Wet Morning Drive

Crews Dig Ditches to Help Stop Flooding in Pittsburg County

Flooding shut down highways in Pittsburg County, but neighbors say they've seen worse. The highway is not safe to cross, but there are still ways to get around the flooding says OHP. Crews are waiting for the flood waters to recede now, but before the rains moved in they dug ditches to help with the water flow. The National Weather Service says it only takes six inches of fast moving water to knock you off your feet.

Heavy Rain and Flooding Shuts Down Campsites at Area Lakes

Major flooding shut down some recreation areas around local lakes and with more rain expected, it could put a damper on the holiday weekend. Officials recommend checking in with the area office before heading out.

People Forced Out of Homes by Floodwaters

One family in Wagoner told FOX23 that if it weren't for the fire department, it would have been a lot worse. "The Wagoner Fire Department actually filled all these sandbags before we got the actual sandbag machine. They filled them by hand and their guys came out and stacked these houses," explains one homeowner. County officials say several homes are still under water and their focus is now pumping all of that water out of the area.

Heat Possible Factor in Near Drowning at Local Water Park

The heat may have been a factor in a teenager's near drowning at Big Splash. A second year lifeguard jumped into the water when he was the teen go underwater. Witnesses say it took about 30 seconds of rescue breaths before the teenager started coughing up water. "We were very fortunate that the lifeguard did see the young man. I have nothing but positive things to say," says Bill Von Thaden, lifeguard supervisor at Big Splash.

Pittsburg County Hands Out Sandbags to Homeowners to Curb Floodwaters

The Pittsburg County Emergency Management Director says the creeks are just now starting to overflow their banks and water is creeping across Highway 31.

Oklahoma Teachers Get More Money After Bill Signed by Governor

Oklahoma teachers will now see more money in their paychecks, but some are not happy about it. Under a new bill signed by Governor Mary Fallin, districts can no longer deduct union dues from teacher's paychecks. Fallin signed the bill even after educators complained, saying they are being unfairly targeted because the bill only applies to unions that collectively bargain on behalf of their members.

Contract Approved for New Superintendent of Tulsa Public Schools

Tulsa's new superintendent is officially under contract and that contract means the new superintendent is making \$60,000 more than her predecessor. According to district spokesman Chris Payne, the salaries are about equal. However, there are other types of compensation that Dr. Keith Ballard took, that new superintendent Dr. Deborah Gist is taking in smaller amounts. "If you want to be able to attract people that have high talent, and Dr. Gist is certainly in that category, you have to put together compensation packages that are attractive and make them want to stay," Payne says. The Tulsa School Board spent several hours on the issue before unanimously approving Dr. Gist's contract. She comes to Tulsa from Rhode Island where she served as Commissioner of Education.

Tulsa Continues to Deal with Teacher Shortage

Too many students and not enough teachers is one of the biggest problems facing educators in Oklahoma. Tulsa Public Schools started the year with 83 open teaching positions. We checked and as we near the end of the year, TPS still has about 40 substitute teachers covering classrooms. Officials say it's a concern because it's important for kids to establish stability. "Being a former teacher myself, I found that my students were very appreciative that I wasn't often sick or out of the classroom," explains Ashlee Whitehead, TPS recruiter. Governor Mary Fallin signed a bill into law this week that will make it easier to attract teachers from other states. It allows them to start teaching in Oklahoma without having to be re-certified.

Tulsa Public School Teachers Accused of Helping Students Cheat on Tests

A parent and student tell FOX23 that two Tulsa Public Schools teachers helped students cheat on state tests. TPS spokesman Chris Payne confirmed that two Skelly Elementary teachers have been suspended. The student told FOX23 that one teacher handed out study guides with answers to the state reading test that they were allowed to take home. We brought these allegations to TPS. They refused to comment because it's a personnel issue. Payne says the teachers are suspended until a board meeting that will be held at a later date.

Bill on Governor's Desk Would Allow One Employee to Carry Guns on School Property

A bill that would allow guns in Oklahoma schools is waiting for the governor to sign it. The state House of Representatives approved the measure that would let schools pay for one employee to undergo firearms training and carry a handgun on school property. We talked to Chris Payne, spokesman for Tulsa Public Schools. He says that the district would likely not take part if it is signed. "If anything it might cause more problems. How do you control that problem, how do you keep it out of the hands of someone that shouldn't have it?" he asks. Payne also points out that TPS has their own police force with professionally trained officers.

Hearing for Teacher Accused of Sexual Battery

We are following new developments in the case of a Tulsa high school teacher accused of sexual battery. Superintendent Dr. Keith Ballard is calling for the coach and PE teacher to be fired. The district is not giving more details about what the teacher is accused of, but a district spokesman says an internal investigation led them to believe some wrong-doing took place. The teacher is currently suspended with pay and can defend his employment at a hearing in June.

Reading Tests to be Thrown Out of School Grades for Second Year

For the second year in a row, Oklahoma education leaders say scores from the 5th and 8th grade writing tests will not be used to calculate school letter grades. State superintendent Joy Hofmeister ditched the field writing tests. Districts across the state questioned students' scores on the actual tests. Because of this, the scores won't be counted towards the schools' overall A through F grades.

Governor Signs Bill to Protect Kids from Potentially Dangerous Teachers

Governor Mary Fallin signed a bill to protect students from potentially dangerous teachers. The bill will require school districts to report if a teacher is fired because of criminal activities. This law is in response to some teachers who were fired, but still able to move and work in other districts despite criminal allegations. The State Board of Education will now keep records of those dismissals.

Costs for College in Oklahoma Goes Up

It will soon cost more to go to college in Oklahoma. The Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education approved tuition and mandatory fee increases of about 5% at colleges and universities across the state. For students at Tulsa Community College, that's a 3% tuition hike. At the University of Oklahoma and Oklahoma State University, it's a nearly 5% tuition hike.

Jenks Plans New District on Main Street

Business development in Jenks is expected to bring in big money to the city. Officials broke ground on the Gateway District on Main Street near Highway 75 Wednesday. The mayor says it's like adding to a house, it gives the city more room to grow. "You take your family, you double it, and you stick it in the same house, it's going to be pretty challenging to walk around and move around. What this means to Jenks is a very bright, bright future," say Mayor Lonnie Sims. The first building will be 8,500 square feet and will house Gateway Mortgage's headquarters, along with other businesses. An extra 14 acres will be sectioned off and sold to be used for restaurants and even a hotel.

Construction Adds Pressure to Old Pipes Causing Breaks

They've had to reroute water around construction sites, causing more pressure on other pipes. The old pipes simply can't handle the added pressure. At the height of the spike in breaks, there were 40 active water main breaks. That number is down to 12.

City Announces Plans to Pick Up Storm Debris

People in west Tulsa will be able to get rid of debris from the March tornado for free. The city of Tulsa changed its mind and will offer free bulky waste pickup. Tulsa councilor Jack Henderson says it's a good move because people couldn't afford to rent trailers. "I have apologized to the citizens that live in this community that the city didn't move faster, but we did as much as we could as fast as we could," explains Henderson. The city asks people to have debris on the curb Friday night so pickup can start at 6am Saturday.

City Shows Plan for Dams on the Arkansas River

The next step is public meetings to get feedback on the plans. It could go to a vote as early as this fall.

Mobile Home Residents Fight Plans to Build on Their Complex

The Commission approved the land owner's request to rezone the property Monday night. The land is managed by McGraw Realtors. The property owners say there are no immediate plans to build and the property remains under contract. This issue will now go to the city council for a final decision.

City Plans Route 66 Interactive Center

The city of Tulsa has announced it will help bring a Route 66 interactive center to Tulsa. Instead of offering money, the city has agreed to take the spot of land near Riverside and Route 66 off the market for a year. This will give the Route 66 Alliance time to raise money to purchase the land. The group says they've already raised \$5 million of the \$19.5 million they need.

City of Bixby Renegotiating New Health Insurance for Employees

The city of Bixby is now renegotiating new health insurance rates after employees saw a \$6,000 spike in their deductibles. City officials agreed to contact their employees for input on how much more they are willing to pay out of pocket to keep their deductibles low, while also dealing with higher premiums. "We're committed to ensuring that no matter how many meetings it takes, that our employees interests are protected," says city manager Doug Enevoldsen. The city is holding three meetings with all city employees to get their feedback on insurance plans. The current health insurance expires July 1st.

City Road Crews Racing to Keep up with Potholes

The task force will use the feedback to create a final plan that will go to voters this fall.

We went out to the scene near 188th Street and found deputies, investigators and emergency crews on scene.

Police Make Heroin Bust in Broken Arrow

A traffic stop turns into a heroin bust in Broken Arrow. Officers arrested three people for possession of a controlled substance. According to police, they stopped David Stocks for warrants Saturday. He told them he was waiting for friends and when they arrived Presley Sasser was found with a syringe hidden under her shirt. "She actually tried to squeeze some of the liquid inside the syringe out," says Sgt. Thomas Cooper. That liquid tested positive for heroin. Officers say they also found meth residue inside a hotel room they were staying in.

Police Looking for Leads After Fire Guts House

Fire investigators believe someone intentionally set a midtown business on fire near 11th and Utica. Crews say they want to talk to anyone who may have seen smoke or something suspicious in the area between 4:30 a.m. and 5 a.m. That's when they say the arson happened. The person who called firefighters reported seeing flames coming out of an A/C unit in the back. Fire crews confirmed the fire started in the back part of the Teeter Sweepers building. "They're going to need some major repair. The whole back of the building or back side of the building has been burned up pretty good," says Capt Chuck French. No one was injured in the fire.

Woman Defending Her House Shoots Man Trying to Break In

Tulsa police say a woman defending her home against an intruder shot a man trying to break in. It happened near 14th and Quincy. The 32-year-old suspect is listed in critical condition. He was shot three times in the head, shoulder and upper body. It started when the woman inside the house heard someone banging on her door and yelling loudly. She says she didn't know who he was so she got her gun. FOX23 has learned that she acted within the Oklahoma law. "Obviously the woman was inside her residence and was in fear for her life when she took the action she did," says Capt. Thomas Bell of the Tulsa Police Department. The woman fired three shots through her front door, hitting the suspect all three times.

Man Hit and Killed in South Tulsa Accident

Police say the driver who hit and killed a man near I-44 and Yale won't face any charges. The 25-year-old victim was walking with his girlfriend near the curb when they were hit. Police on the scene say they found no traffic violations involved because the victim and his girlfriend were wearing dark colored clothes and walking in the wrong direction. "Instead of walking against traffic, they were walking with traffic, so they didn't see him coming because he was behind them," says Sgt. Mark MacKinzie of the Tulsa Police Department. The victim was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident.

Police Trying to Find Person Who Shot Woman Several Times

Tulsa police are trying to track down a man accused of shooting a woman several times. It happened around 3 o'clock Tuesday morning. Police say Michael Ishman is a person of interest in the case. Neighbors say they are fed up with crime in their neighborhood. One neighbor told us, "As soon as they see the police cars take off, that's when the trouble starts coming in." Police say the shooting occurred following a fight between a man and his girlfriend. The woman is still in the hospital.

Tulsa Police Searching for Shooting Suspect in West Tulsa

Tulsa police are looking for a man they say shot another man in west Tulsa. The victim was taken to the hospital in critical condition. A witness tells FOX23 that the suspect had been drinking heavily prior to the shooting. The witness told officers that she saw the men arguing before the shooting. The victim was shot multiple times. Police say the suspect is to be considered armed and dangerous. The victim and suspect were at a cookout prior to the shooting.

Police Investigate Several Incidents of Shots Fired into Buildings Around Tulsa

Police were busy investigating four different cases of shots being fired into buildings in different areas around Tulsa. Investigators say there were seven people inside a home near 36th and Garnett when shots rang out. Luckily no one was hurt. Officers say they found three shell casings outside the house and in the front door. Police believe the suspects were likely driving by when they fired at the house.

The neighbors say they didn't see anything and the victims told investigators that they don't know anything about the shooting. Right now, police do not have a suspect description.

Man Shot by Reserve Deputy Dies

A man shot by a Tulsa County reserve deputy has died. The Sheriff's Office says Eric Harris, 44, was a suspect in an undercover gun and ammunition bust. The shooting happened outside the Dollar General store near Ute and North Harvard. The Sheriff's Office says that when they went to arrest Harris a fight broke out. "Deputies tried to restrain him, a struggle ensued and then during the struggle there was a shot fired by one of the deputies," Major Shannon Clark tells FOX23. The Sheriff's Office has not released the name of the reserve deputy who shot Harris.

Hundreds Rally for Change Following Reserve Deputy Shooting

Hundreds of people walked from the Tulsa County Courthouse to the Sheriff's Office calling for a change after the death of Eric Harris. Reserve deputy Robert Bates has been charged with manslaughter in Harris's death. Protestors say this isn't a race issue, but about the failure of policies among several law enforcement agencies across the country. Marq Lewis, of We the People Oklahoma, organized the rally. "If you were to sit back and look at that video again, it would seem that it's wild game hunting," says Lewis. Tulsa County Sheriff Stanley Glanz has not spoken publicly about the shooting. A spokesman for the Sheriff's Office says Glanz is focusing on keeping his office running, but he does plan to talk about it at some point.

Sheriff's Office Responds to Claims Training Records were Falsified

The Tulsa County Sheriff's Office is responding to claims a reserve deputy's training records were falsified. Reserve deputy Robert Bates is charged with second degree manslaughter in the death of Eric Harris. The Sheriff's Office told FOX23 that they believe claims that the records were falsified came from a disgruntled former deputy who is currently charged with murder. The affidavit came to light Thursday, claiming that the office tried to force supervisors to sign off on Bates' training records. According to the documents, if they refused, they were moved to a less desirable assignment.

New Undersheriff Takes Over Following Resignation

A new Tulsa County Undersheriff is about to start his new job. Rick Weigel has served as Chief Deputy overseeing the reserve deputy program and worked at the Tulsa Police Department for 35 years. He's taking over for Tim Albin who resigned amid allegations that he falsified training records for Reserve Deputy Robert Bates.

Medical Examiners' Office Releases Harris Autopsy

The Oklahoma State Medical Examiners' Office released the autopsy of a man shot and killed by former Reserve Deputy Robert Bates. According to the autopsy, the cause of Eric Harris' death is listed as a gunshot wound to his chest that caused his lungs to collapse. The manner is listed as homicide. The report also showed that Harris had a large amount of meth in his system. There were some allegations that Harris was on PCP at the time of the shooting, but the toxicology reports found no evidence of that drug in his system.

Another Deputy Retires as a Result of Reserve Deputy Shooting Investigation

One of the men at the center of the Eric Harris shooting investigation has officially asked to retire. Major Tom Huckleby made his request to the Tulsa County Commissioners Tuesday. He asked that he retain his status as a retired peace officer when he leaves the office in August. Huckleby is accused of falsifying training records for Robert Bates. Bates is charged with second degree manslaughter in Harris' death.

We the People Oklahoma Collect Signatures for Grand Jury Investigation into Sheriff's Office

Election Board Verifies Signatures on Grand Jury Petition

Hearing on Motion to Dismiss Grand Jury Petition Scheduled

Today a Tulsa County judge will decide if a petition calling for a grand jury investigation into the Tulsa County Sheriff Stanley Glanz is legitimate. Glanz's attorneys filed a motion claiming that the group seeking signatures did not follow the law. The group, We the People Oklahoma, is calling on people to pack the courtroom for the hearing. The group says they followed the laws when getting signatures, though the Sheriff's Office is claiming they bribed people to sign with free food. The hearing is scheduled for 10 a.m.
