4/1/23

- Firefighters put their lives on the line every day and now a shortage is making things even harder. How one Florida Fire Department is getting creative to attract the next generation of firefighters.
- Tracking the IRS. Can an \$80 billion dollar increase for the agency make your filing process easier? Hear from a Syracuse Professor who has kept a close eye on how the IRS works for decades.
- An Asian-American band made history at the Supreme Court after they were turned down for a trademark. Now, their 8-year legal battle is being told to a new generation at the opera.

4/15/23

- Schools struggling to feed their students. The push for all kids to continue eating for free following pandemic relief, and the change Pennsylvania teachers and cafeteria workers are demanding.
- Election officials say nearly 27 million Americans who moved last year didn't remember to cancel their voter registration. The new technology helping make states more secure and what happens when states refuse to use this system.
- From weapons to works of art. One artist is transforming trauma into a tribute to victims of gun violence by melting down guns and turning them into liberty bells. How the artist says her personal experience is shaping her work.

4/22/23

- Families living near railroad tracks are concerned about safety. After a disastrous train wreck in Ohio, they're demanding more be done to protect their communities and asking what are the next steps to prevent more tragedies on America's railways.
- A Chicago community riddled with gun violence. The long wait for help, and how bystanders are jumping in to care for the wounded. A look at a program that's training neighbors to step in when every second matters.
- Rising tides are carving a path of destruction along America's coast lines. How the ocean is poisoning the land and farms are drowning in saltwater tides. Why ghost forests are a dire sign of things to come.

4/29/23

- Having a baby in America is more dangerous than ever. For expectant mothers in rural west Texas, having access to proper maternity care is a growing concern. Why has the maternal mortality rate risen, and what's the solution for women traveling hundreds of miles to give birth?

- The future of giving. How a child of poverty is now leading one of the nation's largest philanthropies, and how Darin Walker's strategy could make a difference.
- A community band attracts international attention. How they're one step closer to reaching their goal and what the band leader is doing to get his young musicians to London this summer.

5/6/23

- America's churches are divided, creating a rift in many Christian churches. How the political stand is changing who is sitting in the pews, and the tough decisions about LGBTQ issues.
- Young voters are making sure their voices are heard, but could that momentum shift as more states enforce new voting rules? Idaho is now excluding the use of student IDs to vote, and Ohio is now limiting counties to have only one ballot drop box.
- A new way of life. How one Afghan family is adjusting to life in Wisconsin, and what it's like to start over and have new dreams for the future.

5/13/23

- NASA is preparing to reach new heights with a trip around the moon. How a rocket scientist is working to help get them there, and what she's doing to encourage the next generation to enter the aerospace industry.
- In the 1860s, workers were laying 1900 miles of track to connect our nations east and west coasts. How the building of the transcontinental railroad changed America's identity.
- The Surgeon General warns that Americans are lonely. How loneliness is directly correlated to health issues, and how important it is to have social connections.

5/20/23

- Online sports betting is turning homes into gambling dens. Now, wherever you are is a casino. How sports books are trying to draw in young people.
- In 1920, more than half of black people lived on farms. Now, they make up less than one percent of America's farmers. Meet the new generation of farmers making a claim to land and legacy, and how farm programs don't really help black farmers.
- Climate change concerns. How people living in coastal cities are trying to protect their homes from the next brutal hurricane season.

5/27/23

- America's veterans are facing a lonely battle with PTSD. Several resist treatment because of the stigma, and sink into depression. This episode focuses on what so many are going through and the efforts to combat the wounds of war through recent advancements to better understand PTSD.

6/03/23

- America's seniors are looking for help to stay in their homes. The shortage of home health care workers, and how the social support system is failing those workers and the people relying on them.
- Doing your taxes may get easier. The IRS's new program to modernize how you file your taxes.

- An all-too-familiar story for many small towns in America: businesses and factories close, and the people leave. Now, a hometown hero is rebuilding the place that he says gave him his start.

6/10/23

- The future of A.I. is here, but is it worth the risks to privacy and safety? What one expert says about striking the balance between technological advancement and safety.
- Over one hundred years ago, a massacre in Memphis changed our constitution. But, students living there today didn't learn about it until college. What they're doing to be sure the story is not lost.
- Gender-affirming care. Minnesota is protecting care for transgender children. How medical professionals are guiding families through life altering decisions.

6/17/23

- Underage labor: a childhood stolen by human traffickers. Looking at kids working at too young an age and in too dangerous of conditions. Now, with a major worker shortage, states are rolling back child labor laws.
- Young people tackling climate change with kitchen scraps. How a New York City collective is getting creative by helping residents compost, and how it's helping the environment.
- If I can do it, you can do it. What a teacher says about his expeditions to some of the most remote places around the world, and why his most important mission is in the classroom.

6/24/23

- Some people think people who live in poverty don't deserve beauty. Meet the man on a mission to grow a better neighborhood, block by block.
- It was considered the garden spot of America. How a garden of Eden turned into an environmental nightmare, and how it could haunt political candidates.
- Who says Chicago is America's second city? The forgotten history of the environmental justice movement, and the woman who made a street-smart memorial happen in a poisoned community.

4/1/23

- An exclusive with the ex-wife of the 84-year-old man who shot a teen who accidentally rang his doorbell. What she says about her ex's anger and violent temper.
- A six-year-old girl shot in the head and her dad shot in the chest after her ball rolls onto their neighbor's front lawn. Hear from Dr. Phil about these extreme overreactions to innocuous incidents, and the question the girl has for the shooter.
- Squatters living in a house that was for sale. When a woman checked on her home, she found a menacing dog with puppies on the front porch and two women squatting inside. What it took to get them out, and the damage they did to her newly remodeled home.

4/29/23

- Shot after making innocent mistakes. A national epidemic where homeowners are shooting innocent people who come to their homes by mistake, and some of the shooters are never charged because they're protected by a "stand your ground" law.
- A young student pilot in crisis and the dad who guided her down meet for the first time. The bond that now unites them forever.

5/6/23

- A man trapped in a supermarket by a cashier who closed the store fifteen minutes early, never checking if there were any customers still inside.
- Four kids watching TV and one of them smells something. Now, a little boy is hailed a hero after discovering his house was on fire and alerting his family to run for safety.

- A heroic act to get an 87-year-old woman's purse back from the man who snatched it. How a good Samaritan jumped into action, tackling the thief and holding him until police arrived.

5/13/23

- A children's book author charged with killing her husband. Newly-released court papers suggest a disagreement over buying a two-million-dollar house may have led her to poison him with Fentanyl.
- Justice at last for Natalie Holloway. Twenty years after her disappearance, the prime suspect is now being extradited to the U.S.
- Deepfake victims in tears. Forty students from one high school who say they were targeted by a classmate who put their faces on pornographic images, and the aftermath for these young girls.

5/20/23

- Defiant Megan and Harry. How they're denouncing claims that they exaggerated what happened on the streets of New York when they say they were involved in a near catastrophic chase with paparazzi.
- "The Little Mermaid" controversy. Some believe the new film takes a dig at Princess Kate.
- A former employee making bombshell accusations against Rudy Giuliani. What she says he expected her to do, and why she feared losing her job.

5/27/23

- A volunteer cop swarmed by bees on live TV. What he says about the swarm that took him down as the whole world watched.

American Heart Association – Tulsa Heart Walk – KMYT-TV (My41) supported the 2023 Tulsa Heart Walk, which took place in Tulsa on April 29, 2023. My41 aired the PSA a total of 82 times to encourage our viewers to participate. This year's event raised over \$425,000 for the research and treatment of heart disease.

American Heart Association – Tulsa "Go Red for Women" Luncheon – My41 supported the 2023 Tulsa "Go Red for Women" Luncheon, which took place in Tulsa on May 11, 2023.
