Bridge Closed to Fix Flooding Damage

A road linking Broken Arrow and Bixby is expected to close so crews can fix damage caused by flooding. 131st Street between Memorial and Mingo will close. The Oklahoma Department of Transportation has deemed the road structurally deficient. The work is part of the Haikey Creek Flood Protection Project. It's expected to be finished in September.

They are waiting for the ground in the area to stabilize before they start making improvements to that part of Highway 51.

Shipping Increases After Flooding

If it's approved, the changes will take a couple of years before they go into effect.

He says that this helps students and teachers get halfway through the course material by the end of November so they can get out of school earlier than most other schools.

University President Endorses Sales Tax Increase to Fund Education

University of Oklahoma President David Boren is endorsing a statewide one cent sales tax increase to help education. Boren says the additional funding is needed to help fix the teacher shortage by providing them with more competitive salaries. He says if voters approve the sales tax, more than \$600 million would be raised in the first year. More than half of that money would be used to give teachers a raise, he says.

Teacher Who Told Left Handed Student to Write With Other Hand Resigns

New Store to be Built on RiverParks Land

Oklahoma's first REI store will be built in south Tulsa. Tulsa city councilors approved the rezoning request for the store to be built on 12 acres at 71st and Riverside. The new store is the first of its kind, not only for the brand in Oklahoma, but it is the latest retail store to be approved by city leaders to be built on the Arkansas River. Mayor Dewey Bartlett's office has been working with REI on getting this deal approved and getting them the site for more than a year now.

City Asks for Input to Spend Vision 2025 Money

The city of Tulsa wants your ideas about how to spend Vision 2025 money. The ideas that are coming in so far include renovations to the Pearl District and creating an art deco museum in Tulsa. The next hearing is scheduled for tomorrow. If the Vision 2025 tax is renewed, part of the money will be spent on keeping water in the Arkansas River.

Tulsa Hopes Mediation Will End Airport Trust Lawsuit

Tulsa city leaders are now hoping mediation will end a lawsuit against the Tulsa Airports Improvement Trust. The Bank of Oklahoma sued the trust for more than \$15 million in connection with a loan that was made 15 years ago. It was part of the efforts to have a regional airline based in Tulsa. Great Plains Airlines filed for bankruptcy in January 2004.

City Councilors to Approve Lawsuit Settlement

Tulsa city councilors are expected to approve a \$35,000 settlement in a discrimination lawsuit filed against the Tulsa Fire Department. Jessica Chance's lawsuit claimed that she wasn't hired as a firefighter because she's a woman. She claims that during the hiring process Chief Ray Driskell took her picture and later compared it to nude pictures obtained from a police officer she used to date. The city council is expected to approve it next Thursday.

Tulsans to Pay Less for Trash Service

Most Tulsans will pay less for trash service before long. The Tulsa City Council approved a new rate structure that will mean 90% of Tulsans will have a lower bill. Starting November 1st you will get to choose your pickup plan. The standard rate will be based on the current service, but people can add premium options such as backyard pick-up.

Mayor Delivers State of the City Address

Tulsa Mayor Dewey Bartlett delivered his state of the city address Tuesday. He went before a record-breaking crowd at the Cox Business Center and tackled a number of issues, including how Vision 2025 money should be spent if it is approved by voters. "We have to realize that we are one Tulsa and whatever affects a portion, whether good or bad, affected the entirety of the city," Bartlett said. We also asked the mayor about development plans for Turkey Mountain after a developer backed out of plans to put an outlet mall on the site. He said a portion of the area could be set aside for development in the future.

Councilors Simplify Process for Outlet Mall Approval

The City of Tulsa is simplifying the process to get an outlet mall in east Tulsa. Another outlet mall planned in west Tulsa moved their plans to Jenks. Now Tulsa's focusing their attention on an outlet mall that would be located near Admiral and 129th East Avenue. City councilors are considering a tax increment finance district focused on sales tax dollars, not property taxes. We're told it will speed up the process.

Councilor Wants to Create Transit Hub

A Tulsa city councilor wants to expand the Center of the Universe into a downtown transit hub. Councilor Blake Ewing envisions passenger train service, expanded bus service and more parking downtown. His plan, proposed on Thursday, would cost around \$175 million spread out over several phases.

City has No Plans to Fix Problem Road

It's been called a traffic nightmare, but so far there are no plans to fix a problem road for at least five years. Drivers are fed up with Mingo Road between 71st and 91st Streets. A study shows traffic has increased by 50% in just one year along that road. Tulsa City Councilor Anna America has proposed a Vision 2025 widening project for the area in hopes of solving the traffic issue soon.

Two Suspects Found in a Double Shooting in North Tulsa

Tulsa Police now say there are at least two suspects in a shooting that's put one man in the hospital in critical condition. Police tell FOX23 they think it's connected to other shootings and to gangs in the area. Sgt. Dave Walker says he thinks the same gang is behind the homicide Thursday and the Sunday shooting. "Two shootings on the same street kind of makes you indicate that something is going on," Walker says. Police call it an ambush. The victims were walking out of their home when at least two, possibly three, men approached and starting shooting. The victims were taken to the hospital where one is not expected to survive.

Man Robbed Trying to Meet Online Acquaintance

He told investigators the man pointed a gun at him and demanded cash. The thief got away with a cell phone and about a hundred bucks.

One Person Shot in Overnight Home Invasion

Two people are in the hospital after four men forced their way inside the home, tied up the family and shot one person in the mouth. Police brought the K9 officer out and searched the area, but were unable to find any of the suspects. They expect the men ran into the woods behind the house or had a car waiting nearby. The suspects are also believed to have killed the family dog before breaking a sliding glass door to get into the house. The victims were taken to a hospital, but are expected to recover. Investigators say five people were in the house at the time of the invasion.

Three People Arrested in Walmart Heist

Oklahoma Labor Commissioner Murdered

Oklahoma Labor Commissioner Mark Costello was murdered in Oklahoma City. According to police, he was stabbed to death outside a Braum's in Oklahoma City by his son Christian. Police say they met at the restaurant to resolve an argument from earlier in the day. The confrontation turned physical and Christian allegedly stabbed his father several times with a steak knife. Witnesses say they had to ram Costello with a car to stop him.

Robber Tries to Lock Employee in Cooler

Tulsa Police investigators say an armed robber tried to lock a Subway employee inside the walk-in cooler. Police say they man left with all of the money inside the cash register. Before he left, he walked the employee into the cooler and slid a table in front of the door trying to lock the employee inside. The employee was able to get out and call 911. He was not injured. Police are still searching for the suspect, but because the man wore a bandana over his face they do not have a good description.

Teens Arrested After Police Chase

Tulsa County Sheriff's Office deputies arrested two teenagers they say led them on a chase with a stolen truck. Deputies say it started when they tried to pull the teens over and they wouldn't stop. They say they ended up jumping out of the truck at a Warehouse Market near 49th West Avenue and Archer, but deputies chased them down. Investigators say the truck was stolen from family members in Sand Springs.

Man Jailed After Crashing Into Fence and Parked Car

The suspect lives in the complex and officers believe he was on his way home when he crashed through the fence.

Testing Results Expected for West Nile Mosquitoes

The Tulsa County Health Department will release the latest number of West Nile carrying mosquitoes caught in traps around the county later this morning. The department has set up traps across the area. So far this year, they've tested about 9,000 mosquitoes from 270 traps. Only mosquitoes in five of those traps have tested positive for the West Nile virus. There are no human cases reported in Tulsa County, but there are two cases in the state. Officials say the best way to reduce the risk is to make sure there is no standing water in your yard where mosquitoes could breed.

Five People Diagnosed with West Nile in Oklahoma

Health Department Investigates Salmonella Outbreak in Cucumbers

Seven cases of salmonella poisoning from contaminated cucumbers happened in Oklahoma. According to health officials 285 people have gotten sick and one woman died in the outbreak. The cucumbers were from Andrew and Williamson sold under the name "Limited Edition" between August $\mathbf{1}^{st}$ and September $\mathbf{3}^{rd}$ at Walmart and Sam's Club.

Mystery Bug Bites at Claremore School

Health officials confirm the fourth death from West Nile in Oklahoma so far this year. The latest happened in Kingfisher County.
