Weather Causes Issues During Morning Drive

Road conditions caused three wrecks overnight, but the roads were warm enough that the Tulsa Police Department was able to call off Operation Slick Streets by 4am. Drivers reported seeing some slick spots, but overall the drive wasn't bad. "They've been really good. I mean you just have to take your time. You can't get in a big rush. You have a little ice slicks here and there, but if you use your head you won't have any problems," says one driver. The City of Tulsa started treating roads as soon as the freezing rain started.

Tulsa Fire Department Gets Ready for Winter Weather

Members of the Tulsa Fire Department are getting ready for coming winter weather. When firefighters go out on a call in the extreme cold, not only do they worry about staying warm, but they're also concerned with making sure all that water doesn't freeze up. "If it gets really cold, the trucks have water in them. If the water's not moving, it will freeze up and freeze the pumps up. If it gets really cold around zero, you could have some serious trouble," says Captain Jeff Wagnon. Trucks are kept in heated bays when they aren't out on a call. The station also stocks up on cleats to help firefighters walk on snow and ice.

Cold Temperatures Cause Two Water Main Breaks on Memorial

Drivers need to give themselves extra travel time this morning after two water main breaks close roads along Memorial Drive. The breaks were about a mile apart. Neighbors say they are tired of all the breaks and immediately start planning to go hours without water. Crews were able to get the break at 21st Street fixed within about 5 hours. The break at 31st isn't expected to be finished until later today.

Water Line Bursts for the Fourth Time in Three Days

Water is restored to one neighborhood after the fourth break on the same line in three days. Workers blame rapidly changing temperatures and aging pipes for the breaks. FOX23 cameras were there as water flowed out of a front yard. The final break took about three hours to fix. Crews say some rock got into the line causing one of the breaks. Neighbors are frustrated because they say their water is constantly getting turned off so crews can work on the lines.

Farron Salley is based in Broken Arrow, where the roads are slushy. Officials there are warning people to be cautious, even though the roads may appear fine. Preston Jones is in Owasso near 76th Street North and Owasso. Road conditions are much worse in this area, with several crashes in the area. The city reports crews out across the city trying to get the roads cleared.

Broken Arrow Public Schools Says They Are Against High Stakes Testing

"It's important for us to assess children, but the high stakes placed on it is something we don't want to do," explains Broken Arrow Superintendent Dr. Jarod Mendenhall.

New Bill to Would End Lottery, Costing State Education Millions

"I believe that we would properly fund education through other sources, but no examples of it right now, no," the lawmaker says. FOX23 has learned that the rest of the money goes back into the lottery to keep it running.

A number of teachers accused her of being "anti-teacher" because of some teacher firings she was involved with as Commissioner of Education in Rhode Island. "It technically is what happened, but there's so much more to the story and I think the other things that people don't realize is what happened after that," Dr. Gist told FOX23.

The house voted to table the amendment on Tuesday. Inman says there's not enough support for those who are providing education in our state.

Bill Aims to Make it Illegal to Teach Foreign Language in Oklahoma Schools

There's a push to make it illegal to teach anything but English in Oklahoma public schools. In 2010, Oklahomans approved a constitutional amendment making English the official state language. A new bill by Senator Ralph Shortey might make immersion schools illegal. Parents are trying to understand the logic behind that. "Maybe it's unintended consequences. But the consequences of making such things is contrary to Oklahoma public policy. It scares me," explains Paul Catalano, whose child is a student at a Tulsa immersion school. Catalano says a bill like this would have such negative implications for students getting a valuable education that he doesn't expect it to pass.

State Board of Education Approves New Academic Standards

Bill to Ban All Forms of Tobacco on School Grounds Moves Forward

Oklahoma law already requires public schools to be tobacco free during the school day. This would extend the policy to non-school hours, school vehicles and school-sponsored events on private property.

Thousands Rally at State Capitol for Education

Thousands of parents and teachers are waiting to see if their voices were heard at Monday's education rally. The groups gathered by the hundreds outside the capitol building in Oklahoma City. They rallied for what they called "common sense testing," more funding in the classroom and for money to get good teachers to come to our state. "If we want special teachers to come in for any core subject that we have, we really need to attract teachers with better pay," says Broken Arrow teacher Katrina Shaw. Educators we spoke with say until more funding is given many Oklahoma schools will not be able to compete with surrounding states.

New Proposal for Riverfront Development

They says they've signed a non-disclosure agreement and can't give details of the project yet.

Plans in Place to Deliver Petition Against Proposed Outlet Mall to City Councilors

Members of the Tulsa Urban Wilderness Coalition plan to deliver printed copies of the petition to city leaders.

Construction Delays Along Harvard in North Tulsa

Convention Center Planned for Broken Arrow

"The more people we have in this part of town the better it will be for lunch, dinner, evening business," says Tony Henry, owner of the Full Moon Café. Groundbreaking is scheduled to happen sometime this spring.

Tulsa Police Say Shortage of Officers Hinders Crimefighting

With attrition, the department loses officers each year, but last year's academy only graduated 12 officers. Tulsa Police officials are working with Tulsa City Council to increase the budget and possibly add a public safety tax.

Votes in Owasso Asked to Decide City Language

Owasso voters will decide on seven different propositions today. One proposition would change all masculine language to gender neutral language, so it applies to males and females. City leaders say it's been almost 30 years since the statues were updated. "We were somewhat antiquated by saying councilman and also referring to councilors as he. We just felt it was necessary to bring it up to date," says Owasso City Manager Warren Lehr. The city charter hasn't been changed since 1986 and according to the city manager, the language needs to reflect the times.

Broken Arrow Drivers May Need to Change Routes Due to Traffic Signal Issues

Drivers in Broken Arrow may need to come up with a different route to work or give themselves extra time thanks to an accident that knocked out a traffic signal at a main intersection. According to city spokeswoman Krista Flasch, a driver ran into the signal pole, knocking out the lights. The signal was replaced with a four way stop sign. The city is asking people to avoid the area while they work on getting the lights fixed. Drivers reported seeing accidents in the area because people didn't pay attention to the stop signs. Broken Arrow Police are monitoring the area. If they believe problems are starting, they will step in and direct traffic.

Economic Summit in Owasso for Area Businesses

The city of Owasso is seeing big growth. In just one year, 34 new businesses opened and that number is growing. Owasso leaders say the 2015 economic outlook is mostly good and they plan to move most of their focus to revitalizing the downtown area. "If you're a small business owner or want to start a business, there's somewhere you can go that's hopefully going to be a great atmosphere in a couple of years," says Mark Hamrick, owner of Copper Kiln. One economist says the low oil prices could slow the economy, but still says the city should see almost 1,000 new jobs in 2015.

Two Men Killed Following Robbery Attempt

Two men are shot to death at a convenience store. According to police, the men were trying to rob the store around 10:30pm the night before. Police say three men came into the store wearing masks. The clerk had his own gun and he used it. One of the men was found in the doorway, while the second suspect later died at the hospital. A third suspect left the scene, but later returned. That suspect and another man were arrested. They are being held in connection with a string of armed robberies and murder in the death of their accomplices. The clerk was taken to the police station for questioning, but was released.

Man Killed in Shooting at East Tulsa Hotel

Tulsa police now have three out of five suspects behind bars in connection with a murder at the Super 8 Hotel near 31st and Memorial. Detectives arrested Pamela Taylor Wednesday and former Tulsa County deputy Warren Crittenden on Tuesday for the murder. Police also arrested Kendrick Logan for the murder of Michael Jones. "I know they went to that motel to do harm and they were armed and he ended up dead," says Homicide Detective David Walker. Detectives say the victim was in town to run a prostitution ring. Police want to talk to two other people in relation to the shooting.

Teenager Hurt in Road Rage Crash on Highway 169

Police say a drunk driver caused a road rage crash that injured a teenager on Highway 169. Owasso police arrested the suspect almost two miles from the crash site. He told officers he was planning to get into a neighborhood and hide. According to the arrest report, witnesses helped police by following the suspect. Officers at the scene say they could smell alcohol on the man. Police say the teenager was following the suspect too close, so he slammed on his brakes. The teenager's car hit the median and flipped five to seven times, critically injuring the driver.

Man Found Shot in the Chest in his Car by Neighbors

Man Arrested After Breaking into Hotel Room and Getting into Bed with Child

Bank Teller Credited with Catching Thief

The victim lives near 101st and Harvard. He reports that his Escalade was broken into the day before Jefferson showed up at the bank. The victim says the thief also took nearly \$2,000 in cash and a pistol.

Store Manager Accused of Embezzling Money from Store

Pawhuska police say a store manager was ringing up more than just groceries. According to investigators, Richard Parker stole around \$58,000 in cash and checks from Pawhuska Hometown Foods over a period of several months. FOX23 has learned that Parker turned over the checks, but \$26,000 was still unaccounted for. Parker is no longer an employee of the store.

Two People Killed During Home Invasion

The homeowner says he shot two men and a third got out a back window. FOX23 spoke with a woman who says the homeowner is her son and she'd just left to see friends when she got a call from a neighbor. "I got here as soon as I could," Anita Penn tells us. Police have not released the names of the men who were killed.

Family Wakes Up to Man Breaking Into Their Home

A family woke up to find someone breaking into their house near 8th and West 51st Street in west Tulsa. Police say the suspect acted like he owned the place once he got inside and they think he really believed that he owned the home. "He lives about four or five blocks over. He's telling us the whole time that hey, this is my house, what are you doing here," says Tulsa Police Corporal Dan Miller. Officers helped get the family out while the suspect passed out on their sofa.

Best Ways to Protect Yourself from Flu

Doctors say the best way to protect yourself from the flu is a simple shot. Flu shots cost as low as \$20 and are most often covered by insurance. The Tulsa County Health Department has a program offering free shots for children of qualifying families. They also recommend taking other precautions. "Covering your mouth and nose when you cough or sneeze, washing your hands as often as possible, staying home if you're sick and getting to see a medical professional if you start to feel flu symptoms" is recommended says Leanne Stephens with the Tulsa County Health Department.

Green Country Hit Hard by the Flu

New flu numbers will be released later today, but experts expect the number of deaths in Oklahoma to continue to rise. Tulsa County continues to be the hardest hit with the most deaths and hospitalizations in the state. Eleven people in Tulsa County have died from complications of the flu. The Centers for Disease Control announced the flu is at epidemic levels, partly because the flu shot is not as effective this year.

What to Parents Should Watch for with the Flu

Dr. Roopa Thukaram says "high fevers, increased work of breathing, any color change to the skin, like blue color to the skin we call cyanosis" are things to watch out for.

Webbers Falls School Closes Due to Flu

New Research Shows Anti-Viral Drugs Helping People with Flu

New research on the prescription drug Tamiflu shows taking the medicine has increased benefits for those dealing with the flu. Pharmacists say the drug is most effective within the first day or two of your symptoms. The new research shows it also helps in ways other than simply reducing the amount of time you have flu symptoms. "It actually can decrease the flu complications such as hospitalizations, developing different upper respiratory infections, such as pneumonia," says pharmacist Chris Schiller. Oklahoma has had 68 people die from the flu so far this year.

Health Officials Warn Flu Season Isn't Over

Health officials say you need to keep your guard up because flu season isn't over yet. The Oklahoma State Health Department released the latest flu numbers Thursday. They say six more Oklahomans died from the flu, breaking the record and bringing the total to 90 people. Tulsa County has had 20 flu deaths. The Tulsa Health Department says people 65 and older and children under the age of four are the most at risk of dying from the flu.

Health Department Releases New Flu Numbers for Oklahoma

I don't want to go through what I went through. It was pretty bad," he told us. Health officials expect the flu to continue into May.

Walgreens Releases Flu Index

Oklahoma was the worst state in the nation during this flu season according to a report released by Walgreens. The pharmacy chain tracked where anti-virals were most prescribed. "The key is to recognize it was a cluster in that area and to press the issue of how important vaccination is," says Walgreens Pharmacy Manager Olivia Ochoa.

Oklahoma Medical Examiner's Office Releases Why 6-year-old Oologah Girl Died

The state medical examiner's office has concluded an Oologah kindergartner at the center of a health scare died from an enlarged heart. Six-year-old Jenny Yang died in January after she was sent home from school with a fever. Initially, the community was worried that the flu was to blame. The autopsy shows Yang suffered sudden cardiac death.

Tornado Relief Drive – On March 25, 2015, a tornado destroyed homes and businesses near Sand Springs, OK. On March 30, FOX23 and My41 teamed up with Cox Media Group radio stations, Cox Communications, and the American Red Cross to set up a drive-through donation station at a local park. Both stations aired a PSA several times in advance of the event to encourage community participation. FOX23 News provided live coverage of the event.
