#### ISSUE: HEALTH CARE & WELFARE

Program: Red Cross Blood Donation PSAs

Description: KBSI produced and aired PSAs to urge viewers to give blood, to replenish blood supplies that are running very low due to the coronavirus outbreak. Information is given on how

volunteers can set up an appointment with the Red Cross to donate.

Description: Interview with Dr. Debbie Lee-DeStefano, Professor of Spanish Language and Culture at Southeast Missouri State University, to discuss the school's Spanish for Health Professions minor study program. She discusses how the program came from a presentation concerning the need to include linguistically and culturally competent health care, which developed into a series of classes which grew into a minor program. She discusses how although there may be a low percentage of Hispanic people in an area, there is still the need to be sure that health personnel be able to communicate with a patient whose primary language is Spanish, to make sure a correct diagnosis is made. Dr. Lee-DeStefano also talks about how part of the program involves students travelling to Ecuador to spend time learning from local medical instructors, as well as going into the rural areas of the country to experience first hand medical care for the indigenous people.

Description: Interview with Dr. Robert Hamblin, retired professor from Southeast Missouri State University, and recently author of "Darkness Descending," a book of poetry inspired by his experiences taking care of his wife, Kay, who has been stricken with alzheimer's. He discusses some of his experiences and difficulties that he encountered as Kay's health deteriorated. He explains how the book began as a project that his wife began in an attempt to write about her experiences; but as she lost the ability to write, he took over the project. He found that writing the poems became therapeutic to help cope. Dr. Hamblin reads some of his poems for the program.

Description: The Jackson County, II., Health Department reported 23 new cases of Covid-19, the most in a single day since the start of the pandemic, with many of the cases involving young people in the teens and 20s. 21-year old Heather Gathman says many young people believe they are at less risk and are less likely to take precautions. Jackson County Health Department administrator Bart Hagston says he has become more concerned what impact this will have in the community. As part of a contract tracing grant from the state, the County Health Department is hiring fourteen additional people to expand their tracing efforts.

Description: Interview with Ron Escarda, Group Director for Universal Health Services, to discuss the creation of the Southeast Behavioral Health Hospital which is expected to open in December 2020. UHS is a health care business which currently operates about 250 behavioral health facilities throughout the country. UHS will partner with Southeast Health in building the new 102-bed facility near Cape Girardeau, Mo. According to Mr. Escarda, the facility will offer state-of-the-art inpatient services to all ages, with a safe and therapeutic environment. UHS will provide educational and training services to locally employed personnel; as well as operational support resources. Mr. Escarda also discusses some of the various types of therapy programs that the facility will provide.

Description: Cape Girardeau County health officials say it's more important than ever to get a flu shot this year due to the coronavirus pandemic. They say it's best to get the shot as early as possible so your body is able to build up immunity. Cape County Public Health Director, Jane Wernsman, says you are more likely becoming a victim of Covid-19 if your body is busy fighting off the flu. She says most people who have died from Covid-19, did so because their immune system is compromised by other health problems. Ms. Wernsman says flu shots are most needed for older people, women who are pregnant and people with chronic health problems.

The other goal of the center is to give students training and experience in working with autistic children. One new area the center is exploring is helping people through "telehelp," which would better enable the center to reach families in rural areas. Dr. Patrich also discusses the opening of a new branch office in Sikeston, Mo.

Description: Starting Monday, people in St. Francois County, Mo., will be required to wear masks in public places, after the County Health Center Board held a special session today to vote on the mandate. During the meeting, held in Farmington, numerous people voiced their opinions, both for and against wearing masks. Board member, Tara Wadlow, voted for the mandate, stating that her reason was that the CDC has recommended wearing masks as the simplest way to hamper the spread of Covid-19. Board Treasurer, Dr. Victoria Damba, voted against the mandate, saying that we all have to make choices about our health, and the mandate takes away people's right to have that choice. The mandate will go into effect Monday, September 21<sup>st</sup>, at midnight.

Description: Lakes and rivers are seeing more people due to the pandemic; but not everyone is staying safe on the water. According to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, more adult males have drowned this year compared to past years. Park Ranger Andrew E. Jefferson, Sr., says July is one of the deadliest months for water related activities, and that people need to practice more common sense when they're on the water. He says they are urging everyone to wear a life jacket, no matter their age. Jefferson says that most victims had no intention to be in the water; but they end up drowning after accidentally falling out of the boat.

Description: The Show Me State is asking motorist to be more careful around railroad crossings. The Missouri Department of Transportation has teamed with Operation Lifesaver for Rail Safety Week. On average in Missouri, there are thirty-five highway rail crossing collisions each year, resulting in more than five fatalities. Railroad Administrator, Troy Hughes, says it's common for accidents to happen when motorists think they can move faster than a train. He says too often when the gates come down, people try to go around the gates not realizing the train is traveling faster than it may appear. Hughes adds that it's best to always allow an approaching train to cross first, since it typically takes a train more than a mile to come to a complete stop.

She also discusses how the organization works with local churches in providing services to those in need.

The company's president, Tyler Needham, started the business earlier this year and says the mission is to keep products such as these American-made. Needham says they started with one machine that produces about 40,000 masks a day, and they are looking to ramp up production by adding several more machine during the coming months.

Marchi says that he has had to cut hours because there's less volume. According to Marchi, they typically handle 300 to 350 shirts a day; but right now, they are only doing about 200 shirts a day. He adds that they have been trying to attract more customers by running ads on social media.

Ministry President, George Culley, says the reaction from the community has been amazing; but he couldn't do it without the blessing of his team. He says he has twenty to thirty volunteers, but they work as if they are three hundred. If you need food, the ministry is hosting an event tomorrow. You only need to bring a form of ID with your address. The food bank is one of thousands benefitting from the Farmers to Families food box program.

Southern Illinois University Faculty Administrator President Dave Johnson is calling for university leaders to put student safety first. He is concerned that the number of Covid-19 cases will increase as students return in the fall; and he asks that university administrators consider that just because opening the campus is allowable, that it doesn't mean it is necessary. Johnson adds that plans to reopen SIU is still under construction.

Ms. Hahn discusses how the university became a test-optional institution in the fall of 2019; but with many standardized tests being cancelled earlier this year due to Covid-19, the school decided to expand the opportunities for incoming student, without a test score, starting the fall of 2021. The school has also expanded its institutional scholarships to be available for more test-optional students, along with an increase in the amount of the scholarships. Ms. Hahn also discusses how the pandemic has created a need to expand the ability to virtually recruit new students, as well as allow students and parents to explore and learn more about the university on-line. She also discusses how they have resumed some face-to-face recruitment activities for potential new students and their families. She also offers information on how new students can apply on-line for student aid and scholarships.

He says the biggest challenge at this time is the potential consolidation of the county courthouses. The county currently has two aging courthouses in separate cities, and they are considering various ideas and suggestion on how to move towards consolidating into one building. Other issues of public concern include economic development, upkeep of county roads and improvement of county parks.

Description: Interview with Jason Williams, Construction Engineer with the Missouri Department of Transportation, to discuss plans for improvements to the intersection of Interstate 55 with Highway 61 in Cape Girardeau County. Williams discusses why the changes were needed, due to two aging interstate bridges, which needed to be replaced, as well as an unusual interchange configuration for people entering the interstate. They found that it would be cost effective to completely redo the interchange while replacing the bridges. MoDot has decided to change the section of Highway 61 to a Divergent Diamond Interchange (DDI), which will make it safer for motorists to get onto the interstate without having to make a left turn in front of oncoming traffic.

Description: With only two months remaining before the 2020 census deadline, many local communities are reporting a lower than expected number of responses. Southern Illinois Census Program Manager, Lynden Schuyler, says she hopes that the number of people filling out their census is on the rise. Jackson County, Il., reports that only 55% of residents have responded so far. Schuyler says there are many reasons for the lower response; but Covid-19 is the largest. The pandemic has stopped door-to-door canvasing; but the outbreak should be people main reason to return their census as their communities will need all the funds they can get to recover. In response, Carbondale Main Street is holding an event to encourage people to fill out their census.

Description: An issue on the November ballot could give Illinois voters a chance to change the state's tax system, from a flat tax to a progressive income tax. John Jackson, representing the Paul Simon Institute, says the changes would mean lower-income residents would pay a lower tax rate. The proposal is backed by Governor Pritzker who says the change could generate an added three-billion dollars for the state, but increasing the tax rate for higher income earners. Jackson says the change will require a lot of support, since the proposal needs more than 60% of voter's approval to be passed. If approved, the new tax rate would take effect on January 1<sup>st</sup>, 2021. Tax rates for individuals earning \$250,000 or less, would stay the same or go down; while the tax rate would go up for people earning more than \$250,000.

Cape Girardeau County Election Supervisor, Alan Seabaugh, says since more people may be voting absentee this year, the County Clerk office is adding a feature to its election website, which will allow you to track your ballot. He says people can watch from the start, to see if the ballot has been sent to them, up to when the ballot has arrived at the County Clerk's office and is available to be counted on Election Day. Seabaugh says the goal is to have the feature available on-line by the time absentee voting begins on September 22<sup>nd</sup>.
