There is no music, and no shouting, only gently-spoken instructions from Stephen Taylor. This is called Taiji Fusion-- A soft-form of Chinese martial arts. Taylor went to china to learn from Taiji masters. Now he's teaching students at his Lenexa gym.

Stephen Taylor: "Getting the proper structure, the bone structure and bone alignment to help with the circulation. And then when you add the breathing the meditation side it increases that circulation and that's where the majority of the health benefits."

The first thing I noticed is that the simple movements allow you to focus on your muscles --finding balance as we inhale and exhale.

KS SCHOOL FUNDING FIGHT

It's no secret Kansas schools face an uncertain future. Nancy Fritz President of Kansas National Education Association Shawnee Mission: "No matter what we try to do, the Kansas legislator keeps cutting and taking from those school districts right and left". Long time Shawnee Mission school teacher Nancy Fritz believes Senate Bill 71 could take her school district's budget to a new low. And Fritz isn't alone. Mike Slagel, Ph.D. Assistant Superintendent Blue Valley: "We are vehemently opposed to Senate Bill 71 and we're going to make sure they understand that."

The bill aims to rewrite the formula for how Kansas public schools are funded. It was introduced this week in an effort to balance the budget. If it becomes law the Shawnee Mission and Blue Valley districts would lose millions. Blue Valley Assistant Superintendent Mike Slagel says the most difficult part, the money has already been accounted for.

Mike Slagel, Ph.D. Assistant Superintendent Blue Valley: "We are in the middle of the school year right now, so that 3.3 million dollars would be hitting us in the middle of the school year. Obviously we already have the teachers in the classroom; we already have the bus drivers, so we'd have to look for other ways to manage the newfound deficit." Slagel says news of the midyear budget reduction isn't exactly a surprise, but it's still unexpected. Figuring out how to do more with less isn't an easy task, not for administrators, or teachers.

MOM STAGES ABDUCTION

Police say the way a Troy Missouri family tried to teach their 6 year old about stranger danger is criminal. Detectives say the boy's aunt asked a co-worker to kidnap her 6 year old nephew. Apparently the boy's mother and grandmother were also in on it.

Andy Binder, Lincoln County Sheriff Dept.: "The man took the boy out for a ride of terror. The boy immediately started crying when he's told he will never see his mother again, he's never going to see his house, and then when he doesn't stop crying the man shows him a gun and says if you don't be quiet you're going to be harmed."

Deputies say the boy was crying. The man fed up, tied up the boy with trash bags and then put a coat over his head. A while later he brought the boy back but the boy didn't know it because his eyes were covered. His aunt then threatened to sell the boy as a sex slave. Police say the boy told school officials what happened on Wednesday. Prosecutors charged the 4 adults with kidnapping and abuse of a child.

WHEAT CELIAC RESEARCH

We told you earlier this week about researchers in Kansas that are working to develop a gluten-free wheat. If they pull it off, it would be a major win for people battling celiac disease -- and other gluten-related illnesses. The work is being done at the "engrain" company in Manhattan, Kansas.

Researchers aren't working to remove the gluten from wheat, rather the specific protein in wheat that people are allergic to. They are hoping to get rid of the component in wheat protein that people are allergic to.

Their work will take up to two years -- and once it's done, the data will hopefully be used to breed a new version of wheat. Which researchers hope to have available in the next decade.
