Dry Conditions See Tulsa Firefighters Sent to Panhandle Fire

Thirty members of the Tulsa Fire Department's Wildfire Task Force headed to Woodward County in Western Oklahoma to help battle the wildfires started 2 days ago thanks to dry and windy weather. The taskforce was called up by the state forestry service. It was formed 6 months ago and made up of firefighters from departments across Green Country. Since the wildfires started, state officials say well over 366,000 acres have burned, destroying homes, causing evacuations, and even killing one man. Air tankers and National Guard helicopters are among the resources being used to battle the historic flames. The Tulsa team sent 7 brush trucks and 3 support vehicles to join the more than 500 fire fighters from across Oklahoma. The Oklahoma Forestry Service predicts the fire risk in western Oklahoma to remain high through the middle of next week, due to the weather conditions.

Hot Temps Help Boost Lake Businesses

The heat is driving visitors to Keystone Lake in droves, something local businesses are thankful for. Pier 51 Marina says business was hit hard last year thanks to the flooding that happened over Memorial Day weekend. The marina owners had to turn off power, limit gasoline and generators, and couldn't open the majority of the area including the café and retail store. This downturn came after another big flood hit 2 years before, in 2015. The owners are thankful for a respite in the rain and anticipate a great start to the summer. They have already had to close their boating ramp because they're at capacity.

Heat Wave Prompts Cooling Centers

The Salvation Army is not the only place in town folks have sought a respite, the John 3:16 mission says they've seen their numbers increase too.

Braden has spent countless hours in research labs during the school year, focusing specifically on removing heavy metals from contaminated streams. Braden and another student were working to find funding for science fairs across the state two months ago, and now Braden has moved on to follow his passion and compete in multiple fairs. He's spent months working to find a cheaper way to remove heavy metals from city water sources. Braden says right now the EPA spends millions of dollars to do it, but his system consists of 600 beads and only costs ten dollars to make. The project caught the attention of the judges and he even got a special award encouraging him to trademark his research.

Muskogee Sheriff's deputies say two teens were walking in the city of Muskogee when they were picked up by Robert Lane. Lane brought them to his house in Wainwright but didn't let them leave. For 12 days, the two 15-year-olds were locked in a back bedroom, with Lane only letting them out of the room a few times. The teens finally talked Lane into letting them leave, and were able to walk to a nearby convenience store for help. Neighbors were shocked to hear about what had happened just down the street from them, and are glad Lane is now in jail.

Police say two 17-year-old girls used Snapchat to try to buy marijuana from a man in Jenks and ended up being victims of a carjacking. Officers say when the girls went to Jenks, they met the man and went to an apartment complex in south Tulsa. Three men in ski masks jumped out and ambushed them once they arrived. The suspect pulled the victims out of the truck, took their phone and the drug money, and then stole the truck. Officer say they found one of the phones using a GPS iPhone app, and then found the stolen truck later that morning. A spokesperson for the Tulsa Police Department warned that when you are breaking the law by doing something like buying drugs, you run the risk of becoming the victim of a crime yourself.

Jewelry Theft Ends In Arrest Thanks to Tracking Device

Local police said they were able to track a jewelry thief thanks to a small tracking device. Police arrested Timothy Beaver, who is now out of jail on a \$5,000 bond. It all started when Michael Hoyt said he hired Beaver to do some plumbing work at his home. Hoyt's girlfriend noticed some jewelry missing the next day, so they called Broken Arrow Police to file a report. Hoyt said the plumbing job still wasn't finished but he was concerned about having Beaver back in his home, so he put a tracking device inside his girlfriend's bag of jewelry just in case. Police say Beaver had hidden the bag in his lunch cooler outside, and Hoyt activated the noise on the tracking device while police interviewed Beaver. Hoyt says he's

proud of his little tracker and that his idea kept him from becoming a victim again. Police say they searched Beaver's home and truck and found other jewelry believed to be from other houses in the area. Beaver was booked into jail on complaints of larceny and possession of stolen property.

Stabbing Victim Found Dead in Rogers County

Rogers County Sheriff Scott Walton said today that deputies were dispatched to a mobile home park just after 3am when a man and his dog found a man with apparent stab wounds while out walking. Walton says dispatch walked the called through first aid steps, and the man made every effort to check for a pulse and breathing. Walton commended both the man and dispatch for doing an excellent job. Investigators believe the stabbing happened a few hours before the victim was found, and neighbors reported hearing arguing and yelling from the trailer around midnight. A search warrant was executed at the home near where the victim was found, but investigators did not find the murder weapon in the home. Walton says this is the first workable homicide of 2018 for Rogers County.


Oklahoma Fire Departments Host Soccer Match

My41 runs weather alert tickers from FOX23 News during periods of severe weather. When there is a tornado warning in the Tulsa metro area, My41 also simulcasts weather cut-ins produced by FOX23 News. FOX23 News is committed to being on-air and online, giving the latest conditions as severe weather moves into the KOKI-TV/KMYT-TV viewing area.

Relay for Life – My41 sponsored a fundraising walk for the American Cancer Society on June 15, 2018. Our stations produced and aired PSAs several times in advance of the event to encourage community participation. The event raised over \$103,000 for the Pancreatic Cancer Action Network.
