Slug: NATIONAL GUARD

A shortage of election workers has forced Governor Tony Evers to call on the Wisconsin National Guard to help with the April election. News 19's Mike Beiermeister joins us now. So, Mike, how is the Governor planning to utilize the guard on election day? Army National Guard Soldiers will serve as poll workers at locations throughout the state. Wisconsin election officials report that nearly 60 percent of municipalities are dealing with a shortage of workers due to fears of the spread of COVID19 which means they're short about 7,000 workers. Right now, the Army National Guard is working with clerks to pair up their guardsmen with their local polling stations to help fill those positions. Guardsmen will not be in uniform at the polls. Major General Knapp told me that their goal is have a polling place for every municipality by next Tuesday. A lot of moving pieces right now, but the best thing people can do is to cast their ballots absentee to help relieve some of the stress at the polls next week. The election takes place on April 7th.

Slug: VOTER TURNOUT

Voters will cast ballots next week for Wisconsin's spring election, but many have already requested and submitted absentee ballots. And if you haven't done so, you'll now have a few extra days. News 19's' Mike Beiermeister is here to explain. A federal ruling related to the election. a federal judge ruled that this primary election will not be postponed and voters will be given an extra six days beyond next Tuesday's election to cast their absentee ballot. Now the polls will still be open next Tuesday but we won't know a result from the election until at least April 13th. Yesterday it was announced National Guard soldiers will be asked to help with the spring election at polling locations. As of right now, La Crosse County is unsure if they will use help from the guard but they do have the staff at county polling locations to carry on with the election a number of polling locations have changed. In La Crosse County, we've included those new locations in a story on our website WXOW.com. If you live outside of La Crosse County, you can check where you will vote by heading to myvote.wi.gov. The new deadline for voters to get those absentee ballots to their local clerk will be by 4:00 p.m. on April 13th.

And he also wants the entire election to be done through the mail the governor signed an executive order Friday to call for the special session. One thing you'll notice when you come to the polls are La Crosse police and fire personnel they are helping out at all polling locations in La Crosse earlier today we were over at the Coulee Recovery Center learning how police and fire are playing a role in this election they're mainly helping with handwashing and sanitizing before voters enter their polling location but also helping relieve any congestion safely and a big part of that is safe social distancing making sure that voters are 6 feet apart another thing we've seen today are many voters wearing masks and following that new CDC guideline.

Slug: UNEMPLOYMENT

Over the past three weeks, more than 16 million Americans have filed for unemployment as the covid-19 pandemic continues to shutdown businesses. News 19's Mike Beiermeister joins us now and Mike. Wisconsin accounts for about 300,000 of those requests over that same time frame. That's right Dustin with weekly claims here in the state just shy of 600,000 right now, the Wisconsin department of workforce development is awaiting more guidance from the US department of labor to set up applications and compensation for the recently passed cares act the new federal law includes two new programs that will provide relief money outside of those stimulus checks the DWD is developing an application for Pandemic Unemployment Assistance or PUA which expands unemployment eligibility for those who normally do not qualify, like the self-employed, independent contractors and part time workers the F-PUC program which is short for Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation provides an additional \$600 per week through July for those who are eligible for unemployment or PUA benefits if you were not eligible for unemployment before the cares act was passed on March 27th, and you think you qualify for PUA benefits, you should wait to file until the system is set up the DWD expects it to be up and running later this month however they've been completely overwhelmed right now with all of these elements if you do have questions about filing for unemployment, the DWD is asking you to navigate through their website before calling them they have posted a number of FAQ's there a lot of questions about unemployment right now, so I highly advise you to check out the website the DWD expects those additional payments of 600 dollars to start by April 26th.

Wisconsin elections commission members are working with the postal service to determine what happened.

42-percent voter turnout in La Crosse County Tuesday 45-percent in Monroe County. No absentee numbers from those counties so far. But here's what we know city wise in Onalaska turnout was 46-percent. 5-thousand 199 voters in all. Of those over 5,000 voters just over 75 percent voted absentee we spoke with La Crosse City Clerk Teri Lehrke as well she says in 2016 they counted 8-thousand 583 absentee ballots in this most recent election 9-thousand 98-absentee ballots have been returned. Turnout statewide 34-percent. That is the highest percentage for an April election since 2016. Last year turnout was 27-percent. More than 1-and-a-half million people voted. About 71-percent voted absentee. Last year 12-percent voted absentee.

That fact has many people in other parts of the state questioning whether the governor should treat all areas of the state the same when it comes to restrictions. Reporter Katrina Lim talked to some people in Eau Claire today to see how they felt about the safer at home extension she also posed those questions directly to the governor. On Wednesday, Governor Evers extended Wisconsin's safer-at-home order for another month and a half. With a large percentage of the covid-19 cases in Milwaukee, some rural residents are wondering why should the order apply to them? News 18 stopped by phoenix park to ask folks what they think about the extension and some are definitely

disheartened. Others expressed concerns about our local economy. In the end, Evers said he did not make this decision lightly.

For the fourth time since the coronavirus pandemic began, lawmakers have passed stimulus legislation to help the economy. The 484-billion-dollar bill primarily is earmarked for small businesses. And as ABC's Ines de la Cuetara tells you it's likely not the last of the relief bills. The house overwhelmingly approving a new 484-billion-dollar relief package. Lawmakers returning to Washington to vote on the bipartisan measure in person many wearing masks and gloves some even sharing their personal struggles with the virus. The bill comes after congress passed a 2 trillion-dollar last month. It includes funding for hospitals and testing. And replenishes funding for the paycheck protection program for small businesses. Which ran out of money last week. But the bill does not include money for state governments senate majority leader Mitch McConnell facing criticism for suggesting hard-hit states should file for bankruptcy if they need financial aid. Today New York's Governor Andrew Cuomo-leader of the state with the most covid-19 cases and deaths in the country firing back this as the Labor Department reports an additional 4.4 million Americans filed for unemployment last week. Bringing the total number of jobless claims since the outbreak began-to more than 26 million.

Today the Governor submitted his response to the legal challenge asking the supreme court to reject the challenge it reads in part quote Wisconsin's pandemic laws give DHS broad powers to close schools and forbid public gatherings and issue orders for guarding against the introduction of any communicable disease he continues quote if legislative republicans want to be involved in the state's response to this pandemic, they should stop sitting on the sidelines and start working to find solutions to help farmers, small businesses, and workers.

Some people have already received their stimulus checks and some have not. A local Trempealeau teacher is still waiting on hers but something unusual happened she spoke with News 19's Marcus Aarsvold about how she received someone else's economic impact payment Marcus whose did she get? Instead of getting her own government relief money Nancy Rogers was surprised to receive a twelve-hundred dollar check made out to her deceased mother she understands that it's a busy time for the federal government but she says she really just wants to know what to do with it Nancy Rogers and her husband filed their 2019 taxes digitally and should receive their stimulus checks through direct deposit instead they were shocked to receive a physical check for Nancy's mother who died in February of 2019. First rogers tried contacting the IRS but says she hasn't heard anything back yet. Next, she contacted her local senators and Tammy Baldwin's office responded saying the IRS is aware of the problem and that there's no current solution that she should keep checking the "get my payment" official i-r-s website until the problem can be addressed. Rogers says she and her husband are lucky and that they don't need the stimulus check to survive but she wanted to share her story for those that might be facing the same issue and really need that relief money. She says she is not comfortable cashing the check so for now it's just a waiting game to see what the IRS wants her to do with it. A lot of challenges facing the federal government as they try to get that money dispersed to everyone in the country. Officials say the best option right now is to keep checking back to the "get my payment" IRS website which you can find a link to on our website WXOW.com

The Wisconsin National Guard says it has more that 14-hundred soldiers and airmen serving in response to the pandemic. the guard added 400 soldiers this week to help increase testing efforts including at factories and food processing centers last week, the guard helped to operate the first community-based testing site in the state in buffalo county and more of those sites are popping up. one is scheduled for Sunday in Eau Claire County. Right now, the guard has 11 mobile testing teams with 25 operational by the end of next week. Testing is a big part of moving through the governor's badger bounce back plan. So is contact tracing. In the past two months, the DHS says it has brought on just over 200 contact tracers' staff that work alongside county health departments. And they are looking to hire more. So far, over 1-thousand people have applied to a state job posting.

Slug: MN BUDGET

The coronavirus crisis has taken a major toll on state budgets in Minnesota a deficit of almost 2-and a half-billion is projected for the next couple of years. That's almost 4-billion-dollar change compared to the February forecast which projected a budget surplus. Research predicts revenues will fall by three point six billion while spending will rise by 391 million. the 2-point-3 billion-dollar budget reserve remains available to offset the damage

At Governor Walz covid update this afternoon we learned that eighty percent of the state's covid deaths were among people living in long term care facilities. News 19's Marcus Aarsvold details the health department's new plan to improve conditions for the state's elderly population who are most at risk. Health Commissioner Jan Malcolm says most long term care facilities in Minnesota have at least one or two positive covid-19 cases So as a part of their new protection plan they're going to start testing everyone who lives and works at a long term care facility where a positive case is found. this is change instead of just testing residents and staff at places where there's a large number of positive cases. Health Commissioner Malcolm says this is already happening at Hennepin County health care facilities. So they plan to expand it state wide. It's one the new goals from that five point roll out plan to protect elderly Minnesotans moving forward. Governor Walz says they are ramping up these goals with intentional actions because those living in long term care facilities are most vulnerable due to an increase in underlying health issues and because they live in such close contact to one another.

As we wait for a ruling from the Wisconsin supreme court on Governor Evers stay at home order that runs until may 26th we learned what republican lawmakers intend to do if the court strikes down the order which would give lawmakers more say in the states response to the crisis, Assembly speaker Robin Vos says he wants to focus more on regional restrictions rather than statewide policies. He also wants more specific phases for restaurant reopening including possibly allowing outdoor seating before the main restaurant can reopen. Vos also said he wants to move away from the list of essential businesses that are allowed to remain open while others are not for example Vos questions why it's okay to buy flowers at Walmart but that buying flowers at a flower shop would be a major threat to public health.

Today we learned the La Crosse County health department has decided to change its policy regarding accepting help from the National Guard to set up a mobile testing site. A community test site is typically open for one or two days and people drive thru --without leaving their vehicles - like we saw last week in buffalo county. The ruling will have implications for parochial schools across the country. News 19's Mike Beiermeister spoke with a local attorney for insight into

the issues involved. What it comes down to is a term called ministerial exception which allows religious employers to defy anti-discrimination laws and count certain employees as ministers. It's a principle stemming from the first amendment which halts government's interference on church affairs and that's what the schools are arguing the La Crosse area is home to several religious employers. The supreme court is contemplating which employees at a religious institution should qualify for the ministerial exception and which employees shouldn't this all depends on how closely their work is related to the mission of the organization we've actually seen a similar case here like the one we're seeing in the supreme court. Back in 2002, a teacher at St. Patrick's in Onalaska sued for age discrimination after they decided not to renew her contract the district 4 court of appeals upheld the original decision to side with the teacher stating that ministerial exception did not extend to teachers but the Wisconsin supreme court sided with the schools their decision said her work incorporated the missions and teachings of the religion. We reached out to both Aquinas and Luther high school's but they either declined to comment or did not get back to us in time for the story the court is expected to rule sometime next week.

A racially motivated attack on a Wisconsin woman has brought national attention to Madison. The FBI has joined the investigation after a bi-racial woman says she was set on fire by four white men. As ABC's Romina Puga tells you the alleged attack happened while the young woman was sitting at a stop light. A police search is underway in Wisconsin for the 4 men who allegedly caused second and third degree burns to this 18-year-old bi-racial woman. Althea Bernstein says Wednesday morning she was driving to her brother's home. She was at a stop light, with her window down, when she heard someone yelling a racial slur. When Bernstein looked to see who was yelling, she says she saw four white men. She says one sprayed flammable liquid on her face and neck from a bottle while another threw a burning lighter at her, catching her on fire. Bernstein, who is studying to be a paramedic, says her instincts kicked in-she drove off while patting out the fire. Police say they are looking into the incident as a hate crime. Madison's mayor says even though the investigation is still ongoing, right now it appears this could have been a racially motivated premeditated crime.

Reporter Nadia Romero has the ruling and reaction abortion rights opponents taking to the steps of the nation's highest court after supreme court justices ruled in a close five to four vote that Louisiana's strict abortion law barring doctors from performing abortions unless they had admitting privileges at a nearby hospital is unconstitutional conservative chief justice John Roberts shocked pro-life advocates by tipping the scale and again siding with his liberal counterparts Louisiana's governor John Bel Edwards responded to the ruling in a statement saying: "While I voted for the law in question and am disappointed, I respect the US Supreme Court's decision and trust that Louisiana and our nation will continue to move forward." Those returns have been subpoenaed by congressional investigators but the president claims he is immune from criminal investigation while in office.

Prosecutors released the criminal complaint on the shooting this afternoon. It says the suspected gunman 31 year old Timothy Young of Spring Grove shot and killed 19 year old Anthony Fimple of La Crosse at the Twisted Moose tavern on Third Street just after midnight Friday night. Young is held on one million dollars cash bond at the county jail on first degree intentional homicide charges. Witnesses told police young was well known to the staff at the Twisted Moose which had recently changed its name to the La Crosse Bierhaus. Bar staff say young had had previous incidents at the bar over the past several weeks where they called his behavior weird citing one incident in which young spit on someone and said I have covid. He was asked to leave by tavern staff. Young had come into the tavern about 9 o clock on the night of the shooting then left but returned about 12:30 am but was denied entry at the door. About ten to fifteen minutes later witnesses say they saw Young return armed with a handgun and fired one shot at Fimple before driving off in a car parked just outside. Fimple suffered a head wound and died at a local hospital a short time later. As for the arrest witnesses provided a description of the vehicle. Police located young about fifteen minutes after the shooting at Onalaska Wal mart parking lot. Upon his arrest police say young said he might have overreacted but also said it was worth it while also expressing frustration with the way he had been treated by the victim. The district attorney's office asked for one million dollars bail...the public defender argued for a lower amount.

Be involved. I think when we look ahead and say what we can do in this community, a lot of people are saying oh that's Minneapolis, or that's Milwaukee. What do you say to those people who say we do not have those issues here in our community? Just wait. They will see we do have that issue. You always hear, oh that will never happen in this town, and then you hear, oh I never thought that would happen. So, like the weather if you don't like it, just wait awhile, it will change. So, to those people I always say to them just wait awhile because what you think never could, never will happen, will happen. So, time will tell with those individuals with that mindset. Time will tell. I think it's to understand people in this community are hearing that people of those who have struggled who have faced situations that aren't right. They need to listen to that. They need to understand that. They need to understand within themselves as community members, what can be done now to change this here for those who are experiencing something they shouldn't be experiencing and work with all of us within our community, within government, within leadership to help move us forward as a community. Callie loves being in the water but recently she's had to take it easy because of a ligament tear while not uncommon in pets, vets say they're seeing more visits because of increased activity and pet owners paying closer attention during stay at home orders. One-by-one four-legged friends are being brought to Madison veterinary specialists with tears, sprains and other injuries. One problem doctor Trent Tuttle is seeing a lot of CCL tears. They are similar to an ACL in humans and many times result in surgery and physical therapy. A CCL tear is degenerative so adding more high impact activity wears down the ligament in a dog's knee and speeds up the process. But there are some things we can do to slow it down. Specialists say you should not panic if you think your pet has a tear or sprain. Keep an eye on them and call the vet if you do not see any improvement.

Melisa Raney explains in today's Health Minute. Everyone is waiting for the day when there is a vaccine for the coronavirus, in hopes that things will start going back to normal. Unfortunately, while we wait, many parents are avoiding other vaccines. According to the centers for disease control and prevention, there has been a notable decrease in childhood vaccines ordered through the federal program that immunizes half of the country's children. The drop began the week after President Trump declared a national emergency due to the covid-19 outbreak. In Washington state, the state health department saw a 30-percent drop in childhood vaccines in March, and preliminary data shows a 42-percent decrease in April. The CDC says while it might not be an issue now, once social distancing is relaxed, those who are not immunized will once again be at risk. The American academy of pediatrics says if children are not getting their regular vaccines, they are likely missing other important check-ups, like developmental screenings. They are urging pediatricians and parents to stay on top of it and reassuring nervous parents that it is safe to visit their doctor.

An enlargement of one of the heart's four chambers was the best predictor of mortality among covid-19 patients according to a new study. Mandy Gaither has more in today's Health Minute. Patients with severe coronavirus infections, who presented with enlarged right ventricles of the heart, were most likely to die from the disease based on data from a new study. A team from the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai looked at health records of more than one hundred covid-19 patients hospitalized at Mount Sinai Morningside in New York City between March 26 and April 22nd. 31-percent had dilation of the right ventricle 41- percent died by the end of the study period, compared to 11-percent of those whose right ventricles were not enlarged. The study which has been accepted for publication in the journal of the American college of cardiology says right ventricle enlargement was the only variable significantly associated with mortality in this group of covid-19 patients. The reason behind the new findings remains unknown. Enlargement of the right ventricle can be caused by obstruction of blood flow in the lungs due to blood clots or lung tissue damage, according to the new study's authors. They say direct damage to heart tissue by the coronavirus may also be a contributing factor. The study's lead author says after this research doctors can use bedside echocardiography to identify patients with covid-19 infection at the highest risk of adverse hospital outcomes

Melisa Raney has some tips in today's Health Minute. By now all 50 states have reopened to some degree. And while experts are warning moving too fast could accelerate the covid-19 pandemic, many are wondering if it's even safe to visit businesses. Remember to wear a mask, frequently wash or sanitize your hands and any surface you touch and stay six feet apart from others. Here are a few other tips: 1. Don't go out like a normal day, going from place to place. Limit your outings to one business. 2. If you want to dine in at a restaurant, try and eat outside. The virus circulates more in enclosed spaces. Make sure you are six feet from other tables and wash your hands before and after eating. 3. When heading to a beach or park, read up on the current guidelines and restrictions. Some places will only let you be there if you keep moving. And if it is crowded, find someplace else. 4. Feel like you need to get a good sweat on at the gym? First, make sure you are far away from others. Wipe down every machine or piece of equipment before and after you use it. 5. Want to get your hair cut or get a pedicure? While it is impossible to social distance with employees at places like this, there are some things you can do. Read their safety protocols to ensure they are taking every step to eliminate risks.

Today marked a significant date in Wisconsin's battle against the coronavirus. Wisconsin saw its highest one-day death toll since the outbreak began state health officials report 22 additional deaths today. The previous daily high was 19. Also, on the negative side the state reported its highest daily increase in cases today. Health officials confirmed an additional 599 case since yesterday. The previous record one day increase was 528 set last Wednesday. On the plus side today also marked a new high in daily testing. As some Americans are heading back to work the centers for disease control and prevention have updated guidelines for how to get to places safely. Mandy Gaither has more in today's Health Minute whether you take public transit or go by car the CDC says there are ways to lower your risk of coronavirus infection. First be aware of frequently touched surfaces from kiosks to touchscreens ticket machines to turnstiles limit touching anything that a lot of people have had their hands on and if you must touch these surfaces -- wash your hands for 20 seconds with soap and water -- or rub your hands with sanitizer containing 60-percent alcohol -- as soon as you can. The CDC says social distancing is also important in both cars and on public transit. When possible -- try to travel during non-peak hours -- and stay six feet away from those not in your household consider skipping a row of seats between yourself and other riders avoid gathering in groups and stay out of crowded spaces when possible -- especially at transit stations and stops. For those traveling in taxis or rideshares-- the CDC advises opening windows when possible to improve air circulation -- or adjusting the air conditioner to make sure the air is not recirculating. It also recommends avoiding pooled rides or rides where multiple passengers are picked up who are not in the same household. If traveling in a van or bus -- the CDC says to sit in the back -- if possible, in order to remain at least six feet away from the driver.

Gundersen Health System built a new hospital and clinic in the small town of Hillsboro News 19's Lindsey Ford gives a look and tells us why its unique to its rural clientele. October of 2019 is when the new Gundersen St. Joseph's hospital clinic broke ground to start construction and now it's done. June 15th is when the hospital and clinic will officially open. The new hospital is just a little under 70,000

square feet similar to the size of the current hospital but staff say it is much for efficient. In-patient care has 11 rooms, nine are single rooms and two can be doubles. For example, inpatient care and the ER are close by so healthcare providers can switch from going to the hospital, clinic and ER within minutes. Staff say the hospital employees more than 200 people making it an economic engine in the community which keeps local jobs in the community.

Over this pandemic we have heard a lot about antibody testing tests that are supposed to determine a past infection of covid-19 but in new guidance the centers for disease control and prevention says those tests are not always reliable. Mandy Gaither has more in today's Health Minute. Antibody tests to determine if a person has had a past infection of covid-19 may be wrong up to half of the time the CDC now says. Dr. Sanjay Gupta says a lot of the antibody tests initially put out weren't good the FDA has since put out a policy requiring antibody test makers to submit emergency authorization requests along with proof the tests work the CDC says health officials or health care providers using antibody tests need to use the most accurate tests they can find and might need to test people twice across populations, tests give more accurate results if the disease being tested for is common in the population so, if an infection has only affected a small percentage of people being tested, even a very small margin of error in a test will be magnified.

Balancing home life and home school has been difficult for many during this pandemic but a new report suggests learning from home has been hardest on two groups of students. Mandy Gaither has more in today's Health Minute it is a saying that rings true. In a classroom education is more equalized students have access to supplies, technology, and their teacher. At home it is a different story for some a new survey of 15-hundred parents who chose to answer via Facebook messenger shows major gaps in remote learning based on family income. The report by the advocacy group parents together found that parents with incomes of less than 25-thousand dollars are ten times more likely to say their kids are doing little or no remote learning those students are also three times more likely not to have consistent access to a device and five time more likely to go to a school not offering distance learning materials or activities at all. In addition to low-income students struggling one other group is having a hard time as well. Nearly 40% of parents whose kids should be receiving individualized support or are entitled to other special education services say they are not receiving any support at all. While the study isn't scientific, the group says more resources are needed to prevent low-income students and students with learning challenges from falling further behind. For those struggling with homeschooling the group says one of the best ways to teach your children is by telling them about the lesson then immediately showing them how to do the work you can do a math problem together or watch a short online video then let your student give it a try with your help, if needed.

La Crosse hospitals are screening people at the door for covid-19 and they of course take other precautions. But Gundersen and Mayo health professionals say some who need care wait too long or avoid coming for appointments. News 19's Marcus Aarsvold is here to explain why. An example health expert gave me is that they're seeing people wait too long to get their appendix checked out. So when they finally come into emergency room they're in a lot of pain and that level of pain is preventable hospitals have opened their doors for all patients if a pre-covid surgery was canceled, they're getting re-scheduled now doctor Paul Mueller says emergency departments nationwide have seen a 50% decrease in patient visits because people are still scared to go in. Both experts agree that it's good to see the community taking precautions but not to the extreme of avoiding health care altogether. Opening the door so more people can return. They are also alternatives for those still not comfortable going into the buildings physically folks also have the option to set up virtual consultations so they can stay home and still take care of their health. Hospital workers also say they're thankful that the La Crosse community followed social distancing and safety measures to help flatten the curve and that they wouldn't feel as confident re-opening their doors if they didn't think they could count on people to continue wearing masks and washing their hands frequently.

There are new evidence people who use vaping products or electronic cigarettes are more likely to get coronavirus and symptoms could be severe. But tracking the numbers in Wisconsin may be tough for health officials. Capitol bureau chief Emilee Fannon tells you why health experts are now sounding the alarm on those who use vaping devices during the pandemic, especially teens. Doctors and researchers at UW Health say if you use vaping products you are more likely to catch covid-19. Vaping is known to cause lung inflammation which doctors say is tied to some of the most severe coronavirus cases. Health professionals say there's now more concern for youth who vape an age group that was not as likely to contract the virus. The department of health services said reporting vaping related injuries has become "very *uncommon." DHS said it is because staff who typically track these cases have shifted their focus to covid-19. DHS also believes fewer are reporting vaping injuries because not as

Nationally new reports show nine states have hit record numbers in new coronavirus cases, 15 are seeing more hospitalizations. A record increase in cases out of Florida. The state's department of health reporting more than 3,000 new people diagnosed with covid19 in the last day. Governor Ron Desantis insisting the surge is linked to increased testing. But FEMA charts obtained by ABC News show that Alabama, Florida, Arizona, South Carolina, Mississippi, and Texas have concerning percentage of positivity rates meaning no matter how many people are being tested a higher percentage of the population is testing positive. A former Baraboo high school student is speaking out about her experiences with racist speech and symbols like the confederate flag. Dasia banks filed a federal lawsuit accusing the school district of

failing to protect her from discrimination. As reporter Francisco Almenara tells you a growing national movement gives her renewed hope. It is hard for Dasia Banks to be back where she felt so uncomfortable but standing in front of the Sauk County civil war memorial, honoring the people from the area who fought against slavery, helped make up for that. In a lawsuit, she and her lawyers argue that the Baraboo school district, among other accusations, did not protect her from racist speech and symbols from fellow classmates. With the events of the past few weeks, they see their cause echoed across the country. Banks finished her schooling in the Madison school district, where she says she didn't see the confederate flag at all for her the past few weeks and seeing the protests have been a sigh of relief. There are other people fighting for what I'm fighting for, it's just a really good feeling and seeing the marine corps and NASCAR ban depictions of the confederate flag, makes banks feel like progress is happening. Slowing speedy drivers down at northside elementary is only one part of a city-wide plan to decrease car and pedestrian accidents. Seeing a safer commute starts with adding barriers to school streets. And ends with your contribution by going to the city's website to take a survey based on your neighborhood so your voice is heard. After people take the survey next the city will put up cones on places like Gillette Street to simulate what these curb extensions would do. That survey is due by July first so if people want to weigh in, they need to fill it out soon. This is the first big update and change for the "safe routes to schools" plan since 2007. Lightning can be fascinating to watch but also extremely dangerous. According to the national weather service there are over 25 million lightning strikes a year in the US and each could be potentially deadly. Meteorologist Warren Sears joins us to help us further understand lightning but he also tells us how to stay safe when this powerful phenomenon is present. The pure power of lightning is nothing short of incredible but it is still unbelievably dangerous. This week is national lightning safety awareness week and I'm aiming to teach you more about what to do when it strikes according to the NWS nearly 20-30 people die each year in the US due to lightning and most of those deaths occur outdoors the safest place to be in a storm is indoors when you are inside stay away from windows and avoid using water as it can be a good conductor of electricity in the unfortunate case you find yourself outdoors when lightning is present stay away from tall objects like trees also we know metal is a great conductor of electricity so stay away from fences, light poles, and especially avoid holding metal like golf clubs or baseball bats if you can't take shelter indoors car is the next safest option as it provides some protection i might be biased but here a few eye opening facts about lightning while the odds are in your favor it's still possible the NWS estimates your chance of getting struck by lightning in a given year is 1 in 1.2 million the good news is the coulee region hasn't had any documented lightning fatalities in the last 10 years according to the NWS but with that said never let your guard down and the best piece of advice when thunder roars head indoors. Thanks Warren. Many have heard that lightning can never strike the same place twice that is actually a myth. Lightning often times will strike the same place repeatedly especially tall pointy and isolated objects. The national weather service says the empire state building gets struck an average of 23 times a year

COVID-19 COVERAGE ON WEB AND SOCIAL MEDIA

Since April 1, WXOW has produced approximately 700 stories related to COVID-19. Content related to this topic is by far the most viewed content on our website. The content includes daily updates from our local health departments, medical information, along with stories on where people can go to get tested and find additional help.

We've also had related content as it pertains to the economic impact the virus has had on the economy. Besides informing viewers of the latest developments, we've featured stories with links on where people can go to get help with unemployment questions and job hunting. This is in addition to a special section of links to resources available to the public. All of this is contained in our COVID-19 section of our website found at https://www.wxow.com/coronavirus

WXOW also live streamed on our website and our Facebook page 88 individual live events related to COVID-19. They included updates from both WI and MN state health departments as well as ones from the La Crosse County Health Department. Each of those provided details on ways people can stay safe as well as the latest figures on the spread of the virus. The live streams from the state health departments averaged at least an hour in length while the La Crosse County ones averaged anywhere from 30-45 minutes in length. During these live streams to our viewers, new programs such as the COVID-19 Compass were unveiled to the public on safety measures needed to reduce the number of cases of the virus. This feature detailed the threat level posed by the virus and the preventative steps needed to reduce the threat level. While they lasted, we also carried every live on the website and Facebook page the briefings from the White House Coronavirus Task Force.

Part of our online coverage included live streaming on May 5 the Wisconsin Supreme Court hearing arguments for the state's Safer-At-Home order, which was subsequently struck down by the court. The 1:45 hearing showed viewers how the process worked at the state's highest court, albeit in a virtual setting.

Also during the pandemic, to help local businesses, we began our Takeout Guide and Business Guide pages on our website. With restaurants closed to dining, the Takeout Guide provides information such as services offered, whether delivery or curbside pick up was available, and links to the restaurant's Facebook page or website. The Business Guide operates in much the same way as the Takeout Guide in showing what businesses are open, location, and what services they are offering. It is more focused on other businesses outside of the restaurant industry. Lastly, part of the content on the Business Guide lists whether or not that business is hiring and if so, how people can apply for employment.

That was an email from a viewer after our first installment -- on Policing and Race. Our Daybreak anchors, Candace Price and Dustin Luecke, sat down with Cecil Adams and La Crosse Police Chief Shawn Kudron. Adams helped create the African American Mutual Assistance Network.

The idea is to give different community members a chance to get together with local leaders to share their experience, what they would like to know from each other and what we all can do to listen, learn and continue the conversations.

Highlights from each discussion air on Daybreak and MidDay. The full discussions (around 30 minutes in length) are posted to WXOW's YouTube page, with links shared on our website and social media pages.

This is part of what we hope will be an ongoing effort to use our platform to host meaningful conversations among those in our community working toward positive progress. The second published conversation featured two pillars for LGBTQ+ rights in the La Crosse community. They discussed how far the movement has come, and where it is today.

Future conversations (already being set up) will involve Hmong community members and religious leaders of color from different denominations.

SOCIAL UNREST COVERAGE ON WEB AND SOCIAL MEDIA

The other subject that has drawn viewers surrounds the George Floyd case and the ensuing protests, riots, and police reform. We have done produced dozens of stories for our website on those topics.

Part of our coverage provided by WXOW to our viewers includes live streams on both our website and social media pages of the peaceful protests here in the La Crosse area. They include events in La Crose on June 3, June 7, and June 11.

In total, we've done 24 separate live streams of local, state, and national events. They include everything from protests in Madison and Minneapolis, to updates from Minnesota Governor Tim Walz (June 2, 3, 5, 10, 12, 16, and 18) on the protests and what the state is doing to deal with racism and police reform. The live coverage also featured George Floyd's memorial service on June 4 and his funeral on June 9.

OTHER EVENTS

On May 4, we live streamed on both our website and Facebook a debate between the two candidates for Wisconsin's 7th Congressional District, part of which falls into our viewing area. The debate covered a broad range of topics including the economy and dealing with the coronavirus.

On May 20, we also carried a virtual town hall meeting with presidential candidate Joe Biden and our local congressman, Rep. Ron Kind. Viewers from Western Wisconsin were able to ask questions of the candidate. The economy, farming issues, and COVID-19 assistance were among the topics discussed in the 90 minute event.

Additional community coverage online included our Jefferson Awards special on June 18 honoring local volunteers who give back to our area. We also featured the Holmen School District School Board meeting on June 22 regarding a memorial wall that's being removed which is causing wide concern among community members.
