This station airs the following programming to address issues in the public interest:

- 1. News of the Day and/or Community Information on a variety of issues in the public interest.
- 2. <u>Severe Weather Coverage</u> with local weather reports and severe weather coverage, such as winter weather warnings, tornado warnings, and other significant weather events. The station often broadcasts "wall-to-wall" continuous coverage during more significant weather events.
- 3. "Week In Review," a 30 minute local magazine style show covering a variety of local issues.
- 4. <u>Community Service Projects</u> which provide exposure to issues, events, and other activities in the community through a combination of efforts, including public service messages by on-air personalities, produced announcements, remote broadcasts, on-air interviews, and personality appearances at community events.
- 5. <u>Public Service Announcements</u> which provide exposure to issues, events, and other activities in the community through the airing of pre-recorded :30 or 60 second announcements at no charge to the sponsoring organization.
