The orders, while integral to preventing the spread of the **coronavirus**, have **impacted the state's economy and social services**. Some authoritarian leaders have reached beyond mandated lockdowns in response to the outbreak, censoring media, canceling elections, and shutting down investigations. In this virtual forum, Dr. Yasha Monk, a political scientist known for his work on the rise of populism and the crisis of liberal democracy, offered insights about how the coronavirus crisis may reshape democracy.

President Eisenhower established the first Law Day in 1958 to mark the nation's commitment to the rule of law. This year's Law Day celebrates 100 years since the 19th amendment's ratification, which gave women the right to vote. Despite the amendment, women were not granted equal access to voting, particularly for women of color in the Jim Crow South. Today, strict voter ID laws often prevent minority communities from voting. The coronavirus pandemic is amplifying these issues as the country ponders **how and when to conduct an election during a public health crisis**. During this Forum, Virginia Kase, CEO of the League of Women Voters, addressed these issues and acknowledge that many people didn't immediately benefit from the passage of the 19th amendment.

Its community-based teams work with local partners to bring free bail assistance to thousands of people each year, reducing the human suffering caused by unaffordable cash bail, restoring the presumption of innocence, and building on the work of grassroots movements for decarceration.

After the killing of George Floyd at the hands of police, journalists Erika D. Smith, a columnist for the Los Angeles Times and Jamil Smith Senior Writer at Rolling Stone, wrote about racism in America's systems. **The nation is facing a "cascade of crises" – rising unemployment; increased risk of death, either from COVID-19 or policy brutality, both of which disproportionately affect the Black community; an increased militarized police presence, and a looming housing crisis.** Ms. Smith pointed out the fact that Blacks in our country have more difficulty navigating networks of power.

The World Health Assembly has designated 2020 the International Year of the Nurse and the Midwife in celebration of the 200th birthday of Florence Nightingale. Dr. May Wykle is one of the nation's most distinguished nursing leaders, as well as an internationally recognized expert in geriatric and mental health nursing. She is also the first African American woman in nursing at major research university in the U.S. to have an endowed chair named after her. Doctor Wykle is of the opinion that the **future of nursing will continue to expand** and that nurses will become more and more respected within the healthcare community.
