This morning FOX23 is hearing from a woman who was buried in rubble at the TGI's Friday's as the storm blew through. Celia Daniel is covered in cuts and staples from head to toe, and has a fractured skull and vertebra. Her ten-year old son has a concussion. She says they were just about to leave the restaurant when it started pouring-- so they stayed inside and shot this cell phone video. Then she says the tornado hit and debris came crashing through the window. Daniel says "we were trying to run and hide. Something hit in the back of my head and it felt like I got ran over by a car." Daniel says "it was scary. I mean everyone was screaming and stuff and just blood everywhere." She says a restaurant employee put pressure on one of her cuts and a friend applied a tourniquet and kept her stable until medical help could get to them.

The school says it called instructors from Denver and Los Angeles to fill in while the unionized teachers strike. Emergency Teaching Certificates Issued in Tulsa and Broken Arrow

Due to Oklahoma's teacher shortage, more than 850 emergency teaching certifications have been approved this year. 118 for the Tulsa Public School District 11 for Union, and 7 for Broken Arrow. As a parent you want your child to have a qualified teacher." Most of the emergency certifications are to fill vacancies at early childhood facilities and elementary schools. The State is expected to issue another round of emergency certifications next month.

Roberts says "this place feels like home to me." Roberts also says programs here have helped him get a job, and back on his feet. Roberts says "I lost my house, lost my job, and pretty much lost everything, but now they give me hope, I hope everybody gets that good feeling inside themselves when they come here. The Mission hopes to serve more people like Blake with a new facility. The rescue mission has broken ground on the Miller Family Center for life change. They will have almost double the beds for men, and triple the beds for women and kids. The new facility will have a dining room big enough room to fit up to 120 people.
