. The change caught a lot of people by surprise as mail in ballots shifted the results. This story features reaction from both sides and explains what this means for Utah Democrats, who know hold a historically low number of seats in the legislature.

**President on Immigration** (aired 11/20/2014 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – President Obama is taking matters into his own hands when it comes to Immigration Reform. The President is using his executive power to make changes to the nation's immigration system. Obama is calling his plan a common sense, middle ground approach which includes protecting some undocumented immigrants from deportation. This story explains the details of the President's executive order and let's our viewers know the impact on those living in Utah.

**CIA Torture** (aired 12/7/2014 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – Agencies are on alert after the release of the torture report of detainees at Guantanamo following the terror attacks of 2001. Our story showed viewers how the report concludes that the agency used waterboarding, sleep deprivation, body slamming, slapping, and death threats, which were covered up by the Bush Administration.

**Governor's Budget** (aired 12/11/2014 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – This story focuses on the main points of Governor Herbert's proposed budget. Reporter Rod Decker's story focused on the Governor's plans to increase the gas tax and plans to increase education spending. The Governor says he can fund highways in the short run but needs a higher tax to pay for roads in the long run.

**Don't Move The Prison Poll** (aired 12/17/2014 @7pm, 2:00 minutes) – The story is about how Utahns are not in favor of moving the Utah State Prison. There have been several stories recently about residents in 6 areas that have been named as possible relocation sites are upset about the proposed move. A new poll done by UtahPolicy.com shows that 55% of Utahns don't want the prison to be moved at all. Officials were surprised by the reaction.

**North Korea Sony Hack** (aired 12/18/2014 @7pm, 1:30 minutes) – U. S. investigators have determined hackers working for North Korea were behind the cyber attack on Sony's Movie Studio. As early as 12/18, The Department of Justice will formally place blame on hackers working for the North Korean Regime. Sony just pulled the release of

the controversial movie, “The Interview” after threats were made referencing the September 11<sup>th</sup> attacks. This story updates viewers to the latest as investigators figured out the hacks came from North Korea and what could happen now that the government has that information.

## **FRANCHISES:**

### **PAY IT FORWARD:**

**Visions for the Family** (aired 10/2/2014 @7pm, 3:30 minutes) – A nightmare that permeates homes across the world. In the wake of domestic violence sits the innocent children. But there is hope in Utah. Visions for the Family is a non-profit created by Velda McDonald who is the first generation of a family that broke the cycle of domestic violence. She provides therapy for children and parents with Visions for the Family. Our story highlighted the cause and showed viewers how they could help.

**Ezra B. Smith** (aired 10/9/2014 @7pm, 3:30 minutes) – It's estimated that a child is diagnosed with some form of autism every 20 minutes in this country. It's a diagnosis that is daunting both emotionally and financially for families. Little Ezra Smith was able to grow when his family found the Autism Behavior Treatment Center in Draper. His family wanted others to have the same life so they created the Ezra B. Smith Foundation on Autism to help. Our story highlighted the cause and showed viewers how they could help.

**Walk in Beauty** (aired 10/16/2014 @7pm, 3:30 minutes) It looks like a third world country but it's right here in Utah. Children on the Navajo Nation would spend the winter without warm shoes if it wasn't for Melyssa Holbrook and her Walk In Beauty program. She personally gathers hundreds of shoes twice a year and delivers them to 16 schools in Southern Utah and Arizona. It's all part of the Adopt An Elder charity. Our story highlighted the cause and showed viewers how they could help.

**Youth Village** (aired 10/23/2014 @7pm, 3:30 minutes) – Young children should never have to live with a cloud of fear and anxiety hanging over their heads because of a violent and dysfunctional home life. What kids really need is love, laughter and fun. At the Utah Youth Village more than 50 kids have found just that. Plus a lot of good food and grub thanks to restaurant owner Rich Sheleene, who decided to pay it forward. Our story highlighted the cause and showed viewers how they could help.

**TOP Soccer** (aired 10/30/2014 @7pm, 3:30 minutes) – It's hard to find an empty soccer field in Utah on any given summer Saturday. Now special needs players of any age and ability are able to enjoy the healthy fun thanks to the South Davis TOP Soccer program. It's a great program that opens the world to people with disabilities. Our story highlighted the cause and showed viewers how they could help.

**Lanie's Firefighters** (aired 11/6/2014 @7pm, 3:30 minutes) – Lanie Lambert is an 11-year-old spunky girl with Asperger disorder and a love for firefighters. She is now

focused on helping these lifesavers get a break from the action and go on much needed vacations. Our story highlighted the cause and showed viewers how they could help.

**East Bay Post High School** (aired 11/13/2014 @7pm, 3:30 minutes) – East Bay Post High School in Provo is teaching special needs students how to someday live independently. They produce several handmade products that are being sold as far away as Japan. Lead instructor Bret MacCabe spends his off time finding scrap wood and preparing items so his students can grow their skills. Our story highlighted the cause and showed viewers how they could help.

**Friend to Friend** (aired 11/20/2014 @7pm, 3:30 minutes) – Shelley Davies leads the special needs program at Centerpoint Legacy Theatre in Centerville. Dozens of performers, with various levels of disabilities, are preparing for the Holiday Show. Our story highlighted the cause and showed viewers how they could help.

**The Giving Grinch** (aired 11/27/2014 @7pm, 3:30 minutes) – Utah's Giving Grinch is going to make Christmas memories for some 50 children this year, and has done so for nearly two decades. 3) Topics include: decision by Sony Pictures to not release “The Interview”, a movie depicting the assassination of North Korean leader Kim Jong Un by two bumbling American reporters, in the wake of a cyber-attack and terrorist threats from North Korea; reasons behind his opposition to President Obama’s recent announcement of the start of the process to establish a normal diplomatic relationship with Cuba / reaction to Kentucky Republican Senator Rand Paul’s support for President Obama’s decision regarding Cuba / America’s foreign policy relationship with China, in light of the comparisons between the governments of Cuba and China
