The NWS says an EF1 tornado touched down near 48th and Riverside. Agencies in Coweta and Bartlesville are reporting straight-line wind damage. Statewide, 12 people were hurt Tuesday night by the storms.

Storms Cause Damage in Wagoner County

Excessive Heat Advisory Issued for Green Country

An excessive heat advisory has been issued for much of Green Country. Emergency crews are working to make sure people are safe as they work and play in the hot sun. They are stocking their trucks with so-called rehab items, such as water, cooling packs and fans. They're also advising people to take advantage of cooling stations and splash pads. The excessive heat warning has been extended to include Friday.

First Ozone Alert Day in Green Country

How Tulsa Baggage Handlers Cope with Extreme Heat

Jenks Public Schools Announce More Cuts

Jenks Public Schools announced more than half a million dollars in cuts to the district. The superintendent says jobs will be cut for all levels of personnel, meaning class sizes will increase. Parents tell us the state's budget priorities are clearly not in the right place if the district has to make such deep cuts. Additional cuts are expected in the next couple of weeks.

Education Supporters Push for Education Sales Tax

The group gathered tens of thousands more signatures than needed two months before the deadline. The tax is expected to generate \$615 million a year for education.

Tulsa Public Schools Announce Job Cuts

Dozens of jobs are being cut at Tulsa Public Schools. The district says they will cut 175 positions, but only about 90 of those are currently filled. For the most part, the cuts are administrative, meaning they won't affect schools. The superintendent calls these cuts heartbreaking and historic and says they might not be over. "There will be additional difficult days ahead because we still have a lot more work to do to get to where we need to be to get the magnitude of cuts we have before us," says Dr. Deborah Gist. The board of education also approved adding 73 new positions as part of a reorganization of the administrative office.

Tulsa Public Schools Announce Cuts to Teaching Positions

Teachers and parents are reacting to the news that Tulsa Public Schools will cut 142 teaching positions. The district says they want to move those teachers into other jobs where people who help the positions either retired or quit. The cuts are happening thanks to a budget shortfall that cost Oklahoma educators \$20 million. The cuts will increase class sizes.

Tulsa Community College Says They Will Cut Positions

Another area school says they will have to cut positions due to the state's budget crisis. Tulsa Community College confirm it is cutting 15 full-time positions and 15 part-time positions. The positions

are expected to save the college about a million dollars. That's on top of the more than 180 positions lost over the past couple of years. TCC says the latest cuts do not include any instructors.

Tulsa Schools Say They are in Compliance with New Transgender Bathroom Rules

Tulsa Public Schools say they are already in compliance with a new directive from President Obama. In November TPS updated their anti-discrimination clause to include transgender students. Last week the Obama administration told public schools to allow transgender students to use bathrooms and locker rooms that correspond to their chosen gender.

Grassroots Campaign to help Bixby Schools Handle Budget Cuts

A grassroots campaign to help Bixby Public Schools deal with budget cuts raised \$64,000 in one month. The campaign is called "Bridge the Gap" and is asking people to donate money to the schools. They say the district is expected to have \$200 less next year to spend on each student. They are asking people to help make up the difference by donating online or at the school offices.

Efforts to Keep Education Tax off November Ballot

A public policy research organization in Oklahoma is trying to keep a 1% sales tax for public education off the ballot. OU President David Boren delivered signature to state lawmakers in April. Thursday the Oklahoma Council of Public Affairs filed a legal challenge claiming the signature pages did not properly describe the proposal.

Major Donation to Tulsa High School

An unprecedented announcement is expected later this morning concerning funding for one Tulsa school. The Booker T Washington Foundation for Excellence is working to save 10 teachers' jobs and several classes that were supposed to be cut from next year's budget. The foundation said those cuts were lower the school's high standard of education. The exact amount of the donation has not been released.

Street Rehab Project Planned for Garnett near 36th Street North

Crews are getting ready for a year-long road project in north Tulsa. More than two dozen companies on Garnett between 36th Street North and Pine will be impacted by the project. They say the road is currently in such bad shape that it has damaged vehicles. Road closures begin on April 18th and is expected to be finished by August 2017.

Public Meeting to Discuss Street Construction Scheduled

A public meeting is scheduled about a street project that is expected to impact thousands of drivers. The work is coming to Mingo Road between 36th and 46th Streets North near the American Airlines maintenance base. Improvements are also planned for the intersection at 46th Street North and rehab work is scheduled to go from 36th Street North south to Pine. The meeting will be held at the City of Tulsa Sewer Operations and Maintenance building tonight.

Tulsa's Mayor Presents Flat Budget for Next Fiscal Year

Tulsa's mayor is presenting a flat budget for the next fiscal year, but it could end up costing residents more money. Mayor Dewey Bartlett presented his plan to city councilors Thursday and says it's similar to the current budget. It includes no pay increases for city employees and 56 vacant positions will be cut. The mayor says that if sales tax revenue increases then raises will return. Mowing cycles for grass along the highways has also been cut from seven to five times a year.

Streets Shut Down for Celebrations

Event coordinators expect around 4,000 people to show up for the parties. There are easy ways to get around the area, including taking Main Street to get around the area. Celebrations start at noon.

Councilors Plan Trip to Controversial Store

Tulsa City Councilors are planning a trip to Dallas to look at riverfront development, which includes an REI store. Plans to bring the store to Tulsa were met with controversy. It's currently in the center of a lawsuit to block plans to build on the site of Helmerich Park at 71st and Riverside. Councilors say they

want to be more familiar with options for riverfront development. They will leave for Dallas on Tuesday and return on Wednesday.

City Councilors Work to Save Positions

Tulsa city councilors are trying to save some of the 56 city positions on the chopping block due to budget cuts. Councilors spent Thursday morning going through the proposed budget. Right now 15 positions at the 911 center are at risk along with some in the legal and development departments. Councilors say they want to make sure every penny is spent the right way before the cuts are final.

Tulsa Funds Walkability Study

Tulsa is one step closing to becoming a more walkable city. Wednesday, the Downtown Coordinating Council approved funding for a study to be conducted in the fall. Some of the first recommendations include fewer lanes of traffic, eliminating confusing one-way streets and making more room for cyclists.

Budget Cuts Impact Tulsa Police Department's Helicopter

Proposed budget cuts could impact the number of hours Tulsa Police can fly their helicopter to fight crimes. City councilors and police officials say the budget allows for 1,600 flight hours this year, but next year's budget would cut 360 of those hours. They say it would save \$180,000, but some say it would cost the city when it comes to your safety. Even with the proposed cuts, police say there will still always be an active crew on standby. Unfortunately, they say, it will make them reactive rather than proactive.

Tulsa County Family Justice Center Finds New Home

Tulsa County's Family Justice Center will have a new home in downtown Tulsa. This comes after a proposed site in north Tulsa raised controversy. The new 7.5 acre site was announced Monday morning. It's just a few feet from the jail and the sheriff's office. Before the announcement, there were hours of debate as people tried to keep the facility out of north Tulsa. The land will cost about \$5.6 million and be a four-story building with 65 beds.

Man Accused of Kidnapping Girlfriend

Wagoner County deputies say a man kidnapped his girlfriend and he's on the run. Deputies say Dallas McGlone, 29, is suspected of throwing his girlfriend in a truck after a fight in Coweta. The truck has damage to the front windshield and the driver's door. They say the girlfriend was kicking the windshield during a fight. The two have not been spotted since she was taken Monday night.

Police Lose Suspects Following Chase

Police came up empty handed after chasing four people through east Tulsa. Investigators say that the suspects stole a car just a few hours before they were spotted near 31st and Garnett. Tulsa Police launched their helicopter to find the suspect, but came up empty handed. Officers on the scene say it's only a matter of time before the suspects steal another car.

Attorneys for Former Reserve Deputy Plan Appeal

Attorneys for former reserve deputy Bob Bates plan to appeal a jury's decision to declare him guilty of manslaughter in the death of Eric Harris. Harris's brother says the toughest thing for him was the defense implying it was Harris's actions that led to his death. Bates was booked into the Tulsa County Jail. He's expected to be booked next month.

Police Ask for Help Finding Robbery Suspects

Investigators are asking for help finding suspects in a robbery and carjacking. They're looking for a silver 2001 Chevy Cavalier with a missing tail light. Police say so far they don't have any leads on where the car is. Three people reported that two people pointed a gun at them, stole their cell phones and took off in their car.

Sand Springs Grandmother Arrested for Drugs and Weapons

Police say a grandmother was arrested for meth, heroin, marijuana, knives and thousands in cash. Mary Joe Cravett was arrested in Sand Springs. The police department, along with Tulsa Police and the Oklahoma Bureau of Narcotics, served a warrant on her house. Many of the officers who worked the case volunteered their time, saying it's worth it to get those types of drugs off the street.

Police Look for Suspect in Two Armed Robberies at Quik Trip Stores

Tulsa police officers say they're searching for a suspect connected to two armed robberies at two different Quik Trip stores. Police say they found the getaway car earlier this morning. They are questioning two people in that car, but say neither is a suspect. Police say a man pulled out at gun and demanded money, then left. Only 25 minutes later, they say, the same person did the same thing at a

store about a mile and a half away. The suspect is described as a man in his 20's, five foot four, around 120 to 140 pounds, wearing a black jacket and blue jeans carrying a handgun.

Homeless Man Shot by Airsoft Gun

A homeless man was shot by an Airsoft gun in downtown Tulsa overnight. The victim tells us he was walking with his wife when bullets started flying. He covered her so she wouldn't get hit. Once the shooting was done, they drove around the building and the suspect opened fire again. "It felt like 22 bullets hitting you, cause they hurt," the man told FOX23. No one was arrested in the case.

Police Search for Teens Who Slashed Tires

Tulsa Police are searching for a group of teenagers who slashed tires at a midtown Taco Bell because their order was wrong. FOX23 got surveillance showing the teens coming through the drive-thru. The manager says they got upset about cheese on their tacos. According to the manager, they threw the tacos and liquor at him. He says they banged on the window, then drove around front and started slashing the employees' tires.

Two People Found Shot to Death in North Tulsa Park

Two people were found shot to death at a north Tulsa park and police say two children were found nearby. The victims were found inside a car after some park visitors found a 5-year-old boy wandering in the park. They say the child told them his mother was hurt and took them to the car. Both victims had gunshot wounds. An infant was found unharmed in the back seat of the car. Police are canvassing the area to see if anyone saw or heard something last night.

Bill Aims to Help Judges Deal with Mentally III Offenders

A bill moving forward would give judges more power when it comes to people with mental health issues. The bill would like courts order out-patient treatment for adults with mental health conditions. The bill is named after late Labor Commissioner Mark Costello. Costello's son Christian is accused of stabbing him to death last August. He has pled not guilty to first degree murder charges.

Couple Sues City over Health Insurance

A same-sex couple is suing the City of Tulsa for discrimination. Steve and Greg Martinez say the city denied them spousal health benefits. The couple's attorney says the city violated its equal opportunity policy. The attorney says that once the lawsuit was filed, the city fired Steve Martinez for insubordination, which forced them to move out of state. The city will not comment on pending cases.

Bill to Expand Health Insurance to Cover Autism Goes to Governor

Families are hoping Governor Mary Fallin signs a bill to expand insurance coverage for their autistic children. It would provide Oklahomans with something people in other states already get. Applied behavioral analysis is an important part of treatment for many children. Right now most private insurance limits those sessions. House Bill 2962 would provide up to \$25,000 a year in coverage for children up to 9-years-old.

Health Departments Closing Due to Budget Cuts

The Oklahoma State Health Department announced they will close five locations due to budget cuts. The Drumright Health Department location will close its doors, along with departments in Beggs and Henryetta in Okmulgee County. The locations are scheduled to close on July $\mathbf{1}^{\text{st}}$.

Veterans Get Opportunity to Meet with VA Health Officials

Health Officials Start Spraying for Mosquitoes

Health officials could start spraying for mosquitoes as early as this week. As FOX23 has reported the Tulsa Health Department put out mosquito traps in May and plans to start spraying in June. Due to the threat of the Zika virus, the health department is using new traps specifically designed for the type of mosquito that carries the Zika virus. They also say to make sure that you don't have any standing water to attract mosquitoes.

Health Department Finds Mosquitoes Carrying West Nile

Tulsa Health Department officials identified seven areas where mosquitoes carrying the West Nile virus have been located. Officials say dead birds in one area led them to test the trap, which is when they made the discovery. They trapped infected mosquitoes from 11th to Pine between Harvard and Sheridan. Other areas include 21st to 31st between Sheridan and Yale and between 111th and 121st between Memorial and Mingo. The Health Department says they will spray the affected areas this week.

Bixby to Start Spraying for Mosquitoes

The City of Bixby is taking major steps to make sure you don't get bitten by mosquitoes this summer. The city manager recently sent out a letter detailing a multi-phase action plan in response to the increasing mosquito population in the city. They are working with the Tulsa Health Department to combat the issue. If the Health Department received a large number of complaints in one area, they will come out and spray.

First Human Case of West Nile Found in Pittsburg County

The first confirmed human cause of the West Nile virus in Oklahoma for the 2016 season was found in Pittsburg County. The Oklahoma State Health Department is asking you to take precautions. In addition to the first human case, collections of mosquitoes have tested positive for West Nile at the Tulsa and Oklahoma City-County Health Departments.
