WRNQ provides its listeners with programming and public service announcements that address issues of concern to our local community. Among the issues determined to be of most concern to the community during the preceding calendar quarter were:

- **Art Education:** Joined by country music DJ Uncle Mike Hansen, co-hosts Poet Gold and Peter Leonard discuss the role of arts education in determining a person's relation to art throughout life. Each person revealed how their experience with art - especially music - as children affected their lifelong relation to art. In past times art, if taught at all, was a minor part of the school curriculum. Although it is often generally more prominent in schools today, it remains a small and separate part of learning. Current, enlightened thinking about art and education is to have art "integrated" into other subjects, like science or history.
