Tornado Damage Reported in Coweta

Several homes and a school were damaged after an EF-1 tornado tore through Coweta. No injuries or deaths were reported in the storm, but lots of damage were left behind. Members of the Coweta High School football and baseball teams helped with the cleanup process. Debris was found along fields near the high school. School administrators decided to extend fall break to continue to cleanup and make repairs on campus. City officials also warned residents of scammers coming in, offering to make repairs following the storm.

Crews Repair Collapsed Structure on I-44 Bridge in Tulsa

A section of the I-44 bridge that crosses over Peoria was closed for several hours after a section of the bridge collapsed. ODOT crews say the collapse was triggered by a hole in the bridge. ODOT couldn't confirm if any cars were hit due to the collapse. Traffic was condensed to one lane while crews made repairs.

Tulsa Police Warn About Rise in Speeding Following Two Deadly Crashes

Officers with the Tulsa Police Department are trying to raise awareness about the rising number of deadly crashes involving speeding. One of the most recent victims is a member of their own department. Mary Byers, a dispatcher, was hit by a car and killed while walking to work. More than 50 deadly crashes in Tulsa have been connected to speeding.

Updating Tourism Numbers in Tulsa Amid the Pandemic

The Tulsa Regional Chamber released its local tourism numbers from 2020. While the pandemic did hinder those numbers, the results were better than expected. Around 7.2 million people visited Tulsa in 2019, about a third lower than 2019. The return of conventions is helping to boost those numbers as well. That number is expected to continue to rise with the return of concerts.

Renovations Announced at Tulsa's Turkey Mountain

Project Aims at Repairing Dangerous Road in Tulsa County

A section of Yale Avenue between 81st and 91st is known as a dangerous road in south Tulsa County. Today, crews are breaking ground on a new project to make improvements. The project will widen the road and update the guardrails. The pavement is also falling off the edge of the road down to a hill. 177 crashes have been reported in this area between 2004 and 2012. The project is expected to be completed next year.

New Development Announced at Midtown Tulsa's Stretch of Route 66

The City of Tulsa has broken ground on a new development in midtown Tulsa. It will be called NOMA, or North of Market. The development will include new apartments, businesses, and restaurants. It will cost the city about \$60 million dollars to complete. Mayor G.T. Bynum says the development is another step of putting Tulsa on the map. NOMA is expected to be completed in 2023.

Oklahoma Highway Patrol Phases Out Assistance Phone Number

Oklahoma Highway Patrol is getting ready to phase out *55, the number drivers call when they need assistance on the road. *55 was launched in 1992 and routed the call to the closest state trooper. Troopers will now use updated 911 technology that will create quicker response times for drivers. The technology was paid by the CARES Act Fund. The technology will also help dispatchers to quickly reach officers.

Cherokee Nation Builds New Hospital in Tahlequah

The Cherokee Nation has announced plans to build a new hospital in Tahlequah. The facility will replace the current facility that tribal leaders say is outdated. The Cherokee Nation is spending more than \$400 million dollars for the project. Construction is expected to start in 2022 and finish by the end of 2023.

Popular Tulsa Park Temporarily Closes Due to Construction for New Gilcrease Museum

Tulsa County Schools Experience Bus Driver Shortages

School districts say they are actively recruiting for new drivers while keeping parents' updates about delays.

Oklahoma City Teachers Fired Over Refusal to Wear Masks

Tulsa Public Schools Hosts Tribal Recognition Ceremonies

Broken Arrow Superintendent Resigns

Perry also plans on tackling the teacher shortage, bus driver shortage, and general staffing shortages.

Green Country Schools Tackle Threats on TikTok

Growing Petition Aims to Change Honor Code at Oral Roberts University

Tulsa Police Arrest Suspected Serial Rapist

Tulsa police have arrested a man connected to multiple rapes in east Tulsa. 19-year-old Brandon Bills has no criminal record and is accused of assaulting at least three women. Several of the assaults started as home invasions. Patrol and traffic units worked together to track down the suspect. Investigators also used forensic evidence to link Bills to the crimes. Bills confessed to the crimes during his arrest. The attacks were random, and police believe there could be more victims.

Trial Date Set for Man Accused of Killing Tulsa Police Officer

A trial date has been set for David Ware, the man accused of killing Tulsa police Sgt. Craig Johnson and wounding Officer Aurash Zarkeshan. Police say Ware shot the two men during a traffic stop in 2020. The trial was initially delayed after Ware's attorney asked for more time to prepare. The prosecution is seeking the death penalty in the case. Ware's trial is scheduled to begin on April 4.

Police Search for a Suspect After a Man was Critically Injured During a Drive-by Shooting

Police are investigating after a man was shot in the head as he slept inside his Tulsa home. Investigators aren't sure if the man was targeted or if it was a random attack. This shooting follows three additional shootings in Tulsa over the past few days. Police are not sure if the shootings are all connected. The city continues to fight back against shootings by pulling guns off the streets.

Police Search for Suspects After Tulsa Business Owner Dies in the Parking Lot

Tulsa police release more information about the second suspect connected to the death of Miami Nights owner Frank Valdes. Police say Valdes tried to break up a fight in the parking lot of his business. Two men then beat Valdes, who had a heart attack and died. Police have described Valdes' death as a murder. One person is in custody as police search for the second suspect.

Former Tulsa County Detention Officer Arrested, Accused of Smuggling Contraband

A former Tulsa County detention officer has been arrested, accused of smuggling cell phones and drugs into the jail. Court documents show that Velvet Robinson was paid by a gang to bring the items to inmates. The investigation was launched after meth was found inside a rubber glove in a cell. Robinson confessed to the crimes and now faces multiple charges.

Broken Arrow Police Release Body Camera Footage Showing Officer-Involved Shooting

The Broken Arrow Police Department has released body camera footage from the night a police officer was shot while chasing down a suspect. The footage shows the officer getting shot, then immediately firing back towards the suspect. The officer, Caleb Sherman, will recover. The suspect, identified as Cory Batt, later killed himself before officers could arrive.

Man Jailed on Multiple Sex Crimes Could Be Connected to More Crimes in Tulsa

Tulsa police believe a man already jailed on accusations of sex crimes could have more victims in the metro. More victims have come forward to police after hearing about the arrest of James Townes. Tulsa Special Victims Unit lieutenant Darin Ehrenrich says Townes recently moved from Oklahoma City to Tulsa after getting out of prison last year. Investigators are urging any potential victims to come forward.

Man Arrested Following Armed Robbery at Tulsa Pizza Restaurant

A man is in jail, accused of robbing a Tulsa pizza restaurant at gunpoint. Police say Curtis Kendricks robbed the Blaze Pizza near 37th and Peoria. The restaurant's manager says Kendrick's pointed the gun in her face and demanded money. Neighbors are concerned because this is a quiet part of town. Police say Kendricks also robbed customers inside the restaurant.

Man Arrested on Animal Cruelty Charges After More Than 150 Animals Were Rescued from His Collinsville Home

The Tulsa County Sheriff's Office has seized more than 150 animals from a property in Collinsville. Some animals were dead, others required medical attention. The rescued animals are now under the care of the Humane Society of Tulsa. The suspect, Samuel Smith, faces an animal cruelty charge for each animal. The Humane Society is accepting donations and adoption applications for some of the animals.

One of Tulsa's Largest Employers Will Require Employees to Get a COVID-19 Vaccination

American Airlines, one of Tulsa's largest employers, will now require employees to get a COVID-19 vaccination. The decision comes after the federal government threatened to end million-dollar contracts if the corporation did not comply. Around 4,000 people are employed by American Airlines in Tulsa. Employees do not have the option to agree to regular testing. Employees began to protest at the maintenance facility, claiming they should have the right to make their own decisions. American Airlines says it will continue to work with the federal government to reach a decision.

Tulsa Pharmacy Offers Monoclonal Antibody Treatment during COVID-19 Pandemic

A pharmacy in Tulsa is offering monoclonal antibody treatment for those with COVID-19. The antibodies are administered through four quick injections, and patients are monitored for an hour before leaving. Patients must meet a certain criteria before getting the treatment, and the treatment must be administered within the first ten days of the onset of symptoms. The treatment aims to reduce waiting times at hospitals and urgent care centers across the Tulsa metro area.

Therapy Dogs Visit Pandemic-Weary Healthcare Workers in Tulsa

A team of therapy dogs that usually work with patients at Tulsa's Children's Hospital visited with staff members at Saint Francis hospital. It was an opportunity to give support to men and women who are on the frontlines of the COVID-19 pandemic. Doctors and nurses say the moments with the therapy dogs gave them a much-needed boost to their mental health.

Oklahoma State Dept. of Health Offers COVID-19 Vaccines to Children

The Oklahoma State Department of Health is now offering COVID-19 vaccinations to children 12 and older. The dose is smaller compared to what is administered to adults. State officials are administering vaccines to children after the federal approval was given, after months of studies. Like the adult dosage, the vaccine will not prevent infection, but will greatly reduce the risk of severe reaction or death.

New Law Aims to Lower Insulin Prices in Oklahoma

A new bill passed in Oklahoma caps co-pays for insulin at \$30. However, there is a loophole that impacts some people. House Bill 1019 prohibits patients with federal insurance from the benefit. The loophole

leaves hundreds of thousands of Oklahomans paying higher prices for life-saving medication. Some patients pay several hundred dollars a month for insulin.

Oklahoma Attorney General Issues Restraining Order Against Ascension Health Care

Oklahoma Attorney General John O'Connor has issued a temporary restraining order against Ascension Health Care. All Ascension employees were supposed to be vaccinated by today or face termination. O'Connor says his restraining order is a move to prevent the firing of health care workers on the front lines of the pandemic.

Oklahoma Gov. Kevin Stitt Sues Biden Administration Over Vaccine Mandate

Oklahoma Gov. Kevin Stitt and Oklahoma Attorney General John O'Connor have filed multiple lawsuits against the Biden Administration over vaccine mandates. The lawsuits represent private businesses and the Oklahoma National Guard. Many Oklahomans are upset about the possibility of losing their jobs over not getting the COVID-19 vaccination.

Federal Report Lists Failures by Oklahoma Public Health Lab After Move

A report from the federal government lists concerns about Oklahoma's Public Health Lab, and how understaffed it is. The report also lists concerns about improperly handling COVID samples. The lab recently moved from Oklahoma City to Stillwater. Interim Oklahoma Health Commissioner Keith Reed says changes were immediately implemented after the report was released. The changes were approved by the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services.

Healthier Oklahoma Coalition Asks People with COVID to Avoid Hospitals, Visit Urgent Care Centers

The Healthier Oklahoma Coalition joins other organizations and healthcare systems across the state, asking Oklahomans who believe they have COVID to avoid emergency rooms and hospitals. Doctors say hospitals are so overwhelmed that they are having issues helping people with non-COVID issues. Unless your COVID symptoms are dire, they ask that you say home or visit an urgent care center for help. Doctors are also asking people to continue following COVID protocol, such as social distancing and wearing a mask in public.
